Pencils of all different colors and different candidates filled the box. I wondered where all these pencils came from and how did they manage to make it into one shoe box? I asked

the woman running the sale if she collected pencils? She said, "They were my father's. He's dead."

"Sorry for your loss," I said. "Did he collect pencils?" "They're just pencils."

I have always wondered about people who collect match books. Can they get fire insurance on their collection? If their collection of match books went up in flames could they collect on the policy? The matches were just doing their intended job. It would be like complaining because water is wet.

Every rubber band in my grandfather's drawer would snap when you stretched it. You would be wrapping a deck of cards and the band would snap. # To your good health

Woman complains of
feeling hot

**Dear Dr. Roach:** I am a 66 year old woman who usually is too hot. When I tell my doctors, they just sort of laugh it off. It is making my life miserable because if I keep the heat or air conditioning where it is comfortable for me, it is too cold for others. I hate summer and stay inside in the air conditioning.

I keep the temperature in my house at 64 degrees F. in the summer and winter. I know other members of my family do not tolerate being out in the sun when it's hot, but they aren't plagued with

being too hot otherwise.

The sensation of being too warm comes and goes. I am about 40-pounds overweight, and have been for most of my life. The sensitivity has intensified as I've aged. I had a hysterectomy in my 30s, and I know some of my hormones were off. — J.R.

Answer: Heat intolerance is common and has several possible causes. The short list includes excess thyroid hormones, loss of estrogen and being overweight. The long list includes, among many others, some serious conditions, such as polycythemia vera (a blood disorder of having too

many red blood cells), inflammation of blood vessels, multiple sclerosis and tumors that secrete substances that can affect blood vessels, such as carcinoid or pheochromocytoma. These are uncommon to rare diseases and usually have other symptoms, and many would likely have progressed over time.

The part of your story that bothers me is that this has been bothering you for years and your doctors haven't taken it seriously. Even if it isn't a life threatening condition, it's been bothering you, and they should have at least tried to help.

It's time to have a frank discussion with your current or a new doctor and explain that you are concerned about this, that it's affecting your life and comfort, and that you want to be taken seriously. I'm not saying your doctor needs to evaluate you for everything on the long list, but he or she does need to listen, think and explain.

better to take Lipitor at night? Is that true for all statins? — M.E.

Answer: The cholesterol in our blood comes from the food we eat and also by the cholesterol our body makes. Most cholesterol synthesis happens at night. So, it's better to take a statin at night, particularly for statins that don't stay in the body a long time (this is referred to as a short half-life). Lovastatin pravastatin (Mevacor), (Pravachol), fluvastatin (Lescol) and simvastatin (Zocor) have short halflives, and data have shown better results with these taken at night.

On the other hand, atorvastatin (Lipitor) and rosuvastatin (Crestor) have long half-lives, so it isn't so important to take these at night.

Naturally, if you are taking any statin, you should continue a careful diet as well. Taking a medication doesn't take away the harm of a poor diet.

1. Give yourself plenty of time. Chances are, the trip will take longer than the GPS predicts. Be aware of when rush hour is likely to be in communities you'll drive through.

**2. Sit awhile before you drive.** Don't take off until you've familiarized yourself with all the truck's switches and gauges. Make sure the mirrors are properly adjusted.

**3. Watch out for blind spots.** The Federal Motor

Miller's

Carrier Safety Administration points out that trucks have oversized blind spots known as the "No-Zone." Bear these in mind, especially when changing lanes or coming to a stop.

**4. The things you carry.** Truck rental agreements generally include language from the U.S. Department of Transportation prohibiting the "carrying or hauling of explosives and other dangerous articles." That means don't pack such flammable items as paint, chemicals, cleaning materials, solvents, propane, gasoline and so on. Your rental agent can

help you tell whether something you want to bring along is allowed.

5. Be smart about size. "Trucks are taller, wider and may weigh up to 10 times more than the average car," explained Don Mikes, senior vice president-rental, Penske Truck Leasing. They also take longer to stop. Ease off of the accelerator early when approaching a stop. This also helps keep your cargo from shifting.

6. Protect your property. "Most insurance and credit card companies won't cover truck rentals under existing policies," Mikes added. If your insurance company is among them, consider signing up for additional coverage options to protect yourself and your belongings. You may feel more confident knowing that his company offers free 24/7 emergency roadside assistance.

**7. Look for a sign.** Pay attention to road signs pertaining to trucks such as weigh station stops, truck or lane restriction signs and overhead clearance postings.

**8. Park smart.** Set the emergency brake every time.

# Creative container combinations

by Dr. Leonard Perry, Horticulture Professor, University of Vermont

Combining several types of flowers in the same growing container has been popular in England and Europe for some time, and has become quite popular now in this country as well. Combine the right plants and they are easy to maintain, attractive, and perfect for those with small spaces or little time to garden.

With so many new plants to choose from, including perennials and even tropical plants in addition to annual flowers, how do you decide? Chris Schlegel, head grower for D.S. Cole Growers in New Hampshire, has some suggestions. She says you should consider both cultural needs for your choices, and basic design principles.

Since your choices will be in the same container, make sure they have a similar tolerance for sun or shade. Make sure the moisture and fertility requirements are compatible. Use plants with similar vigor, so that one strong selection doesn't overtake the planter and grow over less vigorous ones. Reading the labels on plants, and asking professionals at complete garden stores, can help answer these questions.

Then consider design. For container gardens to have the most impact. three various plant forms should be used. There should be tall plants that give an upright character to the planter, mounded plants to add volume, and cascading or trailing plants to visually soften the edges.

ferred to as "thrillers" for the upright or unusual that attract attention first, "fillers" that add the mass and fill in, and the "spillers" that cascade over the side. Thrillers are big and bold, often leaves. with large Thrillers can be plants with unusual foliage, vibrant colors, or unique

Fillers are often foliage, filling in or weaving about the thriller.

Spillers help soften pot edges and sides, and visually anchor the pot to the ground. Often they contrast in color or texture with the other plants.

You should use a variety of plant textures to add interest. Texture is the visual effect created, usually by size or shapes of leaves.

Mixed planters can be either symmetrical and formal, or asymmetrical and informal. To be symmetrical, visually divide the container in half, and either side should be the same as the other. To create symmetry, use even numbers of plants, and ones that remain discreet and don't grow together.

To be most aesthetically pleasing, the plant size should be one to two times the height of the container.

Generally there are four color schemes you might consider. Monochromatic color schemes rely on various shades of a single color, such as the yellow or red combinations described above. Polychromatic combinations are just the opposite, using a variety of colors. The British are famous for such combinations, often using 10 or more different flowers and colors in the same planter.

are seen from a distance, while the cool colors (green, blue, purple) are more soothing and should be seen at closer range.

Complimentary color schemes make use of colors that are opposite each other on the color wheel.

One last color effect is to contrast, or "echo", one color in a leaf for instance with another plant.

Persian Shield, the mint-leaf, and the silver licorice plant are examples of silver foliage being used to act as a neutral color, and to bring out other colors in combinations. White flowers also can be used effectively to separate colors that might otherwise clash.


Don't forget to consider herbs and vegetables in your combinations, either with flowers or by themselves. A colorful stake with tomatoes or beans in the center of a large pot might be surrounded with carrots as filler, and flowers as spillers. Or just surround them with beans to fill and spill. Consider colorful Swiss chard, or red-leaved lettuces, mixed in with flowers. There are quite a few ornamental and colorful peppers that blend well in container combinations.

Wherever you go, watch for good design combinations and make note of them and the plants. You

may want to hold plants next to each other when shopping in spring to gauge the effect. Don't be afraid to just start combining plants. You'll soon learn which you like and which work together better. The possibilities are almost infinite!

# A Berry delicious taste of summer

#### by Angela Shelf Medearis

Berries aren't just a tasty treat; they're a healthy one, too. A study reported in the journal Circulation found that "women who ate the most strawberries and blueberries — three or more servings per week — were 34 percent less likely to suffer an early heart attack."

The findings came from the Nurses Health Study II, which followed some 93,600 women aged 25-42 for 18 years, checking in with them periodically to see what they were eating and how it was affecting their health. The heart health benefits were likely due in part to the presence of anthocyanin, an antioxidant compound found naturally in bright red fruits like strawberries.

Berries offer other health benefits as well. One cup of strawberries provides 140 percent of the recommended daily allowance of vitamin C — more than a medium orange - and 16 percent of recommended dietary fiber. This fiber content makes strawberries low on the glycemic index, meaning they help slow the body's process of turning the berries into blood sugar. Strawberries also contain more than 25 percent of recommended manganese, which helps process choles-

# Whatchamacallits

This week's items are different types of cast iron plumb bobs. They are usually suspended from a string and used as a vertical reference line. Plumb bobs are commonly used by builders to ensure that tall structures are level.

There are many variations of these vintage tools. Of the pictured items the largest one has a built in reel that provides a specialized string attachment and movement of the plumb bob. The smallest and thinnest plumb bob has a hardened steel end indicated by the darker color at the tip. The medium sized plumb bob has a head that can be unscrewed in order to attach the string on the inside. All three of the pictured items look to be 19th century American made plumb bobs.

The word plumb in plumb bob comes from the fact that these tools were originally made of lead. Plumb comes from the old French word plomb which means lead.

You may have heard the phrase to plumb

the depths of something. This comes from the fact that plumb bobs can be utilized by sailors to determine the depth of water.

If attached to a suitable scale a plumb bob can also be used as an inclinometer which is an instrument that measures angles of slope, elevation or depression of an object with respect to gravity.

Plumb bobs date as far back as 3150 BC. During this time there is evidence of ancient Egyptians using these type of instruments to help construct their impressive monuments. In more modern times heavy plumb bobs were utilized in the construction of early skyscrapers by hanging them on a wire in the elevator shafts.

Today's building professionals have replaced the use of plumb bobs with water levels. These modern tools work much like plumb bobs but they have the advantage of measuring something horizontally as well as vertically.




