MVR welcomed guest speakers from Catholic Charities Dispute Resolution Center








Women in the Mohawk Valley Bus Trip set May 20



The Mohawk Valley will 'March for Babies' in Utica on May 19

UTICA, NY — April showers has brought May flowers...and the annual March for Babies event in Utica. The Mohawk Valley March of Dimes will be joined by hundreds of families and community leaders on Saturday, May 19 to celebrate the organization's biggest fundraiser. This year, the location will be Mohawk Valley Community College in Utica

Laura Powers of Strategic Financial Services is this year's March for Babies Chair and shared, went into "When I preterm labor on Christmas Day at nearly six months into my pregnancy, my world was suddenly filled with uncertainty and fear, but also love and hope. I soon learned about March of Dimes and the significance they have in the world of pregnancies and babies." Powers' twin sons were born on New Year's Day premature at only 26 1/2 weeks weighing just over two pounds each and spent more than two months in

Crouse NICU while they fought to survive. They are now happy, healthy 4-year olds who help their parents advocate for healthy pregnancies and babies by supporting the March of Dimes.

This year's Mohawk Valley Ambassador Family is the Suppa family. Only 28 weeks into Maria Suppa's pregnancy, her twin daughters were born, and they remained in Crouse NICU for eight weeks. Another unique part of her story is that her daughters were born two days apart from each other. The Suppa girls are the face of "Team Mary & Anna" and will be leading the 2018 March for Babies in Utica. Suppa explains, "The March of Dimes is a very important cause to my family and I know that without their work and achievements, my girls may not be here with me today."

Powers explained, "While the March of Dimes places a keen eye on reducing prematurity through education and

research, they are an organization for all babies. They were instrumental in eradicating polio in the 1970s, and more recently they have assisted with screening newborns for more than 20 serious but treatable conditions in all states." Powers added, "If you had a full-term pregnancy and healthy baby, March of Dimes has been a part of that journey."

Suppa echoed that sentiment and shared, "Every baby's life has been touched by March of Dimes' work — even the healthiest of babies."

The March for Babies is open to the public and all are welcomed to join an existing team or create their own (www.marchforbabies.org). Guests are encouraged to come early during the registration period to enjoy music, children's activities, a visit by the Utica Zoo mobile and a performance by Danceography. LiFT (Little Falls Theater) will also be at the event dressed as various characters and offering photo-ops with

Alphabet Man

Every child has to learn the alphabet before learning to read, so some toys for those under 5 years old have been "teaching toys." Blocks were the first. The oldest mention of alphabet blocks was in 1693 in England. But blocks with letters and pictures were not available for most families until 1820 when large numbers of sets were made in a factory. Well-to-do young girls educated in the 18th century learned the alphabet while sewing samplers. They had to be able to stitch identification on all the family linens when they married. Most toys were made to teach religion, like a carved wooden Noah's ark, or to teach a skill like cooking using a toy stove, pots and pans. Toy makers created a few teaching toys, cards with letters and cloth alphabet books.

A rare, famous teaching toy is the "Alphabet Man" or "Yankee Schoolmaster." The 10-inch-tall iron figure of a man had an arm that moved when a lever was pushed. The man blinked his eyes, raised his left arm and pointed to a hole high on his chest. A letter appeared and the student had to name it. The man is dressed like a schoolmaster and looks like a stern teacher. No one knows who made this complicated toy that was patented in 1884. Or why his right arm is held behind his back and his index finger is pointing to the side. Several of the men have

sold in the past decade. The pictured toy with some missing paint sold at Bertoia Auctions in New Jersey for \$23,600.

Q: I have my mother's antique satin wedding dress from 1931. It's in perfect condition. I would like to know if it's worth anything or if anyone would want it

A: Yes, there is interest in old wedding dresses and gowns. You could donate it to a local historical museum or an organization that will resell it for a charitable cause. You could sell it to a vintage clothing store. Or it could be turned into something else. Old wedding dresses can be used to make christening gowns or bride or princess outfits for small children who like to play dress-up. The fabric can be repurposed to make pillows or enclosed in a locket, frame or Christmas ornament. It also can be used to make scarves, decorate baby blankets, bassinet skirts or wedding or baby photograph albums.

Whatchamacallits

This week's Whatchamacallit is a chisel. However, this differs from previous chisels — it was used for stone. The name of this chisel is the claw (or teeth) chisel.

There are many steps involved in carving stone. As most steps involve sub-steps, this will be as general as pos-





sible for simplicity.

The steps involved are planning, layout, roughing out, defining and finishing. The step which would use the claw chisel is defining. At this part of the process, the stone block or slab has taken its main shape but has many rough edges. The craftsman would hold the claw chisel at a 45° angle, gently tapping the end of the chisel with a mallet to refine the shapes and grooves of the stone.

All teeth of the chisel would need to be touching the stone or else the crafter would risk damaging their chisel or bruising the stone.

After using the claw chisel, a flat chisel would be used to erase the teeth marks from the stone. This would be the end to the defining process before finishing.

The chisels featured look to be made of iron and have carvings in the handles, most likely the name of the owner of the chisel. The mallet is made of strong wood, possibly oak, but is not the usual mallet used for stone work. The preferred mallet would be made of copper, have a copper head or be made completely out of some other metal to prevent the chisel from damaging the mallet.

Chicken soup for autism

Twenty-three year old Billy Nacmias used to weigh 280 pounds. Barricaded in his room with his eyes glued to a computer he ate obsessively. His temper tantrums would often result in a house turned upside down. On several occasions his parents had to call for help to restrain him. Billy is a victim of autism which in his earlier vears left him shy, incommunicative and reclusive. But, an incident occurred in a now defunct New York City high school where a physically teacher abused Billy resulting in a severe change in his disposition. The once quiet boy grew into a violent giant who became a danger to himself as well as

the people around him.

Due to the outcome of a court case resulting from the abusive incident at school, and in way of reparations, the city offered to foot the bill for Billy to reside at The Center for Discovery, a 1,000-acre facility located in the heart of the Catskill Mountains. The center, staffed by doctors, nurses, councilors and instructors. is well equipped to meet the needs of the handicapped who reside there.

Beginning a new life, Billy roomed with four other boys while learning to care for farm animals which resulted in a tremendous increase in his physical activity. He eventually specialized in chickens and egg production. Put on a healthy diet

of organic foods, many of them grown on the center's grounds, Billy, within a year lost more than 100 pounds.

> On a visit to see how his son was doing, father Jack was moved to tears when he saw Billy gently and skillfully carrying several chickens he was transferring to a different area. When done with the chore Billy greeted his parents with open arms. "His disposition has done a 'one-80'," said his mother Jane.

> As time passed Billy had learned enough to teach newcomers how to care for chickens and clean, grade, candle and pack eggs. He also worked with horses and sheep.

> Time passed rapidly and Billy was nearing 21 years of age, which would make him no longer eligible to reside at the center. He had become so adept at his farming skills and teaching them to others that his leaving would be a loss for the center as well as for the on-the-job skilled farmer. He had been there for more than two years. He was slated to go to an adult oriented facility. Councilors wanted him to stay at the center to continue teaching the skills he had learned to newcomers.

Fortunately, a program opened up giving Billy a job and a permanent home at

the center. No doubt the change was due to Billy's valued efforts and the realization that "farm therapy" is also good for handicapped adults. He has now been there for about five years.

On other fronts Billy is a team leader when out on nature hikes. To his parents' delight, he has taken an interest in acting and has starred as Scrooge in an on-thegrounds production of "A Christmas Carol." He also had the lead role in "Guvs and Dolls" and is now in rehearsal for the role of Lazar Wolf in "Fiddler on the Roof."

No longer alone and barricaded in his room, Billy calls his parents every day after early morning farm chores. He recently made a sevenday visit home for Easter in Breezy Point, NY. When asked if he would like to extend his stay Billy shook his head and said apologetically,


"Thanks Mom and Dad, but I got to get back to my chickens."

Recycling coffee wastes and other May gardening tips

Recycling coffee wastes, waiting to move springflowering bulbs and getting rid of tent caterpillars in fruit trees are some of the gardening activities for this month.

Coffee grounds contain some major nutrients (nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium) as well as some micronutrients, so put them to work in your garden. Allow them to dry and then spread them around the base of plants. Lettuce, especially, seems to benefit, and the grounds may benefit acid-loving plants since the grounds are slightly acidic. Coffee grounds also will deter slugs. Slit coffee filters and place them around the base of hosta stems, or scatter the coffee grounds, if slugs are a problem.

If you want to move some spring-blooming bulbs to another spot, or thin thick clumps of daffodils, wait until the foliage has turned yellow later in summer, then carefully dig them up and



let them dry in a shady spot for a few days. Store the bulbs in a cool, dry place for the summer until it's time to plant them in fall.

If you haven't planted containers yet, consider adding a water-absorbing product (sold as this in garden stores) to the soil first. You only need a small amount (follow label directions), with the result being that you'll need to water less often as plants grow. This kind of addition is especially useful in hanging baskets that tend to dry out quickly, especially those lined with coir (coconut husk fiber), and in pots made of fiber or clay.

Check apple, cherry and other fruit trees for nests of tent caterpillars. Blast low-lying nests with water to destroy them, or knock them to the ground and destroy them. A spray of BtK (make sure to get the "K" version) will kill emerging caterpillars but, being a natural bacterium, is not toxic to beneficial insects, birds or humans.

Hummingbirds arrive back in our area usually in late April in southern locations, early May in the north. After their incredibly long journey northward, they're ready for food. Hang a hummingbird feeder or two this time of the year, and either use hummingbird food you can buy (a powder to mix with water), or make your own.

To make your own food for "hummers", add two cups of sugar to a quart of water, heat to dissolve, then allow to cool before placing out. Don't use any other additives such as food coloring. Refrigerate what you don't use, and replace the feeder food every few days. If your feeder hangs from a pole, and ants find it, put Vaseline on a section of the pole to deter the ants.

Each year in the recent past, new annual flowers were displayed at the Burlington Waterfront Park and rated by Dr. Perry (pss.uvm.edu/ppp/aaswp. html), so you can find out which grow best in our


North Country summers. Some of the top flowers in recent years included Toucan Red canna, Bandana Pink lantana and Bicolor Pink Stream alyssum. Several petunias rated highly Supertunia Picasso in Purple, Vista Bubblegum and Vista Fuchsia. There were several excellent foliage annuals grown for their colorful leaves. Among these were Black Stockings fountain grass (this one can

reach 7 feet high with roots that break pots), Sweet Caroline Bewitched Green with Envy sweet potato, Peter Wonder coleus, Royal Hawaiian Black Coral and Maui Gold elephant ears and Quicksilver artemisia.

Among the many other gardening activities for this month are watching for ticks, pruning off lilac blooms when finished and dividing perennials if they're overgrown.





Herkimer BOCES VP-TECH students gain business experience by designing, selling shirts

HERKIMER — If you see someone wearing a VP-TECH shirt, know that a lot of learning and hard work went into it.

Herkimer-Fulton-Hamilton-Otsego BOCES Valley Pathways in Technology Early College High School students in VP-TECH business teacher Andrew students submitted their orders using. The business administration team created an Excel sales spreadsheet to centrally track orders and revenue coming through. The design team was primarily responsible with coming up with the design of the shirts.

Students had free range

for how they wanted to design the shirts. They could draw them free hand or put them together using applications on the computer of their choice. Pieces of each group's design were incorporated into the final product. Local company A&P Master Images put together a proof

based on the student input that the students then approved for printing.

The class also decided on a fair price to charge that would cover costs and allow the class to make a profit.

When the order came in, students separated the clothing by shirt type and then by size. Then they fulfilled orders by reviewing order forms and assembling the shirts in their packaging. Two students assembled each order, and then another two students quality-checked the order to ensure that the correct item was being placed in the bag. A packing slip was included with each order and signed by each student that was involved with the quality check and assembly of the order.

"The assembly process allowed students to gain a little perspective on what quality assurance is and why it is so critical," Carpenter said. "Through that experience, the students quickly realized that had we not quality checked the

work before sending the product out the door, we would have actually had a few mistakes that were found through the quality-checking process."

Students sold almost \$600 of clothing to students and faculty, and the class profited by more than \$100 that will be used for future class enrichment activities. Plans are already in the works to explore other items the class

could sell to raise more money and generate further learning experiences.

"In the end, this was an excellent hands-on project that allowed students to put into practice 21st century skills that are transferable to any field that a student may wish to pursue," Carpenter said. "They had to practice teamwork, and the project was meant to simulate running your own business."

Carpenter's ninth-grade work readiness class recently designed and then sold T-shirts, long-sleeve shirts and hooded sweat-

shirts to benefit the class. "The students were involved with every aspect of the project, as it was meant to simulate a business work environment," Carpenter said. "There was a retail team, a design team, a business administration team and a marketing team."

Project-based learning, real-world work situations and using technology were big parts of this project and are areas of focus at VP-TECH in general. VP-TECH is in its third year of operation. VP-TECH students start in ninth grade and spend four to six years in the program — leaving with a Regents diploma, an associate degree in quality assurance from Herkimer College, a certification in advanced manufacturing and connections with local businesses.

The marketing team put together flyers to distribute to VP-TECH students announcing the sale of the shirts. The retail team put together an order form that





Knowing what to expect during the commencement ceremony and being prepared can help tame nerves and ensure the day moves along as smoothly as possible.


Get clothing set


