James 4:11 tells us to not speak evil of or talk against one another. When we see or hear something another person is doing or saying and we disagree with them, usually we are comparing their action or words to our own paradigm and knowledge of the situation. This is called "judging." We are not to do this.

As a pastor, I often see and hear people criticize and complain about one another. Most arguments and disagreements come from a simple misunderstanding. James tells us in **James 1:19** to be "swift to hear and slow to speak." When we try harder to understand the other person than to come up with a defense, many misunderstandings would be cleared

up before they started. So often we speak against someone because what they have done or said is different than we would have, but in reality it is not wrong or bad, just different. This is a sign of being haughty, or proud, being arrogant in thinking our way is the only "right" way.

There is only one Judge of the heart, the Lord Jesus Christ (II

Timothy 4:8). Jesus Himself taught in **Matthew 7:1** "judge not, that you be not judged." In other words, as He explains in verse 2, people are going to criticize you in the same way that you criticized them. If we are not critical of other people, they are much less likely to be critical of us. Let Jesus judge them. He will judge righteously, knowing their heart and motives.









Utica Zoo officially announces the arrival of four Mexican Gray Wolves Zoo plays important role in national conservation efforts

UTICA – Utica Zoo is excited to officially announce the arrival of four new male Mexican Grav Wolves (Canis lupus bailevi) from California. The new wolves have joined our lone female wolf, Sierra, a long-time resident of the zoo. Last year, we sadly announced the loss of Aztec, Sierra's sister, to an aggressive form

"Even though it sometimes happens in the wild, ideally we do not want our animals - especially a species like MexiWolf Recovery program.

All Mexican Gray Wolves are owned by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS), and managed by the Association of Zoos and Aquariums (AZA) Species Survival Plan. The two organizations oversee the care and housing of each Mexican Gray Wolf on an individual basis. Utica Zoo was in immediate contact with both organizations after the passing of Aztec to determine the best course of action for Sierra.

Fortunately, the zoo

However, earlier this year, she was spayed and her reproductive organs were sent to AZA's Reproductive Management Center in St. Louis, where they are cryopreserved. From the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service website: "The Mexican wolf is the rarest subspecies of gray wolf in North America. Once common throughout portions of the southwestern United States, the Mexican wolf was all but eliminated from the wild by the 1970s. In 1977, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service initiated efforts to conserve the species. In 1998, Mexican

From an original seven animals, the current population of Mexican Grav Wolves in captive care is 281, spanning 55 different institutions. Currently, there are 114 living in the wild as part of species recovery efforts. The arrival of the males represents the continued dedication and important role the Utica Zoo plays in the conservation of this critically endangered species.

Since their initial arrival, the new males have adapted nicely to their new home. They can be described as playful and curious, and are regularly seen towards the front of their habitat near the viewing platform. Sierra has also adjusted well to her new companions, due to the lack of competition because of the different pecking orders of males and females.

"We're excited to be able to establish a new home for these four animals," said Yusuf. "And we're especially thrilled to give Sierra new pack mates to howl with again."



can wolves - to live without companionship," said Director of Animal Operations Pearl Yusuf. "After Aztec passed, we were in touch with the right people to improve Sierra's social quality of life."

The new males - all two-year-old siblings came from the California Wolf Center outside of San Diego. The facility is dedicated to the care and conservation of Mexican Gray and Rocky Mountain Gray wolves. It has cared for and bred wolves as part of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife's Mexican

Sons of the American Revolution bestow honors

At its recent meeting in Orchard Hall, Sauquoit, Oriskany Battle Chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution (S.A.R.) bestowed honors upon a local patriot. Chapter President George presented Gvdesen William Lloyd of Newport, NY with the S.A.R.'s Silver Good Citizenship Medal and certificate in recognition of Lloyd's decades of service to our citizens and, in particular, to our states' sportsmen's/conservation organizations.

A specific note was made of Lloyd's contributions to our area's 1977 Bicentennial celebrations. He conceived and executed the re-creation of our region's historic Tryon Co. Militia, and led them on a three-day march in the August heat from Ft. Dayton

(Herkimer) to Oriskany Battlefield. Upon their arrival at the field, they took part in a one-hour re-enactment of the Battle of Oriskany on the exact bicentennial date of Aug. 6, 1977. This event drew the attention of thousands of people to our area's historic past, promoted positive publicity and appreciation for our region's contribution to the Revolutionary War, and led to a popular book by a noted local author which documented this entire Oriskany bicentennial project. "One Quarter Mile To Go" was written by militia participant M. Paul Keesler in 1978, and is available in most area libraries.


Following the successful Oriskany bicentennial project, Lloyd then utilized the militia members as a base for the initial

membership of the new New York State Muzzleloaders Association, which he founded and announced in September 1977. That organization

celebrated its 40th anniversary last year, and is still going strong.

Four popular grilling techniques

Just like some people insist that charcoal grills trump gas grills or vice versa, some backyard barbecue devotees swear by particular grilling techniques. Such lighthearted debates may never end, and novice grillmasters who want to join the fray can study up on the various grilling techniques before trying them out and forming their own opinions.

1. Smoking

Smoking is one grilling technique that is growing in popularity, as products such as the Big Green Egg inspire more people to smoke their foods. Smoking involves cooking foods in closed chambers at low temperatures. Smoking is not the quickest way to whip up a meal, as the low temperatures require foods be cooked for lengthy periods of time. People who prefer their foods have a smoky flavor

would no doubt prefer smoking over any other grilling technique.

2. Spit roasting

Also known as rotisserie grilling, spit roasting may call to mind pig roasts in which food placed in a chamber with a rotating, often motorized spit. Indirect heat is used to cook the foods placed on the spit or skewer, and spit roasting is often a go-to method for cooking whole birds or ribs.

3. Indirect grilling

When employing this technique to grill foods, cooks will not place their foods over a direct heat source, such as an open flame. Instead, the foods are placed in a chamber away from the heat source before the lid is closed. The lid will remain closed while the food cooks, which can take a long time. Some people prefer indirect grilling because it tends

to produce foods that are well cooked on the inside but do not have the charred exterior that foods grilled by other means may have.

4. Plank grilling

Popular among people who like to grill fish, plank grilling involves putting food on top of a plank of wood and then placing the plank over a direct heat source. In addition to the flavor imparted to the food from the heat source, such as charcoal, the plank itself can add its own unique flavor. Though fish is perhaps the food most widely associated with plank grilling, this technique also can be a great way to grill vegetables.





Fourth Annual Little Falls Cheese Festival

Elaine Cobb, the chairperson for the Think Local Committee, said it is hard to find artisan cheeses that are made by the hands of skilled farmers and/or cheese makers.

But the city of Little

Falls hosts a cheese festival each year to give Mohawk Valley residents the opportunity to buy and eat these sorts of cheeses. This festival took place all the way down Main Street Little Falls on July 14. This is the fourth year that the

city has hosted this cheese festival, which was started to bring attention to Little Falls because this city was once the capital of cheese.

"There's no event fee to come to this festival," Cobb said. "It's widely advertised, and people love cheese. It is hard to find an artisan cheese place, so this festival is the one chance for residents to take it home with them. I think that's a big advantage. We want to be the premier cheese festival in New York State.'

All of the local farmers and cheese makers at this festival made their cheeses by hand and not machine, according to the festival's website Littlefallscheesefestival.com

"This is all handmade," Mark Mattice, cheese maker for the Cooperstown Cheese Company, said. "It's made with a great deal of care. Nothing is processed or made by a machine. We just make the best product we can, and it pays off because we won awards. We're very proud of what



Residents, who came to this event, also had the chance to meet and talk to the person who actually made and produced these sorts of cheeses at their farm.

"This is our first year at this festival, and here you could actually talk to the producer that actually make the cheese right at our farms," said Jeff Bechaz, the owner and cheese maker of Bechaz Riverdale Cheese. "You could actually talk to us and see how our cows are treated. Everything that is mass-produced and sold at stores, the processing is not necessarily the best thing for you. Here you can talk to the person, and see how they do everything."

Mariann Fessenden, one of the cheese makers for the Tumino Cheese Company in King Ferry, said the people could have the chance to taste these artisan cheeses first before buying it, which is something you less often see at a store.

"You get to have the opportunity to ask the cheese makers questions

about their cheese. You're tasting the cheese before you're buying it. You don't often get that opportunity in a grocery store, and you get a chance to find out the story behind the cheese."

Fessenden said.

Fessenden also said that this cheese festival was very unique and different from all the other festivals they have been

"It seems very good and busy," Fessenden said. "We like that people come

with coolers, and they're ready to buy cheese. It's different than other festivals we've been to because people are here primarily for the cheese, and they taste everything and buy it.'

Tumino Cheese Company is owned and operated by Fessenden, Sue Prokop, and Elisa Tumino-VanAmburgh. Fessenden said Tumino-VanAmburgh was born and worked at a cheese plant in Sicily, Italy. Every so often Fessenden and Prokop would go to Italy, taste and study the cheese that TuminoVanAmburgh makes in her home country, and go back to the U.S. and try to make that same sort of Italian cheese in the Finger Lakes region.

"Elisa was actually born in Sicily," Fessenden said again, "and between the three of us, we sort of talked with our husbands about the idea of making cheese. We would go to Italy, and we would taste those cheeses and say 'we think we can do this.' We have a very similar climate and very similar type of milk and cows. So we wanted to try doing







Clean out the medicine cabinet

bring the medication to a pharmacy for disposal rather than throwing it in the garbage or flushing medicines down the toilet.

- Discard any unmarked containers or pill foils that are not in their original packaging.
- Test any medical devices, such as a nebulizer. blood pressure monitor and glucose testing equipment to ensure they are in working order.
- · Replenish commonly used items, such as fever reducers or headache medicines. Make sure there is a supply of bandages and first aid equipment on hand at all times.
- · Relocate medical supplies to an area that isn't high in humidity, as steam from showers can speed up the expiration of medication. Storing medicines in the refrigerator won't help, as that is a high-humidity area, too.

Checking medications and removing expired products from the house can prevent accidents related to medications and ensure that all medicines in the house are as effective as possible.
