Fritz's Polka Band returns to the largest free festival in the U.S.

Fritz's Polka Band (sponsored by Coldcock Whiskey) from Verona, NY, returns to Musikfest in Bethlehem, PA on Friday, Aug. 10. Fritz's Polka Band (FPB) will perform on the Festplatz Stage from 3:30 - 6:30 p.m. Performing with FPB for this gig will be special guest guitarist Rocko Dorsey.

Musikfest is the largest free festival in the U.S., as last year over one million people attended this event. This year marks Musikfest's 35th anniversary.

"The guys in Fritz's Polka Band look forward to returning to Musikfest for the fourth year in a row...especially since Musikfest is celebrating their 35th anniversary this year and my band is celebrating our 40th anniversary," said Fritz Scherz, band leader of Fritz's Polka Band. "As an added twist to our performance this year, FPB friend of many years Rocko Dorsey will be special guest guitarist. Each time we've played this festival, the crowds have been huge. A neat thing about this festival is that there are so many different musical genres represented and the audience welcomes it. It's so thrilling to get booked to play at the largest free festival in the United States. I'm glad the promoters like my band's eclectic musical style and I want to thank them once again for having my band return."

FPB made history in 1999 by becoming the first polka band to play at a Woodstock Festival. FPB has made 18 recordings and appears on "The Manchurian Candidate" DVD, released in 2004

In 2011, FPB had two songs ("Grandparents' Polka" and "Here Is Fritz's Polka Band") included in two episodes of the TV show "Breaking Bad." In 2013, FPB released their 18th recording, a double live CD titled "The WSKG Sessions." Last year, FPB was nominated for three Just Plain Folks Music Awards and each member was nominated for national awards by the Cleveland-Style

Polka Hall of Fame.

Herkimer County HealthNet plans Mohawk Valley Mile walking route in Frankfort

HERKIMER – At their July meeting the Village of Frankfort Board of Trustees approved Herkimer County HealthNet's Mohawk Valley Mile walking route concept. The mile will begin at the Frankfort Free Library.

The Mohawk Valley Mile concept is inspired by Healthy Monday Syracuse, a major initiative of the Lerner Center for Public Health Promotion, intended as a fun way to get in daily exercise. Research shows that walking has numerous health benefits: it can help you maintain a healthy weight and lower your risk for developing certain chronic diseases.

Program Coordinator Elyse Enea said, "We strive to make the Mohawk Valley Mile inclusive and accessible for everyone. All of our routes are located on sidewalks and we have taken into consideration your safety by selecting routes that are accessible to parking, are well-lit and ensure road safety with access to curb cutaways and traffic signals. All of our Mohawk Valley Mile locations are marked with signs that contain maps, directional arrows and dis-

tance markers so all you have to do is follow the signs."

Through the three-year Local Impact grant, Herkimer County HealthNet has been able to provide the villages of Herkimer, Ilion, Mohawk and Frankfort with support to promote physical activity and seek to reduce the associated risk of chronic disease by installing the Mohawk Valley Mile walking routes. Herkimer County HealthNet also provided the villages with preventative warning signage to use in playgrounds and wooded areas to warn of the dangers of ticks and Lyme disease.

Country Preacher

James 4:11 tells us to not speak evil of or talk against one another. When we see or hear something another person is doing or saying and we disagree with them, usually we are comparing their action or words to our own paradigm and knowledge of the situation. This is called "judging." We are not to do this.

As a pastor, I often see and hear people criticize and complain about one another. Most arguments and disagreements come from a simple misunderstanding. James tells us in **James 1:19** to be "swift to hear and slow to speak." When we try harder to understand the

other person than to come up with a defense, many misunderstandings would be cleared up before they started. So often we speak against someone because what they have done or said is different than we would have, but in reality it is not wrong or bad, just different. This is a sign of being haughty, or proud, being arrogant in thinking our way is the only "right" way.

There is only one Judge of the heart, the Lord Jesus Christ (II Timothy 4:8). Jesus Himself taught in Matthew 7:1 "judge not, that you be not judged." In other words, as He explains in verse 2, people are going to criticize you in the same way that you criticized

them. If we are not critical of other people, they are much less likely to be critical of us. Let Jesus judge them. He will judge righteously, knowing their heart and motives.

Utica Zoo unveils "The Excitement is Building!" primate exhibit campaign

UTICA - At a press conference inside the currently under construction Primate Building, the Utica Zoo announced their next Zoo Improvement Campaign titled "The Excitement is Building!" This next phase of the overall "Dream Big" Master Plan will bring a newly designed outdoor "Living Rainforest" for the zoo's white-handed gibbons and a newly designed outdoor "Living Rainforest" for the zoo's spider monkeys, as well as significant upgrades and renovations to the interior, roof and visitor viewing and keeper areas. The renovations mark the first time since 1988 that this area of the Primate Building will be utilized as public exhibit space.

"The footprint we are unveiling today clearly describes the transition from 'We Don't Like It Either,' our 2016 fundraising campaign to begin the construction project, to 'The Excitement is Building!'," said Andria Heath, executive director of the Utica Zoo. "The elements of design of the new exhibits, including the natural setting, overall size, materials utilized, visitor experience and viewing area are not only different from the methodology the zoo was capable of utilizing in the past, but sets the expectation for exhibit design for the future of the Utica Zoo."

The overall project is expected to cost approximately \$3.13 million:

- Project underway: \$913,000
- Spider monkey exhibit expansion: \$1,116,000
- Interior white-handed gibbon exhib-

it and general building improvements: \$987,000

- Grand entrance and observation treehouse: \$100,000
- New roof: \$20,000

To launch this phase of "The Excitement is Building!" campaign, two extraordinary donors have come forward with challenge funds. The initial 2016 campaign was sparked by a \$25,000 challenge by an anonymous donor in memory of a "remarkable man" which was successfully met. The same source is repeating a challenge grant for this initiative. Additionally, local benefactor to the Utica Zoo, Dr. Kenneth Murphy, has also pledged \$50,000 to be matched. The combined challenges require the full \$75,000 in donations to be received prior to Oct. 31.

"The Utica Zoo attracts many visitors from the region and beyond while also providing a fun, safe and educational space for families and others to spend time together and to learn about some of the animals that inhabit our planet," said State Sen. Joseph A. Griffo (R-I-C-Rome). "I had the pleasure of securing funding to help with renovations and other upgrades at the zoo so that it can continue to grow. I am excited to see these projects progress and am optimistic about what the future might hold for the Utica Zoo."

"On behalf of the Utica Zoo Board of Directors, we are appreciative of the initial contributions from all, large and small, who have provided the groundwork to get this far in the exhibit for the white-handed gibbons. 

Whatchamacallits



Before milk was stored in bulk tanks that could hold hundreds of gallons and before digital scales could weigh that milk to a very precise degree, hanging milk scales were the standard. Farmers could weigh their own milk, or a milk tester would travel to farms with their own brass-front spring scales. A milk tester weighed the milk from each cow for two milkings, testing the milk for butterfat content and recording individual cow production records. The dairy farmer used information like that as the basis for culling cows and improving his herd's production and profitability.

Milk scales evolved from single-hand scales to scales with two hands. One hand would be set to allow for the tare (weight of the bucket). The scale could then be read directly to record the weight of the milk only. Most milk scales have two hands. Scales used by milk testers were seldom, if ever, advertising scales, as


that would have shown favoritism.

Milk scales typically came in 10-pound increments for 30-pound maximum weight and 20-pound increments for 60-pound maximum weight.

The scale on the far left was manufactured by the John Chatillon & Sons Company around 1867. The company is still making mechanical and digital scales. The scale in the middle comes from Chas. Forschner & Sons. This Balance No. 2 model was made in about 1889 and was also marketed as a butcher scale. (Today, Forschner makes Swiss Army knives.) Both milk scales were manufactured in New York.

Many antique specimens are now being used as decoration, and if they are in good condition, are selling for more than \$100 on certain websites.

Today, digital hanging weigh scales are available for those who wish to use them.



Check vehicle A/C and stay cool on the road

Imagine being stuck in traffic on a 90-degree day when your vehicle's air conditioning system malfunctions. With summer heating up, the non-profit Car Care Council recommends that motorists be car care aware and have their A/C system checked to make sure it is working properly.

"As the weather turns warmer, the last thing anyone wants to be is hot under the collar in their vehicle when they are driving to work or on a family vacation," said Rich White, executive director, Car Care Council. "Making sure your A/C system is working properly will keep you and your passengers cool and safe, making it a very enjoyable summer on the road."

A vehicle's heating, ventilation and air conditioning (HVAC) system keeps the interior cabin comfortable in

any season by providing the right temperature and humidity level. Typical A/C service by a professional service technician consists of the following steps:

- Service technician visually inspects hoses, lines, seals and other components for leaks as well as inspects the drive belt for cracks or damage.
- Technician checks pressure to test operation, refrigerant charge and outlet temperatures.
- If the system is found to be low on refrigerant, a leak test is performed to find the source of the leak. Leaking refrigerant heats up a vehicle and damages the ozone layer.
- Refrigerant may be added, if necessary, to "top off" the system, although some states do not allow "topping off."

- A technician may also check for evidence of refrigerant cross-contamination.
- A/C service should also include a check of the compressor's drive belt and tension.

The Car Care Council also recommends that when having a vehicle's HVAC system inspected, the cabin air filter be checked to make sure air is flowing properly into the car.

Dear Fred: Even though Archie loves riding in the car, he still faces the same risks as humans if — knock on wood — an accident happens. Unrestrained, he could be thrown around the car and injured, or even worse, thrown out of the car.

Most experts recommend that pets be in a secure carrier, and that the carrier itself be held in place with sturdy straps (not bungie cords) so it doesn't slide around when driving around corners or making tight turns.

However, like many dogs, Archie wants to have some mobility and enjoys sticking his head out of the window. That's natural.

Fortunately, there are manufacturers out there trying to blend pet safety with comfort. Restraint systems are available for larger dogs that allow them to sit or lie down on the rear passenger seat, while keeping them from wandering around the car's interior. For smaller dogs, pet booster seats are available that lift them higher on the seat so that they can look out the window without having to stand on their rear legs.

Keep in mind that there are no performance standards or test protocols for verifying exactly how safe a restraint system or carrier is. Subaru of America and the Center for Pet Safety recently joined forces to test a few products. But vou should take a look at several types of restraint systems for Archie to find the one he'll like best.





Common beneficial insects

Although we focus on the insects that destroy our landscape plants and crops, these undesirable insects give a bad name to virtually all insect species, most of which are beneficial. These either do no harm, provide food for desirable species such as birds, or attack and kill the pests we don't want. Here are 10 common beneficial insects that we should be aware of in our yards and gardens.

Lady beetles, also known as ladybugs and ladybird beetles, are perhaps the most wellknown beneficial insect. The brightly colored, rounded beetles are often orange, but can be red, pink or yellow, and with or without spots. If you see an insect that is black and orange, with an alligator-like shape, leave it. This is probably the larva (caterpillar stage) of this beneficial beetle. Both the larvae and the adults can eat hundreds of aphids in their lifetimes. They also eat insect eggs, mites, and soft-bodied insects such as mealybugs.

One of these, known as the multi-colored, Asian, or Halloween lady beetle, enters homes in large numbers in the fall. They often then appear in spring in huge numbers in warm indoor areas, on light-colored surfaces, and on windows seeking to get out. Proper screening, patching cracks in exterior walls, and just vacuuming them up are simple controls.

While lady beetles arguably are the most known predator, spiders are the most abundant on landscape plants. They're actually not an insect, having eight legs and two body parts (insects have six legs and three body parts), similar to mites and ticks. They are a diverse group, with over 3,000 species in North America, most not biting humans.

Ground beetles range in size from a quarter inch to over one inch long, and are shiny brown, black, or bluishblack. They have long legs and antennae. Most feed at night on caterpillars such as armyworms, cutworms, and grubs.

They may even eat small snails and slugs. A pair of adult ground beetles can eat over 300 gypsy moth caterpillars per year.

Praying mantids also are known by many, being up to three inches long, with their enlarged front legs held out in front as if praying. They are not protected by state laws as some believe. In fact, they may do more harm than good, eating anything they can including honey bees, other beneficials, and even each other!

Lacewings, both green and brown, are about three-fourths of an inch long as adults, with lacey wings. They are attracted to lights at night, and give off an odor when handled. Larvae are like small alligators, with sickle-shaped mouthparts ("mandibles"). Green lacewing larvae are called "aphid lions" from their large consumption of aphids, as well as mites and other small in-

Hover flies, also known as syrphid or flower flies, closely resemble wasps and bees yet they don't sting. One key difference is that they have only two wings. Larvae resemble tiny slugs, and often are found feeding in aphid colonies. Each larva can eat over 400 aphids. Attract adults with flowers that provide lots of nectar and pollen.

Predatory bugs feed on nectar and pollen too. They include several species. Big-eyed bugs are black and white with silvery wings and bulging eyes. They feed on most insects they can catch, including chinch bugs, small caterpillars, mites, and insect eggs. Minute pirate bugs are similar, with similar feeding. Damsel bugs are under a half-inch long, longer than wide, and with long legs. They spike on each shoulder. They feed on over 100 types of insects.

Predatory wasps include ones that can sting us, and so we usually kill them on sight. Bald-faced hornet, yellow jackets, and paper wasps though, are important predators of caterpillars and similar soft-bodied insects. For this reason try and coexist with them, only destroying nests (using proper precautions) if they threaten people and pets.

Parasitic wasps are a large group of many species, most tiny (under an eighth inch long, so often overlooked) to an inch and a half long. They lay eggs inside hosts such as aphids and caterpillars. Once the larvae hatch, they consume the insect hosts. Swollen aphids, and caterpillars with white eggs on their back, are examples of this beneficial insect at work.

Parasitic flies, also known as tachinid flies, are a diverse group of over 1,300 species. They often resemble, so can be mistaken for, houseflies, bees, and wasps. Many lay eggs on hosts, the hatching maggots boring into the hosts and killing them through feeding. Hosts include caterpillars such as of the gypsy moth, beetles such as the Japanese, sawfly larvae, true bugs, and grasshoppers among others.
