Arc Herkimer Transportation releases schedule for NTSI Traffic Survival Workshops

St. in Herkimer.



tage, the average funeral costs between \$7,000 and \$10,000. It can be easy to overlook planning for such a large expense, and many

people may think their funeral costs will be covered by their life insurance policies. However, that isn't always the case and certain complications can arise.

The funeral planning information guide Funeral Basics states that sometimes insurance policies

become invalid if payments have not been made. Policies may have liens on them, or some named beneficiaries may no longer be alive. This can stall the process as issues are worked through. In addition, it can sometimes take between six and eight weeks for beneficiaries to receive life insurance policy payouts. Since many funerals take place within a week of a person's death, it's unlikely that surviving family members will be able to finance funerals with life insurance payouts.

In addition, some policies may not be assignable, which means the benefits cannot be assigned to go to a third party who will file the claim for you (i.e., the funeral home or an assignment company with which the funeral home partners). It's important to determine if an existing policy is assignable and to take appropriate measures if it is not.

Individuals may want to consider burial insurance or preneed funeral insurance. Another option is to use preplanning services, which allow people to prepay for funeral expenses and make planning decisions regarding the services and burial so that family members will not be tasked with financing and/or planning a funeral during a difficult time in their lives.







How to avoid shipping costs on holiday gifts

Many shoppers conduct their holiday shopping at traditional brick-and-mortar stores as well as online retailers. Both have their share of advantages, including the ability to ship items directly home if there is a deal to be had.

Shipping can be quite the convenience, particularly for heavy items or if an item is currently out of stock in a store. - Explore in-store pickup. To capitalize on both online and in-store shopping, retailers will frequently offer free in-store pickup of items purchased online. Ship-to-store has become popular at stores like Target, Old Navy and Walmart.
- Shop as early as possible. Free shipping deals often extend only to items shipped standard. Expedited or overnight shipping will still incur a fee. Therefore, shop early if your goal is cut shipping costs or avoid them entirely.
- Take advantage of Free Shipping Day. Free Shipping Day takes place each year when thousands of online stores offer free shipping with delivery before Christmas. In 2019, Free Shipping Day is Saturday, Dec. 14.

Whatchamacallits



This week's whatchamacallit (top right) was brought in by a local, whose name is Tom. He identified it as a hay knife. Since we are located in a mostly agricultural area, a good amount of our readership may recognize this item – or similar ones.

As I looked into the history of hay knives online, I discovered there are a myriad of types, styles and origins. Some are serrated, others smoothedged, and one style has a blade like a flying "W" wing.

In England, the hay knife developed smooth-edged. Due to the compaction of the interior of hay mounds left in the fields over winter – since they had limited indoor storage – the farmers would dig into the mounds from the side, leaving the hardened outer layers intact, thereby keeping the inside hay suitable for consumption for their livestock.

American settlers would bring this design with them but as usual, Yankee ingenuity would make improvements. In 1871, in the U.S., the serrated style of hay knife was patented by George Weymouth of Dresden, Maine. This style was sold as the "Lightning Hay Knife" by his company, the Hiram Holt Company. I was unable to see any manufacturer marks on our local example.

I did locate a YouTube video showing modern usage of the Lightning Hay Knife to open up a round bale. A quick search online will bring up numerous examples.

The benefits of the flu vaccine

A healthy lifestyle includes many different components. Diet and exercise are arguably the two most significant elements of a healthy lifestyle, but being healthy and avoiding illness involves more than just eating right and getting off the couch.

Preventive care can be critical to long-term health. A healthy diet and routine exercise can help lower risk for various ailments, including heart disease and diabetes. But what about preventing more routine conditions, including the flu? The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention notes that the flu vaccine prevents millions of illnesses and flu-related doctor visits every year. Despite the effectiveness of the flu vaccine, some people still don't get one each year. But a look at some of the many benefits of being vaccinated against the flu might compel such people to change their minds and get their flu shots this year.

• The flu shot keeps you from getting the flu. While it's common sense to note that the flu shot keeps people from getting the flu, just how effective the flu vaccination can be might open the eyes of even the most ardent flu shot proponents. According to the CDC, in seasons when the flu vaccine viruses matched circulating strains, the vaccine has been shown to reduce the risk of having to go to the doctor by as much as

60%.

- The flu shot can save you money and vacation time. The CDC estimated that 48.8 million people got sick with the flu during the 2017-18 flu season. In addition, the CDC estimates that the flu caused workers to miss approximately 17 million workdays and led to more than 950,000 hospitalizations. The cost of a hospital stay is often considerable, and workers who value their vacation and personal time will almost certainly lament having to use some of that time at home nursing the flu. By getting the flu shot, anyone can greatly reduce their risk of spending their time and hard-earned money recovering from the flu.
- The flu shot can help prevent serious medical events. A 2013 meta-analysis of various studies that was published in the Journal of the American Medical Association found that the influenza vaccine was associated with a lower risk of major adverse cardiovascular events among people with heart disease. In addition, the CDC notes that previous studies have found that the flu vaccination has been associated with reduced hospitalizations among people with diabetes and chronic lung disease.
- The flu shot can protect children. Humans' immune systems mature as they grow, and the flu vac-

cine can be an invaluable ally to children as their immune systems are still evolving. A 2014 study published in the Journal of Infectious Diseases found that children who were fully vaccinated were between 74 - 82% less likely to be admitted to pediatric intensive care units than unvaccinated children.

The flu is a formidable foe. But an annual flu shot can bolster everyone's chances of beating or even avoiding the flu.

said he likes to give students opportunities to interact with college representatives such as Hosannah each year.

"It's very educational for them," Mauro said.

"Any type of information she gives them that might help their future is beneficial."

Juniors and seniors were also visited by a representative from Johnson Wales University on Oct. 1, and seniors visited the SUNY Cobleskill campus on Oct. 11.

Some students in the Culinary Hospitality program want to go to college, and others want to go directly into cooking at a restaurant, last school year went to college with one going to Johnson & Wales

Mauro said. Six of his 10 seniors and five going to local community

colleges, he said.

It's nice that Hosannah was able to both present to students and take the time to cook with them, Mauro said.

Hosannah spoke to students about the CIA New York Campus in Hyde Park, the various degree programs, concentrations, opportunities abroad, internships, student life, sports, intramurals, dorms, career fairs, alumni and more.

The CIA provides hands-on learning, academics for the real world such as math and science focused on culinary work, a culinary science lab, an innovation kitchen, nine public restaurants and more than 150 chefs and instructors from 19 countries, Hosannah said.

Students participate in 15-week internships with one of the many companies the institute partners with - including Disney, the Food Network, Google, Marriott and more.

Hosannah encouraged questions from students and as a recent graduate, told them more about student life.

"College is all about balance," she said, before referencing factors such as studying and partying. "It's important for you to find that balance. Have fun while you're in school, and contribute to campus life."

Hosannah also discussed various scholarship and grant opportunities students could look into. "It's important that you guys start applying for scholarships now," she said.

Before moving to the Herkimer BOCES Culinary Hospitality kitchen to cook naan with the students, Hosannah wrapped up her presentation by encouraging students to attend an open house at the institute on Nov. 23.

"So we hope you all can see yourself as a CIA student one day," she said. "You guys ready to go cook some food?"



dividers for the computer lab because it will be used for testing and connected them to large tables.

From the students' work – along with refurbished computers, donated chairs and additional efforts – a new computer lab was born.

"It may seem a bit homespun, but the kids had a learning experience, and we all worked together," Adult Practical Nursing Coordinator Sara Nicolette said. "End result is we now have a nice 10-unit computer area for both LPN and Adult Ed students. A win-win all the way around, and it is not just functional, but it looks nice." Nicolette hosted a pizza party on Oct. 30 for the Trade Industries II students who worked on the project and others who helped create the computer lab. Students also received certificates of appreciation and were able to see the completed lab for the first time.

Adam Spatto teaches the Trade Industries II class. His students, who are all from Central Valley, are Dominick Green, Nyrie Velez, Richard Naugle, Anthony Dennis, Jeff Wildey and Edward Covey.

After Nicolette identified the need for the computer lab, she reached out to Spatto and Herkimer BOCES senior microcomputer specialist Brian Keeler about doing a refurbishment project. Keeler refurbished the existing computers and located an extra one, and Spatto set out to work on the dividers with his students.



Even the tables in the computer lab were previously donated by an insurance company, and Nicolette reached out to Rachel Daughtry, a director at Compassion Coalition, and was able to get the chairs donated.

Compassion Coalition, a nonprofit, donated \$50,000 last year for 60 schools, impacting more than 30,000 local students. Compassion Coalition purchases about 80% of the products it donates, Daughtry said. For the other 20%, the nonprofit works with national companies to help the companies' donated products reach schools that need them, she said.

Daughtry, who attended the pizza party, said she was happy to see how the computer lab turned

"It's phenomenal," she said. "I love it. I love the new opportunities this has created and the sense of accomplishment for the students. It's something tangible they can see and be proud of."
