### Artist channels challenges, trauma into graffiti art displayed at Herkimer College

Artist Tony Thompson turns his difficult past into a brighter future through artwork to be displayed at Herkimer College's Cogar Gallery.

Growing up near Syracuse, Thompson's artistic outlook was heavily influenced by the abundance of graffiti and street art around him. After studying fine arts at Mohawk Valley Community College in 2006, he leaned into the unconventional art form and beat an even more unorthodox path by using found objects discarded planks of wood, old window frames, cardboard from cereal boxes, etc. - as his canvases.

Shortly after deciding to become a full-time artist, Thompson suffered his first of three strokes. He eventually underwent brain surgery, leaving him with ongoing emotional trauma and physical disabilities.

However, he said he harnesses that pain into a positive force, channeling it into his artwork.

"They were both the most challenging and best thing to ever happen to me and my life," Thompson said. "All of my life experiences helped to create a unique style all my own, still heavily influenced by street art, minimalism and life events."


Thompson has since relocated to Utica. His latest exhibit, "Love to Give," will be on display in the Cogar Gallery from Dec. 2 - Jan. 31. An artist's reception will take place 5 - 7 p.m. on Dec. 9 in the gallery. The Cogar Gallery is open to the public free of charge Monday - Friday from 8 a.m. - 5 p.m. when the college is open. 
According to Event Director David Warner, "We were thrilled when the Delaney Brothers agreed to a return performance at our inaugural Bluegrass Christmas concert."

"Performing for the music fans in Little Falls is always special. We can't wait to introduce them to some of our featured songs on our new Christmas CD," stated Frances Piccininni, manager of the Delaney Brothers.

The Bluegrass Christmas Concert will take place at the former Masonic Hall at 5 Prospect St. in Little Falls. The hall is the castle-like structure overlooking Main Street with an intimate auditorium space limited to 100 guests. Tickets are \$15 per person and available at littlefallsbluegrassfestival.com/christmas-concert or \$20 at the door based on seating availability.

### Herkimer County SWCD celebrating 70 years of conservation

The Herkimer County Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD) held its 20th annual Cooperators' Dinner and celebrated its 70th year as a district on Nov. 4. Approximately 85 people attended the dinner, which featured award presentations as well as updates from the SWCD and Herkimer County Dairy Ambassador Natalie Fredericks.

Each year the Herkimer County SWCD recognizes a local landowner that has exhibited a sincere commitment to agricultural conservation principles by giving its Conservation Farmer of the Year Award. The SWCD staff and Board of Directors selected Timmerman Farms as the Conservation Farmer for 2019.

Timmerman Farms is owned and operated by Ron Timmerman Jr. with the help of his three daughters (Marina, Alexis and Sophie) and his girlfriend Tiffany. Ron purchased the farm from his parents in 1998 and began to grow the herd size. He currently operates 750 acres with over 600 acres tillable, and nearly 300 milking cows.

Conservation practices used on the farm include different crop rotations, cover cropping, strip cropping on over 100 acres, no-till for first year corn, grassed waterways and tile drainage on more than 80 acres. In 2011, Ron requested guidance and assistance with manure management. A nutrient management plan

was completed through working with NRCS, which led to a waste storage construction project.

The SWCD then wrote a grant for a concrete waste storage facility through the Agricultural Non-Point Source grant program. This application was funded because the farm is in a priority Agricultural Environmental Management planning unit. A concrete manure storage structure, multiple pumping plants, waste transfer and access roads were completed in early 201, allowing Ron to focus on utilizing the storage to optimize nutrient uptake of the crops and better timing

### Arc Herkimer Respite Facility gets new play set thanks to donation from Stewart's Shops

Arc Herkimer's William H. Privett Respite Facility in Little Falls has received a new children's outdoor play set thanks to a donation from Stewart's Holiday Match Program.

The Burwell Street respite home is a site where parents/guardians can leave their children over weekends, vacations and school breaks. While there, children are engaged by professionally-trained staff in multiple activities aimed at helping them grow. Before the donation, the facility lacked outdoor play equipment for the children.

Arc Herkimer applied for the Stewart's Shops Holiday Match Program this past year and received the money to purchase a play set complete with an accessible playhouse and slide, bench swing for children with limited mobility, two traditional swings, a rock wall, a trapeze bar and a hammock.

According to Arc Herkimer President and CEO Kevin Crosley, "The play set serves nearly 70 children with disabilities and allows them to grow mentally, physically and emotionally through the spontaneous and unstructured play the equipment makes possible. We cannot thank Stewart's Shops and the community's generosity

Farm Service Agency. In 1987 Deb began working as the secretary with the Herkimer County SWCD, and was shortly after titled as the office manager as she took on so much more than financial administration. She retired after 31 years with the district, and in that time, she accumulated an impressive list of accom-

In Deb's career with the district many programs were initiated: the District Newsletter, the Cooperators' Dinner, the Huxtable Award and multiple years of grant funding to properly organize and store all records. This includes the proper storage of numerous years of historical aerial photos, which are now being incorporated into our digital GIS system. Deb initiated the Herkimer County Farm and Home Safety Day in 2000. Annually, more than 600 children visit 17 safety-related stations, to learn about potential hazards at home and on the farm. The program means so much to her that even in retirement she has come back to volunteer at the event.

Every year the district recognizes a person who has demonstrated devotion in both their career and personal life to education in the subject of conservation with the Conservation Educator Award. The district presented this award to Dan Welc, the Private Lands, Urban, and Community Forester for the Herkimer and Oneida County DEC. Dan studied at SUNY Morrisville for an associate's in natural resource conservation, and ESF for a bachelor's in forest resources management.

Some of the duties of his position include working with landowners on forestry tax law programs, helping the City of Utica and the City of Rome with any and all planting projects, working with Cooperative Forest Management and helping any landowners with any other urban forestry questions.

Dan has volunteered at educational events; as the poison ivy/poison oak instructor at Farm and Home Safety Day; and as the forestry instructor at the Envirothon. Dan volunteers for many different groups in the area, including the Youth Empowerment group in Ilion, the Poland Central School Science Fair, the Westmoreland School Seedling Program, Herkimer and Oneida County Conservation Field Day, Herkimer County Farming Your Future and more. Dan has also become a State Fire Instructor, which he attributes to all of the experience he's gained in teaching at so many educational events.

A special recognition award was presented to Bill Zaleski for his dedicated service as the Farm Bureau representative of the Board of Directors, and most recently as the chair of the board. Bill has been a director for 27 years and we want to thank him for his years of support, dedication and guidance.

SWCD manager Gerry Smithson concluded the evening by providing closing remarks which highlighted the achievements of the district during 2019 including numerous agricultural projects, drainage systems, streambank stabilization projects, educational events and earned income programs.

The Herkimer County SWCD congratulates all the award winners and sincerely thanks everyone who attended the dinner.

There are many types of trusts, and working with an attorney who specializes in estate planning can help women and men determine which type of trust, if any, is best for



### Work magic with leftover turkey

Trying to figure out how to use all of those Thanksgiving dinner leftovers in meals? Here are some suggestions:

- Make turkey chili in your slow cooker: Toss some chopped turkey meat, chili beans, tomato paste, chili powder and any leftover veggies into the slow cooker. Refrigerate overnight and let the chili simmer on low until ready.
- If plain turkey sandwiches from the fridge leave you cold, how about one that's barbecued? Sauté some onions in a little butter, stir in cooked turkey and barbecue sauce until heated through,

add pepper and throw it all on a split hard roll.

• Another sandwich variation: Mix together chopped olives, celery, onions, roasted peppers, capers, oregano, pepper or any other vegetables or herbs that call out to you. Mix in oil and vinegar. Split a round Italian bread loaf, pulling out some of the insides, and brush both sides with more oil and vinegar. Place turkey slices on the bottom half of the bread, then spoon the olive mixture over the turkey. Arrange provolone or Swiss cheese slices on top, then press the top

bread half over it all. Cut the sandwich into wedges.

- Try a turkey stir-fry using soy sauce, rice vinegar, sesame oil, garlic and vegetables.
- Plenty of pasta dishes lend themselves to diced white turkey meat.
- A turkey sauté is quick, easy and delectable. Just heat butter and oil in a skillet until hot. Add mushrooms, onions or peppers, and cook. Then add minced garlic, a little broth and turkey.

## Swedes begin Christmas with St. Lucia Day

As the winter holidays approach, we hear much about Christmas, Kwanzaa, Hanukkah and New Year's, but little about a lovely, cherished custom of Scandinavia where the Christmas season begins on Dec. 13 with St. Lucia Day, and ends on Jan. 13 with the feast of St. Knut. St. Lucia Day is more widely observed in Sweden than in other Scandinavian countries, and although primarily a family observance, there are public ceremonies in most offices, hospitals, factories, schools and churches.

In the home, in early morning, the eldest daughter wakes the parents and the rest of the family and serves them coffee or tea and a saffron-flavored bread (Lussekake) or buns (Lussekatter, Lucy cats). Symbolizing St. Lucy, the Italian virgin martyr, she wears a flowing white gown, signifying purity, with a red sash for the blood the martyr shed. She wears a metal crown of leaves studded with seven tapers, which before electricity were lighted candles but now are battery-powered. She is followed by her sisters in white, and white-clad brothers with tall, cone-shaped paper hats with stars. They are called star boys.


Here in America, the Church of Sweden in New York City holds a grand ritual on the Saturday closest to the 13th that attracts so many people that they must hold multiple performances at a larger church nearby. It begins with the church entirely darkened, and at an appointed time Lucy enters followed by 50 to

70 handmaids and star boys, each carrying a light and singing the Italian melody of "Santa Lucia" with Swedish lyrics. It quite moving and dramatic as the lamps gradually light up the church.

Incidentally, the Swedish pronounce it "Lu-SEE-uh"; the Italians say "Lu-CHEE-ah." The connection between the Swedish and a Sicilian is vague, but one theory is that Lucy carried smuggled food to hiding Christians in tunnels, and to free her hands to carry the food, she wore a wreath of candles on her head.

"Just to honor your loved ones and to honor






your past," Borner added.


