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

# Ways to prevent falls during the winter months and throughout the year

Falls are the leading cause of injury deaths, hospitalizations emergency department visits among adults 65 and older in New York State. Each year, approximately 1,013 New Yorkers over the age of 65 die as a result of falls an additional 52,640 fall related injuries were hospitalized due to injuries.

Falls can result in lasting, serious injuries, affecting mobility, independence and mental health. Some people think that falls are a normal part of aging and are not preventable. By making changes in lifestyle and following some precautions you can greatly lower your chances of falling.

#### Prevention strategies

Have your health care provider review all your medications, including over-the-counter medicines. As you get older, the way medicines work in your body can change. Some medicines, or combinations of medicines, can make you sleepy or dizzy and can cause you to fall.

checked by an eye doctor at least once a year. You may be wearing the wrong glasses or have a condition like glaucoma or cataracts that limits your vision. Poor vision can increase your risk of falling.

Make your home safer by removing things you can trip over (like wires, throw rugs, papers, books. clothes, and shoes) from stairs and places where you walk. Using double-sided tape to keep rugs from slipping. Keep items you use often in cabinets that you can reach easily without using a step stool. Have grab bars installed next to your toilet and in the tub or shower. Use non-slip mats in the bathtub and on shower floors.

Improving the lighting in your home. As you get older, you need brighter lights to see well. Hang lightweight curtains or shades to reduce glare. Have handrails and lights put in all staircases. It's safer to wear shoes inside and outside the house. Avoid going barefoot or wearing slippers.

Begin a regular exer-

cise program. Physical activity makes you stronger and helps you feel better. Exercises that improve balance and coordination are the most helpful. New programs within senior centers throughout New York State have implemented the use of Tai Chi as a way to improve balance, strength and coordination. Tai Chi is an ancient Chinese exercise with movements that originate in martial arts practice. While used as a type of selfdefense in its most advanced form, Tai Chi is practiced widely for its health and relaxation benefits. It has also been called "Chinese shadow boxing". Ask your doctor or health care provider about the best type of exercise program for you.



# MMR Vaccine available for all ages

ATTENTION Montgomery County Residents: If you or your child has not been vaccinated for measles... Get the MMR vaccine today.

Currently a measles outbreak is affecting multiple states in the U.S. including New York State. Measles is a highly contagious respiratory disease caused by a virus and is spread by contact with nasal or throat secretions of infected people. Measles can lead to serious side effects and, in rare cases. death. Measles symptoms usually appear in 10 to 12 days, but can occur as late as 18 days after exposure. Symptoms generally appear in two stages.

In the first stage,

which lasts two to four days, the individual may have a runny nose, cough, and a slight fever. Eyes may become reddened and sensitive to light while the fever gradually rises each day, often peaking as high as 103 to 105 degrees F. Small bluish white spots surrounded by a reddish area may also appear on the gums and inside of the cheeks.

The second stage begins on the third to seventh day and consists of a red blotchy rash lasting five to six days. The rash usually begins on the face and then spreads downward and outward, reaching the hands and feet. The rash fades in the same order that it appeared, from

head to extremities. Although measles is usually considered a childhood disease, it can be contracted at any age.

Individuals are not at risk of contracting measles if they are immune. A person is considered immune if they have received two doses of Measles, Mumps, and Rubella (MMR) vaccine OR if they were born before Jan. 1, 1957, OR have a history of laboratory-confirmed measles, OR have a blood test confirming immunity.

The single best way to

prevent measles is to be vaccinated. Individuals should receive two doses of MMR vaccine to be protected. The first dose should be given at 12-15 months of age, and the second dose is routinely given at four to six years of age, but may be given as soon as 28 days after the first dose. Anyone who has not been vaccinated or known to have measles should receive two doses of MMR vaccine at least 28 days apart.

Montgomery County Public Health Department has the MMR vaccine for children that qualify for New York State's VFC program ages six months through 18 years.

For adults, 19 years of age or older, there is a cost of \$57 for the MMR Vaccine. Payment must be made, at the time of vaccination, by cash, check or money order. For more information or to schedule an appointment, Montgomery County residents can call 518-853-3531 (M-F) 9 a.m. - 4 p.m.

# Home additions: Up or out?

Homeowners hoping to expand their homes are faced with a number of choices. One of the first they will have to make is which direction to take their expansion. Homeowners can choose to expand horizontally, increasing the footprint of their homes, or vertically.

Professionals urge prospective remodelers to consider the pros and cons to each expansion option, including which direction to build.

One of the first considerations is land space. Building horizontally will cut into yard space that you may have already

earmarked for a pool, shed or another feature. Proximity to neighbors and the dimensions of your property will also help to determine if expanding horizontally is a good idea.

Building codes and neighborhood requirements also must be considered before making any renovations. Some municipalities may have rules in place that govern renovations. Addons may not be allowed to exceed certain height limits, nor may structures be built within a certain number of feet of property lines.

Homeowners who choose to build upward will have to contend with work crews and other staff being in their homes. Raising the roof may require vacating the premises at a certain point. Also, extensive renovation work will be needed on the lower level of the home, whether it's

to shore up the structure, clean up after the renovation or repair ceilings,

drywall and other components where levels meet.

It may seem easier to expand outward, but this requires laying additional foundation for the new building structure. Bringing in digging equipment and masons can be costly. # Tax time

# Don't miss out on valuable income tax credits

State agencies raise awareness on earned income tax credit worth up to \$8,293

The New York State Department of Taxation and Finance and the Office of Temporary and Disability Assistance (OTDA) on Jan. 30 encouraged New Yorkers to take advantage of the valuable Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC). Today is EITC Awareness

Day, a national effort sponsored by the Internal Revenue Service and supported by local officials and community organizations across the country. "EITC is 40 years old this year, and yet many New Yorkers still don't realize they may qualify for the tax credit if they make \$52,427 or less," said OTDA Executive Deputy Commissioner Sharon

Devine. "According to some estimates, one in five taxpayers who qualify do not file for it. Let's change that." EITC benefits vary by income, family size, and filing status, but eligible families with three or more qualifying children making under the \$52,427 limit could receive a maximum combined federal, state, and New York City credit of \$8.293.

#### Cash that counts

"This is cash that counts - additional dollars in your pocket for school supplies, rent, groceries, repairs or much needed savings," said Margaret Neri, New York State Taxpayer Rights Advocate and Deputy Commissioner at the Tax Department. "If you were employed or self-employed, look into this important credit, and file for it!" Every year, thousands of New Yorkers qualify for EITC for the first time as their financial, marital and parental statuses change. Ms. Neri said EITC helps low-income, working families and individuals achieve financial stability during "hard times." She called New York's portion of the credit "one of the most generous in the nation." Last year, EITC was claimed by 1.8 million New Yorkers with an estimated combined federal, state and New York City payout of more than \$5 billion.

# Noncustodial parent earned income tax credit

In 2006, New York became the first state in the nation to enact a noncustodial parent EITC. The refundable credit is yet another way that New York encourages low-income noncustodial parents to work and stay current with their child support payments. In 2012, the most recent year for which statistics are available, nearly 7,700 noncustodial parents claimed \$3.6 million in NCP EITC for an average refund of \$472.

#### Roseville bookends

**Q:** I have a Roseville set of bookends in the gardenia pattern. Do you have any idea of its value? — Betty, Merrill. WI

**A:** I found your bookends referenced in "Warman's Roseville Pottery: Identification & Price Guide" by Mark F. Moran and published by Krause Books. There are at least six Roseville price guides, but this one is my favorite, and I feel it accurately reflects current values. Moran believes your bookends in green are worth about \$140 for the pair.

**Q:** My dad collected autographed first editions, and I have inherited his collection. Among them are signed

copies of Harper Lee's "To Kill a Mockingbird," Truman Capote's "In Cold Blood" and Gail Sheehy's "Passages." Where can I market my books? — Carole, Buffalo, NY

**A:** One of the better rare-book dealers is Bauman's, 535 Madison Ave., New York, NY 10022; 212-751-0011; www.baumansrarebooks.com. Incidentally, Gail Sheehy has just published her memoir, "Daring My Passages" (William Morrow Books, \$29.99). "Passages" created quite a stir when it was first published in 1976. In fact, the Library of Congress has named it as one of the 10 most influential books of our time.

**Q:** I have been watching the series about the Roosevelt family on PBS. I found some FDR campaign buttons in my granny's sewing box. I would like to know how much they are worth. — Bill, Spokane, WA

**A:** One of the better references is "Warman's Political Collectibles: Identification & Price Guide" by Dr.

Enoch L. Nappen and published by Krause Books. It features dozens of FDR buttons in full-color. Dr. Nappen is a political science professor at New Jersey's Monmouth University and a member of the American Political Items Collectors (APIC).



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

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
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# ${f Whatchamacallit}$

This week's Whatchamacallit is a clever little folding device called a boxwood ruler. These rulers come in a variety of sizes and lengths, with most being made out of wood and brass. If you look closely, the light colored ruler in the middle is a little different, it's presumably made out of ivory.

This style of ruler was made by a few different manufacturing companies, such as the Stanley Tool Company and Lufkin Rule Company. The largest ruler pictured was created by C-S Company, a merged venture between inventor Herman Chapin, founder of the The H. Chapin Company and the D. H. Stephens Company. The merged company was renamed the Chapin-Stephens Co. in 1901 and continued to produce fine quality boxwood rulers, planes, levels, gauges and other small tools. The C-S Company had a reputation for quality workmanship and quality products, however, they went out of business in 1929.

# Collecting

by Larry Cox Children's Books

**Q:** I was born in 1947 and grew up reading Golden Books, Books, See Saw Books and my favorites, the Story Hour series. I have started buying the ones I remember when I see them at garage sales or in shops. My problem is I have no idea of values. Can you recommend a good price guide for me? - Darla, Columbia, MO

A: Although there are several excellent guides, my personal favorite is "Warman's Children's Books: Identification & Price Guide" by Steve Santi and published by Krause Books. It has concise histories and hundreds of listings with values for many of the books issued by the major book publishers for children. Major space is devoted Golden to Books, Whitman, Rand McNally, Wonder, Treasure, Holly, Owl, Pied Piper and Star-Bright. Incidentally, the first Golden Book was "Three Little Kittens," issued in 1942 and worth about \$50 in good condition.

**Q:** I have a glass bowl that is marked "Quezal." I have been told it was given to a distant relative as a wedding present in 1915. Since I have never heard of Quezal glass and can't find it in any of

my reference books, I hope you can help me. — Barbara, Pine Castle, FL

A: The Quezal Art Glass Decorating Company opened in Brooklyn in 1901 and closed in about 1925. I found the mark in "Miller's Antique Marks" by Judith Miller and published by Miller Books. This handy reference documents more than 6.000 marks that make it easier to identify silver, ceramics, glass and other treasures. Priced at \$9.99, it is quite a bargain.

**Q:** I have a partial set of sterling flatware. I am not certain of the pattern, but since I no longer use the pieces, I would like to liquidate the set. Do you have any suggestions? — Carol, Wausau, WI

# The following were my remarks at the Town of Palatine Hearing on Wednesday, February 11, 2015 at the Town Highway Garage at 6:30PM

It is unfortunate that **ALL** of the Council Members and the Town Attorney chose not to attend to hear the concerns and questions of the taxpavers and residents of the Town of Palatine on the proposed building of a New Town Hall.

I will begin quoting Mark Levin, who has a law degree from Temple University and is a syndicated talk show host:

"The nation has entered an age of post-constitutional tyranny" resulting in this attitude by our leaders:

"The public is not to be informed, but indoctrinated, manipulated, and misled".

building project for a new Town Hall, until November of 2014 - ten months after being on the agenda for town business. As some of you are already aware, at the January 2015 Board Meeting, Supervisor Niccoli was met with major opposition from all of the town board members when she requested this public hearing because she wanted to hear what the tax payers of this town had to say regarding this project. Apparently, the rest of the board did not.

I have been vocal regarding my opposition to the spending of hundreds of thousands of dollars on the building of a new town hall in Stone Arabia. I have repeatedly asked the board members... why? Their response is always, we own the land, we have already drilled a well, and we have the money.

What isn't being said is that according to a USDA Soil Survey, the soil composition of the land is not suitable for a commercial building and also a question was recently raised as to the site preparation. The well output at 220 feet deep is less than half a gallon per minute. As for the money, in 2007 bid packages were made up but never put out to bid because the cost was more than they had set aside for the project.

Here we are 8 years later and the building fund has not increased. Yet at 3:00 this afternoon, bids were opened and read regarding the building of a new Town Hall. What has changed to warrant moving forward with this project?

The board has also cited safety of the judge, better record storage, and expanded occupancy as reasons to build. They were presented with plans and cost figures to remodel the current town hall, which addresses all of these concerns, but totally disregarded them because they are insistent upon building new.

It was stated at the January 2015 board meeting by a board member that nothing has ever been done to maintain the current town hall but it's not their fault. So, whose fault is it? If they have ignored maintenance issues to this building, why would a new building be any different?

The proposed location does not have an adequate water supply and no fire hydrants. The minimum response time for a fire truck is approximately 13 minutes. Will this mean higher rates for fire insurance? There are two fire hydrants located across the road at the current town hall and fire truck response time - approximately 3 minutes.

Heating costs could spiral upward as the current town hall uses natural gas and the proposed new town hall, at approximately two times the size, is calling for propane, at a higher price per gallon, as the heat source.

This speaks to the fact that there was nothing in the press regarding the I also have an issue with the proposed location in regards to the fact that most people travel into town to go to work, go to the bank, buy gas, grocery shop, etc. and take care of any business they have with the town clerk or assessor. The population center is in and around the villages. As elected officials, you are to do what is in the best interest of... if not all... then the majority of your constituents. Also, because you were elected by the people, it is your duty to be fiscally responsible. This project does not indicate that you are doing so.

> The board's concern for the safety of the judge is admirable but a new building built in a remote area of the town defeats that concern considering there is more of a law enforcement presence on Route 5 in the Village of Palatine than there is on Route 10 and Stone Arabia Road, and a sheriff's substation has just been opened in the Village of Nelliston. There seems to be no shortage of Montgomery County Sheriff's deputies and State Troopers driving through the village and there is usually a deputy parked at the Town Hall watching for traffic law violators. Personally, I would not want to be Judge Dygert, or any other judge, or the court clerk leaving the new building, late at night, after conducting court.

> In June of 2014, a representative from the New York State Department of State - Division of Local Government Services attended the monthly Town of Palatine meeting and explained to the board members options available to them in regard to shared services and merged courts along with the Towns of Minden, St. Johnsville, and Canajoharie. He also stated that the state would pay a large portion of a consolidation study and the construction of a building, leaving only a small portion to be divided among the four townships. A merger still enables each township to have their own judge and retain their revenues. They would only be sharing the building.

> The issue of the building of a new Town Hall has gone through the leadership of three different supervisors and we are currently on the fourth. The only thing to be accomplished is the wasting of thousands of dollars on the purchase of inadequate land, drilling of a substandard well, architects, blueprints and bid packages, to name a few. Also the time that has been wasted which should be used toward resolving other issues for the betterment of the community.

> At present, the state is strongly encouraging the merging of services. In the future it may become mandatory. Building a new Town Hall in Stone Arabia is counter-productive to a future merger. You will not have only closed the door on the possibility - you will have slammed it shut and nailed it closed. This foolishness has gone on long enough. Thank you for listening.

Prepare the crust by melting 1 stick of butter over low heat on the stove or by using the microwave. Do not overcook. Separate the halves of cookies and remove the cream filling. Put the chocolate cookies into a large zipper-top bag and use a rolling pin to crush

the cookies into crumbs. You may also pulse the cookies in a food processor to create crumbs, if available. Mix the crumbs with the melted butter in a bowl until they begin to clump. Press the cookie crust into a 9-inch pie plate, coming a little bit up on the sides. Allow the crust to set in the refrigerator.

Soften the cream cheese by leaving it at room temperature for a little while and massaging the unopened packages with your hands. Otherwise, microwave the cream cheese on low power until slightly warm and softened.

Add the cream cheese, sour cream, eggs and vanilla to a large bowl. Using a stand or hand mixer. blend the cheese mixture until all ingredients are well incorporated. Then continue to mix for 2 or 3 minutes more to make the mixture more creamy.

In a microwave-safe bowl, place the squares of baking chocolate and use low to medium power to melt the chocolate. Mix thoroughly until all the chocolate has liquified. Let the melted chocolate cool off before adding it to the mixture, so the hot chocolate will not curdle the eggs and cream when added to the cream cheese mix.

Blend the chocolate with the cream cheese batter until thoroughly incorporated. (Note: If you prefer marble cheesecake, swirl the chocolate through the cream cheese instead of mixing thoroughly.)

Pour the batter into the pie plate over the crust. Bake for around 1 hour, checking the cheese cake to see if it is firm and set. Place the finished pie into the refrigerator and allow to cool for 3-4 hours, or overnight.

Do not worry if cracks have formed in the top. Use the cherry filling to top the pie. If desired, decorate with chocolate curls. Serve and enjoy.

Deejays also tend to travel with less equipment than bands, so they will take up less space in a party room.

No matter which road a couple chooses to travel, it's a good idea to listen to a deejay or band perform in a live situation before making a final decision. Couples also should confirm that the performers they meet or audition will be the ones who will perform at their weddings. Make sure this is written into your contract.

Couples should provide a list of songs they want to hear well in advance of their wedding day. This affords a deejay ample time to find each song or bands to learn the songs before the big day arrives.



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

## How to address ceiling stains

Many stains are instantly noticeable. But while a wine stain on a light-colored carpet or a gravy stain on a white shirt tend to jump out right away, other stains sneak past our radars every day. Ceiling stains are one type of stain that tend to go unnoticed for long periods of time. But ceiling stains can be unsightly, and some are

stains are often indicative of much larger problems, and the longer those problems are allowed to fester, the bigger they become. Some water stains on ceilings result from cracks or joints that have not been adequately sealed or caulked. Reseal or recaulk any cracks you suspect are leading to ceiling stains. If you

stains, but only apply such solutions on days when you can open the windows and air out your home. Larger stains may require the application of a stain blocker, which may need to be applied with a roller and brush. No matter the stain, you need to leave time for the ceiling to dry before you can move on. Opening the windows

• Apply a fresh coat of paint. After the primer has dried completely, you can then repaint the ceiling. Some paints may blend in even if you only paint the affected areas of the ceiling, but others will require a complete repainting of the ceiling. The eye test will help you determine how much work you have to do in that regard.

- Cover nearby furniture. If you find ceiling stains above living areas, then be sure to cover the furniture below such ceilings with a tarp. Even if your stain solution will be made primarily of water, you don't want to risk compounding your ceiling stain problem by staining your furniture as well.
- Remove the stains. Different stains require different treatments. A solution made of water and bleach may be effective at removing ceiling
