by David Uffington Phone scammers grow more brazen

Scammers would rather have a pipeline right into your home rather than take a chance on mail that might get trashed straight out of the mailbox. Hence the rise in telephone scams.

USA.gov has a section on phone scams and fraud that covers a number of the common ones. such as these:

• Slamming is when a phone company changes your service without your permission. If you find charges for this on your

phone bill, call to insist you be switched back.

• Caller ID spoofing makes a phone number show up on your Caller ID that might encourage you to take the call. For example, it might appear that your bank or creditcard company is calling you, and you might be tempted to go ahead and give the personal information the caller asks for.

• Cramming is adding charges to your phone bill, likely small ones that vou might not notice.

Consumer.ftc.gov has an extensive section on phone scams, including handling pre-recorded calls, unexpected sales calls and, especially, knowing the signs of a scam. The sooner you can identify clues that you're about to be scammed, the sooner you can just hang up without giving out any information.

Your cellphone isn't immune to phone scams. If you enable the GPS on your apps, you're essentially letting people know where you are, which makes you vulnerable. Disable the GPS feature.

Upgrade plans can be a source of trouble if you don't ask about future up-

grade fees when you buy a new phone. Ask lots of questions about frequency of upgrade, potential down payment and phone condition, and read the contract carefully.

One-ring scams are one of new ones. Here's how it works: Your cellphone rings once. The calling area code appears to be a domestic one, and the temptation is to call back to see who it was. The problem: The return call actually goes to a payper-call international number that might incur fees just for connecting, and more fees every minute.

Be sure you're familiar with international area codes that are often tied to scams, such as 809 (Dominican Republic), 284 (British Virgin Islands), 473 (Grenada) and 876 (Jamaica). Don't return any calls unless you know who it is.



Rabies vaccination clinics announced for April

There will be two Rabies vaccination clinics for dogs, cats, and ferrets in the month of April:

- Saturday, April 4, at St. Johnsville Town Barn, 7431 Route 5, St. Johnsville, 9 a.m. noon and
- Saturday, April 18, at Palatine Town Barn, Stone Arabia Rd., Fort Plain, 9 a.m. - noon

New York State Public Health Law requires that all dogs, cats and domestic ferrets shall have initial vaccinations administered against rabies no later than four months of age and stay up to date with re-vaccinations. Re-vaccinations are required one year later and a booster shot every three years. It is important to have pets vaccinated in a timely manner in order for the pet to be considered protected against the virus. Pet owners should bring proof of their pet's last rabies vaccination. This helps the veterinarian determine whether the pet will receive a one or three year vaccination; without it your pet will receive a one-year vaccination only.

To assure the safety of other pets and people; dogs must be leashed; cats and ferrets must be contained in a pet carrier or box when attending the rabies clinic.

Veterinarian administration fee is \$10 per rabies vaccine. Other vaccines will be available at an additional fee.

Lyme Disease advisory

Montgomery County Public Health wants to remind everyone that Lyme disease is caused by the bite of a deer tick. You can reduce the likelihood of a tick bite by taking steps to protect yourself if you live in or visit areas with Lyme disease activity.

In tick-infested areas, your best protection is to avoid contact with soil, leaf litter and vegetation. However, if you garden, hike, camp, hunt, work or otherwise spend time in the outdoors, you can still protect yourself:

- Wear light-colored clothing with a tight weave to spot ticks easily.
- Wear enclosed shoes, long pants and a longsleeved shirt. Tuck pant legs into socks or boots and shirt into pants.
- Check clothes and any exposed skin frequently for ticks while outdoors.
- Consider using insect repellent (Follow appro-

priate precautions and product instructions when using these products).

- Stay on cleared, well-traveled trails. Walk in the center of trails. Avoid dense woods and bushy areas.
- Avoid sitting directly on the ground or on stonewalls.
- Keep long hair tied back, especially when gardening.
- Bathe or shower as soon as possible after going indoors (preferably within two hours) to wash off and more easily find ticks that may be on you.
- Do a final, full-body tick check at the end of the day (also check children and pets), and remove ticks promptly.

Anyone who has been bitten by a tick should be watched closely for at least 30 days. Typical symptoms of Lyme disease include: fever, headache, fatigue, and a large, expanding skin rash that may have a bull's-eye appearance. If left untreated, infection can spread to joints, the heart, and the nervous system. Anyone who develops a fever or a rash after being bitten by a tick or spending time in tick-infested areas should seek prompt medical care. Most patients

with Lyme disease can be treated successfully with a few weeks of antibiotics, especially if treated early.

9: How do I sharpen the blades on my lawn-mower? — Cara, via email

A: Dull mower blades are pretty rough on your lawn, tearing grass rather than cutting it, which can

turn the tips brown, weaken the grass and promote the growth of fungus.

Sharpening mower blades is something not everyone does routinely, but you should commit to sharpening them at the beginning and end of the mowing season.

Do you need to sharpen them mid-season? Professional landscapers sharpen or change their mower blades every 12-15 hours of mowing time (yes, that's every day or two), so it would depend on the size of your yard and length of the growing season.

Here's how to change a blade:

- 1. Lay down a plastic sheet or dropcloth to prevent oil drips and grass cuttings from staining the work area.
- 2. Disconnect the spark plug from the starter wire, remove the spark plug itself, and make sure the fuel cap is tightly closed.
- 3. Turn the mower on its side. Using a socket wrench, unscrew the center nut that secures the blade to the mower deck

and any other connecting bolts or nuts. If the blade keeps turning as you try to loosen the nut, wedge a piece of wood between a blade and the deck. Remove the blade and brush off any dried grass clippings.

- 4. To sharpen the blade, check the angle of the existing edge. You'll want to sharpen in the same direction as that angle. Run a metal file down the blade at about a 45 degree angle. Or, use a drill with a blade-sharpener attachment.
- 5. Once sharpened, check the blade's balance by hanging it from a nail (or buy a blade balancer at the hardware store). If one end of the blade tilts down much farther than the other, file away more metal on that side until the blade stays horizontal.
- 6. Reattach the blade to the mower, making sure the blades angle downward. Tighten as much as possible, bracing the blade with the block of wood.
- 7. Attach the spark plug and wire, and turn the mower upright.

To your good health

Hand sanitizers vs.

hand washing

Dear Dr. Roach: One encounters many forms of "hand sanitizer" products these days: in medical waiting rooms, restrooms, public places and in our kitchen.

These are waterless, very quick drying products; we even have them in our automobile.

When one has many daily occasions to clean the hands, is it better (for your skin) to use soap and water, or the modern hand-sanitizer products? — N.M.G.

Answer: The jury is out on which is more effective, if you compare good technique with one against the other. Both are effective at reducing bacteria on the hands. However, alcohol-based sanitizers are easy to use, portable, fast and are less irritable to the hands than repeated washings. There is better compliance with them, and so they are more effective in the real world.

Sanitizers are not effective against all germs. They do not kill the spores of Clostridium difficile, a cause of severe diarrhea. However, soap and water wash the spores off and are effective where sanitizers are not, so soap and water should be used in cases of known or suspected C. diff diarrhea. Sanitizers also are not effective against norovirus, another infectious diarrhea. They also can't remove grease.

Dear Dr. Roach: After two years of seeing several doctors and being misdiagnosed and treated with wrong medications, my 27-year-old daughter has been diagnosed with psoriatic arthritis. Her joint pain has been constant during this time. What kind of long-term damage has been done during this time? — A.F

Answer: Psoriasis is a

common inflammatory skin condition, with wellknown plaques — raised red patches with silvery scales or flaked skin most commonly seen over the elbows, knees or on the back. Only a minority of people with psoriasis will ever develop psoriatic arthritis, but you have to have psoriasis to get psoriatic arthritis. Sometimes, the arthritis shows up before the skin lesions, making the diagnosis difficult.

Unfortunately, damage to the joints can happen early in the course of psoriatic arthritis, but only an X-ray can show the extent of damage. Your daughter may need aggressive treatment. A rheumatologist experienced in psoriatic arthritis is essential.

Dear Dr. Roach: During a checkup with my internist, I was told that I have a rather large lipoma on my back. I was told that it is totally harmless and can be removed if it bothers me. Now I realize that I am somewhat concerned about it, as I had ovarian cancer two years ago.

Can I really be sure it is benign without a biopsy? I don't want to find out in a few years that it is cancerous. — S.R.

Answer: A lipoma is a very common fatty tumor. They almost always are benign. If there is a suspicion of malignancy (called liposarcoma), an MRI scan can be done or a biopsy obtained. Surgery is seldom required, except for cosmetic reasons.

I don't believe that you are at higher risk for this being the rare cancerous type simply because of your history. I would just recommend dutiful follow-up. I have sometimes carefully measured these to see if they grow over time.

District Looks Ahead: Thanks to the final state budget, as approved April 1st by the State Legislature, the Fort Plain CSD will receive an estimated increase in state funding of \$225,217 for the 2015-2016 school year. Although disappointed that the Gap Elimination Adjustment remains in the budget, Superintendent Douglas Burton is pleased to know that the district will lose only \$2,748 due to the GEA - which is much better than the \$137,384 that was lost under the GEA for this year. With the announcement of these favorable state aid numbers, the Board of Education is confident in its ability to deliver a 2015-2016 budget which will include no tax levy increase. The public can hear information about the instructional budget at a hearing on April 15th at 7:00 in the district office conference room. A full budget hearing will be held on May 6th at 7:00 in the auditorium of the Jr/Sr High School. As a part of their ongoing work in crafting annual budgets that will carry the district forward into the future, the Fort Plain BOE invited the Canajoharie BOE to a joint session on March 31st. The focus of the discussion was shared services, programs and costs, and the possibility of a merger study to look into the advantages that a future merger of the two districts might bring. The meeting was facilitated by Dr. Patrick Michel from HFM BOCES, who presented both boards with information about what a merger study looks like, how the process would work, and potential timelines. Public comments were accepted, with many in the crowd focusing on questions surrounding possible financial benefits, and new programs for students a merger might make possible. No direct action was taken at the meeting, and each of the boards must now make a decision on whether or not to pursue an official merger study.

Battle of the Books: The Junior High Battle of the Books Team recently participated in a very successful annual competition. The team members this year included: 7th Graders Willow MaGinnis, Jenna Reese, Meagan Behan, and Elizabeth Cernick...and 8th Graders Kevin Staples, Byce Thibodeau, Quinn Jones, Michael D'Arcangelis, and Patrick Murphy.

Mural to be Created: The district was recently awarded a \$3,000 grant from the New York State Council on the Arts. This Fulton-Montgomery Arts Education Grant will help to fund the creation of a mural at the elementary school. The mural will be based on local Mohawk River history, and will be installed on an outdoor wall of the school courtyard. Boston-area mural artist Joshua Winer (http://schoolmosaics.net) will work with the elementary art teacher and grade 4 teachers to coordinate participation of all 57 fourth-grade students in the project. Mr. Winer will spend eight days as an artist-in-residence, to complete the mural. Friends of Fort Plain (FOFP) applied for the Arts Education Grant, in partnership with the school district.

Elementary Honor Society Established: Principal Fred Hutchinson is pleased to announce that the Harry Hoag Elementary School has established a chapter of the new National Elementary Honor Society (NEHS) to recognize their most outstanding students. Staff at the school were notified recently that their application to begin this prestigious new national student recognition program was approved by the national office and that the school may now undertake selection of the first members. The Harry Hoag School will join elementary schools from across the country in establishing a program to promote excellence in academic achievement, and involvement in service and leadership. The co-advisors of this new local chapter will be Mrs. Yerdon and Mrs. Snow. A full description of the criteria for membership, and the process for selection, will be made available to all students, parents and staff. An induction ceremony will take place later this spring. Once new members have been selected, the chapter will begin to organize service projects and other activities to support the purposes of the society.

Fort Plain to Host Ag & Tech Program: The HFM BOCES will be introducing a new Agricultural Technology Program for the 2015-2016 school year, with the Fort Plain Jr/Sr High School building serving as host to most of the classes. The program will be for students in the Fonda-Fultonville, Canajoharie, and Fort Plain Central School Districts. A wide range of Agriculture and Agri-Business courses will be offered, with an eventual goal of linking the program with SUNY Cobleskill, so that future students will be able to earn an Associate's Degree while participating in the program. NYS Tax Commissioner: Four questions you should ask before hiring a tax preparer

7 million New Yorkers hire tax preparers; ensure your preparer is ethical and qualified

Are you thinking about hiring a tax preparer to complete your personal income tax return? Acting New York State Commissioner of Taxation and Finance Nonie Manion recently provided consumer protection tips for taxpayers who decide to do so.

Approximately 70 percent of the state's 10 million income taxpayers hire tax preparers.

"Filing a return is often the most important financial transaction of the entire year for many taxpayers," Commissioner Manion said. "Don't be shy, ask for recommendations when selecting a tax preparer, shop around, deal with someone you know to be a trustworthy advisor."

New York is just one of four states nationwide to regulate tax return preparers. More than 40,000 preparers have registered with NYS.

In an effort to make sure your tax return is accurate and complete, Commissioner Manion suggested asking the preparer these four questions:

- Are you registered with the IRS and New York State? Most tax preparers are required to be registered both with the IRS and NYS. (Learn how to verify a tax preparer)
- How much will it cost? Ask to see a list of fees. The fee should be directly related to the services provided, and not the refund amount. Also, by law preparers cannot charge to e-file in NYS.
- How will I receive my refund? A refund should never get deposited into a preparer's bank account. The fastest and safest

way to receive your refund is to have direct deposited into your bank account. For those without a bank account, they should consider getting their refund on a debit card.

• Will you sign the return? A completed tax return must be signed by both the taxpayer and the preparer. Preparers also must include their federal tax ID (known as a PTIN) and either their NYS registration number or an exclusion code.

If you're aware of a tax preparer who has engaged in illegal or improper conduct, contact the New York State Tax Department at 518-530-HELP or file a tax preparer complaint online.

The deadline to file your tax return is April 15.

Marge Curtis.


With some students playing as many as seven separate roles, the play took place in 12 individual scenes with limited props. It depicted high school life and a survival guide as reported to incoming freshmen by their

grafted tomato plants. Some retailers are hyping the vigor and disease resistance of these grafted plants. One horticulturalist, perhaps exaggerating just a bit, calls grafted tomatoes, "the biggest single change since people started hybridizing tomatoes in the 1920s and 30s". Today, we'll try to separate fact from fiction and determine if

grafted tomatoes are

worth the added expense.

First, let's define a grafted plant. Grafting has been used for hundreds of years in woody plants like apples and grapes. The concept is simple. We have two different plants — one that produces very desirable fruit, but is susceptible to serious soilborne diseases and a second plant that is resistant to that disease but produces undesirable fruit. Grafting allows you to take the top (scion) from desirable plant with the great fruit and attach it to the bottom of the disease resistant plant (rootstock). It has been used on high value vegetables (mostly

melons) in places like Japan and Korea where land is at a premium and soilborne diseases perpetuate as the same crop is planted in the same field.

Here in the U.S., we

have enough land to properly rotate or move our crops from field to field on an annual basis, which reduces plant diseases. About 10 years ago, however, we began to see an increase in high tunnel tomato production. High tunnels are unheated greenhouses that allow for extended harvest seasons in the spring and fall. The structures are essentially permanent and since tomatoes are very profitable, growers tend to plant the same crop season after season. As a result, some soilborne diseases and root knot nematodes (plant parasites that live in the soil) have increased. To keep production high, a grafted tomato with a isease resistant rootstock can be used.

We don't have the space to detail here how to create grafted plants. For a video how-to, take a look at two wonderful videos that my colleague Judson Reid with the Cornell Vegetable Program (CVP) has made. Just google "CVP, Reid, Grafted Tomato Video" to take you to the links.

For grafted tomatoes in our region, the general idea is to use a rootstock that has resistance to plant diseases like verti-

cillium, fusarium and nematodes Good rootstocks include Maxifort, Beaufort and Colossus, but any disease resistant hybrid could be used. Seeds for tomato rootstocks are available from many seed suppliers. For the scion, choose a variety that has the fruit characteristics you prefer. Many home gardeners like to grow heirloom varieties for the great tasting fruit. Unfortunately, many heirlooms lack pest tolerance that has been bred (through traditional breeding) in to hybrid varieties. If you have a garden where ver-

the Northeast. This is absolutely untrue. In New York, most tomato diseases attack the foliage with spores that are airborne. If we lived in a warmer climate with mild winters (yes, there is a benefit to our winters), we would have many more serious soilborne diseases and grafting would be even more beneficial. Having a rootstock resistant to fusarium wilt will not make any difference in conveying resistance to late blight, early blight, septoria, and bacterial speck or spot. If someone makes that claim they are either mistaken or not telling the truth.

Besides the benefit of resistance to soilborne diseases, grafting does appear to increase the vigor of the plant. This may be due to a larger more robust root system providing more nutrients and water to the plant. Judson Reid's research showed a 5-pound increase in fruit per plant using grafted plants, an increase of 20 to 30 percent. And that agrees with other research. The yield increase is likely due to greater foliage due to better plant nutrition. And a healthier plant may withstand diseases to a greater degree than one that is under stress. But this is only a matter of degree. Eventually the grafted plant will decline and in the case of late blight, will die. So don't expect that grafted tomatoes will resist all diseases. Certainly for soilborne diseases like verticillium and fusarium wilts, as well as root knot nematode, yes. For the airborne diseases like late blight that attack foliage, absolutely not.

Whatchamacallits

On April 30, 1888, Joseph P. Lee, an Irish immigrant, farmer and blacksmith from Wyalusing, PA applied for a United States Patent for his version of Hoof Shears. He writes in his application "I have invented certain new and useful improvements in Hoof-Shears," explaining that his device is "a simple and highly efficient device

for cutting or trimming a horses hoof prior to placing a shoe thereon." The invention has two arms, one carries a sharp knife and the other arm has a block for the knife to strike against.

Mr. Lee's invention expedited the shearing and shoeing process, allowing a horse's hoof to be trimmed without the use of the old-fashioned

nippers and buttress. "It will be seen that my invention is extremely simple, cheap and durable and that the same embodies advantages in points of simplicity, durability, general efficiency and inexpensiveness," Mr. Lee wrote in conclusion. His application was approved and the invention was awarded US Patent No. 401.892 a year later.

His new Hoof Shears were commonly used throughout America and Canada.




