



An interest in vegetarianism

Times were tough during the Great Depression, but we raised most of our food on our little farm, both meat and vegetables. My father also worked in a paper mill periodically when he wasn't laid off, or sick with heart problems, so we got by much better than city dwellers.

My father derived a great deal of satisfaction from us raising vegetables for the table and for canning, sometimes selling crops like strawberries as well as wild blueberries that we picked. In addition to canning, my father smoked sausages and bacon which we hung in the woodshed when the process was suc-

The smoking contraption was composed of three, or four, 55-gallon drums with the ends cut out, and stacked perilously atop each other. The bottom drum sat on some large rocks with a gap to allow for building a smoky fire with which to smoke sausages and slabs of bacon. To make the fire smoke, my father regulated the draft by obstructing the gap.

I had no problem eating "natural casing" sausage or hot dogs, until I witnessed firsthand the origin of whence the casings "naturally" came.

My father was rather proud of being able to smoke sausages and bacon so that they would keep without refrigeration, hanging from the woodshed rafters, since we had no refrigerator. The problem lay in the construction and access to the top of the precariously stacked drums. He needed to set up the contraption close to the house so that he could lean a ladder against the porch in order to reach over to hang the sausages and slabs of bacon on S hooks suspended from rods placed across the top of the uppermost

A problem arose during one smoking session when a bacon slab tore through the S hook. The bacon dropped down into the fire, which suddenly was no longer smoking as much as roaring from the hot fat fueling the fire. Smoke, sparks and fire began billowing up out of the top of this towering inferno set perilously close to the porch, raining sparks onto the roof, with flames licking the side of the porch.

Preserving tomatoes

by Dr. Leonard Perry, Horticulture Professor, University of Vermont

Got tomatoes? Maybe you have too many tomatoes, and wonder how to possibly use them all. Consider making tomato sauce with excess ones from your garden, or buy a bulk box for this purpose from a local grower. Tomatoes and sauce can be canned, or easily frozen. Tomato slices are easily dried to a nice crispy texture. Small grape and cherry tomatoes can be roasted, then frozen. A little time invested in this fun harvest activity now will reward you with healthy and fresh snacks and meals for many months.

For making sauce, the right tools will make the job go quickly and easily and you'll wonder how you can manage otherwise. Traditionally, you need to boil the tomatoes about a half minute, then soak briefly in cold water, so the skins slip off easily. Then mash them with a potato masher, and strain out seeds. Another method calls for cutting into quarters, bringing to a boil in a stainless steel

pot, then crushing with a potato masher as you add more chunks and continue boiling.

For about \$25, you can get a stainless steel strainer with pestle to mash the tomatoes. For \$50 to \$100 you can get a food strainer with a handle. This is the kind I have and highly recommend. Even if you just use it a few times a year, as I do, it will save you countless hours. Simply cut the tomatoes into halves or large chunks, put them in the top funnel, then turn the crank. Out a chute comes the sauce, and the skins and seeds come out the tube.

Bring the raw sauce to a boil in a stainless steel pot, then simmer on medium heat, stirring frequently, to reduce the volume. Reduce by about one-third for a thin sauce, by about half for a thicker sauce. You then can freeze the sauce, or precook it with herbs and additions (such as garlic and onions) so it is ready to thaw and use later. If freezing, use containers made and labeled specially for this purpose. Leave a half inch or so of headspace for the liquid to expand as it freezes.

If you're canning the sauce, don't add oil as it potentially may lead to food sickness. For each pint of sauce, add one tablespoon of bottled lemon juice (or citric acid for canning, as per directions). Then ladle sauce into sterile jars, leaving about one-half inch of headspace. Finger-tighten lids, then boil jars (completely covered in water) in a pressure-canner for 35 minutes (for pint jars, 40 minutes for quarts). You also might consider canning whole or halved tomatoes.

If you have several types of tomatoes in your garden, this will make a rich and uniquely-flavored sauce each year. Figure on about two pints (one quart) of a thin sauce from each five pounds of tomatoes. A thicker sauce will, of course, require more tomatoes.

Other items to consider making are chili sauce, pickled tomatoes, salsa, and ketchup. Ketchup really is just a thick sauce, strained more finely as in a cheesecloth, and with

ingredients such as garlic and seasoned vinegar. Vinegar also is a key ingredient for pickled tomatoes. Make sure to use the right proportion of ingredients from tested recipes. Salsa can be made to eat fresh and, to preserve its texture, is best canned. Salsa can be frozen but, when thawed, will be a bit watery for use with chips. Use this instead for cooking. More details on safe canning practices and recipes can be found from the National Center for Home Food Preservation (nchfp.uga.edu).

Tomatoes dry well to a crisp, and easily. Begin by boiling and removing skins. Slice one-half inch thick. Soak for 10 minutes in a solution of one teaspoon citric acid per quart of water. Unlike most other vegetables, tomatoes don't need blanching. Dry in a dehydrator, or in an oven at about 140 to 150 degrees for 6 to 24 hours, until crisp. If using an oven, you may need to prop the door open to make sure the temperature doesn't get too high (monitor with an oven thermometer). You can stack trays with a couple inches space between them.

For roasting tomatoes, line a tray with parchment paper, then add small tomatoes that you've sliced in half lengthwise. Drizzle with olive oil, thyme, rosemary, ground black pepper, or coarse sea salt as desired. You may want to roast slices of garlic with them, or season with minced garlic or garlic powder. Roast at 350 degrees for 40 minutes, then caramelize for another 20 minutes at 400 degrees. You may be able

to roast tomatoes while you have another dish in the oven cooking. Tomato skins slide off easily after baking, if you don't want to eat them.

You can store roasted tomatoes in the refrigerator up to 5 days, and 5 months or more in the freezer. Serve as antipasto, on bruschetta, with a soft cheese such as mozarello and basil, add to tomato sauce, top on a pizza, or chop into a risotto. Roasting is a good way to use tomatoes that you may need to pick before they are fully ripe.

Collecting: Depression Glass

G: I have inherited five pieces of Depression Glass, but have no idea of the pattern. My mom thinks the pattern is from the 1930s. I am enclosing some pictures and hope you can help me. — Betty, Sun City West, AZ

A: Your Depression Glass isn't as old as you thought. The pattern is Forest Green and was manufactured by Anchor Hocking Glass Company during the early 1950s. It is a common pattern and typical prices are a goblet, \$10; mixing bowl, \$11; and a cup, \$7.50. The company was located in both Lancaster, Ohio, and Long Island City, New York.

Q: I have more than 1,000 78 rpm records. Everyone tells me they have no value. I've been to all of the antiques shops in my area and have not found anyone

interested in them. — Greg, via e-mail

A: I get dozens of letters such as yours each month, and the answer is always the same. Old 78 rpm discs are difficult to sell because it is almost impossible to find turntables with the appropriate speed and needle. I recommend you try your luck on eBay.

Q: I have a small collection of about a dozen fruit jars that are early and unusual. How can I find out how much they are worth? — Sam, Spring Branch, Texas

A: Bill Schroeder is one of the foremost authorities of fruit jars, and his nifty price guide is considered a classic. "1000 Fruit Jars Priced and Illustrated" is user friendly and should be helpful.

Ames has a what?

The secret is out of the bag. Ames, NY, the smallest incorporated village in the state has a museum. The museum is not a tiny corner in a remote building, but rather a two-floor stone building with a history of its own. The building was built in 1835 for the purpose of education. Ames Academy was a private, tuition-based educational institution focusing on history, literature, philosophy, geography, and mathematics. In 1871 it became a public school known as the Ames Union Free Academy. It remained a public school until 1957. Artifacts from the original academy and the public school are on display at the museum.

In 1988 the building was dedicated as the Village of Ames Museum. This occurred after the new Ames Volunteer Fire Department building was built. The stone building was no longer needed as a village meeting hall and election site. The trustees voted to establish a village museum for the purpose of preserving the rich history of the area. Mrs. Maude Van Arsdale was assigned the role of the first village historian and undertook the task of collecting, preserving, and displaying artifacts for public viewing. The

building was later added to the register of historic

Many articles about the Ames Volunteer Fire Department can be viewed along with posters from Old Home Days parades and celebrations, and examples of clothing and equipment used by the firemen.

There are displays of village documents, including wedding announcements. births. deaths, bookkeeping records from various businesses, and newspaper articles of village importance. Postal records are housed in a cabinet with the last cancellation stamp used on the day the post office closed. The stamp is available for visitors to stamp their own souvenir. If it happened here, it is more than likely documented here.

There are examples of household items and farm implements from days past and books and school materials used by academy students. The original chalkboard. teacher's desk, hand bells, and ink well are

displayed, allowing visitors to relive their school experience and compare it to the past. Products from industries in the village include baskets, nails, a Jump pump, and pictures and sales records of the saw mill and grain mill can be viewed. A wedding dress, hats, and other clothing dating back in history are on display.

There is an extensive collection of Beech-Nut memorabilia since numerous village residents were employed there.

Military items include a 1773 powder horn from Ticonderoga, U.S. flags from various eras, medals, a WWII Honor

Role, and documentation of village residents who served in the military from the Revolutionary War to Afghanistan.

Histories of the Baptist and Church the Methodist Church are available, as well as a collection of bibles and hym-

"Peckulating" chickens

The hens I finally found in late spring have been laying prolifically. I was feeding them mash but they were scattering it around the coop and yard so I switched to pellets that for the most part stay in the feed pail. Good egg production continued but I noticed that feathers were missing from the necks, breasts and rear ends of some of the birds. It wasn't Romeo the rooster. He's been a gentle sweetheart. The girls seemed to be pulling each others feathers out - not all of them, just a few. One in particular was missing more feathers than the others. I assumed she was at the bottom of the proverbial pecking order. I didn't think the feather pulling was due to a lack of protein because the feed I was using had a high protein content. Also, allowed to free range, the birds had access to worms, bugs and greens that aid in providing them with a well balanced diet.

The feather pulling continued and I began to think that maybe it had something to do with the pecking instinct. When feeding them mash my chickens were doing a lot more pecking. I would guess that it takes at least 10 pecks of laying mash to consume the equivalent of one laying pellet. The birds were eating the same amount of food but doing a lot less pecking to satisfy their hunger. My theory was that they were taking excess pecking energy out on each other. When I bounced the idea off of my wife Alice, she looked at me sideways. I tried using mash again

but the result wasn't dramatic enough to confirm my theory.

I took a look on Youtube where there was an English lady holding a half bald chicken and touting some blue liquid in a spray bottle that she warned "Don't be down wind of the spray when you use it." I was sure that she meant that the stuff stinks. The use of pine tar applied to the plucked area was also recommended but I couldn't find it in town or even at stores down in the Mohawk Valley. A smell that chickens don't like was possibly the an-

So, what foul smelling chemical did I have around the farm to use? Everyone knows that smell is a skunk's main defense. Sometimes when we pass a flattened skunk on the road Alice says that the remains smell like coffee. I have to agree. So, it follows that most animals would be repelled by something that smelled like coffee.

There was can of extra strong demitasse coffee that I pictured sitting in the kitchen closet. Alice loves the jet black brew, sipped out of these little doll house cups, after an Italian meal. Whenever she goes down to the city she brings back a can of her special coffee — that she rarely offers to me. No problem, I don't often drink the stuff because the strong caffeine keeps me up at night. I didn't think she'd notice if I borrowed a few scoops but unfortunately the can was almost empty. Pressured by the pecking problem I mixed most of the remaining black grounds into a small jar of petroleum jelly so that when applied it would stick to my chickens. Then I went out to the coop and one by one caught the birds that had feathers missing and covered the bald spots with my caffeinated concoction. The mixture seemed to work because for the next few days I didn't notice any newly plucked areas. When my repellent wore off and I had to catch the birds for anothapplication, round-up proved to be much more difficult than expected. Before I greased them, the girls waltzing would be around the yard. Now they were doing a jitterbug and it was much more difficult to bag them. When Alice saw me chasing after one she commented. "You're

A pig tale

Some Schoharie County, New York residents have inquired about the screaming they've heard emanating from the home of Brianna and Steve Guckemus during the colder months — but they needn't worry. No one is in danger. It's just Juno, the couple's Vietnamese pot-bellied pig.

"She hates winter," explains Brianna. "She'll scream and squeal at the top of her lungs in protest to avoid going outside to use the bathroom. It's funny to have to explain to your neighbors that no, no one is in trouble... it's just our pig!'

Pigs and other large animals certainly aren't a strange sight in this rural area, but Juno isn't a farm commodity. She's a member of the family, and has been since 2010. when Steve saw an online advertisement offering tiny six-week-old piglets. Now, five years later, Juno has grown to about 150 pounds, a number that can be partially attributed to the large apple tree on the family's fiveacre property.

Juno may tip the scales, but she certainly pulls her weight around the house. One afternoon, Brianna forgot about a pot of boiling water on the stove. The pot began to burn. "Juno smelled it, and ran into the bedroom, grunting at me." Brianna said.

Soon after adopting Juno, they welcomed a daughter. Maiva, into their household, from then on, the baby and the piglet grew up together.

"The best thing about having a pig and a toddler together is that she cleans up all of my daughter's food messes off the ground."

In many ways, pigs are similar to dogs. Juno likes to give kisses and do tricks, such as spinning around on command. She has also gotten dressed up for Halloween and loves good, old-fashioned belly rubs. "She is a peaceful animal and loves to lay in the yard and sunbathe," says Brianna. The pig also has her own "happy dance."

The Guckemus family didn't just wake up one morning and decide that it would be fun to have an unusual pet — Brianna

had grown up with a pig, and had long planned to own one when she became a homeowner. Having lived with a pig before, she understood that with the allure of having unusual animal comes many responsibilities. Those who are interested in keeping a pet pig must be willing to make a serious investment in the long-term health and wellbeing of a large animal. It pays to do research on how to care for vour desired breed of pig, and to carefully consider all the ways in which inviting a pig into the fold could effect a family's time, finances and prop-

"Don't plan on having your pet pig stay small forever," warns Brianna. "The 'tea cup' pig craze is a scam. They will get big, and often they end up in a sanctuary because families aren't prepared to handle a 75-pound plus animal in their home."

Indoor pigs will require owners to "pig-proof" their home similar to the way in which one would prepare a home to be safe for a toddler. This can entail child locks on your kitchen drawers and cabinets and a lock on the refrigerator. It is also important to keep small objects off the floor, as the animal will eat them. It is

Computers and car parts: Finding what you need has never been easier



The digital revolution has transformed the auto industry and given the consumer far more choices than anyone ever thought possible.

(BPT) — Not that long ago a typewriter was the best tool for recording data and libraries kept track of books with index cards packed into wooden drawers. Obviously computers have improved productivity by letting people manipulate data faster. But have you ever considered all the physical, hold-in-your-hands things that would not exist today without computers? Engineering and manufacturing would certainly be slower and harder, but there would

simply have to be fewer things if people were still using index cards to keep track of them.

The auto parts industry is a great example. In the early 1900s, traveling parts salesmen auto could take trains to visit customers because the parts they were selling fit in suitcases. But by the 1930s, some auto parts retailers had paper catalogs with over 100 pages!

By the 1950s, the auto industry was creaking under the weight of too

parts and was badly in need of computers. "If computers had come along sooner, we might still have Packards and Studebakers," says Rock-Auto.com vice president Tom Taylor. "The complexity of building low volume cars with low volume parts was just too expensive back then."

Every year the auto parts industry has to make new parts for new cars while still making parts for older cars. There is an ever-growing invenmany car models and tory of parts to keep track

of, and a growing record of which cars the parts fit. Compared to now, the data in the 1960s was still relatively simple. "A handful of shock ab-

sorber part numbers took care of most American brand cars of that era," says Taylor. "A 6,000 square foot independent auto parts store on Main Street would have had adequate inventory to help most customers."

In the late 1970s and 1980s, computers helped car and parts manufacturing diversify and proliferate. Parts retailers moved away from flipping through thick paper catalogs. They could risk stocking parts for new foreign brands and models because computers helped track inventory and sales.

Today, parts for newer cars might only fit one car brand and a few model years. Major auto parts retailers have more than 400,000 part numbers in their warehouses. Those parts fit millions of different vehicles.

Fitting today's 30-plus car brands, dozens of models and 400,000-plus parts into a giant paper catalog is impossible. The digital revolution has transformed the auto industry and given the consumer far more choices than anyone ever thought possible.

drive off with items on the top of their cars such as groceries, a cup of coffee or even a purse.


Take steps to stay safe and keep your towing loads secure by using these tips as a checklist before hitting the road.

- Determine a vehicle's towing capacity. Be aware of your vehicle's towing capacity. No matter how powerful the engine, there's always a limit on how much it can tow. Reference the vehicle's owner's manual to learn how much weight can be attached.
- Choose the right hitch and ball mount. Matching the trailer and tow vehicle to a hitch class is critical for safe towing. There are five classes of trailer hitches, each designated for the combined total weight of the load and trailer. When selecting a hitch you also need to choose the correct ball mount to match the receiver tube and to raise or lower the hitch ball as needed.
- **Plan pit stops.** Variables can change quickly when towing. On the way to your destination, plan to stop every 50-60 miles to check the lights,

brakes and tires on the trailer. It is also important to make sure the load has remained evenly distributed.

- Inspect and maintain. Towing a heavy load puts tremendous stress on any vehicle, no matter how powerful it is. Routine maintenance is especially important in this situation. Make sure your vehicle is in good condition as towing stress can quickly make small issues larger.
- Exaggerate margin for error. Driving too fast increases the sway of the trailer and makes it more difficult to stop quickly. It's important to have enough room between other vehicles, take wide turns and know the trailer's tunnel clearance.

Benjamin Franklin said that, "an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure." This logic certainly applies to towing. Taking common sense measures will greatly decrease the chance of towing mishaps that quickly derail the best-laid plans.




