

Lamphere said that choosing the theme, "Celebrating the Past, Welcoming the Future," prompted the committee to decide early on that they wanted the event to be "family and community centered, have a historical component, and, if at all possible, be free of charge to attend."

"Like mushrooms in the rain, our ideas just seemed to grow and grow!" commented Lamphere.

This year the event began early in the day, at 10 a.m., with "The Way We Were," a photographic tour with Sharon Fuller and Patrick Smith at the Margaret Reaney Library. A "Digital Scavenger Hunt" also began at 10 a.m.

"Mayor Barnes was enthusiastically on board with such a dramatic change in the hours from prior Last Nights, as well as our desire to make the events free," said Lamphere.

Throughout the day, family oriented events took place at the Community House and trolley rides transported folks all over the village, allowing folks to leave their vehicles parked in one place throughout the entire event.

Lamphere said she is "indebted" to Jim Katovitch and the Fort Plain Activities Council for their support with this year's event.

"Jim provided me with the wisdom of his experience as the coordinator of Fort Plain's event last year and the Council was gracious enough to lend the lighted ball for the drop."

Cooperation was paramount in the success of the event.

"In early December, I spoke with STJFD Chief Chris Weaver to coordinate the bonfire and ball drop. To paraphrase Chief Weaver, he said whatever we wanted done, the department would do it, just let them know. That same kind of openness and willingness to help prevailed throughout this entire experience. There was not a single venue, performer, volunteer or village department who told us "no." The result

of which was a great experience, blessed with good weather, for everyone who attended. I think we more than accomplished our goals!" said Lamphere.

2016 Last Night was funded by private and corporate donations, support from the St. Johnsville Chamber of Commerce, fundraisers and a grant from the Stewart's corporation.

In addition to Lamphere, committee members included Shelley Arduini, Juanita Handy, Judy Swartz, Karen Crouse, and Kim Lansing.



For those who are getting somewhat "long in the tooth" as is the designation for advanced in the equine species. We will recall a long gone era. Our younger counterparts in most cases are not ready to acknowledge that they too will get there someday. They want to create their own heritage and it is rightly so. Many of us recall when our citizens were not as mobile as they are in the 21st Century. Families took root, so to speak, when members quit school, graduated or returned from war. The home place was almost sacred. Often, fa-

ther and mother and even previous generations still resided close by. We have become a throw away society. Stuff that was once carefully saved and put into the attic or storeroom is now relegated to the yard sale, garage sale or set out for the garbage man. Whoops, there goes the family photo album for two bucks. "Oh well. What's the difference, I'm the only one left who would recognize some of the images anyway. I never wrote any identification on the ones I knew and my forbearers did not either." I think the man who bought this

album is an antique dealer. He will separate the photos and sell them for a dollar or two each. That one of the pretty lady or the handsome man can become someone else's ancestors just by them saying so. They have a ready-made borrowed heritage.

The writer of this story has devoted most of his adult life to preserving the real estate of early Mohawk Valley families, besides making at least a feeble effort to preserve and accumulate the every day possessions of those early settlers. My own ancestors pointed the way, followed by my

wife's Nellis ancestors. One of the first families I adopted was the Klock family in 1954. When I became active in saving Fort Klock. Or did they adopt me.

The reader must possess a vivid imagination to be a successful heritage borrower. If you have that essential, let's venture to a few special properties here in our Historic Valley. Lets stop at Fort Klock. Roll back the years to Oct. 19, 1780. There at the loop hole in his own home stands John Klock, musket in hand. The firing from just to the west can still be heard. The acrid powder smoke still lingers here inside from John's last few shots fired. We now go fast forward to walk with the Klock children to the school on their own farm. Can you hear the sounds of that railroad locomotive as it makes its first trip by Fort Klock in 1836? It is now the 21st Century, some visitors have arrived. Stone Arabia would be a nice place to visit next. We will stop at the old Brower family farm where the writer of these lines worked to restore and preserve the historic place for 28 years. Avoid surprise, winterize





Winterizing your vehicle should be a top priority. The non-profit Car Care Council recommends that motorists perform a six-point winter maintenance check of areas that have direct impact on winter driving.

"Harsh winter weather can stress out a vehicle, as well as its driver," said Rich White, executive director, Car Care Council. "A vehicle that is properly prepared for the elements can help you avoid an unplanned road emergency when the weather takes a sudden turn for the worse."

Battery – Cold weather is hard on batteries, so it's wise to check the battery and charging system for optimum performance. Because batteries don't always give warning signs before they fail, it is advisable to replace batteries that are more than three years old.

Antifreeze – Antifreeze (coolant) should be



flushed and refilled at least every two years in most vehicles. As a reminder, do not add 100 percent antifreeze as full-strength antifreeze actually has a lower freeze point than when mixed with water.

Brakes – Have the brake system checked. Brakes are critical to vehicle safety and particularly important when driving on icy or snow-

covered roads.

Tires – Check the tire tread depth and tire pressure, including the spare. If snow and ice are a problem in your area, consider special tires designed to grip slick roads. During winter, tire pressure should be checked weekly as tires lose pressure when temperatures drop.

Oil - Be diligent about changing the oil at recommended intervals and check the fuel, air and transmission filters at the same time. Consider changing to low-viscosity oil in winter, as it will flow more easily between moving parts when cold. In sub-zero driving temperatures, drop weight from 10-W30 to 5-W30 as thickened oil can make it hard to start the car.

Lights & Wipers –Make sure all exterior and interior lights are

working so you can see and be seen. Check the fluid level in the windshield washer reservoir and replace wiper blades that are torn, cracked or don't properly clean your windshield.

In addition, the council recommends a thorough vehicle inspection by a trusted professional service technician as winter magnifies existing problems such as pings, hard starts, sluggish performance or rough idling.

Drivers should keep their vehicle's gas tank at least half-full to decrease the chances of moisture forming in the gas lines and possibly freezing and stock an emergency kit with an ice scraper and snowbrush, jumper cables, flashlight, blanket, extra clothes, bottled water, dry food snacks and needed medication.

"Sticking colorful papers to the glue is just plain fun for her," said Becky. "It's also teaching her cause and effect, a basic skill for life. She discovers by her actions

that something changes. To create is intrinsically rewarding for children, and it also expends lots of energy — all the better for a nap later on," she adds with a smile.

Here are two paper and glue art activities for young kids using recycled stuff from around the house.

Here's the stuff:

• Leftover holiday gift wrap cut or torn into two

to three-inch shapes.

- Leftover ribbon, string and gift tags
- Construction paper
- Household white glue in a squeeze container such as Elmer's
- Art paintbrush, paper plate and leftover tissue paper cut into 1/2inch x 16-inch strips

Here's the fun:

Toddlers

If this is your child's first experience using glue, show him or her how to squeeze the bottle and dab it on the construction paper. Choose pieces of paper one by one and press them into the small puddles of glue every which way. Talk about colors and patterns as you create the collage together.

Three and Four years

Squeeze some glue on a paper plate, then stir in some water. Using the paintbrush, your child may "paint" the glue so-

lution on the paper. Stick paper shapes on the glue.

Crumple tissue strips and press the wads onto the glue in colorful combina-Add tions.

more glue solution, if needed.

Display the art at home for the whole family to enjoy, or hang it in your office as a colorful reminder of your child.

Extra idea: Make the collages on folded cardstock and use as original thank you notes for holiday gifts. Or glue papers to a box and then use it to store things inside.





The origins of popular winter sports

For winter sports enthusiasts, the arrival of snow and chilly temperatures means the start of a season of outdoor fun. Those who see winter as a time to embrace their love of sport may appreciate learning more about some of the sports that are most popular during the colder months of the year.

Ice hockey

Hockey is one of the most popular winter sports. In 1994, Parliament passed the Canada's National Sport Act, which declared hockey the official national winter sport of Canada. The origins of ice hockey are somewhat uncertain. though some historians claim the first set of rules to govern the sport were written by students at Montreal's McGill University in the 1870s.

Downhill (Alpine) skiing

SnowSports Industries America indicates that, in the 2014-2015 season, more than nine million American Alpine skiers took to the slopes, and the sport continues to attract new devotees each year.

Historians state that skiing evolved as a method to cross the landscape in the winter when marshlands froze over. Cave drawings suggest that man used skis

during the last Ice Age in the Palaeolithic period. Yet the birth of modern downhill skiing is often traced to the 1850s when Norwegian legend Sondre Norheim popularized skis with curved sides and made skiing a sport instead of just a mode of transport. Skiing ultimately became quite popular in Russia, Finland, Sweden, and Norway. Today there are various types of downhill skiing, including mountain skiing, extreme cat skiing and heli skiing.

Curling

Curling may now be seen as a largely Canadian sport, but it is widely believed to be one of the world's oldest team sports, tracing its origins to Great Britain. The World Curling Federation states paintings by the 16th Century Flemish artist Pieter Bruegel portrayed an activity similar to curling being

played on Scotland's frozen ponds. The earliest known curling stones came from the Scottish regions of Stirling and Perth, dating all the way back to 1511.

Ice skating

Speed skating and figure skating are derivatives of early ice skating, which is believed to have started in Finland more than 3,000 years ago. Skates were sharpened, flattened bone strapped to the bottom of a shoe and glided on top of the ice. The Dutch added edges to steel blades around the 13th or 14th centuries. Eventually, skating was brought to England from Netherlands.

Whatchamacallits



Our Whatchamacallit this week is a Stanley Victor No. 20 circular (or compass) plane. If you are a hand tool enthusiast, this is definitely a tool you should try.

Stanley made several versions of the circular plane, numbers 12, 20 and 113, and although the 113 is more available as a vintage item, according to www. supertool.com, the Victor No. 20 is by far the best design for this type of plane.

By turning the top center wheel (marked Victor No. 20), you are able to flex the bed in a concave or convex shape in order to shave and shape circular items. The small inset photo, top right (from picclick.com.

au) illustrates how extreme the curve can get.

The idea is to support the bed enough so that the blade will make constant contact with the wood when planing curved surfaces. This type of plane would be used much the same way

as a spokeshave, planning down the grain as much as possible.

The markings on the cast nickel plated frame and design of the adjusting wheel indicate that this plane was made between 1900 and 1920. In the '20s, Stanley began black japanning the planes, as complete nickel plating became too costly.



Senior News Line: Waiting on first check from Social Security

by Matilda Charles

If you'll be eligible for Social Security soon and are counting on having the money in hand on your birthday, beware. That's likely not when you'll receive it, especially not your first check.

The month is broken down into thirds. If your birthday is somewhere between the first and the 10th, expect the money on the second Wednesday of the month. Between the 11th and 20th, you'll get your money on the third Wednesday. After that, you get yours on the fourth Wednesday.

Those who began receiving benefits before 1997, however, get their benefits on the first of the month.

Starting in 2013, Social Security stopped sending out checks. You now have two ways to get your money:

• Direct deposit (electronic transfer) into your bank account on the day you're supposed to get it. This is your best bet because it's free. This is not to be confused with an ETA account that is only for electronic transfers. Ask at your bank to be sure which one you


• Money applied to your Direct Express Debit card. While it's supposedly free to handle your money this way, it often isn't. You get one free withdrawal each month, can check your balances and can use the card wherever debit

accepted. (Probably not to pay your landlord, though.) After that, you'll start getting dinged for amounts, depending on what services you ask

Additionally, you won't receive your money until the month following your birthday — unless you file at age 62 and your birthday is the first or second of the month.


