Fun ways to stay cool

Summertime heat can affect energy levels and take their toll as heat waves overstay their welcome. Days upon days of rising mercury require enterprising individuals to find ways to stay cool.



Old Palatine Church to host celebration

PALATINE BRIDGE — The Old Palatine Church will celebrate the 500th anniversary of the Protestant Reformation on Sunday, July 16, at 4 p.m. with a festival of hymns featuring music on the historic pipe organ and learning about the music's history, which dates back to 17th century Germany. Palatine settlers came to the Mohawk Valley in the 1700's seeking religious and political freedom and with them brought their own tradition of German hymns. The Palatine Church was built in 1770 by individual families, many of

whose names still ring with familiarity throughout the valley.

This anniversary event will be made up of hymns that were written by such famed hvmn writers as Martin Luther, Paul Gerhardt and Jaochim Neander. A Festival Choir will be made up of volunteer singers from many churches around the area and will be meeting one hour prior to the event for a special rehearsal. Guest pastors and lay leaders will take part by presenting the history of each hymn, which will be on the program. Special settings


will precede the congregational singing of each hymn, written by early and contemporary composers such as Bach, Pachelbel, Cherwein, Clarke and Hobby. Guest organist and program coordinator Roberta Rowland-Raybold from the First Lutheran Church, Albany, will include several of her own compositions in the program.

Hymn Festival "500" is open to the public. The Palatine Church stands proudly along Rt. 5 between Nelliston and St. Johnsville, a tribute to the early 18th century settlers of the area.

Kinderhook Bank receives merger approval

The National Union Bank of Kinderhook ("Kinderhook Bank") announced recently that it has received approval from the Office of the Comptroller of the Currency ("OCC") to merge with Patriot Federal Bank ("Patriot"). As previously announced, Kinderhook Bank and Patriot agreed to merge in an all-stock transaction in which Patriot will merge with and into Kinderhook Bank.

The proposed merger of these two community banks is subject to approval by the shareholders of Patriot and customary closing conditions. The transaction is expected to close in the fourth quarter of 2017.

The combined organization would operate as Kinderhook Bank with 11 offices across five counties and, based on financial results as of December 31, 2016, approximately \$601 million in total assets, \$446 million in total loans and \$521 million in total deposits.

Cranmore, FitzGerald & Meaney served as legal counsel to Kinderhook Bank and parent company Kinderhook Bank Corp. and filed the merger application with the OCC.



Ice cream truck history

On a sweltering day, few things bring relief as immediately as a favorite frozen treat. The United States leads the world in ice cream consumption, with an average of 26 liters per person consumed per year.

Ice cream has been around for quite some time, and it is believed ancient Greeks ate a crude form of the dessert as early as the 5th century B.C. While ice cream parlors, dessert shops and supermarket freezers are popular places to sample favorite flavors, ice cream also can be purchased from ice cream trucks.

The tinkling of the ice cream truck music box and the sight of that dessert haven on wheels is enough to send any child (and many adults) into sensory overload. Some of the early precursors to the modern day ice cream truck were ice and ice cream sandwich carts that gained popularity in the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries.

Confectioner and visionary Harry Burt was instrumental in developing the ice cream truck. Burt invented ice cream novelties that could be enjoyed on a stick, including the Good Humor bar. Burt wanted an easy

way to deliver the treat into the hands of hungry kids, so he commissioned refrigerator trucks and hired drivers who looked pristine and safe to deliver the treats to neighborhood children. To entice the youngsters outside, the drivers rang a bell so kids would investigate the noise. Eventually the bell and standard routes helped families know when to expect the ice cream man.

Early ice cream trucks may have sold prepackaged treats, but they eventually broadened their offerings. Some turned into mobile ice cream shops, offering soft-serve or hard ice cream in everything from sundaes to cones to shakes.

Many ice cream truck businesses are independently-owned seasonal businesses. The trucks are seen when the first warm days arrive, and many can still be seen patrolling neighborhood streets into late fall.

To your good health: Can Magnesium pills help control A-Fib?

by Keith Roach, M.D.

Dear Dr. Roach: Ten years ago, I had many episodes of rapid heartbeats, diagnosed as atrial fibrillation. My cardiologist put me on a medication, which I took for a couple of years, but the A fib came back. The doctor changed my medication to sotalol, but that didn't help either. I read that low magnesium could be a cause of atrial fibrillation, and I started taking calcium, magnesium and potassium, and have not had an episode of rapid heartbeat for four years. I went back to my doctor, who told me it was a crazy idea. I haven't seen him in four years. It seems a shame that we hear of so many treatments for A fib when it might be stopped with a simple supplement. -

Answer: Well, it cer-

tainly isn't a crazy idea, but low magnesium isn't the only cause of atrial fibrillation, and supplementing magnesium and other electrolytes will not stop atrial fibrillation in most people. However, low blood magnesium levels are a recognized risk factor for developing atrial fibrillation, and giving magnesium during heart surgery reduces the risk of developing A fib afterward in some (but not all) studies, so there certainly is something to it. Also, oral magnesium can make other medications for A fib work more effectively. Since oral magnesium is safe and cheap, I think it is reasonable to

However, I am concerned because atrial fibrillation can go on in some people without their being aware of it, and the major risk of A fib is

blood clots. I would recommend that you continue to get evaluated periodically to make sure your heart rate is persistently normal. I also would try to find a physician who is willing to work with you on combining "alternative" treatments like magnesium with traditional therapy if needed

Dr. Roach writes: I wrote a column awhile back about a man who kept falling, whose doctor wasn't able to find the cause after a thorough search. I had suggested checking his vitamin D level, but many readers wrote in to tell me about conditions that were missed in themselves or in a loved one. I thought that a few of these were worth sharing.

Many people wrote that a physical therapist (and

perhaps an occupational therapist as well) would be important, and I fully agree. I have found physical and occupational therapists to be among my most treasured but underappreciated colleagues, and almost always, they are able to improve people's function.

Other suggestions included looking for low oxygen levels, and checking whether the blood pressure drops too much upon standing. One person wrote in to note that walkers and wheelchairs can decrease activity and lead to loss of strength and balance. Another recommended looking for hidden infections, such as in the urine. These should have checked for.

On January 11, 1898, Eugene Conkling of Cold Brook, NY was issued patent number 597,102 for his combination wire stretcher, wire cutter and staple puller hand tool. In his application, Mr. Conkling wrote "The purpose of my invention is to provide a combination Wire stretcher, Wire cutter, and sta-


ple-puller in the same tool, the tapering curved jaws being so constructed that their overlapping points engage each other on opposite faces of the points, and other details of construction hereinafter more fully described." Further, he claimed that his invention was for use "in facilitating the stretching and removal of fence wire."

Let's take a close look at "the business end", as they say in product reveals.

The close-up of the business end (L) shows just how Mr. Conkling arranged the necessary components to handle all tasks of fixing or installing barbed wire fencing. The pincher points (overlapping points engage each other on opposite faces of the points) were for removing the staples and the beveled cutting edges just below those would be for cutting the wire.


The stretching of the wire occurred with the handles open and the wire fed though the "gizmos" (technical term) on the handles below the pivot point. As best as I can gather, the wire was fed through and ratcheted outward to stretch and hold for the staple.

After reading through the application several times and matching it up with the diagram, there are a couple of minor discrepancies with our tool — al-



though the patent date and inventor are the same. Ours has hand grips (not tapered handles) and the hammer claw-like "wire engager" (Fig. 6) is different on our example as is the "link receiver" (Fig. 9).

Most likely some modifications occurred as they worked out the bugs.

Fire safety

It's summertime and nothing's better than sitting around a campfire enjoying the company of friends and family and a s'more. Except that I hate camping. That's why I have one of those neat little chimneas on my patio. I also have a strong Wi-Fi signal, about 30 citronella candles, and a big screen TV.

On warm summer nights, I'll take some wood from the neatly stacked pile and with great care, following the tried and true Boy Scout method, start a small fire in the fire pit. Friends will stop by and we'll share stories while watching the stars shimmer in the night sky.

Recently, after a perfect June day complete with a sky so blue it hurt to look at, a group of friends were sitting around the fire when my neighbors decided that they were going to also have a fire. Keeping up with the Jones' or rather the Shapiros.

We watched through my fence as they moved a couple whole pallets, the kind that big box stores move stacks of products around on, into their D.I.Y. cinderblock fireplace. And, like the scene from a bad B movie, my neighbor flicked a lit cigarette at the mess. The pile erupted in flames with an audible, "fwoosh." The black night sky disappeared as if it were daytime and a wave of heat crossed over the chain link fence.

We heard the neighbor's old fashioned folding lawn chairs clatter and fall over as they backed up from the fire. Flames jumped around and embers and sparks

flew in the air. A patch of grass near the pit burst into flames and that newborn fire spawned another little fire. The neighbors were dancing around the flames as if they were doing a ritual dance. The flames licked out and found some of the gasoline they had spilled and a trail of fire broke out racing towards the jerrycan.

The neighbor, watusi'd to his garden hose and sprayed the fire with water. Wrong move. Because gasoline is lighter than water, it simply floats on the water and the water won't have a chance to extinguish the fire. With a gasoline fire, much like a grease fire, you have to cut off the fire's oxygen source.





Three tips to ensure you're ready to hit the road safely

(BPT) — Temps are higher, the days are longer and road trips are planned.

When it comes to getting our cars ready for the road, we habitually adjust our rear-view mirror and double-check fuel levels before putting the car in gear. We sometimes change our engine oil and refill the windshield fluid. Yet we often overlook one of the most important safety features on our vehicles — the tires.

With a little preparation and the right tire maintenance know-how, major issues on the road can be largely avoided. Follow these simple tips to ensure your rubber is ready to meet the road:

1. Choose the right tires for the season.

There are many different tire categories, from ultra-high performance (UHP) tires designed to

ensure performance vehicles handle flawlessly at high speeds to highway tires built to provide a smooth, comfortable ride and predictable handling.

It's important to work with a professional tire technician to decide which tires are best suited for your vehicle and style of driving.

2. Give your tires a once-over for correct air pressure.

One of the easiest ways to extend the life of your tires is to regularly check them for correct air pressure.

Low and uneven inflation will cause a number of problems for your vehicle, including poor han-

dling and reduced comfort, increased fuel consumption and an overall unsafe driving experipressure ence. Tire should be checked once a month and always before longer trips. You should always check tire pressure before hitting the road because driving causes tires to heat up and air pressure to increase. Consult the vehicle's manual for proper inflation pressures.

3. Check your tread depth

Tires with inadequate tread are susceptible to handling, hypoor droplaning, reduced gas

mileage and more. In fact, tires are considered legally worn out when they reach 2/32 of an inch.

"To ensure your tires will perform safely, it's crucial to monitor for worn treads," Morri says.

Pro tip: A penny and a match are both easy tools to check your tread depth. Stick a penny, facing you, upside down in the tread on multiple spots around the tire. If Lincoln's head is completely visible, your tread is too worn and you should replace your tires. Similarly, if you stick the head of a match in your tread and the tip is not completely hidden, your tread is too worn. These are both signs of ultimate worn tread, and you may want to consider new tires before reaching this point.

Before you hit the open road, remember that minor issues can become major roadblocks in the blink of an eye — or turn of the wheel. Take a little extra time to follow these simple tire tips and the only thing you'll have to worry about is the wind

Collecting: Daytona 500 program

Q: I attended the first Daytona 500 stock car race held at the new track in Florida in 1959. I have the official souvenir program that features the history of Bill France, NASCAR and the building of the track. The program also has photos of all the drivers of that era, including Junior Johnson, Tim Flock, Lee Petty and so forth. Does it have any value? — D.L. C., Hapeville, GA

A: I found several Daytona programs issued in 1959 for sale. They seem to be selling in the \$50 to

\$75 range. There is a nice one on eBay, full framed, listed for \$60.

Q: I have inherited two bowls produced by Marblehead Pottery. I love the simplicity of the pieces. Can you tell me how much they are worth? — Susan, Virginia.

A: Marblehead Pottery was hand thrown and first produced in 1905 as part of a therapeutic program for patients in a sanitarium located in Marblehead, MA. Operations ceased in 1936. In recent years, this line of pottery has become quite collectible, especially in Massachusetts, where it was made. Most pieces are, as you indicated, rather simple in design and finished in a single color. You need the services of a good appraiser to determine current val-

Q: I have a collection of sheet music, "Music of the Modern World," published in 1895 by D. Appleton. The musical selections were edited by Anton Seidl. Do they have any value? — Stephanie, Florida

A: After consulting with several sheet music collectors, I have come to the conclusion that your music has very little value. The series was pub-

lished primarily for music teachers in public schools and, although more than a century old, are not very collectible.

Q: I came across a gold colored frame with a copy of Whistler's Mother and a child's prayer encased. Does it have any value? — Doris, RI

A: Prints, such as the

one vou describe, were popular throughout the 1920s and '30s. Most currently sell in the \$35 to \$50 range, with certain exceptions. Prints by such artists as Maxfield Parrish and Wallace Nutting are much more valu-

Well-socialized that are accustomed to human interaction can make for wonderful pets. However, unlike dogs and cats, some birds may not prefer or receive the same amount of daily attention from their owners as oth-

Birds can suffer from depression and anxiety if their living conditions are not optimal. Birds can become irritable thanks to illness, boredom, cage position, and many other factors. Unhappy birds may engage in self-destructive behaviors, such as plucking out their feathers. Bird owners concerned that their birds may be unhappy or unhealthy should take the bird to the veterinarian for an examination. taking steps to improve the birds' quality of life if necessary.

The organization Born Free USA does not advocate for keeping birds in captivity, but does agree that if birds are cagekept, their conditions should be made as ideal as possible. Here are some suggestions to keep birds healthy and happy, courtesy of Born Free USA and other animal welfare and healthcare resources.

1. Feed birds nutritious diets. BeautyofBirds.com states that seed-only diets are the most common cause of premature death in companion birds. Birds need more variety to prevent nutrient deficiencies. Fruits, vegetables (including leafy greens) and sprouted seeds should account for between 20 and 25 percent of a bird's diet.

2. Offer the largest enclosure possible. While it may not be possible to devote an entire room to a companion bird, shop for the largest cage available. This will give the bird more room to exercise and spread its wings.

- 3. Keep sunlight flowing. Birds need access to unfiltered and/or full-spectrum lighting so they can synthesize vitamin D. Window glass blocks necessary UV rays. On nice days, take birds outside to enjoy time outdoors with fresh air and plenty of sunlight.
- 4. Provide enrichment activities. Birds can become bored, so stave off boredom with activities that enable them to use their brains. Birds might enjoy foraging for treats or playing treasure hunt games. Offer a variety of toys to keep them stimulated.
- 5. Provide time to spend outside of the cage. Birds may benefit from a change of scenery to improve their moods. Let the bird out of its cage so it can safely explore its surroundings. Make sure there are no breakable items, close drapes so the bird will not fly into window glass, and be certain ceiling fans are turned off.
- Provide natural perches. Offer living branches that will be more comfortable on birds' feet than other perches. Birds need a variety of textures and sizes in their perches to keep them healthy.
 Birds' happiness as

companion animals is strongest when their needs are met. Employing various strategies that promote their health and provide mental stimulation can improve birds' quality of life.



Birch leafminer and borer, eastern tent caterpillars and fall webworms are some of the common pests on trees and shrubs in landscapes. Knowing these, and their least toxic controls, will help you to have healthier plants with the least harm to the environment.

Birch leaf miner larvae feed inside birch leaves, causing tan-colored blotches. In severe infestations, leaves may be almost totally brown. Gray birch and paper birch are

most susceptible, with other birches much less so. It is much easier to control adults in spring as the new leaves emerge, before adult miners lay eggs. The larvae that hatch, being inside the leaves, are much harder to control. If this pest is severe for several years, trees can be weakened and attacked by the bronze birch borer.

The bronze birch borer is the larva of a beetle which tunnels through the bark, eventually resulting in tree death. This happens from the borer eating and cutting off the vascular tissue — that part of the tree that conducts water and nutrients below the bark surface. Once you see raised areas in the bark, control may be too late. Most commonly injured are paper and white birches, with other species more resistant. Preventing injury from birch leaf miner helps, as does keeping trees healthy, and not pruning trees during summer when adult beetles are flying about. Larvae, once inside trees, are difficult to control.

Eastern tent caterpillars are recognized by many from their white webbed "tents" in branch crotches, teaming with black caterpillars. These insects hatch from eggs in early spring as buds open on apples, crabapples, cherries, and their relatives. They emerge from the nests on warm days to feed on leaves, at which time they can be

controlled with sprays such as insecticidal soap. Nests can be pruned out in early summer and destroyed, as can the shiny black egg masses (about one inch long) found on twigs in winter.

Fall webworms are similar in that they make web nests, but these are on branch tips and appear in mid- to late-summer. There often are several nests per plant, compared to one for tent caterpillars. And the larvae of fall webworm feed from within their silky nest, expanding the nest down the plant as they feed. Nests can be pruned out as for tent caterpillars. Don't use fire to destroy these or tent caterpillar nests, as the fire may damage the host plants. Many different plants host this pest, including birch, crabapple, and cherry. Since feeding is late in the season, it is more an aesthetic problem than harm to plants.

Viburnums are great landscape shrubs but unfortunately, the viburnum leaf beetle is particularly fond of some species. Both larvae and adults can quickly defoliate plants, only leaf skeletons remaining. Eggs hatch in late spring when the young larvae begin feeding, followed by adults in mid-summer. If you monitor plants almost daily, as a friend of mine does, you can pick off insects as they appear and you see them. If you use pesticides, use least toxic ones such as insecticidal soap, horticultural oil, or neem products so that you don't harm beneficial insects, which feed on adult beetles. You can learn more about this pest, and which species are most resistant to it, from Cornell University (www.hort.cornell.edu/vl Other potentially seri-





Shade-tolerant plants help to complete landscapes

Plants need sunlight to thrive and grow, but some need less sunlight than others. People who find their landscapes are less supportive to sunloving plants can choose from a variety of shadetolerant plants, shrubs

Shade tolerance refers to a plant's ability to withstand low levels of light. Certain plants have adapted this feature to survive in the wild. Plants that grow at the base of forest floors, for example,

will get less sunlight than others outside of the tree canopy. Such adaptations enable a wide variety of foliage to grow even though they are not exposed to much sunlight.

While sun-loving plants often have broad leaves and expend significant energy to capture sunlight for photosynthesis, shade-tolerant plants expend less energy and tend to be more efficient consumers of soil nutrients and sunlight.

Penn State Extension's

Plant and Pests division says the amount of shade a plant is growing under will directly affect the density of the foliage and the plant's flowering and fruiting characteristics. Blending shade-tolerant plants into the landscape can be an effective use of space. Before choosing plants for an existing landscape, it's important to assess the level of shade or sun the plants will receive.

- Heavy shade: Heavy shade is when no direct. sunlight reaches a plant. This occurs at the base of northern-facing walls or beneath thick canopies.
- Full sun: Areas that receive full sun enjoy direct sunlight between six and eight hours per day.
- Moderate shade: These sites have reflected sunlight that may come

perennial in the poppy family that produces mounded foliage and arching vine-like stems of heart-shaped flowers in the spring.

- Amethyst flower: Browallia hybrids offer star-shaped blooms of blue and violet. These plants will billow out of hanging baskets or containers, and they prefer warm shade or filtered sunlight.
- Coleus: The coleus, Solenostemon scutellarioides, is another perennial that can have a variety of different leaf colors and striations.
- Witch hazels: These are a genus in the family Hamamelidacea, which has four different species in North America. This shrub or small tree features arching branches with dense, multistemmed clumps. Witch

• Light shade: Plants in these areas will get partially filtered or dappled sunlight.

Once homeowners understand which type of shade they are dealing with, they can then visit plant nurseries and select their plants. Most greenery comes with care instructions that include recommendations regarding the amount of shade/sunlight the plant will need to do well. If further assistance is needed, a knowledgeable employee can make suggestions based on landscape needs.

Those who are looking for some preliminary guidance when it comes to selecting shade-tolerant shrubs, plants or trees can consult the following list.

• Bleeding heart: Bleeding heart, or Dicentra spectabilis, is typically found in woodlands. It's a

hazel produces flowers in the late autumn when most other plants are sparse.

- Bayberry: Myrica pensylvanica can grow in partial shade as a hedge or natural property divider. The leaves of this shrub are aromatic when crushed. The shrub will produce tiny, gray/white fruits in late summer.
- English Ivy: Also known as Hedera helix, this trailing plant is widely cultivated as an ornamental plant. It will spread easily and can become invasive.

Those searching for shade-tolerant trees can choose among Sugar maple, Black alder, Flowering dogwood, and White spruce, among others.

Shade-tolerant plants can make welcome additions to the landscape, offering greenery and color in the darker areas of a property.


