



## Little Falls hosts 16th annual Mohawk Valley Garlic & Herb Festival

"This year's event was definitely the best ever!" remarked Juli Webster co-chair and co-founder of the Mohawk Valley Garlic & Herb Festival. "We had the most vendors (87) and definitely the most enthusiastic crowd!"

Webster co-founded the event in 2000 with her mom Gail Rochette and "a few enthusiastic garlic farmers from the Little Falls area.'

"Juli and I got involved years ago as members of the Canal Place merchants," said Rochette. "We saw the potential economic value of the festival and we had some marketing skills and definitely some energy to add to the festival committee."

Rochette reports that of this year's vendors, 30 were strictly garlic while 10 or so were herb and produce vendors along with a number of food vendors.

The herb component of the festival comes from connections with herbalists such has Helen Guardi of Richfield Springs, NY and Darlene Badger of Rutland, VT.

"They advocated that growing and using herbs was intertwined with a garlic crop," Rochette explained. "Helen and family have vended at all of our festivals."

This year a fermented cabbage producer, along with sauce producers and even one who makes 'bitters', were added to the growing list of vendors.

"Many of our vendors, such as Conbeer's from Johnstown, combine their products to keep the family farm going. They sell garlic and food products and produce," commented Rochette.

Webster says that all of the growers are knowledgeable and willing to educate their customers on the growing of garlic.

This year free classes and demonstrations took place throughout the day instructing attendees on growing garlic and cooking with garlic.

Volunteer and vendor Jill Gies of Gies Pasture, Fort Plain, NY, led some of the classes.

"Last year was the first time we did demos throughout the day," said Gies, "I think festivals like this are important to the agricultural community, because they provide a way for thousands of people to shop for garlic and other agricultural items in one location on one day, providing a boost to the farmers and other participants.'

Attendee Abigail Hight says the event has become an annual day out for her family.

"I have been attending the Garlic Festival for the past five years," said Hight. "I like garlic and it's interesting and fun to see such different variations and uses of it. The festival is family friendly and my children enjoy it as well."

Hight says that she stops every year at her "favorite booth," Sandies Candies, that specializes in Ukrainian garlic. "We love this festival," says Hight. "It's a tradition for my family and will be for a long time."

Webster and Rochette credits Cornell Cooperative Extension, the Mohawk Valley Center for the Arts and other community leaders for the festival's success.

The festival continues to grow every year, both in terms of vendors and visitors," commented Jane Malin, Executive Director of Mohawk Valley Center for the Arts (MVCA). "We had almost 90 vendors this year and one of our biggest crowds ever." This year's attendance numbered to about 3,500.

Malin and several other members of MVCA have been involved in advocating the Garlic Festival for several years and volunteer at the event.

"We are pleased to help staff entrance gates, be hosts and hostesses, help with setup and cleanup, etc." said Malin. "MVCA is also the non-profit umbrella for this event."

We are happy to volunteer with such a popular festival that for 15 years has helped establish Little Falls' reputation as the Mohawk Valley's Festival City," commented Alice Laurenson, who volunteered with her husband Tom. "It was a great festival, all the way round."

Which flu shot is right for you?

It's that time again...flu season is on the way. Vaccines already are available in most locations, so we have no excuse not to get a flu shot soon.

Sometimes the dilemma can be deciding which shot to get. Most flu vaccines contain protection from three strains of influenza, called trivalent vaccines. Those contain two A strains and one B strain of influenza.

Some of them add coverage for a fourth strain. Those shots are called quadrivalent and contain two A and two B strains. With two Bs, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention doesn't have to flip a coin to decide between two equal B vaccines; it can just include both.

In addition, there are high-dose flu shots especially for seniors age 65 and older. As we age, our immune systems don't respond the same way and a regular flu shot might not get us the strong immune response we need to avoid the

The strains change every year, which is why most people need to "renew" their flu vaccine each year. The CDC tracks which influenza hits, and when, in making its calculations for the following year. For the 2016-2017 season, it calculated that those who received flu shots reduced their overall risk by 34 percent for A strains and 56 percent for B strains


Your best (safest) bet: Ask your doctor which flu shot you should get. Some of us under 65 shouldn't have the high-dose shot for one medical reason or another. Don't delay; it takes about two weeks to have immune coverage after receiving a shot.

If you have Medicare Part B, the cost of the shot is covered, as well as the vaccine for pneumonia and hepatitis B.



#### by Sam Mazzotta Alternative treatments: do they work for pets?

Dear Paw's Corner: Recently, a friend recommended that I give my Lhasa Apso, "Cherie," acupuncture treatments to cure her anxiety. I told her I've never heard of dogs getting acupuncture! My friend then told

me that there are other treatments for dogs, like massage, homeopathy and more. Do these things really work? -Curious in San Angelo, Texas

Dear Curious: Almost any alternative therapy available to humans today is available to pets as well (especially dogs and cats) in many areas of the That includes

acupuncture, massage, chiropractic and even energy healing arts like Rei-

Acupuncture has a few scientific studies behind it, and while the jury is still out on how well it can reduce dogs' anxiety, studies have found that acupuncture can help relieve pain. A 2006 study published by the Journal of Veterinary Internal

Medicine found "encouraging data" worth pursuing in future studies, saying there was no reason to recommend or reject acupuncture as an effective treatment for animals.

Just as with humans, massage can help relax muscles and relieve the chronic pain of arthritis, and chiropractic also has been shown to be helpful. A 2016 study by the Canadian Veterinary Medical Association combined acupuncture with massage, for example. and noted that after treatment, "significant improvement was seen in the dogs' ability to walk, trot, jump and rise from a lying position."

However, whether energy healing works or not depends on who you ask. The effects of healing therapies like Reiki on pets are hard to measure. There is a great deal of skepticism about their effectiveness, so approach such treatments cautiously, and research both the treatment and the person offering it before trying it out on Cherie.

## Whatchamacallits



I can hear you saying to yourself, ble's knife, I found marblearms.com "This isn't a Whatchamacallit — it's a jack knife!" Well, you're right, but this isn't just the run-of-the-mill jack knife. It is a Marble's (of Gladstone, MI) safety folding knife. Our example is 5.5 inches tip to tip closed — 9.5inches tip to tip open and it has Marble's engraved on the blade just above the bolster. As you can see, the blade on the knife is longer than the handle when folded.

According to allaboutknives.com, this design was a basic sheath knife that you could safely carry in your pocket due to the folding guard (tang) that protected the blade (and you) when closed.

The original Marble's folding knives began being produced around 1902 and ceased around 1940.

Looking for more history on the Mar-

where I learned that Webster Marble arrived in Gladstone, MI in 1887 and is better known for the invention of the Marble's Universal Rifle Sight (1892), his Improved Front Sight (1902) and Automatic Flexible Joint Rear Sight (1903). Within a short time, Marble's became not only the supplier of original equipment sights to American gun makers, but the preferred maker of replacement sights.

Beside his famous sights and the

safety knife, the Marble's brand was also known for other "outing equipment" including the Ideal knife, pocket axe (which had a springhinged blade guard), waterproof matchbox and coat compass.

## Unvaccinated animals can get rabies from bite, scratch

Montgomery County Public Health would like to remind everyone that people and unvaccinated animals can get rabies from the bite or scratch of an infected animal or from infected animal saliva entering a person's eyes, nose, mouth or any break in the skin. Rabies is nearly always fatal if treatment is not received soon after exposure. Keep the following points in mind:

• Prevention of rabies continues to be an important public health concern. Rabies is an infectious disease that affects the nervous system of humans and other mammals. Rabies is most often seen among wild animals such as raccoons, bats, skunks and foxes. Cats, dogs, ferrets and livestock can also get rabies if they are not vaccinated.

The first sign of rabies is usually a change in the animal's behavior. It may become unusually aggressive or unusually tame. Staggering, convulsions, spitting, choking, frothing at the mouth and paralysis are sometimes noted. The animal usually dies within one week after showing signs of rabies.

The law requires that your pets be vaccinated. The first rabies vaccination is to be given at three months of age. Your pet should receive its second rabies vaccination within one year after the first vaccination and every three years thereafter.

• In the event of a bite, scratch or potential exposure to rabies, the following steps should be taken immediately: Wash the area of contact thoroughly with soap and

water; Seek medical attention; Call your local health department to evaluate your risk for rabies, including whether rabies post-exposure treatment is recommended; Try to capture the animal without damaging its head or risking further exposure. Contact your local health department to have the animal either observed or submitted for testing; If someone has been exposed to a suspected rabid animal and the animal cannot be observed or tested, or it tests positive for rabies, treatment should begin immediately. Human treatment consists of a dose of rabies immune globulin administered as soon as possible after exposure. The first of four doses of rabies vaccine is given at the same time, with the remaining injections given one each on days three, seven and 14 following the initial injection. An additional dose may be given on day 28 if the person is immunocompromised.

• To protect your family and your pets from rabies:

Don't feed, touch, or adopt wild animals, stray dogs or cats; Be sure your pets are up-to-date on their rabies vaccinations; Keep family pets indoors at night; Don't attract wild animals to your home or yard. Keep garbage cans tightly covered and avoid storing any food outside. If a wild animal is on your property, let it wander away. Bring children and pets indoors and alert neighbors who are outside; Prevent bats, raccoons and other wild animals from entering homes by sealing small openings and keeping unscreened doors and windows closed; A majority of Rabies Post Exposure Prophylactic vaccines are given for exposure to bats that were not captured for rabies testing. Most of these untested bats are not rabid therefore many of the post exposure incidents could be avoided completely if the bat were captured for testing. ## Hand me down my walking stick

These words bring back memories of canes used through the ages. Today they are still useful as well as a popular collectibles. Canes and walking sticks bring to mind those with gold or ivory heads used through the ages by the well to do. Some examples from by-gone times are those which conceal a sword, blade or gun such as those manufactured by the

Remington Co. of Illion, NY. There were four varieties of this now rare Remington product. The patent was granted in 1858. If the reader wants to see one of these unusual canes, visit the Remington Museum at the Remington factory in Illion, NY. I now want to tell the reader about some from my own family. My mother's father, Benjamin J. Garlock (1877-1971) was just Grandpa to me. It was he and

was applied to its top was from a deer shot on the old Garlock farm where the small tree grew. The cane was made on the Garlock farm where countless people now enjoy their games of golf. If only the cane could speak to tell us who used it to steady their steps.

The second old time family cane is much lighter. It is made from a small tree which had a knob shaped root. The letters VOG are carved where great-grandfather Valantine Osker Garlock's hand rested years ago.

VO as he was called was born on the Garlock farm near Marshville, NY in 1846 and passed away at 79 years old. Years ago he would have been a well-known Fort Plain Publican

As Grandpa Ben aged he was left quite spry. He

strolled in the woods and carried on the Garlock cane tradition. The roots of a small sapling made a good hand hold on the canes Grandpa made. He cut and dried them and often burned in sayings he would come up with. Teddy Roosevelt's name might appear since he was a favorite with him. When his only grandson became involved in preserving Fort Klock in 1954 that name appeared. It is quite possible that his canes still are prized by those he gave them to. ## Fall lawn care tips

Spring and summer may be the seasons most often associated with landscaping and lawn care, but tending to lawns and gardens is a year-round job. If lawn and garden responsibilities dip considerably in winter, then fall is the last significant chance before the new year that homeowners will have to address the landscaping around their homes.

Fall lawn care differs from spring and summer lawn care, even if the warm temperatures of summer linger into autumn. Homeowners who want their lawns to thrive year-round can take advantage of the welcoming weather of fall to address any existing or potential is-

• Keep mowing, but adjust how you mow. It's important that homeowners continue to mow their lawns so long as grass is growing. But as fall transitions into winter, lower the blades so the grass is cut shorter while remaining mindful that no blade of grass should ever be trimmed by more than onethird. Lowering the blades will allow more sunlight to reach the grass in the months ahead.

- Remove leaves as they fall. Much like apple-picking and foliage, raking leaves is synonymous with fall. Some homeowners may wait to pick up a rake until all of the trees on their properties are bare. However, allowing fallen leaves to sit on the ground for extended periods of time can have an adverse effect on grass. Leaves left to sit on the lawn may ultimately suffocate the grass by forming an impenetrable wall that deprives the lawn of sunlight and oxygen. The result is dead grass and possibly even fungal disease. Leaves may not need to be raked every day, but homeowners should periodically rake and remove leaves from their grass, even if there are plenty left to fall still hanging on the trees.
- Repair bald spots. Summer exacts a toll on lawns in various ways, and even homeowners with green thumbs may end up with a lawn filled with bald spots come September. Autumn is a great time to repair these bald spots. Lawn re-

pair mixes like Scotts® PatchMaster contain mulch, seed and fertilizer to repair bald spots, which can begin to recover in as little as seven days. Before applying such products, remove dead grass and loosen the top few inches of soil. Follow any additional manufacturer instructions as well.

• Aerate the turf. Aerating reduces soil compacting, facilitating the delivery of fertilizer and water to a lawn's roots. While many homeowners, and particularly those who take pride in tending to their own lawns, can successfully aerate their own turf, it's best to first have soil tested so you know which amendments to add after the ground has been aerated. Gardening centers and home improvement stores sell soil testing kits that measure the pH of soil, but homeowners who want to test for nutrients or heavy metals in their soil may need to send their samples to a lab for further testing.

Fall lawn care provides a great reason to spend some time in the yard before the arrival of winter.

## Choosing a vehicle based on wheel drive

Several factors are considered before drivers purchase new vehicles. Wheel drive may not be the first such factor to come to mind, but it can be an important consideration when car shopping.

Despite the considerable rise in popularity of sport utility vehicles, automotive expert Edmunds says most passenger cars sold in the United States today use a two-wheeldrive system. With options such as 4WD, AWD, FWD and RWD, consumers should understand the differences of each type of drive in order to make the most informed decision.

#### Rear-wheel drive

With rear-wheel drive, the power goes to the back wheels to drive the

vehicle. This used to be the system of choice because RWD systems were relatively easy to manufacture, offers Kelly Blue Book. RWD is the choice for many trucks because added load can offer additional traction in the back. Furthermore, rearwheel drive is coveted for sporty vehicles and luxury cars. That's because, as vehicles accelerate the

the rear wheel, enhancing traction and further acceleration. This drive also distributes weight more evenly, so cornering and handling is better.

#### Front-wheel drive

The National Motorists Association states that front-wheel drive, which has become ubiquitous in cars produced today, is cheaper to design and

build than RWD. Fewer parts mean the drivetrain is easier to install. It is also less heavy than others, helping vehicles to be lighter and consume less fuel. In rain and snow, FWD has excellent traction, so it's an asset under poor weather conditions. Front-wheel drive vehicles are not prized for their handling because the front wheels have to put power to the ground and steer the car. Furthermore, unlike RWD, which is more rugged and durable, FWD is more fragile.

#### 4-wheel-drive & All-wheel-drive

4WD is designed for rugged, off-road applications and AWD is for pavement driving. Pure 4WD is good for low-traction situations off of pavement, where additional grip is needed. In some 4WD vehicles, this

drive needs to be engaged through a transfer switch. In such automobiles, the vehicle operates in FWD or RWD until that switch is engaged.

All-wheel-drive provides the best of FWD, RWD and pure 4WD systems. The main advantage is excellent traction on both dry pavement and in poor weather. Some AWD vehicles may be able to go offroading as well. Potential disadvantages to AWD include cost, vehicle weight and, because there are more components in AWD, more parts can fail and require servicing. AWD typically comes in part- and full-time versions.

Choosing a wheel drive requires an understanding of how one plans to use the vehicle and which attributes are most important.

Dear Paw's Corner: I'm heartbroken over the ongoing disaster in south Texas and Louisiana, and especially for the thousands of pets being displaced and separated from their owners. It stirs up terrible memories of Hurricane Katrina and all the lost pets from that storm. Is there anything that we, who are in safe places, can do to help these pets and owners who have lost everything? Carol in Buffalo, NY

Dear Carol: Twelve years ago, I wrote about the problems caused by Katrina's flooding, including pets being displaced and sent to shelters across the country. There was a huge increase of diseases like heartworm in pets who were lost outdoors for many days.

Since then, a lot has changed. Disaster planning now requires that pets be considered in cities' evacuation plans. Shelters in hurricane-prone areas have developed disaster plans that include ways to effectively manage an influx of hundreds of animals.

Ahead of Harvey, many shelters in the evacuation zones transferred their adoptable occupants to other states to make room for rescued pets. Local shelters are networking more closely with each other, with national rescue groups and with the public (thanks in part to social media like Twitter) to coordinate transfer of animals to overflow shelters.

For example, one shelter, Austin Pets Alive!, is taking in pets by the truckload and for several days has coordinated transfers, as well as calls for volunteers and supplies, via Twitter.

You may be able to donate supplies directly to Texas shelters that need them (by ordering them on Amazon, for example) or by donating money to national rescue organizations like HSUS or the **ASPCA**

## **Predatory loans**

Most mortgage professionals are trustworthy and provide a valuable service, helping you to buy or refinance your home. But dishonest or "predatory" lenders do exist and engage in practices that increase the chances of borrowers losing their homes to foreclosure. To avoid becoming a victim of predatory lending, you need to understand the process to buy a home and be a smart consumer.

What is predatory lending?

Predatory lenders, appraisers, mortgage brokers and home improvement contractors could use any of these tactics to take away your home or invest-

- Sell properties for much more than they are worth using false appraisals
- Encourage borrowers to lie about their income, expenses, or cash available for down payments in order to get a loan
- Knowingly lend more money than a borrower can afford to repay
- Charge high interest rates to borrowers based on their race or national origin and not on their credit history
- · Charge fees for unnecessary or nonexistent products and services

Avoid predatory loans by being a smart

Follow these guidelines to avoid becoming a victim of predatory lending:

- · Before you buy a home, attend a homeownership education course offered by a U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD)-approved, non-profit counseling agency.
- · Interview several real estate professionals (agents), and ask for and check references before you select one to help you buy or sell a home.
- · Get information about the prices of other homes in the neighborhood. Don't be fooled into paying too much.
- · Hire a qualified and licensed home inspector to carefully inspect the property before you are obligated to buy. Determine whether you or the seller will be responsible for paying for the repairs.
- Shop for a lender and compare costs. Be suspicious if anyone tries to steer you to just one lender.

The HUD Office of Housing Counseling has a list of federal, state, and local resources to protect you from predatory lending.
