


## Join farmers and chefs in celebration of our local autumn bounty!

#### A brief history of American football

According to Nielsen, 111.3 million people tuned in to watch the Super Bowl in early 2017. Almost twothirds of adults in the United States say they currently watch National Football League games.

But American football is no longer relegated to the boundaries of the United States, as it is becoming a global sport. According to the International Federation of American Football, there are 80 countries with organized federations governing the game. Plus, thousands of youth and adult leagues exist all over the world. Even though soccer has long been a global sport, it seems the other kind of "football" is quickly catching up.

The sport known as American football was born out of the English sports of association football (soccer) and rugby. During the late 19th century, elite Northeastern colleges took up the sport, playing a soccertype game with rules adopted from the London Football Association. Intercollegiate matches began to spring up at schools such as Rutgers, Princeton, Harvard and McGill University. Rugby-type rules became preferential among players and spectators.

Walter Camp, known affectionately as the "Father of American Football," transformed the rugby-style game into the one that resembles American football today. Camp brought two key innovations to the game. The opening "scrummage" was eliminated and a rule was introduced that required a team to give up the ball after failing to advance down the field a specific yardage. Camp also developed the quarterback position, lines of scrimmage and the scoring scale used in football today.

Early games were controversial because of the high rate of injury. Even President Theodore Roosevelt stepped in to ask collegiate teams to revise regulations to make the game less brutal. The committee overseeing the rules would later become known as the National Collegiate Athletic Association.

That league would later become the National Football League. The first televised NFL game occurred in 1939. Eventually, American football's popularity would explode.

Cheerleaders were introduced to the game in the 1960s. Currently, the Dallas Cowboy Cheerleaders are the most famous squad. Six teams in the NFL do not have cheerleaders: the Chicago Bears, the Cleveland Browns, the Detroit Lions, the New York Giants, the Pittsburgh Steelers and the Green Bay Packers.

Football games typically last around three hours. Average attendance for an NFL game is 66,957 spectators.



The day is Sept. 9, 2017 — the first day of the annual Fort Klock Craft Fair. Member Bernadette was to be the teacher for the two days. Her first task was to get that tricky lock on the door to work. As she struggled an Amish friend named Harvey came over to see the school that still survived from another day and age. At least to most residents and students from the 21st Century. But that is not the case with our Amish neighbors. Harvey was a student in a country school as were some of our Fort Klock members a long time ago. That tricky lock gave in to Harvey and he and Bernadette stepped over the threshold to yesteryear. The writer of this story visited the school several times during the 2-day event. It was a pleasure to see the considerable number of school age visitors that

stopped to witness the greatest rendition of a country school teacher that Bernadette was able to give.

Her efforts breathed life into the old school once again. This writer was there on a hot August day in 1954 when a tragic fire greatly damaged the old landmark. We believe the structure was erected about 1825. A few students still survive who began their education right here on the corner of the old Klock farm. The 1930s saw the useful end of the old school when consolidation changed local education forever. That is except for our Amish neighbors who adhere to a system which has survived until this day. I'm proud that I went to County School District 10 at Marshville. That school is gone now but does survive in my memory as long as I reside on this old earth.

National park discount is still a great deal

If you'd planned to pick up a couple of senior passes to the national parks as part of your autumn leaf-peeping travels, you'll need to increase your budget. The lifetime access pass has gone from \$10 to a whopping \$80.

The senior pass (full name: America the Beautiful — The National Parks and Federal Recreational Lands Pass) is a bargain, providing admission to recreation areas run by the National Park Service, U.S. Fish & Wildlife, U.S. Forest Service and more.

If you don't want to pay the \$80 all at once, consider a one-year pass for \$20. Do that for four years, and you can convert it to a lifetime pass.

There still are ways to visit our parks without breaking the bank. Some parks only charge a few dollars for admission. Others, like the national monuments,

are free. Those that do charge have some free days designated each year.

If you're taking a trip soon, here's a warning: The parks service is inundated with requests for passes, and you might not get yours before you leave. However, print out the confirmation you receive and take that with you, as well as a picture ID. If you're planning to buy your pass at the recreation site, phone ahead; many have run out of passes. To buy online, go to yourpassnow.com. You'll pay an extra \$10 processing fee. If you are permanently disabled, you can get a free pass with documentation.

If you already have the \$10 lifetime pass, you won't have to pay for a new one; you're grandfathered in...unless you lose the one you now have.

For more information, go online to www.nps.gov, where you'll learn about parks by state, and locations to buy a pass.



To make themselves more visible to fellow hunters, hunters should wear clothing in blaze orange rather than camouflage. Hunters can visit fishing and game retailers for additional recommendations on gear.

#### To Your Good Health

#### by Keith Roach, M.D. **Pill Swallowing Tips**

Dear Dr. Roach: I am a retired engineer, and engineers like solving problems. I find that people have difficulty swallowing medications because swallowing a gulp of water is an unnatural act when compared with everyday unnoticed swallowing, and that people are taking too small a sip of water, so they feel the pills, which can trigger a gag reflex.

The solution is to swallow a large sip of water without pills to prepare the mind and body for the relatively rare swallowing process that will follow. Then, take a large sip of water and swallow with pills. — R.E.

Answer: As someone who has studied physics, if not engineering, the small sip

of water lubricates the esophagus, so pills are less likely to be stuck.

I have always recommended a small sip followed by a large gulp, for a different reason from yours. As far as specific positions, some people seem to do better with chin up, others with chin down. Taking a pill with some food or applesauce (or something of similar texture) helps many people. Practicing with something (a breath mint or M&M) can help you find what works best for you. Tepid or even warm water helps some.

Dear Dr. Roach: A dear friend has been diagnosed with spinal stenosis. She's 85. She tried a cortisone shot, with very short-lived relief, and physical therapy, to no avail. She's been prescribed pain pills, which cause her to sleep more than you'd expect for her age. Her doctor seems to be out of options. I read about laser treatment for this area. Do you think this might help, or do you have other ideas? -- M.R.

Answer: "Spinal stenosis" is the term we use to describe compression of the spinal cord or nerve roots by bony structures in the spine. This may be a result of arthritis, skeletal disease and many other conditions. One common finding is difficulty after walking, causing someone to want to sit or lie down. I often see people with spinal stenosis who lean over while walking, as though they are walking into a stiff wind. Many sufferers can walk for prolonged periods with a shopping cart, because the leaningover position relieves the pressure on the nerves.

Surgery for spinal stenosis can be challenging, and in an 85-yearold, the risk of complications is higher. However, given her symptoms and lack of response to nonsurgical therapy, consulting with a surgeon may be appropriate. There may still be additional medical therapies she hasn't tried before doing so.

I am not a surgeon, and only a surgeon can appropriately choose the tools for a given surgery. However, having looked over the research in this area, there is no evidence that laser offers any advantage over traditional surgery.

#### Make food safety a priority this fall

season, whether you're preparing a packed lunch for your child, a weeknight dinner for the family or a tailgate feast for the whole crew, make sure you prevent foodborne illness by following USDA's four steps to food safety: Clean, Separate, Cook and Chill.

Clean: Wash vour hands and cooking surfaces before and after handling food. Wash fruits and vegetables before eating, cutting or cooking. Make sure lunch boxes and coolers are clean before packing.

Separate: Avoid cross contamination. Don't let raw meat, poultry or egg products come in contact with fruits, vegetables or prepared foods. Never put cooked food on a plate or tray that held raw meat or poultry.

Cook: When cooking, use a food thermometer to make sure food reaches a safe minimum internal temperature needed to destroy harmful bacteria. Cook raw beef, pork, lamb and veal steaks, chops, roasts and fish to a minimum internal temperature of 145°F and let them rest for three min-

During the busy fall utes before eating. When cooking raw ground beef, pork, lamb and veal, make sure the meat reaches a minimum internal temperature of 160°F. Egg dishes should also be cooked to a safe minimum internal temperature of 160°F. All poultry should be cooked to a safe minimum internal temperature of 165°F.

> Chill: When packing food, use an insulated lunchbox or cooler and at least two cold sources, such as freezer packs. Discard any perishable foods that were left at room temperature longer than two hours (one hour in temperatures above

#### Lunch packing tips:

If the lunch contains perishable food items like luncheon meats, eggs, cheese or yogurt, make sure to pack it with at least two cold sources such as freezer packs. Harmful bacteria multiply rapidly so perishable food transported without a cold source won't stay safe long.

Frozen juice boxes or water can also be used as freezer packs. Freeze these items overnight and use with at least one other freezer pack. By lunchtime, the liquids should be thawed and ready to drink.

If packing a hot lunch, like soup, chili or stew, use an insulated container to keep it hot. Fill the container with boiling water, let stand for a few minutes, empty, and then put in the piping hot food. Tell children to keep the insulated container closed until lunchtime to keep the food at 140°F or above.

If packing a child's lunch the night before, parents should leave it in the refrigerator overnight. The meal will stay cold longer because everything will be refrigerator temperature when it is placed in the lunchbox.

#### Eating and disposal

Teach children to properly wash their hands before eating lunch. If running water isn't available. pack disposable wipes for cleaning hands before and after eating.

After lunch, children should discard all leftover food and used food pack-

Clean lunch boxes thoroughly each night with warm soapy water or a

disinfectant wipe.

#### Foods that cats and dogs should never eat

Nutritious diets are essential to longterm pet health. Many well-intentioned pet owners feed their pets foods they believe are nutritious, only to learn that certain foods, even those deemed healthy for humans, can be quite dangerous to dogs and cats.

Cats and dogs metabolize foods and other substances differently from humans. WebMD reports that each year, there are more than 100,000 cases of pet poisoning in the United States. Household substances that may seem perfectly harmless caused many of these instances in the pets. Medications, cleaning products and certain foods can poison pets. Dogs tend to be at higher risk for food poisoning, particularly because they are less discriminatory with regard to food.

Before caving into the temptation to share snacks with their pets, pet owners should recognize the common foods the ASPCA and other pet welfare organizations list as the most likely to contribute to pet poisonings worldwide.

• Chocolate: Chocolate is accountable for roughly one-quarter of all toxic exposures. Chocolate contains methylxanthines, which are found in cacao seeds. When ingested by pets, methylxanthines can cause excessive thirst and urination, panting, vomiting, diarrhea, abnormal heart rhythm, and seizures. Serious cases can be fatal. Dark chocolate and baking chocolate are especially

dangerous for pets.

- Grapes/raisins: Grapes, raisins, sultanas, and currants, whether raw or cooked, can cause kidney failure in dogs. Not all dogs are affected. However, these fruits should be avoided. Symptoms include lethargy, diarrhea and vomiting within 24 hours of consumption.
- Hops: Commonly used for brewing beer, hops have become a greater risk for pets now that home brewing as a hobby or side business has become popular. When ingested, hops can cause a rapid heart rate, anxiety, vomiting, and other abdominal symptoms. Essential oils and tannins in hops also can cause high fever when pets ingest them.
- Macadamia nuts: These nuts can cause depression, vomiting, tremors, and hyperthermia in dogs.
- Milk and dairy: Do not give dogs and cats milk to lap up, and avoid giving them high amounts of cheese and other dairy foods. Pets do not possess significant amounts of lactase, the enzyme that breaks down lactose in milk. Therefore, diarrhea and digestive upset is likely to occur when pets consume dairy.
- Onions/garlic: These aromatic ingredients are not a good idea for pets, particularly cats. Onions contain an ingredient called thiosulphate, which is toxic to cats and dogs. The ingestion of

onions and onion-related foods can cause a condition called hemolytic anemia. This is damage to red blood cells that causes the cells circulating throughout the pet's body to burst.

• Xylitol: Keep pets away from sugarless gums and candies that contain Xylitol, which also may be used in toothpaste. The substance causes insulin to release in most species, which can lead to liver failure.

Pet owners should be aware that the foods they eat regularly may not be safe for their pets. Always consult with a veterinarian before giving pets foods commonly eaten by humans.

game against Cohoes.


"It was a great game," reports Smith. With Canajoharie-Fort Plain scoring 53 against Cohoes 12, it would certainly seem that way.

## Whatchamacallits -



This week's Whatchamacallit is a very beautiful example of how well things were made over a century ago. It is elegant in its simplistic style. And although the style is simplistic, this is a precision measuring instrument that helped shape the boundaries of our villages, cities and nation.

It is a surveyor's compass. Our lovely compass comes with levels built into the platform; a plumb bob nestled into a cradle in the corner of the box and two sighting vanes also nestled into a custom-made area in the box. Our example was even brought to us with the original tripod that the unit could be mounted onto in order to keep it steady (see inset far right).

W. & L. E. Gurley in Troy, NY—a well know maker of precision instruments made our compass. I was able to determine that our example was manufactured before 1908 because there is no serial number. According to surveyantiques.com , Gurley did not begin to use serial numbers until November of 1908.

Another early instrument that was preferred by surveyors in Europe is the theodolite. Also

used on a tripod, it incorporated sight glasses and an array of wheels, screws and plates—which proved cumbersome in the heavily wooded areas of Colonial America.

Using little more than a compass and a 66-foot chain, early American surveyors set out to chart what became the United States of America. Even though deemed primitive by modern standards, this procedure was remarkably accurate.

#### **Paw's Corner**

## by Sam Mazzotta Do indoor cats need all those shots?

Dear Paw's Corner: Our cat's paws never touch the ground outside. "Dale" is an indoor cat, through and through. He doesn't even try to go outdoors, although he does like to watch the world go by from his perch in the front-room window. With that in mind, why does he have to get all of those vaccinations? Most are to protect him from diseases acquired from other cats, like FIV. He's never going to see another cat, so why should I protect him from a disease he likely won't get? — Budget-Minded Papa in Chicago

Dear Papa: Vaccinating your cat against "improbable" diseases, ones that he seems unlikely to be exposed to, may seem like a waste of money. However, vaccines protect against the possibility of the improbable actually happening.

Under normal circumstances, Dale may never be at risk of contracting feline immunodeficiency virus (FIV), rabies, feline leukemia or other illnesses. But we can't see the future and things don't always stay normal.

Let's say that you and Dale move to a new home. There's a chance that during the move, Dale could escape from his carrier, get confused or lost and be stuck outdoors for a few days until you find him. Or, perhaps a natural disaster occurs where you and Dale have to evacuate and he must be housed temporarily around other pets. Having all of his required and recommended shots will help keep Dale healthy in situations like this.

If cost is a concern, look for lower-cost vaccination events, often called shot clinics, where you can get Dale's shots up to date for significantly less than the veterinarian may charge.

#### Make giant ABC's for learning fun

Fun times are ahead for preschoolers and kindergartners when you create a collection of hands-on alphabet letters that reinforce sounds and the words they are learning to pronounce, read and spell. Craft the 26 letters, save and use them over and over to practice language learning skills.

#### Here's what you'll need:

- · 26 sheets of poster board or cardboard, 9 inches by 12 inches
- · pencil and markers
- scissors
- assorted small glue-on objects, stickers, magazine cut-outs of items whose names start with the sound of specific letters (see suggestions below)

#### Here's the fun:







#### Stay safe when landscaping



#### **Kovels: Antiques And Collecting**

by Terry and Kim Kovel Coco Chanel chandelier Coco Chanel (1883-1971) is a well-known French fashion designer who changed the look of women's clothes and jewelry, and created the famous perfume Chanel No. 5 during the 20th century. But few know she also designed some chandeliers and other furnishings for her apartment and for customers. A rolled-arm sofa and a rock-crystal chandelier probably are her bestknown pieces. She included animal figures and mirrors in abundance. Colors like black. gold, brown, honey, beige and cinnabar were backgrounds for Coromandel folding screens and antique furniture. A famous Coco Chanel-designed gilt-metal and rock-crystal chandelier sold at New Orleans Auctions in 2016. It was designed by with Robert. Goossens, a Parisian jeweler. The frame has interlocking hearts and ovals with large rock-crystal chunks hanging below. Metal leaves covered the 12 light sockets. The impressive 40-inch-high 31-inch-diameter chandelier sold for \$37,500.

Q: In the 1930-1950 period, would Minton dinnerware normally

found in middle-class or upper-middle-class homes? Where might it have fit in the dinnerware hierarchy, compared to Royal Doulton, Spode or Wedgwood?

A: Royalty, the wealthy and the upper middle class owned Minton dinnerware. In some homes, it was the "good" china used only on special occasions. Minton was made in the Staffordshire region of England beginning in 1796. It became part of the Royal Doulton Tableware Group in 1968. The brand is now part of WWRD Holdings. Minton china is no longer made.

Q: I have Currier & Ives' "American Homestead Winter" with the original government copyright notice. I can't find any information on the old copyright mark in the bottom left corner of the print that's followed by the letters "HFA." Do you know what this stands for?

A: The letters "HFA" stand for Haddad's Fine Arts, Inc., a company in Anaheim, CA, that does reproductions of works of art. The company sells only to businesses, not directly to consumers. Your print is a reproduction of an original Currier & Ives print. Reproductions are common, and average-size prints sell

for less than \$30







#### To Your Good Health

#### Can anxiety meds cause Alzheimer's?

Dear Dr. Roach: I read recently that if Valium is taken by older folks for more than 90 days, it ups their risk for Alzheimer's disease by 32 percent and if taken for more than 180 days, the risk goes up 84 percent. Have you heard anything like this? What is safe for seniors, or anyone, to take for anxiety? — C.P.

Answer: A study published recently ago in BMJ, a prestigious medical journal, showed a clear association between benzodiazepines — a class of medications that includes diazepam (Valium), clonazepam (Klonopin), alprazolam (Xanax) and lorazepam (Ativan), among many others — and Alzheimer's disease. The association was stronger for long-term use than for short, as you correctly point out. Further, the risk was higher for long-acting drugs (like Valium or Librium) than for short (like Xanax).

However, the type of study done cannot claim that taking the medication caused the increased risk of Alzheimer's. The authors themselves point out that it is possible that early Alzheimer's disease causes anxiety that is subsequently treated with prescription anti-anxiety medications, and that there is no causal relationship. It is also possible to see this result from chance, although the authors found less than 0.1 percent likelihood this result is due to chance alone. Finally, it's possible that there is both a direct, causal link between taking benzodiazepine drugs and developing Alzheimer's disease and that early Alzheimer's causes some people enough anxiety that they are prescribed these anti-anxiety medications. That implies that the risk is less than the numbers from the study. A different study design may reveal the truth.

There are many good reasons not to use benzodiazepine medications, and I never prescribe them for long-term use. Increased risk of both falls and automobile collisions are two that most concern me. (Multiple studies have confirmed this risk, so it is likely that these drugs do cause some people to fall and to have auto accidents.) These are also potentially habitforming medications, and sometimes it becomes very difficult to sleep without them once they are started.

Because all medications have some risk, I recommend nondrug strategies for anxiety reduction. Meditation, mindfulness and imaging exercises, yoga and even regular exercise all have been shown to reduce anxiety without medication. Counseling and cognitive-behavioral therapies also are effective. If medications are needed, then SSRI medications such as sertraline (Zoloft) have lower risks than benzodiazepines. Just a cup of hot chamomile tea might help you get through stressful times.

Dear Dr. Roach: My husband has heart disease. He's tried every statin drug to lower his cholesterol. He cannot tolerate any of them. The muscle pain and weakness caused by these drugs is severe. His cholesterol remains high, even with proper diet and exercise. I've heard that CoQ10 works well for lowering cholesterol. Is there any validity to this? — Anon.

Answer: CoQ10 (ubiquinone) does not affect cholesterol itself. It does allow some people tolerate statins who otherwise wouldn't. I think it is worth a try, especially for someone like your husband, who has coronary heart disease and who would get much benefit from a statin.








## How to improve the value of your trade-in

• Keep maintenance records. Maintenance records illustrating that the vehicle was taken care of can help owners get more for their trade-ins. Drivers who intend to trade the vehicle in to the same dealership where the vehicle was purchased should still keep their own maintenance records to eliminate potential problems as they negotiate the trade-in value of their vehicles.


