Apple no substitute
for toothbrush

Dear Dr. Roach: I have heard that an apple a day keeps the dentist away and that an apple is nature's toothbrush. Can we really skip brushing our teeth if we eat an apple instead? — R.T.

Answer: I've read many opinions about this subject, and I tend to agree with the ones that show that apples are high in both sugar (some newer varieties much more so than old ones) and acid, which can damage teeth. Apples do have some ability to remove some particles from the teeth, but they will not clean all surfaces of the teeth. So, I would not skip brushing after an apple, even though apples are much better for your teeth than sticky sweets.

Dear Dr. Roach: What is an exophytic cyst? I have one on my right kidney, and it has been watched closely for the past eight years. The most recent ultrasound shows that it is 2.1 cm and hasn't changed in that time. I am 78 and in good health, except for asbestos exposure. Should I get this thing removed, or let it be? I get conflicting advice. — B.W.

Answer: The word "exophytic" means "growing outward," and a cyst is a fluid-filled cavity. So an exophytic cyst bulges out of the kidney and is filled with fluid. The big concern with these is whether they can be cancerous. A simple cyst, with thin walls and fluid without any solid structures, has a very low likelihood of being cancer and does not need further evaluation. If the sonogram can't show that for

certain, then a CT scan is usually done.

Kidney cysts are graded according to the Bosniak category, based on their appearance by CT scan. The more complex the cyst, the higher the likelihood of cancer. Older age, being a male and asbestos exposure are risk factors for cancer of the kidney.

Despite those risk factors, if this were a simple cyst (Bosniak I or II) and unchanged in eight years, it is very unlikely to be cancer, and I would recommend letting it be. However, if it were a Bosniak category III or higher, I would discuss biopsy with the urologist.

Dear Dr. Roach: I'm having a sensation on the balls of my feet, as though I am walking with pads. I have diabetes, but my sugar level is moderate. I have seen three doctors without results. Do you have any thoughts? — B.G.

Answer: Anytime I hear symptoms that could be numbness, pain, tingling or burning sensation in someone with diabetes, I think it is diabetic neuropathy until proven differently. It is not usually hard to diagnose with a filament (to test light touch sensation) and a tuning fork (to test vibration), but occasionally an electrodiagnostic test (i.e., EMG) is necessary. If your regular or diabetes doctor hasn't helped, I suggest a neurologist.

Blood sugar levels that are persistently high are more likely to result in diabetic neuropathy, but longstanding diabetes, even when it's moderately well controlled, can lead to neuropathy.

Think you have your retirement financial planning well in hand? Well, a new study shows that you might be in for a rude surprise when the time comes. The American College New York Life Center for Retirement Income commissioned a survey of retirement income planning, and the results are disturbing. Only 35 percent of men passed the quiz; only 18 percent of women were able to

The quiz covered a dozen different categories, and judging by the results, the topic of annuity products in retirement was the most difficult.

Women equaled men in the Medicare insurance planning section, with both getting 76 percent of answers correct. Women also bested men (just barely, at 38 percent versus 35 percent) in paying for long-term-care expenses.

The survey found the most glaring problem is that while many women know they're not knowledgeable about retirement income planning, the majority still believe they'll have enough money to live on. Why is that? Are women secretly depending on men to be on top of financial planning, answering on the quiz that they make joint decisions, while the men replied that they (the men) were actually the ones in charge?

There is one ray of hope in the survey: The majority of women believe that it's important for their financial adviser to educate them... while a minority of men responded that way.

Ladies, we live longer. If anyone should be more



concerned about having enough money for a long retirement, it's us. At the very least, we should know what our monthly retirement budget looks like.

I take issue with your letter to the editor that appeared in the October 20th issue of the C-S-E. Since the time you announced your intention to run for Town of Palatine Supervisor, I have been waiting for you to state your reasons for running and what you planned to bring to the position. Finally, just 2½ weeks prior to the election, you decide to let your intentions be known and the majority of the letter is nothing but accusations and innuendo toward Town Supervisor Sara Niccoli.

Mr. Maclauchlin, I have attended the Town of Palatine board meetings since 2014 and NEVER have I seen you there, so let me give you some facts:

Fact #1: To address your comment of raising taxes, let me point out that since Supervisor Niccoli has been in charge of the Town of Palatine's budget, taxes have only increased by .07 percent. That would be 7 cents per \$1,000 of assessed value. While other municipalities have been holding hearings to override the tax cap, Supervisor Niccoli has held the budget **under** the tax cap, resulting in the town residents receiving a tax rebate check from the State for the past two years and can expect another one this year.

Fact #2: Supervisor Niccoli is not "hiding". She was absent at the September 2017 board meeting due to illness and the October 11 special meeting (that was scheduled by the Deputy Supervisor) due to a previous commitment. I can only assume that if you are elected you would never be absent from a board meeting.

Fact #3: There had not been a State Audit of the Town of Palatine in close to two decades. It was Supervisor Niccoli who made the request to the State Comptroller's Office for an audit and she has no control over when the final report will be available. That is entirely up to the State Comptroller's Office and for you to insinuate otherwise is completely irresponsible. Is this the type of "leaderhip" the residents can expect if you were to be elected?

Fact #4: Supervisor Niccoli DID address the preliminary audit report as part of her Supervisor Report at the August 23, 2017 Town Board meeting as stated in the official minutes of that meeting. You would have known this if you attended a meeting or asked the Town Clerk for minutes of previous meetings as this would have given you accurate information regarding the town.

Fact #5: You insinuated that the "increasing surplus" is the fault of Supervisor Niccoli. These funds have increased over the last 15 to 20 years because previous town boards had plans to build a new building, neglecting any and all maintenance on the current town hall.

You also stated in your letter, "I offer you something different", but different doesn't necessarily mean better or beneficial for the town.

It is my personal belief that residents of the Town of Palatine do **NOT** need you to represent them. **I KNOW** I certainly do not....and that's a **FACT**.

Sweet Potato vs. Yams — there is a difference. Yams are moister than sweet potatoes and have darker skins. Sweet potatoes are versatile and are often baked, candied or made into pies. It's best not to boil them, as they'll lose much of their flavor.


- 1/2 cup unsweetened orange juice
- 1/4 cup Peter Pan or Skippy reducedfat peanut butter
- 2 tablespoons Brown Sugar Twin
- 3 cups (16 ounces) sliced cooked sweet potatoes
- 1/2 cup miniature marshmallows
- 1. Heat oven to 350 degrees F. Spray

an 8-by-8-inch baking dish with butter-flavored cooking spray.

- 2. In a large bowl, combine orange juice, peanut butter and Brown Sugar Twin. Add sweet potatoes. Mix well to coat. Pour mixture into prepared baking dish. Bake for 20 minutes.
- 3. Sprinkle marshmallows evenly over top. Continue baking for 5 minutes or until marshmallows start to melt and are lightly browned. Divide into 6 servings.

The Good Government Watchdog Group has completed a search and review of the public records of the Town of Palatine, public records of Montgomery County, State of New York and other States, and those of other municipalities. Our findings are:-

That Ms. Sara Niccoli failed to sign the fire contract renewal with St. Johnsville, NY on time and also changed the monetary figures herself without Town Board approval. These monetary changes are in her own handwriting and preserved in the original document. The 3 male Town Board members raised no protest to her action. Your property was not protected from fire or your life by fire rescue for 2 months. The Good Government Watchdog Group's conclusion is that she and the 3 male members of the Town Board of Palatine do not care about your property or your life.

Ms. Sara Niccoli promised a transparent government and one that wanted to hear the opinions of the residents. Ms. Niccoli and her 3 male members of the Town Board reduced the Public Comment section of the Town Board meeting agenda from two to one. Ms. Niccoli and her 3 male Town Board members no longer want to hear your opinion. The Good Government Watchdog Group's conclusion is that this is closed government and the public should be outraged.

Ms. Niccoli and the 3 male members held secret meetings without notifying ALL members of the Town Board of Palatine. The evidence shows that the only female Town Board member was consistently bypassed and refused knowledge of a password to gain accesss to the emails. This is Ms. Niccoli and the 3 male Board members idea of good government. This is the Good Government Watchdog Group's opinion borders on dictatorship. This is a wake up call for the residents of the Town of Palatine.

Ms. Sara Niccoli, for over two months, has not acted on renewal of the agreement with FEMA (Federal Emergency Management Adminstration). This would have continued Federal aid in case of disasters such as floods, wild fires, extreme weather events, mud slides, etc. The Good Government Watchdog Group concludes that Ms. Niccoli does not meet the necessary qualifications to serve as supervisor.

Ms. Sara Niccoli appointed Mr. Niel Yerdon as Deputy Superisor to act in times when she is not present. This appears to be an extremely poor choice. After being sent to school for training, apparently Mr. Yerdon learned little. Much public opinion and recordings show that Mr. Niel Yerdon is unable to adequately conduct a Town Board meeting. In her absence, Mr. Yerdon seems to be incapable of making required decisions such as what to do in emergency situations. Our survey indicates that Mr. Yerdon looks to others to make the decision for him. The Good Government Watchdog Group wonders why he is on the Town Board.

The Good Government Watchdog Group's review showed that Ms. Sara Niccoli has publicly said that the recent audit of records of the Town of Palatine show that she was found to have made no mistakes. This is not true. Sara was ordered by New York State to return all monies that was removed from the Capital Reserve Fund. The monies in the Capital Reserve Fund can only be used for the purpose for which it was created.

Many people contributed to finance Ms. Sara Niccoli's campaign for public office including the New York State Senator. After an election the candidate, whether he or she wins or loses, can use leftover campaign money for personal use. Ms. Sara Niccoli bought a new car. The Good Government Watchdog Group would like to see the campaign funding rules changed. We believe that all leftover campaign monies should be returned or donated to charity.

Ms. Sara Niccoli foolishly denied the employees of the Town of Palatine Highway Department a very small raise in hourly wages. The result is that the Highway Department is now unionized. The union contract calls for a monetary penalty if the pay checks are delivered late. The Good Government Watchdog Group is neither pro or against unions We believe in many circumstances the unions are very beneficial. However, the residents of the Town of Palatine have had their hard earned money pay these late penalties. The 3 male Town Board members and Sara Niccoli claim that the union contract saves the Town of Palatine money. The Good Government Watchdog Group does not agree.

Ms. Sara Niccoli is very proud to be an activist. Sara attends demonstrations in Albany, Gloversville, etc. even if it means not attending or leaving a Board meeting early. She is thought to be against the NRA and for very strict gun control. Look for her on TV and sometimes being interviewed.

Ms. Sara Niccoli and the 3 men board members now want to build a pond on the former site for the now defunct new Town Hall. This pond is supposed to be for resupplying water to fire trucks. The public records show that for one year they argued that there was not sufficient water from the drilled well to even flush a toilet twice. Now there seems to be all kinds of water. What is the source of water? When Town Board member Mr. Christopher Novak was asked about this he replied that one should ask a Mr. Paul Spencer because it was Mr. Spencer's idea. When you first claim that there is a serious lack of water and then claim that there is all kinds of water, you have no credibility. The Good Government Watchdog Group concludes that Mr. Novak does not now want to be connected to this pond location and has cast out Mr. Spencer to hang and twist in the wind all by himself. Shameful Mr. Novak. Can you really trust someone who has moved about 11 times in nearly 15 years. Don't you wonder why?

Also, a review of public records shows that it was argued for months that in the winter it is too difficult to drive north on NYS Route 10 and other roads because of snow, drifting snow, icy roads etc. This would mean that fire trucks would not be able to reach this pond for water resupply. The Good Government Watchdog Group concludes that it is simply amazing that the Town of Palatine Highway Department employees seem to get there every day to plow your roads. The residents who live north of the Village of Palatine Bridge also seem to arrive at work and return home. When the Good Government Watchdog Group analyzed the entire picture of the current town government and their supporters, it is obvious that this was just another scare tactic argument used to defeat the now defunct proposed new town hall. Consolidated government propably will be forced upon us quite soon and we will be governed by people unknown to us. Montgomery County and the New York State Governments will tell us how to live. The Good Government Watchdog Group acknowledges that there are benefits of this consolidation - mostly saving money. We are apprehensive about consolidation of services as decisions will basically be made by strangers to our area. It is believed that local people know their area best and perhaps this outweighs saving money.

Ms. Sara Niccoli and her 3 men board members continue to talk about all the good things they are doing for you. A review by the Good Government Watchdog Group shows that is what it is - just talk. Meanwhile, the really important Town business is not being done as evidence shows that Ms. Sara Niccoli does not act timely on important Town of Palatine business or answer telephone calls or email. Many residents have told us, and verified by Town Board meeting summaries, that Ms. Niccoli has said that she does answer but this is not true. As an activist, much of the time she is not in the area. It appears that Ms. Sara Niccoli's purpose is only to advance her own political ambitions. Good Government is about serving the people correctly. Ms. Sara Niccoli falls far short of this standard.

The Good Government Watchdog Group encourages that when you vote this November 7th, please make educated choices. Your local government can be adminstered more wisely, fairly, honestly, and with fiscal integrity. Your vote can influence the operation of your own local government much more than you can influence county, state or federal governments. You know your home area much better than strangers. Vote- America is still the home of the free because of the brave.

You are encouraged to vote NO on the 2017 Proposed Constitutional Amendments. These amendments are not necessary. The government wants more control of you life.

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
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Now Here's A Tip

Fold one leg onto the other, then roll tightly from ankle to waist, being sure to smooth wrinkles as you go. Stuff socks into shoes. Make use of all your space.


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
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
Whatchamacallits



Our Whatchamacallit for this week is quite a unique measuring tool, patented on Jan. 11, 1870. The patent holder was E. H. Robinson of Janesville, WI. I had heard that some folks call this a bridge square, but nowhere online could I find this item in relation to that name. The only other image of this exact tool that I found was from an old listing of antique tools for sale, and it offered no definitive name. Robinson called it a "ruling device."

According to Robinson's patent application, the intent of this tool was to provide a simple device that was quickly and "readily adjusted to make parallel lines or lines of any angle." It is simple in its design consisting of a ruled U-shaped square with a crossbar between the tongues (arms) that can be slid up and down and secured by means of set-screws on the crossbar (see diagram). It is clearly stamped Eagle Square Manufacturing Co. but I was unable to capture the logo with the camera.

Eagle Square Manufacturing Co. has a very interesting and long history starting in 1819. In 1916 it was sold to the Stanley Rule and Level Company of New Britain, CT. According to UVM Center for Digital Initiatives website, "Throughout the many changes in ownership and administration, the factory in South Shaftsbury has retained the "Eagle Square Company" name."

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

Rabies vaccination clinic announcement for November

A rabies vaccination clinic will be held on Saturday, Nov. 4, 2017 at the Mohawk Town, 2-4 Park Street, Fonda from 9 a.m. – noon.

New York State Public Health Law requires that all dogs, cats and domestic ferrets shall have initial vaccinations administered against rabies no later than four months of age and stay up to date with re-vaccinations. Re-vaccinations are required one year later and a booster shot every three years. It is important to have pets vaccinated in a timely manner in order for the pet to be considered protected against the virus. Pet owners should bring proof of their pet's last rabies vaccination. This helps the veterinarian determine whether the pet will receive a one or three-year vaccination; without it your pet will receive a one-year vaccination only.

Veterinarian administration fee for rabies vaccine is \$10 per vaccine. Other vaccines will be available at additional fees.

To assure the safety of other pets and people; dogs must be leashed; cats and ferrets must be contained in a pet carrier or box when attending the rabies clinic.

Years ago, I had five totally indoor kitties. And like his cats, mine loved to perch on the windowsill. I'd never bothered to keep up with all of their shots, because they never went outside and so wouldn't be exposed to other cats — so why deal with the expense?

You can guess what happened: The window screen popped out somehow, and my cat "Woody" fell out into our side yard. Once we discovered the "escape," we got him back into the house, but sadly, it was not fast

enough. As time went by I noticed all of my cats were showing signs of illness, so I made an appointment with the veterinarian. Sadly, Woody never made it; he passed away the day before the appointment. All of my surviving cats were diagnosed with feline leukemia.

Because of my insistence on being cheap, I shortened all of my cats' lives. If they had been vaccinated regularly, they likely would never have gotten sick even if they accidentally escaped the house. That's a fact I can never, ever change. Please don't think like I did. Protect your family and get all of their vaccinations. — Dee in Palmyra, NY

Dear Dee: Thank you for sharing such a painful experience. I hope your story will help others realize just



how much they have to lose by not vaccinating their indoor cats against feline leukemia, feline immunode-ficiency virus, rabies and other diseases.

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



Tips for a healthy and happy kitten

New pets can make life at home more exciting. Cats are popular pets because of their curiosity, playfulness and size, which make them great pets in private homes and apartments big and small.

Many people prefer cats because they tend to require less maintenance than dogs and felines are relatively self-sufficient. According to a 2014 survey from Alberta Agriculture and Forestry, 37 percent of Canadian households included one or more cats. In the United States, the American Pet Products Association says that 30 to 37 percent of households have a cat, and more than 35 percent of cats are acquired as strays.

Kittens can be soft, fluffy and adorable to have around. However, to maintain a peaceful household and provide a safe environment for new felines, it's important for pet owners to follow some key tips.

Kittens should not be separated from their mother or siblings until they're at least 10 to 12 weeks of age, provided the litter has had significant human contact, offers Blue Buffalo Pet Food's animal experts. If the kittens have not had much contact, it may be possible to bring them home earlier. The earlier cats are socialized, the easier the kitten-owner relationship and the less skittish the cat may be.

Cats require some necessities from the start. These include feeding bowls, litter boxes or trays, toys, and scratching posts. Washable cat beds with warm blankets are also helpful. Position the litter tray in a corner away from food and water. The International Cat Care





group says that a new home can be intimidating, so it's best to introduce cats slowly to their new environments. Choose a room that's quiet where the kitten can adjust. Outfit the room with toys and a place to snuggle or hide, and remove any hazards or breakable items.

Gradually give the kitten time to venture out into the main living area to explore, watching how it behaves. If the cat dashes nervously, it may need more time to acclimate. Some kittens take up to two weeks to fully relax in a home. People should be introduced one at a time.

The animal guidance group VetStreet says handling and playing with kittens at least once per day will help owners form strong emotional bonds with their cats. Children should be monitored upon introduction to the new kitten to make sure it's a positive experience for both the kitten and child.





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part of a "walking" spinning wheel used to spin woolen varn.

A curved "bowl" shaped like part of the border of a circle is sometimes sold at an antique shop. The bowl usually is made by impor-

tant porcelain companies and it seems to be a bargain. It is part of a set of crescent-shaped bowls and one round bowl that fit together to make a circle. The curved bowls held foods like olives, pickles and sauces or several types of vegetables with sauce in the round center bowl. Most sets were made with the five bowls and a lid for the centerpiece. Once a piece broke, the set couldn't be used. But the pieces still were attractive when used

A set made by Coalport porcelain in the Imari pattern sold in 2016 for \$923. Single curved bowls can be found for \$50 to \$75. A covered center bowl might fetch \$100.

g: I have a Sarah Coventry necklace that I was told is 85-90 years old. It's about 16-18 inches long and has graduated glass beads strung on fine copper wire and a copper ring and clasp. I was told it is Waterford crystal. I'd like to know how old it is and what it's worth.

A: It's newer than you think. Sarah Coventry was founded in 1949. Jewelry was designed by freelancers and made by other companies. It was sold through home parties. WANT TO CATCH HOMEBUYERS' EYES? Follow 5 easy steps to a lush lawn

(BPT) — When it comes to selling a home there are many different strategies and most of them focus on the home's interior. However, what many sellers fail to realize is that it's the exterior of the home that often makes or breaks a sale.

Curb appeal is necessary for that vital first impression. Much of a buyer's opinion about a property is formed before they even enter the front door. Research shows curb appeal not only speeds the sale but also increases offer prices.

One of the biggest influencing factors of curb appeal is the health of the lawn. Think about how much property space the lawn covers. A sparse lawn dotted with weeds lowers a buyer's opinion of the home, while a lush, green lawn elevates a home, and gives the impression it is well taken care of.

According to the 2016 Remodeling Impact: Outdoor Features report, lawn seeding earns the top spot for return on investment, recovering 417 percent of the project cost at resale. Implementing a standard lawn care program recovers 303 percent and updating a landscape with a sod lawn recovers 143 percent. Lawn revitalization projects offer much higher returns than many other home improvement projects, including kitchen remodels and deck additions.

Lawn revitalization projects are surprisingly easy to do, so whether you're selling your home or are staying put and just want to enjoy your property more, it's a worthwhile investment. The experts at Grass Seed USA, a coalition of grass seed farmers and academic turf specialists, offer the following five simple steps to achieving a lush lawn fast.

1. Aerate

When the soil under a lawn becomes too compacted, water, air and nutrients have a hard time reaching grass roots. Lawn aerators correct this problem by pulling small plugs of soil about 1/2 inch in diameter and two to three inches deep out of the ground. You can affordably rent an aerator for a day or hire a professional.

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2. Reseed

If you have bare patches or your lawn looks thin, reseeding is an easy solution. Start by contacting a local turf specialist to determine the best seed or sod to purchase for your location and soil type. Then, rake the bare areas of your lawn and apply seed. Water lightly and regularly until new grass grows in. The spring and fall are good times to seed due to cooler weather, although it can be done any time of year.

3. Mow high

Never cut off more than 1/3 of the grass blade height at a time. If grass gets too long, raise the height on your mower. Recommended mowing heights vary by grass type, but an easy rule of thumb for the most common types of lawn is to mow to a two-inch height when the grass blades reach three inches tall.

4. Fertilize

To keep your lawn healthy, aim to fertilize at least once a year; four times a year is ideal. Your local garden center can recommend the fertilizer best for your climate and grass type. Additionally, naturally fertilize your lawn by leaving grass clippings after you mow. As grass clippings break down, they enrich the soil with nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium, the same nutrients found in fertilizer.

5. Irrigate

A thorough watering once or twice a week is better than lightly misting every day. Allowing the soil to dry before it is watered again encourages the roots to grow deeper into the soil and can help the lawn become drought tolerant in the future. What's more, water during the early morning and evening hours to avoid excess evaporation. Watering during the heat of the day can actually scald and burn grass.

FIVE MYTHS about solar panels, debunked

(BPT) — Home solar panels can drastically cut or even eliminate electricity bills, reduce a home's carbon footprint, increase resale value, and may even help a home sell faster.

The cost of rooftop solar systems has fallen dramatically in recent years, and most homeowners have the option of buying the system, leasing it on reasonable payment terms, or having a third-party pay for and install the system at no up-front cost at all for the homeowner. For example, research by the U.S. Department of Energy's National Renewable Energy Laboratory (NREL) and the Lawrence Berkeley National Laboratory found solar panels help homes sell faster and for more money than those without solar.

If you're considering installing a solar panel system on your home, here are five common myths — and why you shouldn't believe them:

Myth 1: Solar panels only work if you live in a warm, sunny climate.

While solar panels work best when they get a lot of sun, a lack of bright sun doesn't mean they're not working. Panels can still absorb ambient sunlight, even on cloudy days or in regions that get less bright sun. What's more, today's solar panels are more energy efficient than ever. Newer systems like the "LG NeOn R" maximize sunlight absorption and generate the maximum possible output. This higher efficiency means that solar panels can work in virtually any climate and every season.

Myth 2: You need a lot of roof space for solar panels.

Just like other amazing technologies (think microchips), solar panels are getting smaller, more powerful and more efficient. High-efficiency panels take up less space because fewer panels are required to produce the electricity needed to power your home. So even a smaller home could have enough roof space to fit the number of panels needed to generate the necessary power and save you money.

Myth 3: Installation is a long, drawn-out hassle.

While adding solar panels to your home isn't a DIY project, installation usually takes only a day or two. New models streamline the process further, eliminating the need to install a separate inverter. Most solar panels require a separate inverter to bring electricity into your house, but new

As with any major investment in your home, you should make sure you understand the manufacturer and installer warranties for your solar panels, including how long the coverage lasts and what types of problems are covered. And unlike a furnace or an air conditioning system, a solar installation has no moving parts to wear out and typically requires little maintenance and repair.

Myth 5: Solar panels will look big, bulky and ugly on your roof.

Solar panels are becoming smaller, sleeker and more aesthetically pleasing. Higher-efficiency models are also offering increased flexibility of configuration. Instead of having to cover an entire roof with panels in a specific arrangement in order to generate power, modern options allow you to arrange panels to meet your sense of aesthetics.

Adding solar power to a home offers homeowners many benefits, from reducing energy costs, to increasing the value of your home and helping the environment, Ballentine says. "Overall, it's a decision most homeowners feel positively about once they've made it." The NREL notes in its study: "Buyers of homes with (solar panel) systems are more satisfied than are comparison buyers. A significantly higher percentage ... indicate they would buy the same houses again."



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

The Window Covering Safety Council recommends only cordless window coverings or window coverings with inaccessible cords be used in homes with small kids.

Consumers can easily identify products best suited for homes with young children by looking for the Best for Kids certification label on the packaging of a large variety of products. Window covering products that qualify for "Best for Kids" either have no cords or inaccessible cords. In order to be eligible for this certification, manufacturers must submit their products for third-party testing to determine if they meet the Best for Kids program criteria. (See windowcoverings.org for additional information.)

Electrical

Electrical updates should always be made with curious kids in mind. It's easy to update outlet covers to sliding plug options. With these you never have to worry about replacing the outlet plug again because it closes automatically when not in use.

Larger electrical enhancements can help as well. Streamline the aesthetic of your space while eliminating cords by updating wall lighting. For example, a few sconces might replace reading lights, plus they're high enough to keep out of reach of young kids. Another example: a new dimmable ceiling fan provides safe air circulation with customizable light output.

Smart home upgrades

Technology is a home improvement game-changer that can make spaces more livable and safe. Smart window and door locks can be installed throughout the home. Kids can now securely enter without a key and parents are sent an alert at that time. You can also set alerts for windows left open so you know to close them to reduce fall risks.

Another smart home improvement to consider: motion-activated sensors. These sensors can be placed anywhere you don't want children to be. For example, when your child opens the front door before you wake or he tries to get into the medicine cabinet, you're sent an alert to your phone that makes you immediately aware of the activity.

Furniture and decor

That vintage armor will look perfect in your just-redone space ... until your kids start to pull out the drawers and roughhouse around it. Tip-overs are another Top 5 Hidden Hazard by the CPSC, which notes in the U.S. a child is sent to the emergency room every 30 minutes as a result of falling furniture.

Safety anchors and brackets are widely available online and at retail home improvement stores. They are quick and easy to install and may save a life. Interior paint




