

Cleaning bird feeders and other January gardening tips

Cleaning bird feeders, growing Swedish ivy, and brushing snow from shrubs are some of the gardening activities for this month.

Birds deserve clean food surfaces as much as we do. Every few weeks bring the feeders inside and wash them with soap and water into which a little bleach has been added (one part bleach to nine parts water). Rinse thoroughly. If you have a heated bird bath, keep it scrubbed and cleaned regularly as well. I keep an old brush just for this purpose, whenever I refill the bath.

When tree and shrub branches bend under the weight of a new snowfall, use a broom to gently brush off the snow. Don't try to remove ice or you might break the branch. It's possible to save a branch that partially splits from the main trunk if you tie it in place and use long screws (coming from each direction, if necessary) to secure it. If done right away, the tree may callous over the wound and heal itself next season, and not split further.

If you received a poinsettia or cyclamen as a holiday gift, keep it blooming by providing proper care. Poinsettias need good drainage, so if the pot is still wrapped in foil, make sure there is a hole in the bottom so water drains out. Of course if it's on furniture, place a saucer underneath to protect the finish. Keep poinsettias away from drafts, such as near doors or windows or hot woodstoves. Keep soil moist, but don't overwater. Keep in bright light.

The latter applies, also, to cyclamen, which can last for weeks if kept cool (65 to 68 degrees F in day, less at night). Too high temperatures, too little water or overwatering, or too low light may cause leaves to yellow and drop.

When deicing walks, use one of the granular products with a "chloride" other than sodium component—these are safer on plants. They may cost a bit more, but you often can use less. Calcium chloride works best in the coldest areas (down to about 5 degrees F). If below this temperature, don't use any chemical product but rather sand for traction. Liquid products don't track into buildings as granular ones often do. Apply any material before ice and snow, if possible, for best results.

While snow makes a good protective cover for plants, if you use salt to melt ice on driveways or walks, be careful not to pile snow from these areas on your plants or where melting snow will drain onto them. Otherwise, once snow melts in spring, flush soil thoroughly with water to help dilute or wash away any salt residue.

Other gardening activities for this month include ordering seeds and plants from catalogs, reviewing garden notes from this past year while planning for this coming season, and signing up for a garden tour or spring garden symposium.

Chocolate Chunk Cookies

This cookie is for people who like a little decadence in their afternoon snack.

- 2 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup (2 sticks) butter or margarine, softened
- 1 cup packed brown sugar
- 1/2 cup granulated sugar
- 2 teaspoons vanilla extract
- 2 large eggs
- 8 ounces bittersweet chocolate, cut into 1/2-inch chunks
 - 1 cup walnuts, coarsely chopped
- 1. Heat oven to 375°F. Grease large cookie sheet.
- 2. On waxed paper, combine flour, baking soda and salt.
- 3. In large bowl, with mixer at medium speed, beat butter and sugars until creamy, occasionally scraping bowl with rubber spatula. Beat in vanilla, then eggs, 1 at a time, beating well after each addition. At low speed, gradually add flour mixture; beat just until blended, occasionally scraping bowl. With spoon, stir in chocolate and walnuts.
- 4. Drop cookies by heaping measuring tablespoons, 2 inches apart, onto prepared cookie sheet. Bake cookies 10 to 11 minutes or until lightly browned. Transfer cookies to wire rack to cool. Repeat with remaining dough.

Whatchamacallits



Many different tools were used to open bottles, but none so useful as the corkscrew. This item has survived mostly unchanged for numerous years but modern materials have made them look and feel a bit

different. This week's whatchamacallit is a corkscrew with a little something different added on to it.

The corkscrew itself is made out of casted metal, either steel or iron. The very tip has been sharpened to a point while the other end, coming out of the handle, has an eye-loop, making it easier for hanging and storing.

The handle, made out of a hard wood, also has stiff bristles made from either horse or boar hair. The bristles were a convenient addition to the corkscrew during the time this was made, as it was used to brush away debris from the mouth of the bottle.

It may be peculiar to think that debris needed to be brushed away, but looking back into history reveals the answer. It was customary for wine and spirit bottles to be sealed with a cork and wax, perserving the contents inside the bottle. Although wax is still found on some wine and spirit bottles today, it was standard practice before the 19th century. It was also common for the bottle to sit in one location for a tremendous amount of time for aging, leading to the collection of dust, mold or fungus on the





cork and bottle.

The bristles added to the corkscrew would be stiff enough to remove all these unwanted items from the bottle, keeping the beverage clean.

Due to the brush, wooded

handle and metal corkscrew, it is safe to assume the piece dates to around the 18th century although the lack of any manufacturers mark makes dating the corkscrew more uncertain.

Carbon monoxide: **Know the hazards**

Montgomery County Public Health wants everyone to be warm this winter, but we also want you to be safe while heating your homes during these cold, winter months ahead.

Every year, many people get sick or die due to carbon monoxide poisoning from alternate heating sources. Carbon monoxide (CO) is a poisonous gas that can kill you in minutes. It is invisible, tasteless, odorless and non-irritating. Carbon monoxide is produced from burning fuels such as wood, oil, natural gas, propane, gasoline and kerosene.

Carbon monoxide is known as the "silent killer". It can prevent the body from getting oxygen. Symptoms can be flu-like: nausea. dizziness. headache. shortness of breath, sleepiness and weakness. In large amounts, carbon monoxide can cause loss of consciousness, brain damage or death.

Public Health suggests these safety tips to help prevent carbon monoxide poisoning:

- Make sure fuel-burning appliances are properly installed, operated and serviced by qualified technicians according to the manufacturer's instructions and local building codes.
- Properly vent all fuelburning appliances to the outside of the house and make sure the vents are not covered with snow, tarps or other items.
- Consider buying a vented space heater when replacing an unvented one.
- Never use a portable generator, gas or charcoal grill or portable fuel-

burning camping equipment inside a home, building or shed.

- Open the fireplace damper before lighting a fire and don't close it until the ashes are cool.
- Move your idling car or truck outside the garage to warm up.
- Never use gas appliances, such as stoves, ovens, or clothes dryers, to heat your home.

Working carbon monoxide detector alarms provide you and your family with warning signals and critical time to escape your house in case of a carbon monoxide incident. Place carbon monoxide alarms in a central location outside each sleeping area and on every level of your home. Test all alarms every month to make sure they are working properly.

If you suspect carbon monoxide poisoning:

- Get out of the building and into fresh air.
- Call the fire department from outside the building.
- Call the gas company from outside the build-
- Call 911 if you or someone else is experiencing symptoms, or take the ill person to the emergency room. Tell the physician you suspect carbon monoxide poisoning.

Don't let having a carbon monoxide detector give you all the security you need to be safe. Preventing the problem is better than relying on an alarm.

Five things to know about connected cars

(BPT) — If you could go back in time and tell people that in the near future there would be a handheld device that would allow them to listen to virtually any song, watch virtually any movie or television show and have access to pretty much any book, they would probably think you were crazy.

As it is, we now take all those features of a smartphone for granted. In fact, what once would have been the stuff of science fiction is now commonplace. With technology advancing in leaps and bounds around us, perhaps the one thing that has generated the most buzz involves the marriage of the automobile with the computer: a connected car.

To shed some light — and whet your appetite — for current and future car technology, here are five important things to know about connected cars.

1. Connectivity already exists and is becoming mainstream. 2. Telematic magic. In some ways, this type of communication is like having a team of people on the lookout for any maintenance or security issues you have with your car. All you have to do is enjoy your drive. These help alert drivers to maintenance issues, but connectivity allows for a truly exacting system of diagnosis and prevention. One of the most advanced solutions, known as the integrated vehicle health management (IVHM) from Honeywell Transportation Systems, uses algorithms and computer models derived from data generated by vehicles already in service as well as highly sensitive sensors to monitor an automobile's system, such as tire pressure, fluids, timing, efficiency and overall operations. have been implemented in the aerospace industry and used to protect critical infrastructure such as nuclear power plants and oil refineries, the software uses advanced analytics specifically designed for the automotive industry to detect abnormal behavior in a car's connected network. Operation center will then provide rapid feedback to automakers to help mitigate potential threats.

5. The electrified powertrain. One of the needs that comes with increased connectivity is more electrical power in the vehicle. Automakers are developing new 48-volt architectures to replace existing 12-volt systems. The upgraded system supports electric motors, a sophis-

Six quick tips for bomb cyclone winter driving

When it comes to winter car care, many motorists think of antifreeze and batteries, but vehicles need extra attention in winter, especially when a bomb cyclone hits and temperatures drop.

"Most people never heard of 'bomboge-

nesis' until heavy snow and dangerous cold recently hit many areas of the country, including several states that usually don't experience this type of severe weather," said Rich White, executive director, Car Care Council. "Making sure your vehicle is properly prepared for the elements will help you avoid the aggravation of an unplanned road emergency."

The non-profit Car Care Council offers six quick tips to help your vehicle perform at its best during cold weather months.

- 1. Keep the gas tank at least half full; this decreases the chance of moisture forming in the gas lines and possibly freezing.
- 2. Check the tire pressure, including the spare, as tires can lose pressure when temperatures drop. Consider special tires if snow and ice are a problem in your area.
- 3. Have the exhaust system checked for carbon monoxide leaks, which can be especially dangerous during cold weather driving when windows are closed.
- 4. Allow your car a little more time to warm up when temperatures are below freezing so that the oil in the engine and transmission circulate and get warm.
- 5. Change to low-viscosity oil in winter

as it will flow more easily between moving parts when it is cold. Drivers in subzero temperatures should drop their oil weight from 10-W30 to 5-W30 as thickened oil can make it hard to start the car.

6. Consider using cold weather washer fluid and special winter windshield blades if you live in a place with especially harsh winter conditions.

Drivers should stock an emergency kit with an ice scraper and snowbrush, jumper cables, flashlight, blanket, extra clothes, bottled water, dry food snacks and needed medication. The Car Care Council also recommends a thorough vehicle inspection by a trusted professional service technician as winter magnifies existing problems such as pings, hard starts, sluggish performance or rough idling.

Simple ways to quickly boost credit scores

The road to great credit begins with consumers. Consumers who demonstrate an ability to pay bills on time and stay out of debt can make themselves more attractive to prospective creditors, which can ultimately save them thousands of dollars when they purchase homes and/or vehicles.

While strong credit scores take years to build, men and women looking to improve their scores can begin doing so rather quickly. Scores not skyrocket overnight, but they will begin to improve if consumers begin taking the following steps.

• Pay bills on time. Paying bills on time is one of the most effective and simplest ways for consumers to improve their credit scores. One of the credit scores lenders use to determine if they will extend credit to a given applicant is the FICO® score, which is generated by the Fair Isaac Corporation. According to the Fair Isaac Corp., a FICO score is broken down into five categories, some of which factor more heavily than others. An individual's payment history accounts for 35 percent of his or her FICO score, making it the most influential of the five factors for people who have been using credit for a long time. (Note: People with a nonexistent or greatly limited credit history may have their FICO scores



more influenced by other factors.) If necessary, set up automatic payments so all bills, but especially bills owed to creditors, such as credit card companies and student loan lenders, are paid on time.

• Pay down balances and keep them low. Paying bills on time might not be enough to dramatically improve credit scores if consumers are still only paying the miniamount mum month while maintaining high balances. After pay-

ment history, amount owed is the second biggest influence of most consumers' FICO scores, accounting for 30 percent of an individual's score. So in addition to paying on time, consumers should try to pay more than the minimum amount due each month, ideally paying balances in full each month.

• Study your credit report. Credit scores can sometimes fall victim to errors on a person's credit report. A 2012 Federal Trade Commission Study found that roughly 25 percent of all consumers

had errors on their credit reports that adversely affected their credit scores.

Consumers who suspect their credit score does not reflect their credit worthiness should examine their reports, which are available to all consumers once a year for free, for mistakes. Report any mistakes to Equifax, Experian and/or TransUnion.

• Wait to apply for new lines of credit or mortgages. Consumers' credit scores take a small hit each time they apply for new lines of credit, whether it's a credit card or mortgage. Consumers who want to quickly improve their scores should refrain from applying for new lines of credit until they have increased their scores to a point where they won't mind seeing those scores take a small dip.

Consumers' credit scores can affect their lives in various ways. While it takes time to build strong credit histories, consumers can take small steps to begin improving their scores right away.

Getting Christmas cactus to rebloom

Q. I would like to know, how do you get Christmas cactus to bloom? — O.S., Floyds Knobs, IN

A. A little extra care will help bring your Christmas cactus back to full bloom next year. Although a Christmas cactus can adapt to low light, it will produce more abundant blooms if you know how to manipulate the light they receive.

For now, keep your plants in a sunny, indoor location away from drafts, heat vents, fireplaces, and other sources of hot air. Water them thoroughly when the top half of the soil in the pot feels dry to the touch. You can move Christmas cactus plants outdoors in summer, but keep them in shady or semi-shady locations. Too much direct sunlight can

burn the leaves.

When it's time to bring the plants back inside in the fall, help the plants to slowly adjust to life Indoors by gradually increasing the number of hours they spend indoors each day.

Christmas cactus plants bloom when you give them long, uninterrupted dark periods. Begin the dark treatments about mid-October to have plants in full bloom by the holidays. Christmas cactus plants will also bloom if they are subjected to cool temperatures of about 50 degrees Fahrenheit to 55 degrees Fahrenheit at night. Start these cool treatments by early November to have plants ready for the holidays.





Voices from the past


Today is Jan. 6, 2018, I wondered what Grandma Barshied wrote in some of her diaries for this day. I chose one at random — 1936, when I was six years old. The entry for Jan. 6, 1936 was "cloudy, snow PM, washed, handsome Rev. Kirsch died, 52

eggs." The ministers name came back to me. Not from here but from Berea, Kentucky. About the time I started at Fort Klock in 1954 I became more interested in historic pageants. In that year, as Fort Klock was being rescued from ruin,

we had a flag raising that we called our first Fort Klock Pageant. Pageants were not new to me even in 1954 since I had my interest stirred by the Indian Pageant at Ticonderoga in the late 1940's. You say, "What has that to do with Berea, Ken-

tucky and Reverend Kirsch?" At that period of my life I did not get to travel far. However I heard of several outdoor pageants in the South.

The first one my wife and I saw was the Indian Pageant at Cherokee, South Carolina. Another attended was at Kitty Hawk. The one I now address was at Berea, Kentucky. Berea is a wellknown college town. We arrived early for the outdoor drama about Kentucky being divided against itself in the Civil War. Rather than sitting, waiting for the drama to start I went to the souvenirs stand on the grounds. There were a large selection of brooms and brushes made from broom corn. I approached a middle-aged clerk. My question was, "Is broom corn grown here?" The answer was yes. Then I stated that once much was grown in our section of New York State. The clerk asked where in New York I lived. My answer was, "A small village in the Mohawk Valley I'm




Rev. John A.W. Kirsch from an 1936 Centennial History of St. Johns Lutheran Church in Canajoharie. NY.

sure you never heard of; Canajoharie." He then asked my name. When I said Barshied I got a real surprise.

The clerk said, "I stayed

over night with your grandfather and grandmother and also with your Shineman relatives."





I asked how that was. His reply was, "My name is Kirsch and my father was the minister of St. John's Lutheran Church where all of your relatives belonged." Because of his age, I thought he must be a professor. It was years later that I found out the truth. He was another student who had been in the military in WWI. I never saw Reverend John A.W. Kirsch's son again. Like old minds and stacks of paper things get lost. So did his obituary, the story of the Berea Pageant and the fact that his first wife died in Canajoharie, and his second came from Canajoharie was afterward learned. Their final resting place is within sight of my own cemetery plot in the Canajoharie Falls Cemetery. The Berea Pageant long ago ceased to exist except in an old man's aged mind who remembers a

chance encounter many years ago.

Addendum: The last word on Rev. Kirsch and Family received from Berea College.

The man I met years ago was Frederick W. Kirsch. He was born in Canajoharie in 1896. He enrolled in Berea College at the age of 45 in 1941, graduating in 1946.

His father was Rev. John A.W. Kirsch born in Germany in 1865 and died in Canajoharie in 1936. He served St. Johns Lutheran Church from 1891 to 1896. His wife died at Canajoharie in 1892. Rev. Kirsch's second wife was Canajoharie native Wilhemina Hammersmith who passed away in 1941.

The size and weight of your pet also must be taken into account. Bigger dogs may process toxic foods more easily than small dogs.

So, cheap Halloween candy consumed by a large dog may not have a noticeably negative effect. However, it's still a gamble. Another issue to consider is Xylitol, a sweetener often used in sugarfree candies. That can be a danger to dogs of any size. In short, keep candy and pets separate -peri-
