In **James 3:13** the question is asked, "Who is a wise man with a lot of knowledge among you?" We might paraphrase the second sentence of **verse 13** "don't tell me, show me." (You do know don't you, that what we do speaks so loud that what we say isn't heard?) Wisdom, the result of putting knowledge to work, is demonstrated in our lives, and doesn't need to be talked about to be evident.

Bitterness and anger in us shows to others through our actions and words, even if we say it isn't there (**verse 14**). We may think it gives us wisdom but James describes it in **verse 15** as sinful, based on feelings (which change continually), and "devilish". It only brings about confusion and evil activity **verse 16** says.

Verse 17 continues to say that when we get our knowledge and wisdom from God, (see **James 1:5-8**) it is pure, peaceful, gentle and easy to be asked for, full of mercy and good things, without prejudice and hypocrisy. So, where do you get your wisdom from?



Country PreacherRetail industry helped shape Father's Day

Father's Day arrives the third Sunday in June and presents a special way to show the fathers in one's life how much they are cherished. People shower dads with gifts but may not know just how Father's Day came to be.

The concept of Father's Day was inspired by Mother's Day celebrations and was initiated by a woman named Sonora Smart Dodd, who wanted to do something to honor her single father. The concept of Father's Day was slow to take root. However, the retail industry helped propel Father's Day to a national holiday.

In the early days of Father's Day, Dodd worked with her local YMCA and local churches to adopt what was supposed to be a religiously influenced holiday. But in the early 1900s, dads did not necessarily have the same hands-on role that many fathers have today. Cartoons published in newspapers, such as the Washington Star in 1913, portrayed Dad as the breadwinner and a distant fellow who wasn't as involved as his wife in day-to-day interaction with his children. A 1915 issue of the St. Johns Herald and Apache News from Arizona joked that fathers probably didn't want another holiday and would be more content to drink, smoke and sleep in late. Dodd and others realized that marketing would be key to Father's Day's success.

Clothing manufacturers, people who made tobacco and other merchants of products made for men found Father's Day a way to sell merchandise. It just took a while for them to come around.

A Father's Day Council was started in the 1930s and was propelled by a group called the New York Associated Menswear Retailers. Many people joke that, because neckties are so often given on Father's Day, the necktie industry must've had a hand in endorsing Father's Day. And there is truth to that. The council was responsible for selling shirts, hats and, of course, neckties.

In 1938, the National Council for the Promotion of Father's Day was formed, primarily due to poor menswear retail sales. Dry goods, clothing and tobacco associations help promote Father's Day, and after they held a "Father's Day Sports Day" parade in 1941, Father's Day sales increased, and the holiday became more popular.

Montgomery County Public Health wants to raise awareness about healthy swimming behaviors, including ways to prevent Recreational Water Illnesses (RWIs). RWIs are illnesses spread by swallowing or having contact with contaminated water in swimming pools, water parks, spas, interactive fountains, lakes, rivers, streams or oceans. Illnesses at aquatic facilities can occur in or out of the water.

Recreational Water Illnesses (RWIs)

The best way to prevent RWIs is to keep germs out of the pool in the first place. Everyone can help create healthy swimming experiences this summer by following these six healthy swimming steps:

- PLEASE don't swim when you have diarrhea
- PLEASE don't swallow pool water
- PLEASE practice good hygiene. Shower with soap before swimming and wash your hands after using the toilet or changing diapers

 PLEASE take your kids on bathroom breaks or check diapers often

• PLEASE change diapers in a bathroom or a diaper-changing area and not at poolside • PLEASE wash your children thoroughly with soap and water before they go swimming

The water at the beach, river or stream looks clean, but is it? You cannot be sure since the water can contain disease-causing microorganisms that you cannot see but can be harmful to you. Different things, such as trash, sewage, or animal waste, can pollute water. Swimming and swallowing unsafe water may result in minor illnesses such as sore throats or diarrhea, or can result in more serious illnesses. Pollution of water is common immediately after rainstorms or long periods of rainy weather where bodies of water become overflowing and can contaminate each other.

- Avoid swimming after a heavy rain
- Look for signs of pollution such as murky color or evidence of floating trash and do not swim if there is evidence of this
- Avoid getting the water you are swimming in close to or in your mouth
- Avoid eating anything that may have come in contact with the water, or water and sand toys
- Microorganisms can also lurk on lounge chairs, pic-

nic tables and walkways that have become contaminated with the polluted water. Therefore wash your hands with soap and water before eating if you have touched any of these

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Whatchamacallits



The next item in our food preservation series the Millville Atmospheric Fruit Jar.

The Millville jar was produced by

the Whitall-Tatum & Co. of Millville, NJ around the 1860's. What made this jar different is the closing system, which utilized a glass lid and cast iron clamp, com-



plete with rubber gasket. The style of clamp varied, either curved or straight, such as the one pictured.

Authentic Millville jars

are embossed on the lid and the jar itself. The lid reads "Whitall's Patent June 18th, 1861" around the center, where the thumbscrew would be tightened to secure the lid to the jar.


This style of jar was a popular alternative to screw-top jars as the preserved food would not come in contact with metal.

The jar pictured has a large, half circle indentation in the side, distorting the embossed label. This is a production error, in which a foreign object was in the mold when the hot glass was poured. These errors were not uncommon and they rarely prevented the item from entering

The company was one of the first glass factories in America, operat-

the market.

ing from 1806 to 1938. They produced a variety of glass jars, bottles and vials and the products are highly prized by antique bottle collectors. An authentic Mill-ville jar, much like this Whatchamacallit, can be sold for thousands of dollars if in good condition, so forgeries are very common.

If retirement is just around the corner, you have decisions to make, and the biggest is whether you'll stay in your home. With no job to keep you tied to your current location, will you move to another state to be near children and grandchildren? Will you move to a warmer climate, or a city or state that's cheaper?

If you've decided to stay right where you are, there are steps you should take now to make sure your home can meet your needs as the years go by. It's called "aging in place" and it requires advance planning.

Determine what help you can get, both now and as time goes on. What senior services are available if you need remodeling done on your home? For example, if you want to build a first-floor master bedroom and bath so you can avoid climbing the stairs in years to come, what kind of financial help can you get? Are there groups

that will build a ramp to your door should you ever need one?

For the exterior of your home, consider making some modifications now. Better lighting and sturdy steps will go a long way to keeping you safe. If carpeting is a potential hazard, consider installing hardwood flooring. Is the kitchen small and cramped? Can it be remodeled?

Go online to National Aging in Place Council (www.ageinplace.org) and put in your ZIP code to see what services are nearby. Download its Act III questionnaire, a 24page document that will get you thinking about your potential future needs. Look at Aging in Place (www.aginginplace.org) and click on Resources and Home Remodeling. Scroll down for lots of ideas. Ask management at the senior center for local recommendations, or suggest it hold a seminar on aging in place. You won't be the only one with lots of questions.



HOUSE HUNTING? USE THIS HANDY CHECKLIST BEFORE YOU MAKE THE OFFER

(BPT) — House hunting can feel like an adventurous new chapter in your life. If you're lucky enough to find the property that checks off all the "must have" boxes — appearance, size, price, location — it's easy to fall in love.

Not so fast. Before making an offer on any property, it's smart to take a deeper look at the

overall structure and its systems, just to make sure warning signs of major and costly problems are not hiding in plain sight. If the house holds more issues than your budget (and drive to renovate) can handle, it might be best to walk away.

Of course, once the offer is accepted, it's always a smart idea to hire a third-party home inspector to take an in-depth look at the property. In the meantime, one last pass-through with this checklist in hand can give you peace of mind about taking the next step.

Exterior: Walk around all four sides of the house, scanning it from ground to rooftop. Note the condition of the doors and window frames, and look for cracked or peeling paint or signs of loose siding. Higher up, eye the chimney, making sure it appears straight and is in good condition, while the gutters and drainpipes should be in place and functional.


Roof: Ideally, the roof would be 10 years old or less, so scan the roof for the classic warning signs of aging and neglect. Things like curled and missing shingles, dark stains, moss growth and signs of sagging can signal serious issues. (A home inspector can confirm if full replacement is needed, or if a few simple repairs would stabilize things for another decade or so.)

Yard: Take note of the landscaping. Is there a slope angled away from the house, or is there a potential for a flooded basement after a major rainfall? Mature trees provide lots of shade, but watch for overhanging branches, as these can break off in a storm and do major damage to the roof. Finally, take note of the condition of the driveway and sidewalks.

Foundation: The sight of a few hairline cracks in the cement is no cause for panic. Do look for telltale signs of serious issues, such as widening cracks, water stains and bulges. It doesn't hurt to bring a level to make sure the walls are straight.

Plumbing: In addition to checking basement and under-sink pipes for signs of leaks, scan the

ceilings for water stains. Open all the faucets to check the water pressure as well as the time it takes for hot water to reach the tap.

HVAC system: Know the age of the heating and cooling systems, and check these for tags and other signs of routine maintenance. If the system is older than a decade, that can spell costly repairs and a replacement in a brief time frame. When it comes to older systems, energy efficiency is another

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Six things to know about pitching a tent

Camping provides the perfect opportunity to get in touch with nature and disconnect from the daily grind. Camping is a timeless tradition forged by cooking over portable stoves, foregoing indoor plumbing and sleeping under the stars.

A 2015 survey from Kampgrounds of America (KOA) said camping attracts people looking for an opportunity to explore the many wonders of the environment. The great outdoors affords people an opportunity to recharge in the peace and quiet of natural surroundings.

Results from the 2017 North American Camping Report found an increasing number of people say they plan to camp more, and camping is helping to add more balance to a person's life. Currently, 75 million households in the United States include active campers. Households in western Canada are likely to go camping, and data from Statistics Canada points out that camping rates increase with income.

Although there are many ways to camp, tents are often key components of camping trips. Learning to pitch a tent correctly is an important part of successful camping. Here's how to become a tent-pitching pro.

1. Purchase a freestanding tent. While there are many variations to tent designs and ultralight backpackers may prefer a tarp or another non-freestanding device, tents that are able to stand on their own are easier to set up. Many tent designs have two poles and fabric that creates a dome shape and are relatively easy and straightforward to set up

in just a few minutes.

- 2. Practice at home. Before arriving at the campsite, learn to recognize the parts and instructions for your particular tent. Make sure all equipment is present and in working order.
- 3. Buy a footprint. Many tent floors are sturdy, but campers can always use a little extra protection against the ground. Footprints are essentially a tarp that fits underneath the floor of the tent as an extra layer of protection, advises REI. They should be slightly smaller than the area of the tent.
- 4. Scope out the tent location. Avoid sites littered with sticks, stones, roots, or branches. Stay away from low-lying areas that may get soggy in rain storms. Look for natural windbreaks, and place the tent so the side that has the strongest pole structure is facing the wind.
- 5. Make it a team effort. Enlist a helper or two to set up the tent. Ensure all zippers are closed when erecting the tent. Try to push poles through openings instead of pulling on them. Allow for some wiggle room when extending the poles. Guylines should follow the seams of the tent where possible, and lines should be pegged down back to front. Guylines help keep tents sturdy and also keep a rainfly away from the tent body to minimize leakage, according to the Appalachian Mountain Club.
- 6. Use daylight to your advantage. Set up the tent while it is light outside, and outfit it with anything that will be needed in the middle of the night, such as a lantern and other gear.

Fort Klock Opening Weekend: Success despite wet weather

ST. JOHNSVILLE, NY — Undeterred by the rain and chilly weather, hundreds of reenactors and visitors came out to enjoy and take part in the annual Opening Day celebration at Fort Klock located along Route 5 just outside of St. Johnsville. This fortified farm homestead built c. 1750 has long been a hotspot for reenactors and living history enthusiasts to gather and learn more about life

in early America. This year's festivities included a schoolhouse demonstration, blacksmithing competition, colonial baking and open-hearth cooking, coopering, brewing, candle making, weaving, 18th century kids games, a presentation by a colonial themed surgeon, an outpost of 1st NY Regiment, Mc-Cracken's Company 1777, and many other reenactors and trades. When the rain had almost cleared, cannon fire could be heard as an artillery crew drilled and gave the crowd an amazing display of a period correct cannon.

The blacksmith shop drew a crowd as a "Forged in Fire" type competition pitted competitors against one another in a timed challenge to make a ladle in 90 minutes. Prizes for the competition included t-shirts and gift certificates for classes at the Adirondack Folk School. Competitions also included "drawing out" a piece of iron with one heating as well as a competition for s-hooks. Even as the rain picked up people just kept coming in.

Some visitors come every year to get immersed in mid 18th century life while others have been in the area for years and have always wanted to see a reenactment at the Fort. Luckily Fort Klock has multiple buildings in which people

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
