Montgomery County SPCA awarded state matching grant for new shelter

Montgomery County SPCA (MCSPCA) announced on Jan. 28 that it has received \$500,000 from the State's Companion Animal Capital Fund. The MCSPCA will use the funds to build a new animal shelter. The MCSPCA is one of 13 organizations to receive grants during this funding round.

"This grant, no doubt, will allow us to move forward with the building. The construction should start August 2019. The cost for the new animal shelter is \$3.2 million. The MCSPCA building fund is at \$510,000 that has been raised in prior years through fundraising and donations," said Jan Zumbolo, president, MCSPCA. Special thanks to Gov. Cuomo, Assemblyman Santabarbara, Sen. Amedore and the Department of Agriculture and Markets for their part. Zumbolo noted

fundraising efforts for the new shelter will continue.

The new animal shelter will provide for more comfort for the shelter animals. The new building will make it possible to help more animals and pet owners in the community. The addition of a surgical unit will allow for the shelter animals to have medical care on site. Low cost spay/neuter clinics will be offered.

The MCSPCA is rolling out their capital campaign to raise the funds to build the new animal shelter this year. Visit www.mcspca.org for updates.

The \$5 million Companion Animal Capital Fund is an initiative proposed by the New York State Animal Protection Federation, the advocacy voice of New York's animal shelters. The funding the MCSPCA received was allocated in the 2018-19 state budget and

is part of the second round of the program's funding. The fund is administered and overseen by the New York State Department of Agriculture and Markets. It was championed by New York State Assemblywoman Deborah Glick (D-NYC) and State Sen. Phil Boyle (R-Suffolk County).

"The Companion Animal Capital Fund is the first state-funded program of its kind in the nation," said Libby Post, executive director of the federation. "Our goal is to create a permanent funding stream to assist shelters across New York improve their existing buildings or build new ones so that the quality of life for the dogs and cats in their care will be greatly improved. Better facilities equal more community support and more adoptions with their capital improvements. We see

this funding as essential to moving the state's animal shelters forward."

The federation, which has over 50 members across the state, estimates that more than 150,000 animals are brought to shelters throughout New York.

The fund provides matching grants to municipal shelters and local shelters with municipal contract to offset the costs associated with capital projects such as renovating dog kennels, improving medical facilities or building more efficient shelters to reduce overall operational costs. Funds are also being used to construct, renovate, rehab or acquire buildings or equipment needed to house, treat, and care for sheltered dogs and cats. All grantees must have matching funds accessible when the grant is submitted.

The day is a great way to remind Americans to focus on their hearts. County employees had the opportunity to wear jeans to work on that day and make a \$5 donation towards the local Heart Association.

Good Housekeeping

Meal-in-a-Bowl Minestrone

The ideal antidote to a dreary day, this protein-packed soup is as tasty as it is nutritious, with broccoli, carrots, zucchini, green beans, tomatoes, cannellini beans and macaroni simmered in light chicken broth.

2 tablespoons olive oil
 1 1/2 cup chopped onion
 1 tablespoon minced garlic
 4 cup water
 1/4 cup water

1 can reduced-sodium fat-free chicken broth (1 3/4 cups)

1 cup small whole-wheat pasta (such as elbow macaroni)

1 medium carrot, cut in 4 pieces lengthwise and diced

1 can no-salt-added cannellini beans

8 ounces broccoli rabe, cut bite-size

1 medium zucchini, cut in half lengthwise and diced

4 ounces green beans
 1 cup packed parsley

leaves

2 tablespoons grated Parmesan

1 pound plum (Roma) tomatoes

1. Heat 1 teaspoon oil in a heavy 5- to 6-quart pot or Dutch oven over medium-high heat. Stir in onion; cover and cook 5 minutes or until golden, stirring occasionally. Add 2 teaspoons garlic; cook 30 seconds until fragrant.

2. Add 4 cups water and the broth; bring to a boil. Add pasta and carrot; boil 5 minutes. Reserve 3/4 cup of the cannellini beans; stir rest into pot along with broccoli rabe, zucchini and green beans. Return to a boil and boil 5 minutes or until pasta and vegetables are tender.

3. Meanwhile puree remaining beans, 5 teaspoons oil, 1 teaspoons garlic, 1/4 cup water, parsley and the cheese in

a food processor or blender.

4. Remove from heat; stir tomatoes into soup. Stir in the parsley mixture or serve it alongside. Serves 4.

Tip: Broccoli rabe stems cook tender, meaning that unlike collards and kale, you don't need to pull the leaves off the stems. Cut off (and discard) the stems just below the string or wire tie binding them. Remove the tie, and hold on to the bunch as long as you can while you slice the stalks and leaves. Wash well before cooking. A bunch of broccoli rabe usually weighs around 1 pound.

Whatchamacallits

It's time for another whatchamacallit history lesson. First, let's look at the hearth. A hearth is a brick- or stone-lined fireplace (with or without an oven) which, in the past, was used for heating and originally was also used for cooking food. For centuries, the hearth was such an integral part of a home, usually its central and most important feature, that the concept has been generalized to refer to the home itself or a household (like in the terms "hearth and home" and "keep the home fires burning").

Cooking over open fires wasn't the only way to

make food for our ancestors – although the earliest ovens found in Central Europe date back to 29,000 BCE. Culinary historians believe the ancient Greeks were the ones to make major advances in baking, especially bread. Front-loaded bread ovens were developed there, and soon afterward baking developed as a trade and profession.

After medieval times, hearths were moved from the centers of halls to the side of a room and provided with a chimney. In fireplace design, the hearth is the part of the



fireplace where the fire burns, usually consisting of masonry at floor level or higher, underneath the fireplace mantel.

During the Middle Ages, instead of earth and ceramic ovens, Europeans used fireplaces in conjunction with large cauldrons. As we progressed, ovens underwent many changes, from wood to iron to coal to gas and even electric. Each design had its own motivation and purpose.

The wood-burning stoves saw improvement through the addition of fire chambers that allowed better containment

and release of smoke. The cast-iron stove was first used around the early 1700s, when they themselves underwent several variations.

All this information should help you figure out what this whatchamacallit is. This cast-iron utensil was used for removing pans from hearths or ovens in which baked goods were being made – most likely, something like a pie. The horseshoe-shaped piece toward the end is movable, and so it could be pressed up against the pan to ensure it didn't slip when it was being removed from the oven.

1 1/2 cups mini chocolate chips

1/2 cup cocoa nibs, optional

Topping:

About 5 1/2 dozen Belcolade bittersweet disks, or

other high-quality chocolate wafer

Marshmallow fluff, cocoa nibs, or chopped nuts, for garnish

Preheat the oven to 375°F. Lightly grease two baking sheets, or line with parchment.

To make the cookies: Combine the butter, hot chocolate mix, brown sugar, baking powder, salt, and espresso powder in a mixing bowl. Beat until the mixture is smooth. Add the egg and vanilla, and beat until thoroughly combined.


Weigh out your flour. Or measure it by gently spooning it into a cup, then sweeping off any excess. Add the flour to the cookie mixture, stirring to combine. Mix in the chips and cocoa nibs.

Drop the dough by teaspoonfuls onto the prepared baking sheets — a teaspoon cookie scoop works well here. Space the cookies at least two inches apart. Bake the cookies for 8 to 9 minutes, until the surface is set, but the cookies aren't quite fully baked.

Take the cookies out of the oven and press a chocolate disk into the center of each cookie. Return the cookies to the oven for 1 to 2 minutes longer, until the chocolate begins to turn shiny and softens. Remove the cookies from the oven once again, and sprinkle the melted chocolate disk with your garnish of choice.

Allow the cookies to cool right on the baking sheet until the chocolate disks are set. Store well-wrapped cookies at room temperature for a week or so; freeze for longer storage.

1. Sauce: Mix ingredients in a small bowl. (You can do this first, or while fish is cooking.)

2. Burgers: Put bell pepper, cilantro, ginger, garlic, curry paste, lime zest and sugar in a food processor and pulse until blended. Add fish and pulse until just blended.

3. Shape level 1/4-cupfuls fish mixture into twelve 3-inch patties. (At this point, the fish burgers may be loosely covered and refrigerated for up to 4 hours.)

4. Heat oil in large non-stick skillet over medium-high heat. Add half the fish burgers and cook about 1 minute on each side, until just cooked through. Drain on paper towels. Cook remaining fish burgers. Serve with sauce. Serves 4.

Tip: You can find red

curry paste in the Asian foods or spice section of your market. Occasionally it contains shrimp paste, so be sure to check ingredients if you have a shellfish allergy. Refrigerate jar after opening.

On a nonworkday, you could make several meals in advance and then store them in your freezer to defrost at a later date. On a day when you don't have the time or energy to make a full meal, you'll have access to quick, easy, nutritious, home-made meal options.

Freezing meals in advance can be helpful anytime you need a ready-to-go meal or when you take a meal to someone in need, said Shannon Carter, an Ohio State University Extension educator with The Ohio State University College of Food, Agricultural, and Environmental Sciences.

"Freezer meals can save you time by prepping all the ingredients ahead of time, and then only taking minutes to put in the oven or slow cooker after they are thawed," she said. "Freezer meals can also save you money because you can purchase ingredients when they are on sale to enjoy them later."

One way to get started is to plan both the amount and the kinds of meals you want to make in advance and freeze, Carter said in a recent blog post.

"Once you have an idea of what you want to prepare, you can make the entire meal and freeze it, precook a portion of the recipe to freeze, or assemble ingredients to freeze and cook later," she said.

Here are some other tips from Carter:

- Use the U.S. Department of Agriculture's MyPlate as a guide for your menu. Plan a variety of low-fat proteins and dairy along with plenty of vegetables, fruits, and whole grains.

- Consider avoiding ingredients that don't freeze well, such as mayonnaise and lettuce.

- Gather ahead of time

all the ingredients and containers for freezing. Freezer bags or cartons work well. Label the bags or containers with a permanent marker before filling. Label with the name of the recipe, date, and instructions for cooking.

- Lay freezer bags flat in the freezer so they are easier to thaw. Consider placing the freezer bags on a pan or baking sheet until frozen and then stacking them in the freezer, or stand the bags vertically once frozen.

- Foods kept at zero degrees Fahrenheit are safe indefinitely, although quality might deteriorate after 3-6 months.

- The safest way to thaw frozen foods is in the refrigerator. A gallon-sized bag of food will usually thaw in the refrigerator in about 24 hours.

- You can also defrost frozen foods in the microwave and then cook them immediately.

- When using a slow cooker, completely thaw the food before placing it into the slow cooker. This ensures that the food does not enter the "danger zone," a range of temperatures between 40 and 140 degrees Fahrenheit at which bacteria grows most rapidly.

Now Here's a Tip



Shoveling tips

Winter is upon us, and with winter comes winter activities. Shoveling snow is one major winter activity in many parts of the United States. Although many consider shoveling a form of exercise – 15 minutes counts as moderate physical activity – you can increase your risk of an injury. Taking a few precautions while you are shoveling can help prevent unnecessary pain and suffering.

• If you have a history of heart problems or are inactive, talk to your doctor. There is an increase in the number of fatal heart attacks among shovelers.

• Warm up and stretch before you get started.
• Drink plenty of water to keep yourself hydrated.
• Shovel only fresh snow. Freshly fallen, powdery snow is easier to shovel than the wet, packed-down variety.

• Push, don't lift. It's easier on your back and uses less energy than lifting.

• Pick the right shovel for you. Don't pick up too much at once. Use a small shovel, or fill only one-fourth or one-half of a large one.

• Lift with your legs bent, not your back. Keep your back straight. By bending and "sitting" into the movement, you'll keep your spine upright and less stressed. Your shoulders, torso and thighs can do the work for you.

• Dress the part. Dress in layers; if you work up a sweat, you'll be able to remove some of those layers. Wear a hat and gloves to protect your extremities, wrap on a scarf and wear wool socks and waterproof boots to protect your body from the cold temperature.

• If your body is telling you to stop, listen to it. Stop if you feel pain or start seeing heart attack warning signs: chest pain; shoulder, neck or arm pain; dizziness, fainting, sweating or nausea; and/or shortness of breath. Get medical help immediately.

Properly pack a car emergency kit

After home and work, the next most common place people spend their time is in their vehicles. The AAA Foundation for Traffic Safety says the average American spends 17,600 minutes driving each year.

Because they spend so much time behind the wheel, drivers need to be prepared for breakdowns. Packing an emergency kit in the car can help people make the best of such situations.

A car emergency kit can help drivers get back on the road promptly. Without such kits, drivers may be stranded for hours after a breakdown. Emergency kits also come in handy during weather-related events that can sideline cars until roads become passable. Getting caught in a vehicle during a snowstorm and failing to have the proper gear can be a life-threatening scenario under extreme conditions.

It is always wise to plan for the worst and hope for the best. The Department of Motor Vehicles and the Department of Homeland Security note that these key items should always be included in a car emergency kit.

• durable bags or crates to store supplies
• complete first aid kit

• small fire extinguisher
• jumper cables
• rain ponchos
• plastic tarp
• flashlights and extra batteries

• bottled water
• small cache of nonperishable foods

• wrench and pliers
• local maps
• rags
• duct tape
• multipurpose tool
• ice scraper
• automotive fluids
• blankets/warm clothing

• cat litter for slick roads
• tire-changing equipment

• spare tire
• road flares or caution reflectors

• empty, refillable gas canister
• cash for gas
• phone charger cable

Being prepared can make a difference when vehicles are sidelined. In addition to an emergency kit, cars and trucks should be regularly maintained to prevent breakdowns. This includes ensuring all fluids are at proper levels, filters are changed, batteries are in good working order, and tires are inflated correctly. Cold, painful fingers can mean a serious disease

(NAPSI) — “Zombie Hands.” That’s what can happen to an estimated 5 to 10 percent of the population when temperatures start to fall.

In a typical case of Raynaud’s phenomenon, also known as Raynaud’s disease or syndrome, sufferers experience numbness and pain in their fingers, toes and other extremities. Fingers turn white, blue or red as the small blood vessels go into spasm within minutes of exposure to cold or stress, and they appear to be “dead” as blood flow is constricted.

Named for the French physician Maurice Raynaud, who first recognized the condition in 1862, it causes an interruption of blood flow to the fingers, toes, nose or ears. There may be associated tingling, swelling or painful throbbing. The attacks may last from minutes to hours. In severe cases, the area may develop ulcerations and infections, which can lead to gangrene.

Raynaud’s can occur as a “primary” disease – that is, with no associated disorder – or as a “secondary” condition related to other diseases, such as scleroderma, lupus and rheumatoid arthritis.

“Ninety percent of Raynaud’s sufferers don’t seek treatment and too many physicians pay short shrift to those who do,” said Lynn Wunderman, founder and chair of the Raynaud’s Association. “Treatment is important because some

sufferers may have an underlying condition such as systemic scleroderma or lupus. Awareness of such a problem may allow for earlier medical intervention.” Simple blood tests can rule out the presence of antibodies associated with diseases that have Raynaud’s as a component.

What’s being done

To help, the Raynaud’s Association, a 501(c)(3) nonprofit health organization, launched a new and assertive campaign, “Don’t Turn a Cold Shoulder to Painful Fingers,” to urge those with the disorder – and their doctors – not to dismiss the pain that Raynaud’s sufferers endure, or the lifestyle adjustments they make to minimize exposure to cold or stress.

Although there is no known cure as yet, treatment options such as calcium channel blocker drugs have been clinically proven to alleviate symptoms by opening up the blood vessels so blood circulates more freely.


