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What is the Last Supper?

Many important events took place during what's now known as Holy Week, which commemorates the final days of the earthly life of Jesus Christ.

The Last Supper was one of most important events to take place during the final week of Christ's life. Contradictions within the Gospels make it hard to say with absolute certainty when the Last Supper took place, but according to Catholic Online, Evangelists and critics generally agree that the Last Supper was held on a Thursday that was very likely the evening of preparation for Jewish celebration of Passover.

The Last Supper is depicted in the Gospels as the final meal Jesus shared with his 12 apostles before he was crucified. Christians believe that, during the meal, Jesus predicted that his disciple Peter would deny knowing him three times before the following morning, while also predicting that another disciple present at the meal would ultimately betray him.

Many Christians also believe the Last Supper marked the institution of what is now the sacrament of the Eucharist. The Gospels of Mark, Matthew and Luke include accounts of the sharing of the bread and wine, though each account differs slightly. While the Gospel of John, which differs in various ways from those of Mark, Matthew and Luke, does not describe the bread and wine ritual, the Bread of Life Discourse (John 6:22-59) has been interpreted as Eucharistic.

Moments in Time The History Channel

- On April 23, 1014, Brian Boru, the high king of Ireland, is assassinated by retreating Norsemen shortly after his Irish forces defeated them. A small group of fleeing Norsemen stumbled on Brian's tent, overcame his bodyguards and murdered the elderly king.
- On April 25, 1719, Daniel Defoe's "The Life and Strange Adventures of Robinson Crusoe," a fictional work about a shipwrecked sailor who spends 28 years on a deserted island, is published. It's based on the experiences of Alexander Selkirk, a Scottish sailor who spent four years on a small island off South America.
- On April 26, 1865, John Wilkes Booth is killed when Union soldiers track him to a Virginia farm 12 days after he assassinated President Abraham Lincoln. Killing Lincoln was part of a conspiracy to simultaneously kill the vice president and secretary of state, neither of which happened.
- On April 22, 1915, German forces shock Allied soldiers along the Western Front by firing more than 150 tons of lethal chlorine. The Germans were perhaps as shocked as the Allies by the devastating effects of the poison gas.
- On April 27, 1956, world heavyweight champion Rocky Marciano retires from boxing at age 31. He ended his career as the only heavyweight champ with a

perfect record, 49-0. Marciano had started boxing in the Army to get out of kitchen duty.

- On April 28, 1969, following the defeat of his proposals for constitutional reform, Charles de Gaulle resigns as president of France. He had first resigned in 1946, but was called back in 1958 when the Algerian War sent nearly a million Algerians into France.
- On April 24, 1996, the Pittsburgh Penguins beat the Washington Capitals, 3-2, in 139 minutes of game play, making it the fifth-longest match in NHL history. Playoff games aren't allowed to end in a tie.

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Here's a quick overview of tax reform changes and where taxpayers can find more info

Major tax law changes affect every taxpayer filing a 2018 tax return this year. To help taxpayers understand these changes, the IRS created several resources that are available on IRS.gov.

Here's a quick overview changes on of kev IRS.gov:

Tax rates lowered. Starting in 2018, tax rates are lower for most income brackets. The seven rates range from 10 percent to 37 percent.

Standard deduction nearly doubled. For 2018, the basic standard deduction is \$12,000 for singles, \$18,000 for heads of household and \$24,000 for married couples filing a joint tax return. Higher amounts apply to people who are blind or at least age 65. Along with other changes, this means that more

than half of those who itemized their deductions in tax year 2017 may instead take the higher standard deduction on their 2018 tax return.

Various deductions limited or discontinued. New limits apply to mortgage interest. Additionally, taxpayers can no longer deduct miscellaneous itemized deductions for job-related costs and certain other expenses. The law also limits the state and local tax deduction to \$10,000, \$5,000 if married and filing a separate tax return.

Child Tax Credit doubled, and more people qualify. The maximum credit is now \$2,000 for each qualifying child under age 17. The income limit for getting the full credit increased \$400,000 for joint filers and \$200,000 for other taxpavers.

New credit for other dependents. Taxpayers can claim a \$500 credit for each dependent who doesn't qualify for the Child Tax Credit. This includes older children and



WHY "NO" TO THE TOWN OF PALATINE "HUT"

A response to Supervisor William MacLauchlin's manifesto as published in the Country Editor on March 23, 2019 to convert the former Pizza Hut building in Palatine Bridge to town offices.

It is not surprising that Supervisor MacLauchlin would think nothing was accomplished in the previous discussions about the future of the Town Hall. He was not involved in the discussions, he did not come to meetings, he published nothing, and therefore learned "nothing".

In fact there was a trove of information and procedure that came out of those "discussions" if you were willing to learn including:

- 1.) There are rules and regulations pertaining to these activities
- 2.) There are multiple sources for guidance to walk you through these processes
- **3.)** The rules and regulations have to be followed, and in the right order, or you face disqualification
- **4.)** If a proposed project does not have a good, worthwhile foundation, it probably will not survive
- **5.)** Following the rules helps to distinguish the weak spots in the plan before money is spent.
- **6.)** If you do not know the history and where the fault lines are, you may well end up repeating mistakes of the past.
- 7.) Lastly, specifically for this discussion, despite all the calls for the inadequacy of the current town hall, the work still gets done and for the most part in a timely manner. Maybe there is a place for praise for that instead of all the energy going into, "They will do a better job if we put them in a new bulding"

Subtopics: Kamin et al

- **a.)** If right of way is so easily done, why not someone before?
- **b.)** At one point the land and building were two separate parcels. Has that been resolved?
- c.) Why is it an advantage to Kamin to not have a viable business in that spot?
- **d.)** There is a repeated advancement that converting the Hut to a government building is an advantage to local businesses. Town government, with limited hours is not going to generate a significant increase in traffic.
- **e.)** Eminent domain can only be used if there is no other way to accomplish a goal.

Subtopics cont.: The Sheriff

- **a.)** Yep, there's a new sheriff in town. He is new enough that we really do not know his true goals other than it is a pretty good bet that he will want to expand his bureaucracy.
- **b.)** Sheriff station? I thought there was one in Nelliston. How did that work out?
- c.) Increase the road patrols? Do we really need more tickets written to "increase revenue"
- d.) Local police, troopers and sheriff backup seem sufficient for a rural community.
- e.) Herkimer County has no road patrol.
- **f.)** No deputy in Palatine, his direction will still come from Fultonville and he will be in his car.

Subtopics cont.: Building Renovations

- **a.)** What are the design costs and the actual renovation to turn a restaurant in to an office building? Mold abatement costs?
- **b.)** Who gets an office in the new digs? Everybody? Clerk and assessor, yep, and the code officer, the dog catcher, the historical person, and oh yeah certainly the supervisor...did I miss anybody?
- c.) Since the court location does not change, how does that make it more efficient?
- **d.)** A simple reconfiguration of the current building would give a larger court room than is being proposed in this manifesto.

Subtopics cont.: The County Treasurer and local governing

- **a.)** The treasurer's job is to get these kinds of tax delinquent properties back on the tax rolls. What is his incentive to transfer the Hut to Palatine?
- **b.)** Any decision he makes has to be approved by the legislature. Yes, they all want to get this property off their proverbial backs, but how does the treasurer get to call what properties he pulls out of the tax sale for other purposes?
- c.) If you do not want this to happen, contact your local legislator. Don't know who this is? Not surprising! With the change to a legislative government, we do not see the people that go to Fonda at local meetings very much. Many do not know local issues.
- **d.)** The comment that this proposal may generate additional revenue. Folks, the only source of revenue for government is taxes and fees, and they only come from us.
- **e.)** In Palatine, only the minority council members of Chris and Hank are the ones interested in saving money. As a result of a complete lack of understanding as to what the previous council had left in the form of a budget for 2018, the Supervisor and his minions in the majority voted to raise taxes over 60% for 2019. Just think what they will do when they have two buildings and up to 300% more expenses to heat, cool, and take care of.
- **f.)** Please, also do not lose track of our county executive that is hell bent on consolidation. How does this fit into his goals?

Subtopics cont.: A suggestion

Being critical without offering an alternative solution does not necessarily move us forward.

A simple reconfiguration of the present town hall to accomodate all issues.

- a.) The Town Clerk would remain in her current office.
- **b.)** The Tax Assesor would move into the current court room area.
- c.) The court room would move into the general assembly room area.
- d.) The judge's bench would be located at the south end of the assembly room..
- **e.)** The former assessor's office now becomes the judge's chambers, with at least two egresses for his safety..
- **f.)** Remove former supervisor office patitions.
- **g.)** Set up a row of work stations on the north wall with phone, internet, and files for the code officer, dog catcher, and supervisor.
- h.) Guesstimated cost: \$10,000 ??

Conclusions:

- **A.**) The level of part-time services provided by the town hall tenants does not rise to the level of needing a new or larger facility.
- **B.**) Converting the current town hall building to a court and sheriff facility, puts all the operational expense of that building squarely on the court, pushing that balance sheet closer to, if not into, negative numbers.
- **C.**) It may be time to consider eliminating the justice court rather than trying to enhance it.
- D.) In fact, this proposal may not be about new offices at all, but rather a blatant attempt to grow the court with more sheriffs, more tickets and "additional revenue."
- **E.)** Lastly, be suspicious of a town supervisor that does not know New York State Town Law, apparently ignores the recommendations of the 2017 State audit, and unilaterally pushes his own agenda, with little or no public comment, that if enacted, the Town will have to live with for the next 30 to 40 years.



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Explore the true meaning of Easter

Bunnies and baskets, chocolates and candies. It's that time of year when parents scramble to ensure their children wake up to a trove of treats, and families decide on who is serving the lamb dinner this year.

These are some of the familiar Easter traditions, but much more is involved with the holiday than egg hunts and brightly adorned bonnets. For the religious, it can be important to delve into the true meanings behind Easter and let those discoveries help shape celebrations.


Easter, above all, is a religious commemoration of the resurrection of Jesus Christ. It is the culmination of the holy period known as Lent, and it the most significant date on the Christian liturgical calendar.

Jesus Christ was the Son of God, who fulfilled the prophesies that he would give his own life for his people so they could enjoy eternal life after their own mortal bodies perished. Easter, from Jesus' very own words, marked a new covenant for the faithful.

According to scripture, Jesus was enjoying the Passover dinner when he sat down with his disciples. Understanding that this would be his last earthly meal and that someone close to him would betray him, he took bread and gave thanks to God for it. He broke the bread and said it was his body that should be given up so sins would be forgiven. He did a similar gesture with wine, indicating that it was his blood that should be shed as a sacrifice for all. Christ instructed the disciples to do the same ritual in the future in memory of him.

Jesus was subsequently betrayed and turned over to the authorities. He was sentenced to crucifixion and perished on the cross. His body was cleansed and placed in a tomb sealed by a stone. His followers were unaware of the miracle that would ensue in the days to come. On Easter Sunday, the tomb was discovered open and empty. Jesus had risen from the dead, providing irrefutable proof that he was the Son of God. In turn, Jesus fulfilled all he was born to do and preached.

Easter did not always symbolize Christ's resurrection when it was first celebrated. It was once a pagan ritual of renewal and birth. However, when early missionaries began spreading Christianity's message, the holiday — falling around the time of Christ's actual resurrection — was adopted to commemorate the religious miracle. Today it stands as a testament to ultimate sacrifice and the promise of eternal life for all who believe in him.

Americans spend up to the United States consume nearly seven billion pounds of candy during the year, and Easter is the second-most popular holiday (behind Halsociation says people in loween) for indulging a

Faith comes first for many Easter celebrants. But there's nothing wrong with enjoying some candy come Easter Sunday. Here's a look at the history behind some of the sweets the Easter Bunny might leave in your basket this year.

- · Chocolate eggs: The first chocolate eggs were made in Europe in the early 19th century. Since then, they have become one of the most popular and recognizable treats associated with Easter. The chocolate egg is predated by edible Easter eggs made from sugar and pastry first designed in Germany. According to the "Guinness Book of World Records," largest chocolate Easter egg ever made debuted in 2011. It was just over 34 feet high and weighed nearly 16,000 lbs.
- Chocolate bunny: The Easter Bunny also is a German incarnation. The seasonal bunny was introduced to America in the 18th century by German immigrants who believed in the "Osterhase," an egg-laying hare they believed was a sign of new life and prosperity. Germans also introduced the first edible chocolate bunnies. The NCA says 76 percent of people eat the ears on chocolate bunnies first.
- Jelly beans: People aren't quite sure where the jelly bean originated, but some think it was based on a soft, chewy Middle Eastern sweet called Turkish delight and the hard candy shell Jordan almonds. William Shraft, a Bostonbased confectioner, may have coined the phrase "jelly bean" when he urged people to send these sweets to Union soldiers fighting in the Civil War.
- Peeps: Peeps are owned and made by Just Born Inc., a Pennsylvania-based company started by Russian immigrants when they acquired the Rodda Candy Company in 1953. Just Born figured out a way to automate and streamline the process of making Peeps, and today they can produce 5.5 million per day.

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
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"Jeopardy!" alumna to host trivia night in Canajoharie

Explaining your used car warranty options

Purchasing a previously owned vehicle requires a leap of faith. Even after relying on a test drive and a thorough inspection by a mechanic, it's impossible to know how the previous owner drove and maintained the vehicle and the wear and tear it may have endured. Drivers also cannot predict any issues that may crop up after signing a purchase contract. A certified pre-owned warranty from the dealership, an extended warranty or a different type of aftermarket warranty product can offer some peace of mind.

Navigating these warranties can take some savviness. Certified preowned warranties tend to be the smartest bet in the realm of used car warranties. This is because factory warranties are backing the product, and the vehicles that are given the CPO stamp have been properly vetted and are in great shape to be

insurable, according to IntelliChoice, a company that develops and distributes consumer automobile ownership data, ratings of vehicles based on their consumer value, leasing cost data, and Certified Pre-Owned Program analysis. Many car companies conduct small repairs to prepare a vehicle for CPO status, and cars are inspected thoroughly to ensure they are worthy of being backed by the factory warranty. This is a boon to buyers because they know they are likely getting a quality vehicle.

There are mixed reviews by automotive experts on other aftermarket warranties, often billed as "vehicle protection plans" and "service contracts." Some people believe they can save a lot of money. Others feel that they aren't redeemed enough to warrant the out-ofpocket cost, and that paying for repairs alone is

more cost-effective.

Autotrader, a vehicle value estimator and buying/selling tool, says that an extended warranty is rarely a good buy on a used car, but there are a few exceptions. If the car is notoriously unreliable (check J.D. Power reliability ratings), purchasing a warranty can be a smarter buy. Drivers should look for an exclusionary (bumper bumper) warranty, which covers all items except for ones specifically excluded on a list. This type of warranty is more comprehensive, and there's less of a risk that a claim will be denied. Other warranties include powertrain warranties, which only cover the vehicle's most important and expensive components. A WRAP warranty also may be attractive, as it will extend coverage to the few items that may no longer be covered by the original manufacturer's warranty.

> • Begin with firm, hard-boiled eggs. Bring a pot of water to a rolling boil. Then use a large spoon to gently lower the eggs into the water. Lower the heat to maintain a simmer and boil for just about 12 minutes. Transfer the eggs to a bowl with ice cold water and let them cool. Allow the eggs to cool completely before coloring.

> Lay out newspaper or an old tablecloth to soak up any spills. Spills are inevitable, so don't let them spoil the fun. In addition, empty egg cartons make ideal drying racks, so do not discard them.

> • Make patterns or other designs on the eggs. Use a white crayon to draw on the egg directly. The dye will not stick to the wax. Or use string, rubber bands, tape, stickers, or other items to create your pattern. Dip the egg and then remove the materials afterward to reveal the design.

> · Swirl a few drops of food coloring into shaving cream on a flat surface. Roll the eggs into the mixture, let dry, and then gently clean to remove the excess shaving cream. The result is a marbled effect.

> • Recognize that you don't have to "dye" eggs at all. Use a sponge to dab on a design. Strips of tissue paper can be adhered to the egg with glue or shellac. Children may enjoy submerging the egg in glue and then coating it in glitter.

The potential to create creative Easter eggs is limitless. Embracing new strategies can set this year's eggs apart.

Spring tips in the vegetable garden

Planning the garden layout, starting seeds indoors, and making coldframes are some of the spring activities for this year's vegetable garden.

In planning your veggie garden layout, avoid planting members of the same plant family in the same spot that they were in last year, or even the year before. This is called "crop rotation." Members of the same family are susceptible to the same diseases and insect infestations, and utilize the same nutrients. Planting crops from the same family in the same bed, year after year, can deplete soil nutrients, even with proper fertilizing.

For example, avoid planting members of the tomato family (tomatoes, potatoes, peppers, and eggplant) in the same place year after year. Likewise, the cucumber family contains this and melons and squash; the onion family has, in addition, leeks and garlic; the cabbage family has this crop and many others such as broccoli, cauliflower, kale, radishes, and turnips.

There are various other crop rotations you may read or hear about, but a simple one revolves around nutrient use. Leafy crops (lettuce, spinach, cabbage for instance) need lots of nitrogen, so start them out in beds that are new or enriched well with compost and manure. The next year, in this same bed, planting fruiting crops such as tomatoes, squash, cucumbers, and peppers. They don't want much nitrogen, but lots of phosphorus.

The third year, in that same bed, plant root crops such as onions and carrots. These mainly need potassium, and grow fine if there is less nitrogen and phosphorus from the previous years. Finally, in year four, plant legume crops such as beans and peas that actually put nitrogen back into the soil. Add lots of compost and manure the fall of that fourth year, with other nutrients, and you'll be ready to restart your rotation the following spring.

I garden in several raised beds, and simply rotate crops among them from year to year—perhaps the simplest form of crop rotation and the minimum you should work toward. With this, I can usually manage a couple years between having the same crop in the same bed. Keep a simple layout map of your beds and plantings from year to year to help in your planning.

If you start seeds under grow lights or fluorescent shop lights indoors, check the tubes for signs of age. Tubes that have been used for two to three seasons probably have lost much of their intensity even though they look fine. Dark rings on the ends of the tubes are a sign they need to be replaced.

To get an early harvest of lettuce and other greens, dig out a large shallow container and sow some seeds. Grow them indoors until the weather warms enough to put them outside during the day. Keep cutting leaves from the outside of the plants to prolong the harvest. Or, you can sow seeds for a mesclun mix and cut off the leaves when still young. They will regrow for another harvest in a few weeks.

Long-season alliums, such as leeks and onions, should be started from seeds

now. Sprinkle the seeds on top of seedstarting mix, keep it moist, and as soon as the seedlings emerge place the flats under grow lights. Snip the ends periodically to keep them about three to four inches tall and help them to grow strong.

Check seed packets and catalogs for recommendations, then plot out planting times for seeds you'll be starting indoors. You can find online sowing tables too, such as one I compiled (pss.uvm.edu/ppp/pubs/oh90sowv.pdf). Don't try to get a jump on the season by planting earlier; larger plants are more easily stunted than smaller ones and won't necessarily grow faster once they're transplanted outdoors. This is especially true for melons and squash that only grow when it is warm. Unless you give them protection, wait until at least late May to plant them outside.

Cold frames are handy for hardening off seedlings. You can make a simple cold frame by placing hay bales along the perimeter of a rectangle, and placing old windows or a glass storm door over the top. Purchased cold frames are convenient — some have thermostatically controlled tops that open automatically when the temperature inside hits a designated point. Since the midday sun can heat things up quickly, this feature is especially handy if you're away for long stretches during the day.

When your garden soil is dry enough to work in, sow peas, spinach and greens. Transplant cole crops such as broccoli, cauliflower, and cabbage into the garden. You'll need to buy cole crops as small plants if you didn't sow their seeds indoors back in March. Set up the pea trellis before you plant so you don't disturb emerging seedlings in the process.


Other spring tips for vegetables include planting a patch of asparagus which, being perennial, should last in that location for many years — it is a crop you do not rotate. Look into buying, or ordering, "seed potatoes" (not seeds, but rather small potatoes) of varieties you don't find in stores. I like to grow potatoes above ground in 15-gallon fabric-mesh bags, which you can buy just for this purpose.

Whether you're new to vegetable gardening, or with many years of experience, and have a mostly sunny site, grow tomatoes. There are so many tasty varieties, and heirlooms, that you just won't find in markets. There are newer varieties, too, that are compact for small spaces. In surveys of vegetable gardeners in Vermont, I've found that virtually all grow tomatoes. The other mostgrown vegetables include salad greens, herbs, beans, cucumbers, and peppers.

Step up your grilled cheese game

I love a grilled cheese sandwich for breakfast... and lunch, and dinner, and snacks. Okay, I love grilled cheese sandwiches anytime of the day! I'm not the only one who adores a little cheesy goodness from time to time. Grilled cheese sandwiches are one of the top comfort foods in the United States.

Research provided by some food historians states that cooked bread and cheese is an ancient food that has been enjoyed across many cultures, and is found from ancient Roman texts to the more recent French croque monsieur sandwich. Originally, this cheese and bread combo was made as an open-faced sandwich.

The modern version of the grilled cheese sandwich originated in the United States in the 1920s. James L. Kraft, of Kraft Cheese fame, invented and patented the cheese pasteurizing process. This prevented Kraft cheeses from spoiling when transported long distances across America.

If you've ever used the expression "the best thing since sliced bread," thank Otto Frederick Rohwedder of Davenport, Iowa. Rohwedder invented the first single loaf bread-slicing machine, but the prototype he built in 1912 was destroyed in a fire. It wasn't until 1928 that Rohwedder had a bread slicing machine that made distributing white bread easy and affordable. With the availability of processed cheese and sliced white bread, the American-style grilled cheese sandwich gained popularity!

The beauty of grilled cheese sandwiches is the abili-

ty to mix and match cheeses, bread and seasonings according to taste. Adding sauteed vegetables or condiments enhances the flavor of the cheeses.

Using hearty breads like country white bread, ciabatta, multi-grain, pullman, pumpernickel, potato and sourdough will take your grilled cheese game to a new level! I have a few recipes to help you step up your grilled cheese game!

Grilled Cheese Sandwich

Spreading mayonnaise on the bread and using melted butter to cook the sandwich adds flavor and a crispy texture. Go traditional or try the variations below for a delicious, grilled cheese twist!

- 2 slices (1/2 inch-thick) Pullman or other white bread per sandwich
- 2 tablespoons mayonnaise per sandwich
- 1 tablespoon unsalted butter per sandwich
- 2 ounces (about 4 slices) thinly sliced American or Cheddar cheese, or combination of both per sandwich
- 1/8 teaspoon pepper, per sandwich, optional
- 1. Place bread on a cutting board and spread mayonnaise over top side of each slice.
- 2. Place a small skillet (nonstick or cast-iron) over medium heat. Add in 1/2 tablespoon of butter. When the butter is melted, place 1 slice of bread, mayonnaise side down, in skillet; top with cheese or filling of your choice (see below); season with pepper, optional.
- 3. Top with second slice of bread, mayonnaise side up. When underside is golden brown, about 3 to 4 minutes, turn sandwich and add remaining butter to skillet. Press down gently on sandwich for even browning and to help melt cheese. Cook, 1 to 2 minutes until second side is golden brown and cheese is melted.

Stepped-Up Grilled Cheese

Spicy Diner Grilled Cheese Sandwich: Mix 2 tablespoons mayonnaise with 1/4 teaspoon Sriracha. Spread mayonnaise over top side of each slice. Prepare

for cooking according to instructions above.

Southwestern Grilled Cheese Sandwich: 2 slices white bread with 1 slice Monterey jack, 1 slice Pepper Jack cheese, 1 slice Cheddar cheese, 4 to 6 pickled jalapeno slices. Prepare for cooking according to instructions above.

Grilled Cheese With Pesto: Spread pesto on 1 slice white bread. Top with 1 slice each provolone and mozzarella. Top with another slice of bread. Prepare for cooking according to instructions above.

Grilled Cheese With Roasted Tomato: Toss 4 halved plum tomatoes with 1 tablespoon olive oil, and thyme, salt and pepper to taste. Roast at 350 F for 1 hour; mash. Spread 2 slices sourdough bread with one-quarter of the tomato mixture and sandwich with 2 slices cheddar. (Use the remaining tomato mixture for more sandwiches.) Cook, following recipe instructions above.

Cajun Muffuletta Grilled Cheese Sandwich: To 2 slices country white bread place 2 slices provolone and 1 tablespoon deli olive salad between the cheese, and season with 1/8 teaspoon Cajun seasoning. Cook, following recipe instructions above.

French-Style Grilled Cheese Sandwich: Spread 2 slices sourdough bread with Dijon mustard and brie (remove the rind), and add some caramelized onions. Cook, following recipe instructions above.

Spanish-Style Grilled Cheese Sandwich: Spread the bread with fig jam. Build the sandwich by placing 1/4 cup grated Manchego cheese and 1 tablespoon sliced green olives between 2 slices white bread. Cook, following recipe instructions above.

Fire up the smoker for Easter dinner this year

For much of the country, Easter Sunday typically falls during a time of year when the weather outside is still pretty chilly. But this year Easter falls on the third Sunday in April, increasing the chances that temperatures will be more spring-like and less reminiscent of winter.

Warmer temperatures on Easter Sunday means hosts tasked with cooking Easter dinner might be able to expand their culinary horizons and avoid the stove. Though they might not have considered it before, hosts might want to fire up their smokers to give their families something delicious and different to dine on this Easter Sunday. If the weather takes an unexpected turn for the worse, electric smokers can typically be used indoors, but check the manufacturer's instructions to confirm that.

Big meals are part and parcel for Easter Sunday, this recipe for "Pork Loin Roast with Hot Pepper Jelly Glaze" from Karen Putman and Judith Fertig's "Championship BBQ Secrets for Real Smoked Food" (Robert Rose) is a great way to take advantage of warmer Easter weather while still ensuring everyone has a full belly by the end of the meal.

Pork Loin Roast with **Hot Pepper Jelly Glaze**

Serves 4 to 6

- 1 boneless pork loin roast (about 2 lbs.)
- 4 cups apple juice
- 1/2 cup Brown Sugar Rib Rub (see below)
- 1 cup hot pepper jelly Additional apple juice for spraying
- 1. Rinse pork under cold running water and pat dry. Place in a large sealable plastic bag and pour in apple juice. Seal bag and refrigerate for at least 8 hours and up to 12 hours.
- 2. Remove pork from marinade and pat dry. Discard marinade. Sprinkle dry rub over the surface of the meat, coating evenly. Set aside.
- 3. Prepare a fire in your smoker.
- 4. Meanwhile, in a small saucepan, melt hot pepper jelly over medium-low heat. Keep warm

by the smoker.

5. Place pork directly on the smoker rack, add wood to the coals and close the lid. Smoke at 225°F to 250°F, spraying with apple juice every 30 minutes, for 2 hours. Brush with hot pepper jelly, close the lid and smoke, spraying with apple juice every 30 minutes, for 1 to 1 1/2 hours, or until a meat thermometer inserted in

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the thickest part of the pork registers 160°F for medium, or until desired doneness. Let rest for 15 minutes before slicing.

Brown Sugar Rib Rub Makes about 3 1/2 cups

- 2 cups packed dark brown sugar or granulated maple sugar
- 1/2 cup fine kosher or sea salt
- 1/4 cup sweet Hungarian paprika

1/4 cup chili powder

1/4 cup ground lemon pepper

- cup granulated 1/4 garlic
- 1 tablespoon freshly ground black pepper
 - 1 teaspoon dried basil
- 1 teaspoon dried thyme

In a medium bowl, combine brown sugar, salt, paprika, chili powder, lemon pepper, garlic, black pepper, basil, and thyme.

Potential culprits behind thinning grass

Thick grass is often a hallmark of a healthy lawn. If grass begins to thin, homeowners may feel as though all the time and effort they spent tending to their lawns was for naught.

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Thinning grass can be caused by any number of things. And while it might take a little effort to address, thinning grass can be treated if homeowners correctly identify that cause of the problem.

Leaf spot

The Center for Agriculture, Food and the Environment at the University of Massachusetts Amherst notes that leaf spot diseases affect both cool- and warm-season turfgrasses. Various fungi can cause leaf spot. Symptoms and the timing of the appearance of leaf spot will vary depending on which fungi is causing the problem. For example, bipolaris sorokiniana, which affects grasses in warm, wet summer months, produces small spots that are dark purple to black. Dreschslera poae is another fungi that causes leaf spot, and it also produces dark purple to black spots. However, it tends to appear in the spring when the weather is cool and moist. Understanding the different fungi and when they typically strike can help homeowners identify what is causing their grass to thin. In such situations, professional landscapers can be invaluable resources as well.

Stripe smut

The University of Maryland Extension notes that stripe smut primarily poses a threat to Kentucky bluegrass that is older than three years. Pale green streaks that run parallel to the veins in the leaves and leaf sheaths are symptomatic of stripe smut, which tends to be noticed in spring and fall, when weather is cool. As the disease progresses, stripes turn black or a sil-

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very gray, causing the leaf blade to shred and curl. After the blades have shred, they turn brown and die. The grass thins because stripe smut makes it vulnerable to problems like drought.

Ascochyta leaf blight

Lawns suffering from ascochyta leaf blight will become straw-colored. According to the lawn care and pesticide experts at Ortho®, when a lawn is affected by ascochyta leaf blight, its healthy grass blades will be mixed in with diseased grass blades. Most prevalent in the spring, this disease can affect grass at any time during the growing season. That's because the ascochyta fungi invade leaf blades through wounds, such as those that can result from mowing. Ortho notes that dull lawn mowers can contribute to the disease, which might disappear on its own and can even return after it's seemingly been cured.

Easy Banana Bread

1/2 cup fat-free sour cream

Sugar substitute to equal 1/2 cup, suitable for bak-

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Whatchamacallits


their foot free of the front boot. Then you repeat the process for the other

To Your Good Health

by Keith Roach, M.D. Medication doesn't stop vertigo's spinning

Dear Dr. Roach: I have a terrible case of vertigo. I'm not sure what causes it or what I can do to prevent it from happening to me again. I was given two medications, promethazine for nausea and meclizine for vertigo, but still the problem persists. Can you offer some kind of help? - J.G.

Answer: Vertigo is the sensation of movement when not moving. Although it is classically described as a spinning sensation, some people feel as if they or the world is moving in other ways.

There are many causes of vertigo, but we generally break them down into two groups: peripheral causes, from the vestibular nerve, which connects your brain with the organ of balance in the inner ear: and central causes, from the brain itself. Peripheral causes are much more common and generally are labelled "benign," even though they can be quite severe. Central causes are most commonly attributed to vestibular migraine and poor blood flow to the brainstem.

Only a careful exam and, occasionally, more sophisticated tests can reveal the underlying cause of the vertigo. The most common cause is benign paroxysmal positional vertigo, and I suspect that is what you were being treated for. having received a nonspecific treatment for vertigo. Although it is commonplace, I disagree with this treatment if it is used for more than a day or two, and then only in people whose symptoms are severe.

Most people get relief from an office treatment called the Epley maneuver. They can continue at home with other

exercises. I would suggest that you ask your doctor about these procedures, and if he or she isn't familiar with them, it might be wise to consult with an expert. In any event, vertigo is a symptom that can arise from several distinct medical conditions. You should find out what your diagnosis is.

Dear Dr. Roach: I would like your opinion of taking a vitamin B complex capsule. A friend recommended it, but the dose of one to two capsules a day makes my urine turn bright-vellow. The daily values are from 3,000 to 8,000 percent, and that seems pretty high to me. I don't enjoy taking it, because it smells and tastes unpleasant, but I'm mostly concerned about getting too much of a "good" thing. -- R.W.

Answer: Here's the good news: B vitamins are necessary, and your body is able to get rid of any excess. In fact, the yellow color of your urine is exactly that, your body spilling off the B vitamins you don't need. There are a few medical conditions that benefit from B vitamins.

Here's the not-so-good news: You almost certainly don't need so much, and most people don't benefit from taking vitamins at all. A healthy diet with lots of fruits and vegetables gives you most of the B vitamins your body needs. (Vitamin B-12, by contrast, is found only in animal products, which is why vegans require supplementary B-12.) If you choose to keep taking a vitamin just for general health. I would change to a brand that has lower doses and isn't unpleasant to take.

I don't recommend stopping megadose multivitamins suddenly. This is particularly important for vitamin C, where symptoms of deficiency can show up temporarily in people who suddenly stop high doses.

Buyers' guide to financing a vehicle

The price of the average car continues to rise. Analysts at Edmunds estimate the average transaction price of a new vehicle now hovers at roughly \$36,000. Few people can walk into a car dealership and pay such a price in cash, which means that savvy shoppers need to familiarize themselves with the financing process in order to get their dream rides.

In addition to finding the perfect car or truck, buyers must spend time researching the ideal way to pay for it. Car loans are key to the car-buying process. Too often shoppers wait until they're in the negotiating seat at the dealership before they even know what they can spend, and this can be a mistake. A poor financing deal hurts buyers over the long run and may lead to defaulting on the loan and dealing with the credit fallout that defaulting produces.

Vehicle financing is a step-by-step process that should begin long before consumers even pick out a car.

- Examine your spending and saving. Start by looking at your finances and establish a budget. How much cash do you have on hand for a down payment? Also, how much can you comfortably devote to a new car payment and requisite auto insurance? You can use automotive loan calculators to get a rough idea of what a particular car will cost you in terms of monthly payments.
- Know your credit standing. Great credit will give you financing leverage. Understand your credit score and which factors may be bringing it down. Resolve any issues well before you apply for financing so a bad score will not hurt
 - Visit lenders. The fi-

nancing deal offered by the dealership might not be the best price possible. You can get preapproved/prequalified for an auto loan the same way you do for a home mortgage at banks and credit unions. This helps you secure the best interest rate possible. It also provides negotiating power. A preapproval letter puts you in the position as a stronger "cash buyer," states the financial resource NerdWallet.

• Set a firm buying price. Preapprovals and working with a third-party lender gives you a specific amount of money you know you can borrow. Use this as a tool to keep the negotiated price low because you cannot exceed your preapproved amount. It also may be a way to push dealership finance mangers to contact their own captive lenders to try to beat the rate offered by your existing lender.

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
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Keep tires road-worthy for safer driving

Making driving safer can come down to ensuring that the vehicle is in good working order starting from the ground

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration warns that an average of 200 people die each year in tire-related crashes. In 2016, 733 people across the United States lost their lives in accidents in which tire malfunction was a contributing factor. Roughly 70 percent of single vehicle accidents are tire-related. Taking tire maintenance seriously can greatly reduce the chances of blowouts, accidents and fatalities.

Maintain the right pressure

Caring for tires not only improves safety, but also it extends the life of the tires, saving drivers money as a result. Michelin Tires says that simply checking the tires' inflation pressure can make a significant difference in how long tires last. For example, a tire that is consistently 20 percent under-inflated may see its life expectancy reduced by 20 percent.

Tires that are not properly inflated also can have a high rolling resistance. In such instance, the engine must expend more effort to move the vehicle – thus eating up fuel.

Pressure should be checked at ambient temperature before driving, states AAA. The recommended inflation pressure can be found in the drivers manual or on the tire.

Check tire tread

Tires rely on good tread depth to maintain traction and shed water during wet conditions. AAA recommends checking tread with a visual inspection and with the "quarter test." Insert a quarter into a tread groove with the top of Washington's head facing down. If the top of his head is not visible, the tires have

at least 4/32" of tread and are acceptable for continued use. If the top of Washington's head shows, tires need to be replaced.

Learn about tire aging

Check the owner's manual for specific recommendations concerning replacing the spare tire for the vehicle. Some manufacturers state after six years, while others say 10 years is the maximum service life for tires. While most tire centers will use newly manufactured tires when replacing tires, you can double check the age of any tire by looking at the sidewall for the tire identification number

(TIN), offers NHTSA. The last four digits are the week and year of manufacture.

Keep up on maintenance

Wheel alignment, tire rotation and tire balancing wear and extending the life and safety of tires. Each vehicle has specific recommendations, and drivers should consult their manuals to find those specifics.

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


