## How to identify poison ivy


Poison ivy is an unwelcome guest on many properties. Unfortunately, many people don't recognize the presence of poison ivy until it's too late and they've already fallen victim to the uncomfortable, itchy red rash that is the plant's hallmark.

According to Poison-Ivy.org, a website providing information about poison ivy, poison oak and poison sumac, the rash from poison ivy may first appear as just a slight itchy spot. But that spot will gradually get worse and can even cover your entire body with giant red sores if left untreated or if it goes undetected for

too long. That only highlights the importance of learning to recognize poison ivy on a property and taking the appropriate measures to prevent anyone from coming into contact with it.

Is all poison ivy the same?

Many people may be surprised to learn that all poison ivy plants are not one and the same. Poison-Ivy.org notes that there are different types of poison ivy in different places, so curious homeowners should visit the site to determine how to identify the type of poison ivy specific to where they live. Eastern poison ivy grows on the ground, climbs and sometimes appears as a shrub. And despite its name, Eastern poison ivy grows from the East Coast to the Midwest, affecting people in middle American states like Kansas



and Nebraska. Eastern poison ivv also can be found in some parts of Texas and Arizona.

What are some telltale signs of the poison ivy plant?

Eastern poison ivy is the most widespread poison ivy plant, and these are some of its characteristics. (Note: People who live outside of regions where Eastern poison ivy grows can learn about the characteristics of plants in their area by visiting www.Poison-Ivy.org).

• Poison ivy plants always have leaves of three. No poison ivy plants have more than three leaves.

• Poison ivy always grow left, then right. That means that the stem/branch of leaves closest to the root of the plant will always lean left. Subsequent stems/branches of leaves can lean right. Stems/branches of poison ivv leaves are never side by side.

• Poison ivy plants never have thorns.

· The edges of poison ivy leaves are never sawtoothed or scalloped.

• Poison ivy leaves will appear differently depending on the season. In spring, Eastern poison ivy leaves will appear red. As spring turns into summer, the leaves will gradually appear more green. Come autumn, the green leaves will look as if they were brushed with red, with some leaves featuring patches or spots of red.

The poison ivy rash can be very uncomfortable. Learning to identify poison ivy plants can help people avoid the rash.

## Identify and treat a garden mole problem

Lawn and garden enthusiasts often must address unforeseen issues when tending to their lawns. Weeds can be a blight, and drought can compromise the look and integrity of a lawn.

Another more deceptive potential adversary is moles. After a spring and summer spent tending to their gardens, no homeowner wants to have their hard work compromised by moles.

"The Old Farmer's Almanac" says that moles are ground-dwelling insectivores that feast on insects in the soil. Moles grow to be roughly six to eight inches long and have gray or black velvety fur. Their snouts are slender and hairless, and they have very small eyes and ears. Their large front feet have long claws that scoop dirt out of the way like a garden hoe.

Even though moles are more likely to snack on grubs, worms and beetles than plants, they damage gardens and lawns because of their underground tunneling behavior. Moles make subterranean channels throughout the yard in search of food. Some of the telltale signs include sprouted mounds of displaced soil, holes and raised burrows and hills. Tunneling can separate roots from soil, eventually killing vegetation in the process, according to the home and garden experts at BobVila.com .

There are various ways to address mole problems in a lawn or garden. Some professionals may recommend fumigants, home remedies and repellents. But these methods are not always effective, according to Better Homes & Gardens. Using insecticides can rid the lawn of some of the foods that moles dine upon, ultimately discouraging them from coming onto a property. However, many experts agree that trapping is the only reliable means of stopping these creatures.

Homeowners can trap moles humanely by catching the mole in the act. This involves waiting for a mole to start channeling, then using two shovels to block egress on either side of its path. The mole can be removed to a box and relocated. There also are various mole and gopher traps available for sale that operate with spring-loaded snares. ## A little auto care goes a long way

(NAPS) – Performing simple preventative maintenance on your vehicle will go a long way toward protecting your vehicle investment, say the experts.

"Buying a new car today comes with a hefty price tag when you add up the down payment, monthly car payments and higher insurance rates. Neglecting its care can mean even higher costs down the line in the form of more extensive repairs and lost resale value," explained Rich White, executive director of the nonprofit Car Care Council. "By following a proactive auto care plan, the typical car should deliver at least 200,000 miles of safe, dependable, efficient and enjoyable performance."

The organization recommends following a vehicle service schedule, keeping a free copy of its "Car Care Guide" in the glove box and performing the most common routine maintenance procedures to keep your vehicle performing at its best.

Consider this checklist:

• Check all fluids, including engine oil, power steering, brake and transmission, as well as windshield washer solvent and antifreeze/coolant.

Check the brake system annually and have the brake linings, rotors and drums inspected at each oil change.
Check the tires, including pressure and tread. Uneven wear indicates a need for wheel alignment. Tires should also be checked for bulges and bald spots.

• Check the hoses and belts to make sure they're not cracked, brittle, frayed, loose or showing signs of excessive wear.


• Check the heating, ventilating and air conditioning (HVAC) system as proper heating and cooling performance is critical for interior comfort and safety reasons, such as defrosting.

• Check the wipers and lighting so that you can see and be seen. Check that all interior and exterior lighting is working properly and replace worn wiper blades so you can see clearly when driving during precipitation.

"Be sure to fully inspect your vehicle annually, including performing a tune-up and wheel alignment," continued White. "If you ever suspect there is a problem, it's a good idea to address it quickly before minor repairs become more complicated, expensive repairs."

## Whatchamacallits

Isn't this an interesting looking piece of history?

This whatchamacallit is the great-great-grandfather of the Magic Bullet, an ancestor of the food processor. (We know, because we have DNA tested it.) This lovely kitchen tool could be used to finely grind up any-thing that needed to smaller and smoother, from apples to ground chuck.

As far as our esteemed whatchamacallit researchers can tell, this vintage piece of equipment comes from about the 1860s. It is a hand-cranked, gear-driven food chopper or hasher. As the user turns the handle for the gears, the chopper rotates around the bucket. First sold by Laroy Starrett from Athol, MA, there were several sizes of the hasher available – and the company eventually even patented a washing machine following this design using a dasher instead of a chopping blade. Starrett, ever the helpful homemaker, also patented a butter working machine a few months before registering the hasher.

Starrett wrote in a monograph that the inspiration for the device came from watching a river boat with a walking beam engine.

In good condition, one of these antique food processors can fetch up to \$600!

School Budget Vote & Board of Education Election: The annual school budget vote will be held on Tuesday, May 21st at the Harry Hoag Elementary School, between the hours of 1:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m. In addition to the proposed annual budget, voters will be asked to authorize the purchase of school vehicles by expending funds from the Bus Purchase Reserve Fund. Proposition 3 on the ballot will be an Authorization for Increase to the Library Tax levy. This request for an increase has been made by the Fort Plain Free Library, and is seperate from the school budget and tax levy. Finally, on May 21st voters will also elect two members to three year terms on the Board of Education. Applications for absentee ballots are obtainable between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m., Monday through Friday except holidays, from the school district clerk. The clerk must receive completed absentee ballot applications at least seven (7) days before the election if the ballot is to be mailed to the voter, or one (1) day before the election if the ballot is to be delivered personally to the voter. Abentee ballots must be received by the district clerk no later than 4:00 p.m. prevailing time, on Tuesday, May 21, 2019. The annual school budget vote and election is open to Fort Plain Central School District residents who are: 18 years of age or older, citizens of the United States of America, and have been a FPCSD resident for a period of thirty (30) days immediately preceeding the annual election. One of the things that resonated the most were Jacy's words about the "ripple effect" of such an accident. Jacy's mother was a teacher, and every student in her middle school was heartbroken upon hearing of her death. Members of Jacy's family were effected by her long illness and extensive rehabilitation. Jacy and Steve emphasized to the students that not just texting, but becoming involved in a phone call can be very distracting and cause the driver to lose focus on his or her surroundings. They noted that 15 people in North America are killed each day, due to cell phone-caused vehicle crashes. Their bottom line message: put your phone on standby when you get in the car. 





## Expert lawncare tips for a happy summer lawn

(BPT) — It's been a rough winter in many parts of the country, but spring is here at last — and that means it's time to give your lawn a bit of TLC.

Although grass is highly resilient, you can help your lawn recover from winter and make sure it's in top shape for summer with these tips from turfgrass researchers around the U.S.

## 1. Aerify to relieve soil compaction.

If your lawn is old or heavily trafficked, or if it sat under wet snow for much of the winter, the soil may be compacted. Aerifying the turf with a core aerator (you can rent the equipment or hire a professional) can open up the soil, allowing water, nutrients and oxygen to reach the roots of the grass more easily. Aerification is recommended annually for cool-season lawns, but according to Clint Waltz, Ph.D., of the University of Georgia, a warm-season lawn that suffered drought-induced dormancy the previous summer can also benefit from aerification through mid-May.

#### 2. Interseed for a thicker lawn.

Lawns that are sparse or have worn patches can be interseeded when the soil warms up in the spring. Aaron Patton, Ph.D., of Purdue University said, "The earlier in the year that you seed, the more time the turf will have for root development before summer." Be sure to use a high-quality seed that is a good match for your geographic region and your lawn's soil type, sun exposure and irrigation patterns.

## 3. Watch your mowing height.

Don't wait too long to start mowing your lawn. Scalping an overgrown lawn causes stress that can affect the grass the rest of the season. As a rule of thumb, never cut more than one-third of the grass blade height at a time. Leaving the grass a bit taller can also improve the wear tolerance of the turf, said Geoffrey Rinehart of the University of Maryland. More leaf tissue allows the grass to better withstand foot traffic and protects the growing point at the base of the blade.

#### 4. Grasscycle to feed your lawn naturally.

You'll probably want to remove the grass clippings the first few times you mow, to reduce shading, but once your lawn gets going, consider "grasscycling" simply leaving the clippings on the lawn. Grady Miller,





Ph.D., of North Carolina State University said, "Grass clippings decompose quickly and can provide up to 25 percent of the lawn's fertilizer needs."

#### 5. Fertilize - but sparingly.

Even if you're grasscycling, you should fertilize your lawn at least twice a year (mid-May and mid-September work well in most areas). Cale Bigelow, Ph.D., of Purdue cautioned that the spring application should be sparing and should feature slow-release nitrogen fertilizer to minimize excess growth. Too much fertilizer can lead to rapid but weak growth, leaving your turf more susceptible to wear and stress.

#### 6. Water properly.

Proper irrigation in the spring can help prevent or reduce pest problems and environmental stress later in the summer, said Miller. He recommended watering to a soil depth of 4 to 6 inches. (You can check the depth by pushing a screwdriver into the soil. If it goes in easily, the soil likely has enough moisture.) Watering deeply once or twice a week is better than frequent light watering.

#### 7. Take it easy.

Moss, mushrooms and other lawn pests may make an appearance in early spring, but once your grass comes out of dormancy and begins growing quickly in



late spring, the hardy turfgrass will push many of these invaders out. Issues will often resolve themselves if you create the conditions that favor the grass. If infestations recur, your county extension agency can help you identify the underlying problem and provide recommendations that are specific to your region and type of grass.

A little spring maintenance can pay off big later in the year. If you want healthy, wear-resistant turf for the high-traffic summer season, now is the time to start setting your lawn up for success. 

## **Real estate financing:** The 3 main factors lenders consider

(BPT) — Buying a new home is an exciting milestone. While finding the right home is essential, the most important step toward homeownership is making sure you're ready to apply for a home loan.

Applying for a mortgage is not something people do every day, so it's natural to have questions. There are several factors that help determine a loan decision, along with strategies you can follow to help position yourself for the best loan at the best rates.

Angela Patterson, Vanderbilt Mortgage director of Credit and Credit Services, explains the three factors that have the biggest influence on any loan decision. Credit

Your credit is a critical factor for lenders making a loan decision. They will learn more about your credit history and credit score by pulling a credit report.

A credit report shows how well an applicant has repaid any loan or credit obligation. Usually lenders look at the most recent pay history and look for debts with a high balance. While score is important and will most likely have an impact on the interest rate offered, the detailed pay history plays a significant role in whether an applicant is approved or declined.

Does this mean if you have a past blemish on your credit you will be denied a home loan? Not necessarily. There are many factors lenders consider.

"It is very important to our team to call every applicant," said Patterson. "Our customers are more than just a credit score. We want to understand their journey and provide the financing program that best fits their situation."

### Income and debts

Determining your ability to repay the debt on time each month is important to a lender when making a loan decision. A debt-to-income ratio, or DTI, is one of the tools lenders use to determine your ability to pay. Two things need to be calculated to know this percent: monthly income and the existing credit obligations that are paid monthly.

Lenders typically use verified gross monthly income, your pay before taxes, when determining an ability to repay. Gross monthly income includes a paycheck from an employer, plus any money you may receive in government aid, child support or pensions.

After totaling gross income, the lender will need to determine the amount of debt the applicant pays toward each month. Typically, lenders use a credit report to identify the applicant's debts. Some examples include car payments, student loans and credit card balances.

#### Employment

Employment is another important factor that goes into a loan decision. Lenders will look at the type and length of employment. If a person is self-employed, the applicant will need to prove steady income over a twoyear period.



The most important step toward homeownership is making sure you're ready to apply for a home loan.

Consistent and non-temporary employment are seen favorably by most lenders. This means being regularly employed for two or more years. Consistent employment shows a lender stability in an applicant's source of income, which is an indicator of their ability to repay the loan.



## **Kovels: Antiques and Collecting**

#### by Terry and Kim Kovel Rabbit doorstop

Where did the Easter bunny come from? There is no suggestion of an egglaying rabbit or hare in the Bible's scriptures. There were stories about decorated eggs at Easter as early as the 1300s. And children made nests for the colored eggs. In America, the bunny arrived in the early 1700s with German immigrants in Pennsylvania. The idea of eggs at Easter was universal. but instead of a bunny, countries had foxes, cuckoo birds, hares and more. The rabbit symbolizing Easter is now a fluffy, young bunny. even though it was an adult rabbit in earlier years.

A doorstop shaped like a rabbit probably was not originally made as a symbol of Easter, but it could have been. The iron figure of a sitting rabbit was made in the early 1900s by Spencer Manufacturing Company, in Guilford, CT. The 15-inchhigh doorstop was so rare it auctioned at Bertoia in New Jersey for \$5,400 – three times the estimate.

*Q*: I have a picture of John F. Kennedy autographed to my family. During World War II, my father was in the Navy with Pierre Salinger, President Kennedy's press secretary. I'd like to have the picture appraised, but there are no political auctions around here. Some reports are that a signed picture stating it's to our family could be worth thousands. I won't send it to any online companies. How can I get the value?

A: You can contact auction houses that have political auctions to find out if there is any interest in the photo. If the auction is interested in it, take a picture of the photograph, making sure it's clear enough to read the autograph, and send it to them with the details of how your family got the picture. Don't be disappointed. It isn't worth thousands of dollars. A picture autographed to someone usually is worth less than a picture with an autograph that is not "to" anyone.

*g:* I found an old Mountain Dew bottle and

brought it home and washed it. There is a misprint on it. It reads "it'll tickle yore nnards." Does that make it valuable?

**A:** The Pepsi-Cola Company introduced Mountain Dew in 1964. "It'll Tickle Yore Innards" was part of the slogan used on bottles and cans from 1965 to 1969. Error bottles are not rare, and the error doesn't add to the value. Mountain Dew bottles with that slogan sell for about \$5.





• On May 4, 1886, a peaceful labor protest in Haymarket Square in Chicago turns into a riot, leaving more than 100 wounded and eight police officers dead. Seven of the eight fatalities and the most of injuries were caused by shots fired by fellow officers.

• On May 2, 1933, the modern legend of Scotland's Loch Ness Monster is born when a newspaper reports a couple's sighting of "an enormous animal rolling and plunging on the surface" of the lake. The "monster" became a media phenomenon, and a circus offered a huge reward for the beast's capture.

• On April 30, 1945, holed up in a bunker under his headquarters in Berlin, Adolf Hitler commits suicide by swallowing a cyanide capsule and shooting himself in the head. Soon after, Germany unconditionally surrendered. ending Hitler's dreams of a "1,000-year Reich."

• On May 3, 1951, the Senate Armed Services and Foreign Relations committees begin hearings into the dismissal of Gen. Douglas MacArthur by President Harry Truman. The American public liked MacArthur's tough stance on communism, and he returned home to a hero's welcome. • On April 29, 1968, the musical "Hair" premieres

on Broadway. The show featured a much-talkedabout scene in which the cast appeared nude on the dimly lit stage. "Hair" quickly became not just a smash hit, but a cultural phenomenon.

• On May 1, 1991, Oakland Athletics outfielder Rickey Henderson steals his 939th base to break Lou Brock's career record. Henderson would steal 1,406 bases in his major league career, almost 500 more than the next closest player.


