Whatchamacallits

Nowadays, it seems like everyone has an iPod, a satellite radio or some other type of new entertainment technology. While there is nothing wrong with these new inventions, it can be fun to know a little bit about how far technology has come!

One early source of mass entertainment was the radio. Among the first devices to be manufactured were crystal radios. They were called such because lead galena crystals (and a fine-pointed wire called a cat whisker) were used to operate them.


A piece of crystal, plus two packages in which such crystals were packaged and sold, are shown in the photo to the right. They were placed inside the chamber (pictured center) to pick up radio signals.

Crystal radios were very popular in the 1920s. Boys' publications even encouraged readers to make their own. Eventually, vacuum tube radios replaced crystal-dependent models.

# Protect your pets from holiday household hazards

Decorations sparkle with inviting lights.... and tantalizing scents from special foods entice closer inspection. Unfortunately, a too-close encounter with holiday favorites may lead to an emergency trip for your favorite pet.

Dr. Ed Cooper, specialist in veterinary emergency and critical care medicine at the Ohio State Veterinary Medical Center, reminds pet owners that holidays can be a dangerous time for dogs and cats in the home.

Foods that are tasty treats during holiday parties can be dangerously toxic for dogs. Chocolate, especially dark or baker's chocolate, consumed in large quantities can make our canine pals ill. Grapes and raisins can also be dangerous, as well as certain sugar substitutes (xylitol) used in baking and found in sugar-free gum. Keep your pet in mind when positioning foods for guests,

and place items out of reach as much as possible, he said.

Additionally, Cooper recommends you move your pet to a different room out of harm's way and alert visitors not to offer treats to your dog or cat. A list of dangerous plants and other toxins can be found at go.osu.edu/holidayhaz-

Determining if your pet might need a trip to a veterinary emergency room requires owners to watch for behavioral changes, Cooper said. Signs of toxin exposure include vomiting, diarrhea, loss of appetite, change in behavior, trembling, twitching and seizure. Owners should call their family veterinarian if they are concerned. A list of emergency signs is available at go.osu.edu/pet-emer-

be energy efficient with holiday décor this season.



• Use fiber-optic decorations. Fiber optic items are lit by one light. The illumination carries through the fiber optic cables to the entire decoration.

# How to prep a snowblower for winter: A tuneup checklist

RepairClinic.com® shared a snowblower tune-up checklist to aid in preparing a snowblower for the winter season

Here is RepairClinic's checklist to follow when tuning up a snowblower for the season:

1. Review the owner's manual.

"Recommendations for snowblower care vary by manufacturer and by model," said Jefferey Linderman, outdoor power equipment specialist for RepairClinic.com. "Review the owner's manual at the start of every season to avoid expensive mistakes."

- 2. Replace the spark plug.
- 3. Drain and replace the oil.

Take care when replacing the oil. Consult the owner's manual for the proper way to tilt the snowblower, as this varies from model to model. Tilting the snowblower the

wrong way in this step can cause expensive damage to key components. Remember that used oil should be recycled; this can be done at many auto part suppliers or small engine repair shops.

4. Add fresh fuel and fuel stabilizer.

"Fuel stabilizer is important," Linderman said. "It slows the development of damaging buildup in the carburetor."

5. Remove dirt and grime.

A degreaser spray will remove grease and dirty from grimy areas. Allow the degreaser to sit for 10-15 minutes before wiping with a clean cloth.

6. Check the fuel cap and tires for wear.

Fuel caps have small vent holes to allow air into the fuel tank. Replace the fuel cap if its air vent holes are blocked by buildup or debris. Cover or close the fuel cap vents in the off-season. Check the tires for wear and re-

place as needed. A tire pressure gauge should be used to check the air pressure in pneumatic tires.

7. Lubricate bearings.

Lubricate wheel bearings, auger bearings and impeller bearings.

8. Inspect the scraper blade, slide shoes and other parts for wear and replace as needed.

Take the time thoroughly inspect key components such as the scraper blade and slide shoes (a.k.a. skid shoes) for wear. "These parts have the important job of protecting the housing from damage," said Linderman. "Replace these parts if they have worn dangerously thin or are damaged beyond repair."

9. Test, troubleshoot and repair, as needed.

If a snowblower has performance issues such as starting and then stopping or malfunctioning augers, take the time to troubleshoot and repair now.

"Even minor changes in performance can indicate larger problems in a snowblower," Linderman said. "Troubleshoot and make repairs to avoid downtime and costlier repairs later in the season."
