


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Collecting

Q: At a farm sale earlier this summer, I bought several older fruit jars. One is especially interesting. It is a "Leader" jar with glass lid and wire bail. It is a quart-size jar and is olive green in color. Even though I have several vintage fruit jars, I have not seen another one like it. I paid \$25 for the jar. — Melissa, Covington, LA

A: Bill Schroeder wrote what I think is one of the best references in this field of collecting, "1000 Fruit Jars Priced and "1000 Illustrated" published by Collector Books, I found your jar in this guide, and according to Schroeder it is extremely rare. How rare? He believes it is worth about \$1,000. The olive green jar is extremely desirable and you obviously got quite a bargain.

Q: I have a large decorative bowl marked "Amphora." I have not been able to find the company listed in any of my reference books. — Jonathan, Wheaton, II.

A: The Amphora Porcelain Works was one of several pottery companies that operated in the Teplitz-Turn region of Bohemia during the late 19th and early 20th century. Prior to

Art pottery identified with this mark is collectible and sometimes can be quite expensive. It would not surprise me if your bowl is worth several hundred dollars, especially if it is in good condition.

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Shoveling tips

Winter is upon us. And with winter come winter activities. Shoveling snow is one major winter activity in many parts of the United States. Although many consider shoveling a form of exercise — 15 minutes counts as moderate physical activity - you can increase your risk of an injury. Taking a few precautions while you are shoveling can help prevent unnecessary pain and suffering.

- If you have a history of heart problems or are inactive, talk to your doctor. There is an increase in the number of fatal heart attacks among shovelers.
- Warm up and stretch before you get started
- Drink plenty of water to keep yourself hydrated.
- Shovel only fresh snow. Freshly fallen, powdery snow is easier to shovel than the wet, packed-down variety.
- Push, don't lift. It's easier on your back and uses less energy than lifting.
- Pick the right shovel for you. Don't pick up too much at

- once. Use a small shovel, or fill only one-fourth or onehalf of a large one.
- Lift with your legs bent, not your back. Keep your back straight. By bending and "sitting" into the movement, you'll spine keep your less upright and stressed. Your shoulders, torso and thighs can do the work for
- Dress the part. Dress in layers; if you work up a sweat, you'll be able to remove some of those layers. Wear a hat and gloves to protect your extremities, wrap on a scarf and wear wool socks and waterproof boots to protect your body from the cold temperature.
- If your body is telling you to stop, listen to it. Stop if you feel pain or start seeing heart attack warning signs: chest pain; shoulder, neck or arm pain; dizziness, fainting, sweating or nausea; and/or shortness of breath. Get medical help immediately.

The joy of Christmas is found in sharing happiness with family and friends while trusting in the truth of the birth, life, and sacrifice of our Lord Jesus.



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

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

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Did you know?

The winter solstice takes place in December every year and marks the longest period of darkness in the Northern hemisphere. The summer solstice takes place concurrently in the Southern hemisphere at this time. The winter solstice does not last the entire day but is the point at which the sun is shining farthest to the south, directly over the Tropic of Capricorn. The sun also appears at the lowest point in the sky. Its noontime elevation seems to be the same for several days before and after the solstice. The solstice typically falls on Dec. 21 or Dec. 23 each year. Areas of the Northern hemisphere

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will experience only about nine hours of daylight on the solstice, while other areas that are farther north, such as Iceland and Nome, Alaska, may only have between four and seven hours of daylight. However, all areas above a latitude of 66.5 degrees north, including the Arctic Polar Circle, do not experience a sunrise during the solstice. While it may seem like winterdarkness will stretch on interminably, following the winter solstice, the days begin to gradually grow longer and the nights shorter.

In 2014, the winter solstice will occur on Sunday, Dec. 21.



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
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Safety tips for

As we become older we also become less able to defend ourselves or appear confident. Senior citizens are often the target of theft, robbery, or fraud. There are some helpful tips to help you to remain safe both in and outside of your home.

Safety at home

- Keep doors locked, both when you are home and when you are away.
- If someone knocks at your door, don't open the door unless you know your visitor.
- Have a peek hole installed in exterior doors if possible.
- If a person claims to be from a specific place, ask the person to show you identification either through a mail slot or by sliding it under the door. Refuse to open the door for those who cannot provide this information.
- If someone knocks at your door to ask to use the telephone, never open the door. Ask for the information and make the phone call for them.
- If someone comes to your door who you do not know or trust or who you feel may be dangerous, call your local police department or 911.
- Never hide a key to your home outside your door, such as under a mat, in a flower pot, or in the mail box. Burglars will know where to look!

Telephone safety

If you receive numerous "wrong number" calls, never allow yourself to engage in a conversation where you reveal your name, address, marital status, or any other information that

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senior citizens

might indicate you're alone or vulnerable. And NEVER give bank or credit card information over the phone even if the caller wants you to "verify" it.

Safety outside of the home

- Always be alert of your surroundings, especially in parking lots.
- Carry as little cash as possible at all times and carry any credit cards concealed. If you carry a purse, never carry it wrapped around your wrist. Rather, carry close to the front of your body. If you carry a wallet, try to avoid carrying it in a pocket that it could easily be removed from. If a burglar attempts to grab your purse or belongings, do not resist. Give the object to the burglar and never pursue the burglar. Make noise to alert bystanders!
- When approaching your vehicle, have your keys ready. It's a good idea to have your key in your hand before leaving the store. Before you get in your car, glance in the back seat and front seat to be sure. Once in the car, don't linger, especially putting money in your wallet. Lock your doors immediately and start your engine. Beware of papers stuck to your windshield. Do not exit your vehicle to remove anything on your windshield. Drive to a safe location first before getting out to see what it is.

Celebrating St. Nicholas Day at Fort Klock

Children and their families traveled from several counties to celebrate St. Nicholas Day at Fort Klock in St. Johnsville. The annual event has become a tradition for many families, with parents that had come to the event when they were youngsters now bringing their own children to visit with St. Nicholas and hear the story of how he became a legend.

The scent of hot cider, mulled with cloves, oranges and nutmeg added to the atmosphere, while Fort Klock volunteers and re-enactors of the Tryon County Militia dressed in attire appropriate for the time period, along with Colonial Christmas carols, brought about a feeling of reliving the past.

While some of the older children passed St. Nicholas by, the younger ones waited shyly to sit on his lap and tell him why they deserved presents this year. St. Nicholas reminded them that he was aware of both their good behavior and bad.

Each child received a dated, handmade wooden ornament.

"Every child who comes here gets a handmade ornament," remarked Eugene Wagner, who has played the role of St. Nicholas for many years. He said that he has seen some families that have been coming to the annual event for over 30 years.

The tradition of Santa Claus originated with St. Nicholas, who was born during the 3rd century in Patara on the southern coast of Turkey.

Nicholas came from wealthy parents and was raised as a devout Christian. His parents died while he was very young. Legend states that Nicholas chose to obey the words of Jesus to "sell what you own and give the money to the poor." Giving away his inheritance, he dedicated his life to serving God, assisting the needy, the

sick and the suffering, becoming Bishop of Myra at a young age. He was known for his generosity to the needy, his love for all children, and his deep concern for sailors and ships.

Nicholas died on Dec. 6, 343 and became the Patron Saint of Children. The anniversary of his death became known as St. Nicholas Day.

St. Nicholas Day was brought to this area by Mohawk Valley Dutch and Palatine German pioneers.

St. Nicholas Day is observed at Fort Klock on the first Sunday of each December.

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

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Holiday waste by the numbers

The holiday season generates a lot of waste, and many things contribute to this excess of trash this time of year.

- Thousands of paper and plastic shopping bags end up in landfills after the holiday season. Reusable cloth bags can limit the amount of bags tossed away, and users of plastic bags can recycle those bags at appropriate receptacles.
- Four million tons of waste is attributed to shopping bags and wrapping paper. Recycling paper or looking for reusable items in which to wrap gifts can cut down on paper waste.



Montgomery County Public Health wants everyone to be warm this winter, but we also want you to be while heating your homes during these cold, winter months ahead. Every year, many people get sick or die due to carbon monoxide poisonfrom alternate heating sources. Carbon monoxide (CO) is a poisonous gas that can kill you in min-utes. It is invisible, tasteless, odorless non-irritating. Carbon monoxide is produced from burning fuels such as wood, oil, natural gas, propane, gasoline and kerosene. Carbon monoxide is known as the "silent killer." It can prevent the body from getting oxygen. Symptoms can be flulike; nausea, headache, dizziness, shortness of breath, sleepiness and weaklarge amounts, carbon monoxide can cause loss of consciousness, brain damage death. Public Health suggests these safety tips to help prevent carbon monoxide poi-

 Make sure fuelburning appliances are properly installed, operated and serviced by qualified technicians according to the manufacturer's structions and local building codes.

Properly vent all fuel-burning appliances to the outside of the house and make sure the vents are not covered with snow, tarps or other items.

• Consider buying a vented space heater when replacing an unvented one.

Never use generator, portable gas or charcoal grill or portable fuel-burning camping equipment inside a home, building or shed.

• Open the fireplace damper before lighting a fire and don't close it until the ashes are cool.

 Move your idling car or truck outside the garage to warm

Never use gas appliances, such as stoves, ovens, or clothes dryers, to heat your home. Working carbon monoxide detector alarms provide you and your family with warning signals and critical time to escape your house in case of carbon monoxide incident. Place carbon monoxide alarms in a central location outside each sleeping area and on every level of your home. Test all alarms every month to make sure they are working properly. If you suspect carbon monoxide poisoning:





1. In nonreactive 3-quart saucepan, combine cranberries, raisins, brown sugar, water, vinegar, cinnamon stick, cloves and

Whatchamacallits



Ready your home for holiday guests



Things to consider before buying this holiday season

can resist a great deal. Whether it's heavily discounted merchandise on Black Friday or lastminute sales for shoppers who procrastinate, there are deals to be had from the start of the holiday season until its unofficial end sometime around New Year's Day.

But not all deals are what they seem. Many a shopper has swiped their card on a gift for a loved one only to find out later they overspent or didn't read the fine print and subjected themselves or their friends and family members to potentially costly fees. The following are a handful of things shoppers should consider before making any purchases this holiday season.

Restocking fees

As thoughtful as holiday gifts may be, many are ultimately returned. Recipients may already have similar items at home or find a particular gift does not suit their personal styles. Because returns are so common, shoppers should read the fine print before buying gifts to ensure their purchases are not subject to restocking fees if they

must be returned. Restocking fees can apply to any product, but they are most often applied to electronics. A restocking fee is a charge the person returning the gift must repay upon bringing the gift back to the store or mailing it back to the warehouse. Restocking fees often apply to items that are not returned in

their original factorysealed box, and these fees can be exorbitant, sometimes as much as 20 percent of the cost of the product. So before buying that big-ticket television appliance, holiday shoppers should ensure the item's recipient will not be subject to a considerable fee if he or she decides to return the gift.

Extended warranties

Many items come with manufacturer warranties that cover damaged items for a predetermined period of time. But many shoppers want to go the extra mile and buy extended warranties that protect the products for longer periods of time. While that's good in theory, studies from Consumer Reports have shown that products rarely break within the time period covered by extended warranties, meaning shoppers are simply buying a false sense of security they're unlikely to ever use. When considering an extended warranty, first research the product you want to buy by reading customer reviews of the product on popular sites such as Amazon.com. Such sites can offer valuable insight with regard to how reliable products are. If multiple reviewers note that a given product has never given them a reason to reconsider their purchase, then you likely don't need an extended warranty. If you still want

the extra protection, read the fine print of the extended warranty so you know just what it doesand does not cover.

Return policies

Because so many gifts are returned once the holidays have come and gone, it's important to understand a retailer's return policy before buying a gift for a friend or family member. In-store purchases may be subject to different return policies than items bought online, which may need to be returned via the mail, a potentially costly expense for the gift's recipient depending on the size of the gift. Try to shop only at stores with flexible, consumerfriendly return policies so your friend or family member does not have to jump through hoops just to return the gift.



How to simplify the process of returning gifts

Returns are an inconvenient reality of the holiday season. Whether you're returning clothes that don't fit or big-ticket items that don't suit your lifestyle, the idea of making those returns is unlikely to inspire enthusiasm. However, the following are a few ways to simplify the process of returning gifts so it goes as quickly and as smoothly as possible.

• Gingerly open packages. Much of the frustration associated with returning gifts can be traced to returning the items in boxes that were torn apart when opening the gifts. Before tearing into a package or removing tags from any clothing, consider the gift and if you think you might want to return it. Some stores will not allow returns unless packaging is completely intact, while some clothing retailers will only accept returns that include the original tags. So examine all gifts before you go tearing into any packaging so your initial excitement may impede your ability to return ultimately unwanted gifts.

- Don't delay a return. Men and women who wait to return an item may be making things more difficult on themselves. Some stores only allow returns for a predetermined number of days after the product is purchased, while others may not offer cash back after that period has expired. If you know you want to return a gift, do so soon after receiving the gift to minimize the headaches that come from procrastinating with regard to returning gifts.
- Bring the original receipt. When possible, bring the original receipt instead of just the gift receipt. Returns made with only a gift receipt may only be eligible for store credit or a retailer may not give you full credit for the amount spent on the gift. In the latter case, without the actual receipt, you likely won't know how much store credit you deserve or how much cash back you can expect.
- Know the return policy before visiting the store. Return lines can be long, and no one wants to finally

make it to the front of the line only to be told an item must be returned via the mail or that returns are subject to fees they don't want to pay. Save yourself the time and frustration of a failed return by researching the retailer's return policy before you head out to return any items.

Emphasize safety when buying gifts for children

Toys will once again be high on kids' wish lists this holiday season, when advertisements will highlight this year's most coveted gifts. But just because a particular toy is this year's must-have item does not mean it's the safest gift for kids of all ages.

According to the Consumer Product Safety Commission, there were an estimated 265,000 toy-related injuries treated at hospitals in the United States in 2012. Of those injuries, an estimated 72 percent happened to children younger than 15 years of age while 69 percent affected kids 12 years of age or younger. In addition, an estimated 34 percent of those injuries happened to children younger than five years of age. Many toy-related deaths were the result of drowning and asphyxia-

No one wants to think about injuries or deaths involving kids, but holiday shoppers must keep safety in mind when purchasing children's gifts to safeguard youngsters from injury.

Balloons

The CPSC notes that balloons are the leading cause of suffocation death in children. Children may swallow broken or uninflated balloons, which can then stick to the throat and airway, making it impossible to breathe. Holiday shoppers should avoid giving balloons to children age eight or younger. In addition, dispose of balloons if or when they deflate.

Painted toys

Lead paints and toys containing lead are not legal in North America, but that doesn't mean that imported toys are made in adherence to stringent safety guidelines. Before buying a toy, confirm that it is leadfree, as exposure to lead can cause serious neurological problems, especially in young children.

Button batteries

Button batteries, or the small-sized batteries found in some toys, watches and hearing aids, can be hazardous. Batteries can become stuck and cause chemical burns.

Adults should always verify that the battery compartments on children's toys are secured with screws. Other products that have remote controls may contain batteries that are not adequately secured. In addition to button batteries, AAA batteries, which are small, can be hazardous to kids.

Magnets

Small magnets can be swallowed and become

lodged in the digestive system of a child. If two or more magnets or a magnet and metal component are swallowed. they can attract to one another through intestinal walls. This can cause blockages, perforations and infections. Avoid toys that use small magnets, and check the CPSC website to ensure that mag-

- Store toys that belong to older children out of reach of younger kids.
- Don't buy toys with removable parts that can be swallowed.

- Only buy stuffed toys that are washable.
- Graciously decline hand-me-down toys that may not meet current safety standards.











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

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
