Labor Day

Just as Memorial Day has become the unofficial start of summer, Labor Day has become the unofficial end of summer. The date looms, circled in red, on calendars hanging on refrigerators and office walls everywhere. People take their last vacation days of summer, some close up their camps for the season, and some have a barbecue.

Approximately 55 percent of the country fire up barbecue grills to celebrate Labor Day. The average household spent about \$700 over Labor Day weekend. But, most people don't know what they're really celebrating.

While many correlate Labor Day to great sales at furniture shops, car dealerships, and other stores, the holiday is more than summer's Black Friday. The holiday started in 1882 and became a federal holiday in 1894. Labor Day was officially proposed as "A street

parade to exhibit to the public "the strength and spirit de corps of the trade and labor organizations" followed by a festival for the workers and their families."


We're supposed to be celebrating the 155.7 million workers (people over the age of 16) in the work force of the USA. Aproximately 5.7 million workers commute to work. The average time stuck in your car, train, or bus on the way to work is a mind numbing 25.5 minutes. Once we're at work we spend an average of 8.6 hours toiling away.

The labor movement is responsible for such modern amenities as the 8 hour work day, 40 hour work week, safe work places, and fair pay. Did you know that a big moment of labor history happened here in the Mohawk Valley? Just over 100 years ago there was a big labor strike in Little Falls, NY. Affectionately known as the Little Falls Textile Strike of 1912,

approximately 700 workers, mostly immigrant women, stopped working in the textile mills of Little Falls to protest working conditions and a cut in pay. The strike lasted from Oct. 9, 1912 to Jan. 4, 1913. Seven hundred local workers fought for better work conditions right here in Little Falls.

I hope this Labor Day, you were able to take a second between cheeseburgers and great sales deals to reflect for a moment on the workers; the workers that came before and built this great country. The 146 workers who perished in the Triangle Shirtwaist Factory Fire. All the workers who suffered while striking for better pay or better working conditions. The strength and determination that build our great country. The future workers and the great accomplishments they will make.

Now get back to work.

Pee Wee's in the stew

On the afternoon of the 21st day, the first chick began to chip away at its shell so that a tiny hole appeared. I was amazed to hear the chick peeping even before the shell was broken. Then another crack appeared in another egg and then another. In a couple of hours three chicks were stumbling around like drunken sailors. After that, the hatching seemed to stall. Many of the eggs had cracks that eventually became holes but progress was slow if at all. In one case I could see movement inside the tiny hole but the chick didn't appear to be making any progress in chipping his way out of the shell. I was worried that it was too thick and that the chick would wear out its tooth which is mounted on the top of the beak like a rhino's horn. I consulted Vaughn and McNulty, two local experts and

they advised me to let nature take its course. After many hours, movement stopped inside the shell and the chick, having warn out its tooth, died as I looked on. This happened with several more eggs and when I did an autopsy, many of the chicks appeared to be fully developed. Other eggs hadn't developed at all and the chalazae, a jelly like substance that my friend, Brooklyn Bob, used to make his mother remove from his breakfast eggs, was still in tact. I was thinking that either the chicks were too weak or the eggshells were too strong. Finally there was only one cracked egg left with the chick actively trying to enlarge the hole it started but again progress was negligible. I decided to give the struggling newcomer a little help and opened the hole minimally with



Alabama woman, 92, works to protect bees, butterflies

SELMA, AL (AP) — Alabama's Capitol has been the scene of raucous behavior at times, but smiles abounded in the state Senate during a friendly "invasion" three decades ago.

The leader wasn't a legislator, but she was an expert when it came to gentle persuasion and guile to get the state to honor a flying bug.

Mallieve Breeding not only got the Legislature to designate the Eastern Tiger Swallowtail as the State Butterfly, she also won approval for Selma to become the "Butterfly Capital of Alabama."

How did Breeding, known to many people in Selma as "Madame Butterfly," turn a part-time hobby into an important part of her life?

Well, the secret is finally out. She admitted that she didn't know beans about butterflies back in 1982, but she was worried about something else that she felt might negatively affect America.

Pollination pollution. That's what got her dander up. The more she studied, the more her concern grew until she took the lead to bring attention to butterflies and their entomological importance.

A devoted member of the local garden club, she had read a report that butterflies and bees were in danger of potential extinction due to increased use of herbicides, insecticides and other agricultural poisons that also touch shrubs, flower beds and other greenery.

As she headed to Montgomery in 1982 to accept a state resolution honoring the butterfly and Selma, she let everyone within listening distance know that a two-year campaign had been launched by national garden club federations to focus on the "plight of the

"There has been a noticeable lessening of their numbers and this has become a great concern to all environmental groups who love not only the beauty of the butterfly but realize its importance in nature's balance," she said that day.

Recently, she said the situation hasn't improved much, "and I'm still worried about what might happen if we don't protect our pollinators."

"A world without butterflies would mean not only a great loss of beauty but would surely affect our survival," she said. "The butterfly is a major pollinator that is essential to create seeds and fruits.

Age and infirmities have slowed her down quite a bit in recent years, but she doesn't plan to stop her call for greater protection of butterflies and bees.

One look out her expansive kitchen window can testify to that environmental commitment. Birds of all sizes, shapes and colors zoom around her trees while squirrels scamper up and down the trunks and branches.

Then there are the butterflies. If ever there is a haven for them in Selma, it's her backyard, where hummingbirds have invitations to rest a spell on her


When it came to picking a specific butterfly to be honored, she and her garden club friends opted for the Eastern Tiger Swallowtail. She said it's because they are Alabama butterflies by choice as opposed to Monarch butterflies — pretty but "just visitors passing

Recent years have not been kind to Mallieve. She's had two broken hips, strokes, back problems and a heart attack.

Selma has gone out of its way to recognize her, and she appreciates it. A butterfly garden was built outside a local school and named for her. Last December, she was in the city's inaugural course. she was in the city's inaugural group of honorees selected as "Golden Gate Builders.

It was the latest in a long line of honors for a greatgrandmother who will celebrate her 92nd birthday.

with a pair of tweezers. Fluid began to ooze from the area I had disturbed. The chick was still trying to break out but wasn't making any progress. One warning I got about interfering with the opening of the egg was that the chick would become dehydrated. This bird looked like he was going belly up like the others so I felt I had nothing to lose.

I brought a bowl of warm water out to the coop, dipped the partially opened egg into it and with the chick's head above water, began to peel away the rest of the shell which seemed to contain a placenta-like membrane. When finished, I put the chick on the floor of the incubator and it just lay there hardly moving. It didn't seem to have much life in it but every once in a while it would move spastically. Later the membrane that was still attached to it was stuck to the wire floor restricting the chick's movement. I cut it off, just like the umbilical cord is cut from a human. This seemed to allow for more movement and the little black bird began to flap and thrash around. Meanwhile, his buff siblings who were almost a day older were well coordinated, much bigger and walking around easily. I started calling the little black chick Pee Wee. A few days later he was so much smaller than his siblings that he constantly tried to get under their wings as though they were mothers. In spite of Alice's protests I had the birds set up in a clear plastic box in the kitchen so that they saw a lot of me and became used to being handled. Earn college credit for hiking Appalachian Trail

EMORY, VA (AP) — On a bright day late last year, a couple of friends and I tore off on the trail: the Appalachian Trail, to be exact. And it was not in Washington County, VA, but the Washington County of Maryland.

Michelle Kershner, the marketing director for nearby Frederick County, MD, got a big kick out of getting out of our vehicle and getting in the woods. So did Chris Haugh, the scenic byway and special projects manager for Frederick County.

I suppose Haugh and Kershner got a jolt of getaway fever because they were hiking into the next county - a place not called Frederick. As for me, I simply had fun being on the same trail that passes through my beloved Washington County, VA.

I have hiked just bits and pieces of the fabled AT. Yet I have interviewed many who have tackled the entire trail, which runs from Georgia north to Maryland and eventually into Maine.

To reach the true alpha and omega of the AT, you have to go all the way north to Mount Katahdin in Maine and south to Springer Mountain in Georgia.

Kasi Quinn did it. So did J.B. "Jason" Hibbitts. Both also came back to Emory, VA, and reported on their hikes — even earning college credit through a program called Semester-A-Trail Emory & Henry College.

Jim Harrison, the college's director of outdoor programming, calls this "a special studies opportunity that allows degreeseeking students to attempt a thru-hike of the Appalachian Trail while remaining fully enrolled in an academic semester."

Get to know Harrison:

Harrison has the field experience a student should envy: He thruhiked the AT in 1997. "To backpack from Maine to Georgia turns out to be way more difficult than anyone thinks it will be," Harrison said, "but it

Today, this program is listed in the course catalog at Emory & Henry:

"The Semester-A-Trail Program offers students the opportunity to build independent studies and projects with broadened field-based implications. Student hikers have developed imaginative projects across the curriculum in ecotourism, human physiology, water quality, wellness, and photography."

It sounds both fun and serious.

"It would be easy for a student interested in economics, for example, to examine-explore the AT corridor's economic impact on trail towns, and to do this in context is cutting edge scholarship," Harrison suggested.

Students have to be ready, of course, to incur costs — what Hibbitts estimates is \$1 a mile for a trail spanning more than 2,000 miles.

Participants in the Semester-A-Trail Program cannot embark on their trip any earlier than the spring semester of their sophomore year. They must also be certified in CPR and have completed Physical Education 164, Hiking/Backpacking, with a B or better, among other requirements.

Still, all of the above is not scaring away Will Leigh, 18, a student from Hamilton, VA.

Leigh plans to thruhike on the trail during 2014 in Semester-A-Trail.

"Thru-hiking the AT has been something that has inspired me since I was a young Boy Scout doing overnighters with my troop on the trail," Leigh said. "As I have grown a little older, the

trail has been there punctuating the beginnings and endings in my life. There have been few summers since freshmen year of high school that I have not done a solo hike on the AT."

It has been nearly a 🖁 decade since Hibbitts completed his thru-hike. He now serves as a trail ambassador for the Town of Damascus and also works as an adjunct $\overline{\omega}$ professor at King University in Bristol. And, this 2001 graduate of Honaker High School has advice for anyone contemplating the long haul on the Appalachian Trail - not just moseying through a meadow, like I did in Maryland.

"It's going to be the most challenging experience of your life," Hibbitts said. "But, it's also going to be the most rewarding."

Q: Our garden is producing an overabundance of cucumbers this year. I thought I might try pickling some of them, but I'm not sure where to start. **≝** Any ideas?

A: First, if the cucumbers you're growing aren't <u>∞</u> a suitable variety for pickling, you might be disappointed in the results. Pickling cucumbers are usually smaller than cucumbers grown for slicing, and they tend to have thicker, bumpier skins. But if you want to try, your first decision will be whether you want to make fermented pickles, which are pickled from lactic acid in a fermentation process over three to four weeks in a crock or other suitable container. or quick-process pickles, which are pickled from acetic acid from vinegar in a process that takes just a few days.

If you have a burpless variety growing in your garden, go for the quick process, because burpless varieties produce an enzyme at maturity that causes pickles to soften during fermentation. Always choose smaller cucumbers — they make crisper pickles.

You can find detailed guidance for pickling cucumbers (and other vegetables) in the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Complete Guide to Home Canning, available online from the University of Georgia's National Center for Home Food Preserva-

• Pay strict attention to guidelines, process in a water bath according to canner recipe directions. Otherwise, your pickles may spoil or, worse, cause food poisoning.

• Always trim about a quarter-inch from the blossom end of the cucumber to prevent pickles from softening.



# How to get approved for a mortgage

Real estate professionals say the market is rebounding, and many would-be home buyers are eagerly awaiting their opportunities to purchase their own homes. Fresh data indicates that the inventory of properties is quickly drying up and soon the market is poised to point in the sellers' fa-

According to Allen & Associates, a real estate appraisal, consultant and research firm based in Colorado, properties in the area listed for sale are below the six-month supply of inventory. Now could be the time to get a good deal on a home, provided buyers are able to secure mortgages.

No matter how many affordable homes are available, if a buyer cannot get approved for a mortgage, then his or her chances of owning a home are slim. In the wake of a tumultuous economy, many lenders tightened restrictions on mortgage lending. And even though the economy has rebounded, many lenders have continued to follow strict guidelines before lending money. In order to secure a mortgage

with a good interest rate, buyers must take control of their financial situations and fix problems that could lead to loan reiection.

Many things can impact a mortgage application. Here are the ways to overcome liabilities and improve your standing with prospective lenders.

• Know your credit rating. Your credit rating is a score that lenders rely on when deciding whether or not to approve your mortgage application. The higher the credit rating, the more attractive you look to prospective lenders. But the lower your score is, the more difficulty you will have getting a loan. Should you get a loan with a low score, you may have to pay a higher interest rate than someone with better credit. Prior to making any big financial decisions, such as applying for a mortgage, it is vital to find out your credit score. You can request a free copy of your credit report, which includes your credit score, once a year from the three major credit reporting agencies in the United

States and Canada: TransUnion, Experian and Equifax. You also can pay for your credit repor.

- · Address any issues on your report. Once you know your score, you can take steps to address any issues on the report. Pay down revolving consumer debts, such as credit card balances and auto loans. Report any errors on your credit report so they can be adjusted. Pay bills on time and address any notices of collections before they make it onto your permanent record. If you will be applying for a loan soon, avoid opening any other credit accounts for the time being.
- Maintain steady employment. Having a job is often vital to getting a mortgage. Lenders tend to look for long-term financial stability, which is best illustrated by maintaining steady employment. Jumping from job to job may be a red flag to lenders, so it's better to make a switch after you have been approved for a
- Save, save, save. Having more money in the bank lowers your loan-to-

value ratio, or LTV. This  $\vec{\omega}$ will make you appear less . risky to lenders. Individuals who have saved for a considerable down pay- 8 ment on a home are also seen in a better light.

- Make sure you have a credit history. Some people are too cautious with their credit and think closing accounts or avoiding . credit entirely will make g them more attractive to lenders. But this can backfire. Lenders will want to see a strong credit history that indicates your ability to pay your debts on time.
- Get a cosigner. If you are uncertain about your ability to secure a loan on your own, then consider a cosigner to make you more attractive to prospective lenders. The cosigner helps guarantee the lender that your mortgage payments will be made.

People looking to buy a home in the near future must make themselves attractive to mortgage lenders, many of whom are still reluctant to approve loans for candidates without strong financial backgrounds.

# Home improvement projects recouping more at resale

In its annual Cost vs. Value Report that compares the cost for 35 popular remodeling projects with the value those projects retain at resale. Remodeling magazine found that the overall average cost-value ratio has improved for the first time in six years. Cost-recouped percentages increased for all 35 projects examined for the 2013 survey, a remarkable turnaround from just a year earlier, when only three of the 35 projects saw an increase in cost-recouped percent-

Replacement projects proved especially beneficial for homeowners, who likely also benefitted from a real estate market that finally started to stabilize after an extended period of economic uncertainty that heavily influenced both buyers and sellers.

While an economy on the rebound no doubt benefitted homeowners looking to recoup as much of their home improvement investment at resale as possible, other factors likely contributed as well.

For example, homeowners surveyed for the 2013 report who added a backup power generator recouped more of their investment than in previous years. That's likely because heavily publicized storms, such as Superstorm Sandy in late 2012, have forced homeowners and prospective homeowners to place a greater emphasis on being prepared for such storms.

Among the upscale projects surveyed, none recouped more of a homeowner's investment than replacing existing siding with fiber-cement siding. Homeowners who financed such a project recouped 79.3 percent of the project's cost, placing it just ahead of a garage door replacement, which recouped an average of 75.2 percent of its cost.






