Silo salesman with a sledgehammer

Over the years, Paul Sarafin had come to believe that silos

were like barometers. "When the economic weather for farming was good they went up," he

says. "And when it was bad, they often came down — sold secondhand to someone looking for a buy.'

Sarafin, 70, lives near Richfield Springs, and had been in the silo business for almost 50 years.

At first he built them for the now-terminated Harder Silo Company out of Glens Falls, but after several years of wrestling with the heavy hoops and staves he was promoted to salesman.

In recent years, because of hard times, it had become more and more difficult for Sarafin to make a sale. He says that a farmer who already had the bill collectors on his back was more than reluctant to go into hock for an average \$25,000 concrete stave silo.

But back then a silo was the only solution for a rainy summer when a farmer couldn't string a couple of sunny days together to dry out hay to be stored in the mow. Bailed and stored too wet, hav can heat up from evaporation resulting in spontaneous combustion and a barn fire.

Similar to a canning jar, a silo would preserve grass or corn even when they were not pre-dried, thus enabling a farmer to deal with a wet summer.

For several years, the sales competition had been so fierce that Sarafin considered it a near miracle when he sold one of his silos, which could be distinguished from other brands by the alternating red to plain blocks at the top. His sales pitch was that he had no pitch - just a homespun, direct but patient approach.

"Sometimes I'd visit a farm six or seven times thinking I was softening a farmer up only to find a competitor's silo standing against the barn the next time I'd show," he recalls.

More than a decade ago, with one son in college and the other recently married, Sarafin was under extra financial pressure. Often, to ensure a sale, he'd offer perks like free hardware or repairs to another existing silo. It was late in the season and he thought he was going to lose a sale outside of Sharon Springs, so he

offered to demolish John Burr's old, warn-out 50foot silo for free. That sealed the deal.

Normally the demolition would incur some out-of-pocket expenses to purchase dynamite or to rent a bulldozer, but to cut costs, Sarafin used a unique approach which required one simple tool — a sledgehammer.

"I knew how to build them strong and I knew how to make them weak," he says.

But silos don't fall like trees and even though the salesman had done this job several times before, the outcome was still unpredictable and dangerous. The many tons of concrete could fall back onto the barn, or worse, catch and crush him as he scrambled to get clear.

"Unlike trees that creak and groan before they fall," Sarafin says, "silos let loose all at once."

So, with tuition and wedding bells in the back of his mind and a flimsy cable anchoring the top of the silo to a tractor, Sarafin went to work loosening the bottom support hoops.

Then he began to break out the concrete staves with the sledgehammer as Burr and his family looked on. When Sarafin had broken out more than an 8-foot hole in the silo wall, it didn't even quiver. He was banking on the whole thing falling across the section he was demolishing. After several minutes of hammering he stopped to look up at the top.

He seemed a little nervous.

No sign of movement.

Sarafin began hammering again, the heavy blows echoing inside the silo. He broke out several more feet and then suddenly threw the hammer to the side. The immense structure leaned towards the cut, pulverizing concrete and making it explode under the shifting weight.

Sarafin bolted as the silo let loose and fell in a thunderous heap. When the dust cleared it revealed a benign pile of rubble.

Later the silo slayer said this was the last silo he would demolish with a sledgehammer — but then he had said the same thing two silos before and new expenses were bound to be coming soon.

After Harder went out of business, Sarafin worked at a foam packing plant in Fort Plain and free-lanced at silo repair and supply during off-time and on weekends.

When asked if he saw himself as some kind of modern day hero, Sarafin, now retired and planning to winter in Florida, smiled and said simply, "I put bread on the table." laugh in unison with complete strangers in a movie theatre. It's a bond that crisscrosses through different age groups and stretches throughout all of the corners of the world. Even if you have nothing in common with that person, there is still some type of inherent human bond that makes us want to help others when needed and smile at them when they look like they might be down. It's that part of our conscience that, in a word, makes us human.

From an early age, we are told that the little things in life are what make it so sweet. And when it comes down to it, those little things are really what make our human bond.

Dad's bike invention advances in Walmart contest

JEFFERSONVILLE, IN (AP) — Joe Clevinger's kids had a problem. While riding their bikes through the neighborhood, the three girls heard the deep throttle of some Harley motorcycles. Enchanted by the mechanical roar, they wanted their own bicycles to mimic the noise. Only, the kids weren't quite sure how to do it.

Luckily, their father has a way with inventing things. To solve the conundrum, Clevinger constructed the "Wheel Popper," a metal device with a plastic flap that attaches to a bicycles' wheel dropout and creates a loud motor-like

sound when ridden.

"Ever since there were bicycles ... and there was a child, he was trying to figure out how to put a motor on the bike," the Jeffersonville resident told the News and Tribune (http://bit.ly/14dQMQC). "I did when I was a kid. We had fenders on our bikes though. We'd hook a clothespin and a card to it and it would hold it. But the new bikes don't have fenders anymore."

What began as a family project has turned into something more for Clevinger. He quickly discovered no other products delivered quite the same results as his Wheel Popper did. Unlike similar inventions, this doesn't wear down the

bike tires, cause increased strain on the pedals or easily slip out of position.

"People have tried but most of this stuff they come up with just mounts (higher on the fork) and rubs on the wheel and has a tendency to move," he said. "This stays in place."

After obtaining a provisional patent, Clevinger entered his invention into Walmart's "Get on the Shelf" contest. In its second year, the competition accepts a wide range of product ideas from budding American entrepreneurs and inventors. Once the entries make the initial cut, the public then votes online for their favorites. Winners receive an opportunity to

sell their items at Walmart.com, while the overall champion has the chance to market their creations in actual Walmart stores across the nation.

At the beginning of August, Clevinger received notification that the Wheel Popper cleared the first hurdle. His invention had been selected to progress to the second round of the competition in the "For Kids" category. Now his advancement to the next stage depends on how many votes his invention receives online.

More than just a fun noisemaker, the Wheel Popper can also have a practical application. Drivers pay attention to bicyclists when they hear the loud noise. This, the 51-year-old inventor said, reduces the chance of a child getting hit by a passing car.

"It's a safety thing. They hear them coming. With more and more people not paying attention while they're driving, you're more apt to turn your head if you hear an unusual noise," Clevinger said.

"When I was riding my bike, every kid was looking at my wheel thinking it's kind of awesome to have one," said 13 yearold Brianna Clevinger. "My dad said just give them one but if you want another one it will be five bucks though."

So far, the local handyman hasn't yet sold his invention to the public.

With a please and thank you, children in the neighborhood have received the item for free so they can try it out on their own bikes. It's Clevinger's way of doing market analysis. When they do go on sale, the price for the product will run between \$7 and \$10, with each piece having a guarantee.

Regardless if the item races off the shelves, Clevinger said his children already have gained knowledge from the invention. All understand the science behind the product, and that in itself is a win.

"We're promoting it for (the kids)," he said. "It's all for them. It's because of them that I came up with the idea."

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Six vehicle warning signs your nose can recognize

should never ignore. Identifying these suspect smells early on can help

says the Car Care Coun-

"Unusual smells can

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there is no harmful damage to your car," said Rich White, executive director, Car Care Council.

The Car Care Council recommends a sniff test of your vehicle to identify any unusual smells, including the following six warning signs:

- 1. The smell of burnt rubber could be slipping drive belts or misplaced loose hoses that might be rubbing against rotating accessory drive pulleys. Do not reach in if the engine compartment is hot.
- 2. The smell of hot oil could mean that oil is leaking onto the exhaust system. To verify the leak, look for oil on the pavement or smoke coming from the engine area.
- 3. The smell of gasoline is likely the sign of a gas leak in some area of the vehicle such as a fuel injector line or the fuel tank. Any smell of fuel can result in a possible fire hazard, so immediate attention should be given.
- 4. The sweet smell of syrup may be a sign that your car is leaking en-

brake trouble and a safety hazard. Have your brakes checked right away, especially if this smell is happening during normal driving conditions.

6. The smell of rotten eggs is never a good one and, if you smell it coming from your vehicle, it could mean a problem with your catalytic converter not converting the hydrogen sulfide in the exhaust to sulfur dioxide properly. This smell can also be attributed to a poor running engine, causing the catalytic converter to become overloaded and fail due to meltdown.

"When you smell any peculiar odor, you should not ignore it. Instead bring your vehicle to a professional service technician that you trust to get an informed opinion on the nature of the odor," concluded White.


This argument could be wrong unless the study material the test is based on is so narrow and channeled as to render it useless except to furnish the answers for that test.

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





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Exotic animals feeding time for Ohio animals, a spread of doughnuts, hot dogs

ary. Ohio's agriculture department then looks for permanent housing for the critters in sanctuaries or zoos.

Groceries and supplies for the temporary boarders have topped \$1,025 since the end of May, according to receipts obtained through a public records request.

Items included a 20inch jungle ball for the bears bought online for \$225 and five, 5-foot kiddie pools for alligators from Wal-Mart for about \$74.

While spices herbs are similar in their use, they are distinguished by a few key differences, mostly related to the plant each comes from.

A spice is a dried seed, fruit, root, bark, or vegetative substance used for flavoring or coloring foods. Herbs, on the other hand, are parts of leafy green plants also used for flavoring but sometimes as a tasteless garnish.

Spices and herbs share a historic sacredness, as well. Even today, they are often used for religious ceremonies or antibiotic and medicinal uses

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
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HUD makes changes to reverse mortgage program

In a move to help HUD manage risk to the Federal Housing Administration's Mutual Mortgage Insurance Fund (MMIF), HUD makes major changes to the Home Equity Conversion Mortgage (HECM) program, including consolidation of the HECM Standard and HECM Saver programs into one.

The changes were initiated after homeowners selecting lump-sum payments rather than periodic payouts strained the MMIF. Seniors depleted their assets quickly and could not keep pace with property taxes and insurance payments.


The changes authorized by the Reverse Mortgage Stabilization Act of 2013 include updates to the initial mortgage insurance premiums and principal limit factors and restrictions on the amount of money borrowers may draw down at closing and

during first 12 months following closing.

Changes also include requirement of a financial assessment for all borrowers to ensure they will have the capacity and willingness to meet all their financial obligations and terms of the reverse mortgages, and a requirement of a set-aside at closing for payment of property taxes and insurance based on the results of the financial assessment.

The financial assess-

ment and property charge grequirements become effective for all loans with case numbers assigned on or after Jan. 13, 2014. Changes to initial disbursement limits, single disbursement lump sum payment option, initial mortgage insurance premiums, Principal Limit Factor Tables, and initial mortgage insurance premium calculations for refinance transactions are effective for case numbers assigned on or after Sept.





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
