


Young athletes lined up to try their hand at the Rockwall Climbing activity at Fort Plain's 2013 annual 4th on the 3rd celebration.

A neighbor was overheard saying "I finally found one thing in common with my teenagers. They listen to rock groups and I listen to political speeches and neither of us understands a word they are saying."



One of the features of the U.S. Open is how tall its "rough" grass is.

Even the pros have trouble with it. Their ability to escape is helped by their tremendous clubhead speed, which most amateurs can't match. When the ball is nestled in deep rough, the grass will wrap around the club's hosel at impact, slowing it and closing the clubface so that there's not nearly enough loft to get the ball out. When in

to get the ball out. When in the rough, assess the lie, then chose an iron that has a loft two clubs higher than you need. For example, if you think you can get out with a 5-iron, use a 7-iron. The ball will come out lower and with more roll than usual, so you'll need to practice this shot.



Montgomery County HAM Radio Field Day

The Mohawk Valley Amateur Radio Association had their 7th annual field day this past weekend. Seven members participated, setting up two radio towers and manning them for almost 20 hours, with the event starting on Saturday afternoon, going throughout the night and all the way to Sunday. The Mohawk Valley ARA is just one of the many HAM clubs in the official ARRL organization, which spans the country.


HAM radios and their operators are vital communication for fire departments and other emergency organizations when all other forms of communications are down during big emergencies. This includes natural disasters and other situations where regular phone lines and cell towers are either down or jammed.

The Mohawk Valley chapter was started in 1999 at the request of Gary Nestle as the nation was preparing for Y2K and the communication chaos the event was thought to bring.

For most, this is an event that's part competition, part emergency drill, and part picnic. The competition end of the event is done by seeing how many other HAM's you can contact within the weekend, each contact gains points for the

team. By Sunday morning, the team had already made up to 60 contacts. Ken Gies, who has been working with HAM's for the past 30 years was able to make contact with radios in states that included Virginia, Georgia, and most of the North East. "It's really cool to be able to talk with someone across the country just by using a few wires." He has passed down the love for this short wave communication to his son Jeremy who has been a member of the club for the past three years. "It's a lot of fun to make these different contacts, and it's just really cool."

Current chapter president Rusty Seastrum, call sign KE2EW, has been a part of the volunteer fire department for the past 37 years and is also the RACES NET Manager for New York State. He got involved with HAM's by working with other local emergency organizations and can recall a recent ice storm where HAM's were used to communicate between local emergency units while regular phone lines were down. Tom Lennord, call sign N1YR, can also recall the event and how big of a help the HAM's were to the local emergency response teams, stating that the organization's motto "When all else fails," rings true in times such as that.







Senior News: Don't be fooled by fancy title

A recent report to Congress by the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau details the many problems seniors have in determining whether financial advisers are genuine.

The long title of the report was "Senior Designations for Financial Advisers: Reducing Consumer Confusion and Risks of the Broker or the Investment Adviser." It focuses on the special credentials that are used to market senior financial services.

Here are a few examples:

At least 50 different "senior designation" credentials are used market to advisers' services, all designed to confuse us. Some of those titles and acronyms sound similar others or imply a legitimacy that isn't real, such as "Registered Senior Investment Adviser." The report says that "all too often, these are just clever marketing ploys to bait the hook."

Those senior designation credentials give the impression that advisers have specialized training or expertise in dealing with the finances of seniors. The report notes that there's a big difference between a college-level course and a weekend seminar.

There's no oversight or enforcement for the use of those designations. Another study showed that, unfortunately, seniors are more likely to rely on someone who uses one of those senior designations.


Seniors are the targets of financial marketing, since it's assumed we have loads of retirement savings, inheritance money and equity. We're invited to "free lunch" seminars, which are ways to

get us in one place to sell us financial products.

To report violators, call whistleblower line at 855-695-7974, send an email to whistleblower@consumerfinance.gov. The CFPB even has an Office of Financial Protection for Older Americans, so it has our best interests in mind.

Flood Safety

Do not walk through flowing water. Drowning is the number one cause of flood deaths, and most occur during flash floods. Six inches of flowing water can knock you off your feet.

Do not drive through a flooded area. More people drown in their cars than anywhere else. Don't drive around road barriers; the road or bridge may be washed out.

Stay away from power lines and electrical wires. Electricity can travel through water. Report downed power lines to your utility company or local emergency manager.

Turn off your electricity when you return home from evacuation. Some appliances, such as television sets, can shock you even after they have been unplugged. Don't use appliances or motors that have gotten wet unless they have been taken apart, cleaned and dried.

Watch for animals, especially snakes. Small animals that have been flooded out of their home may have sheltered in yours. Use a pole or a stick to poke and turn over items or scare away small animals.

Look before you step. After a flood, the ground and floors are covered with debris including broken bottles and glass. Floors and stairs that have been covered in mud can be very slippery.

Be alert for gas leaks. Use a flashlight to inspect for damage. Don't smoke or use can-

dles, lanterns or open flames unless you are sure that the gas has been turned off and the area has been aired out. Carbon monoxide exhaust kills. Use generators and other gas powered machinery outdoors. Use camp stoves and charcoal grills outdoors.

Clean everything that got wet. Flood waters have picked up sewage and chemicals from roads, farms, and storage buildings. Spoiled food and flooded cosmetics and medications are health hazards. When in doubt throw them out.

Take good care of yourself. Recovering from a flood is a big job. It is tough on the body and spirit. The effects a disaster has on you and your family may last a long time. Some helpful tips are to keep the family together, discuss your problems, rest often and eat well. Set a manageable schedule and watch for signs of stress and seek help.

Small adjustments can make a big difference

(NAPSA) — Here's news many parents may care to keep an eye on: At schools around the country, teachers are increasingly incorporating 3-D imaging, digital devices and the latest computer applications into their teaching tools. What's more, according to the American Optomet-Associa-tion's (AOA) latest American Eye-Q survey, 60 percent of parents estimate their child spends up to four hours a day looking at the screen of a computer, video game, MP3 player or handheld electronic device.

The problem

Unfortunately, prolonged use of these technologies can cause eyestrain, headaches, fatigue, burning or tired eyes, loss of focus, blurred vision, double vision or head and neck pain. The AOA calls this condition computer vision syndrome (CVS).

What to do

Parents and teachers can help students avoid CVS by encouraging them to follow the 20-20-20 rule. When using technology or doing near work, take a 20-second break every 20 minutes and view something 20 feet away. Studies show that people need to rest their

eyes to keep them moist.

Plus, staring off into the distance helps the eyes from locking into a closeup position.

Additional ways to reduce CVS include:

- Position the computer monitor or handheld device slightly below eye level. Ideally, a screen should be 15 to 20 degrees below eye level (about four or five inches) as measured from the center of the screen and 20 to 28 inches from the eyes.
- Avoid screen glare, particularly from overhead lighting or windows.
- Blink frequently to keep the front surface of the eye moist.
- Most importantly, students should see a doctor of optometry for a comprehensive examination prior to early in each school year ensure their eyes are healthy and functioning properly. Early detection and treatment are key in correcting vision problems and helpstudents see ing clearly.

Paw's Corner

Canine parvovirus
can kill puppies
Dear Paw's Cor-

ner: Please encourage your readers to get their dogs vaccinated against the parvovirus. This summer, the virus seems to be everywhere in my area. My two dogs are vacregularly, cinated and I'm keeping them inside and from other away dogs for now, just in case. — Dolores in Fort Worth, Texas

Dear Dolores:
Absolutely! Diseases like canine parvovirus can spread rapidly among dogs that live close together, such as in shelters or kennels.

So it is very important to keep your dog's vaccinations up to date. If you're not sure whether your dog was vaccinated against this deadly virus, contact your veterinarian.

Puppies are the most vulnerable to one form of parvovirus that attacks their heart muscles, which can kill them. So vaccinating puppies that are between 6 weeks


and 6 months old is critically important.

Adult dogs tend to suffer from the more common intestinal form of parvo: They'll experience lethargy, vomiting, diarrhea and weight loss. It quickly can cause severe dehydration, so you must get a sick dog to the veterinarian right away.

The virus is transmitted through direct contact with dogs, infected or through eating infected stool gross, but it happens. In addition to vaccinating dog, keep your yard clear of dog feces and don't let your dog sniff or eat other dog's stools.

Ιf you plan to board your dog at a kennel, ask owner if there are procedures in place prevent parvo transmission (such as making sure all dogs have their shots before allowing them), and take a tour to make sure the facility is clean well and maintained.

Flooding event information

Make an emergency supply kithave enough food, water, medication, and other necessities to sustain you, your family and pets for at least 7-10 days.

Notify a friend or family member that lives out of the area if you have to evacuate or relocate.

Listen to directions and emergency instructions issued by your local county emergency officials.

Keep the power off until an electrician has inspected your system for safety.

Electric. plumbing and sanitary systems in your house may have been damaged or affected by the flood. This may affect indoor quality. If you smell natural gas or sulfur odors DO NOT ENTER THE BUILD-ING. Call 911.

Boil water until authorities tell you that your water supply is safe.

If you have more oil than can be absorbed by a few absorbent pads you must contact the DEC Spills Hotline-1-800-457-7362 to request assistance. Do not start oil fired furnaces or boilers until they are checked by a service technician.

If your home suffered damage, call your insurance agent to file a claim. Take photos of any flood water in your home and items you have to dispose of, make a list of damaged or lost items and keep an inventory.

Flood waters may contain substances that are harmful to your health. Keep your skin clean by washing with soap and disinfected or boiled water.

Amasa Belknap, the Cherry Valley gunsmith, 1786-1874

As the writer of this story looks from the heights on the north side of the Mohawk, he is captivated by the majestic Cherry Valley hills. Then too he clearly remembers that some of his own roots lie there in the Cherry Valley region. Probably no one really knows why a young boy becomes a collector. Why does he cherish local history? Is it a natural course of events that even as young as 12 years the firearms that are entwined in our Mohawk Valley history are a special interest? If you can answer this question, the search for the history of and desire to find the products made by Amasa Belknap, the Cherry Valley gunsmith, might be better understood.

Lets follow this once young collector as he studies Amasa Belknap and his day and age. He first heard the name Belknap from his great-grandfather David, who grew up in Cherry Valley. A then-recently acquired 1843 Springfield Musket was being examined when gramp entered. He told the story of when he was young, working on a Cherry Valley farm. Beef was to be butchered

and the humane way was to shoot it. The only firearm on the farm was a rifle made by a local gunsmith named Belknap. The day of the muzzle-loading guns was fast drawing to a close. The flintlock and pill lock systems of ignition were past. It took percussion caps to fire the old gun. Gramp said that the caps kept falling off. When he was asked why, he explained they were on the bottom. What he was describing was an underhammer rifle. The young great grandson dreamed of finding one of Belknap's underhammer guns. The only other Belknap that he had seen was one owned by a friend who occasionally fired it. That rifle was still in the family it was made for.

A more intense search was started to learn about Belknap and the guns he made. The lady who lived in the Belknap house gave the writer a small tool that once was used by the gunsmith. His shop was remembered by several Cherry Valley residents and a few actually remembered Belknap. His shop was torn down circa 1900. His house remained until about 1979-80, when it, too, was removed to

make room for the telephone building. Let's continue one person's quest for Belknap guns.

The first two were found about 1945. One was a typical full-stock hunting rifle. The other an unusual, very small and light shotgun. A great and surprising find a few years later was a heavy, full stock pill lock target rifle of extra fine workmanship. The search for one of his underhammer rifles came to an end many years later. It is that rifle that is in the photograph with this article, along with a typical hunting arm.

Cherry Valley was once a thriving community on the great western turnpike. Belknap chose a prime location where hunting and target shooting were everyday sports. The overland route to the west passed near his shop. Reliable firearms of his make went west with those hardy pioneers. If you own a Belknap gun, it is an important hand-made piece of old Cherry Valley history and our nation.

Long term recover meeting held in Fort Plain

A meeting hosted by the Fulton-Montgomery Long Term Recovery Committee took place Thursday, July 11 at the Fort Plain United Methodist Church. Approximately 50 people from the Fort Plain community attended the event to inquire about receiving and offering assistance in the post-flood devastation. The meeting was co-chaired by two Long Term Recovery members, Matt Ossenfort of Habitat for Humanity and Michael Raphael of the Red Cross.

At the meeting, some community members expressed communication problems, saying that matching volunteers with those who need help has been confusing. According to Raphael, the goal is to form one collective recovery effort — made up of smaller, separate committees — to work together in placing volunteers and other

assistance. This would alleviate the confusion of too many smaller efforts overlapping. Several committees were then formed, from financial/fundraising to volunteer coordinating. They will meet next week to begin coordinating their efforts.

Attending the event was Director of Scoharie Recovery Josh DeBartolo. He offered advice his community learned during their recovery from Hurricane Irene, sharing stories of mistakes

and unforseen issues the members Scoharie encountered in hopes that Fort Plain may avoid those problems. Among his advice was to watch for scamming contractors, who travel to devastated areas to intentionally overprice desperate homeowners. DeBartolo recommends getting two to three estimates before signing on with any contractor. He also cautioned against rebuilding too fast, saying he saw some houses demolished that may have had remodeling potential. "People tend to think that once a house has water, it's over; the house has to be destroyed. But not necessarily...and once you take down the house, it's gone. You can't undo that."

Fort Plain Mayor Guy Barton gave a brief speech near the end of the meeting. He criticized the Obama Administration for not yet declaring Fort Plain a federal disaster. He also reiterated Governor Cuomo's promise for state assistance in the event no federal aid comes.

Governor Cuomo visited the mayor earlier and gave this promise to him personally. "And I got him on tape!" Mavor Barton exclaimed — insurance in case the governor doesn't come through with his promise. "I may not look too smart, but I ain't stupid," he joked. At that, a cheer rose from the crowd and the people clapped with approval.





Maintaining your air conditioner

An air conditioner's filters, coils, and fins require regular maintenance for the unit to function effectively and efficiently throughout its years of service. Neglecting necessary maintenance ensures a steady decline in air conditioning performance while energy use steadily increases.

Air conditioner filters

The most important maintenance task that will ensure the efficiency of your air conditioner is to routinely replace or clean its filters. Clogged, dirty filters block normal airflow and reduce a system's efficiency significantly. With normal airflow obstructed, air that bypasses the filter may carry dirt directly into the evaporator coil and impair the coil's heat-absorbing capacity. Replacing a dirty, clogged filter with a clean one can lower your air conditioner's energy consumption by 5 percent to 15 percent.

For central air conditioners, filters are generally located somewhere along the return duct's length. Common filter locations are in walls, ceilings, furnaces, or in the air conditioner itself. Room air conditioners have a filter mounted in the grill that faces into the room.

Some types of filters are reusable; others must be replaced. They are available in a variety of types and efficiencies. Clean or replace your air conditioning system's filter or filters every month or two during the cooling season. Filters may need more frequent attention if the air conditioner is in constant use, is subjected to dusty conditions, or you have fur-bearing pets in the house.

Air conditioner coils

The air conditioner's evaporator coil and condenser coil collect dirt over their months and years of service. A clean filter prevents the evaporator coil from soiling quickly. In time, however, the evaporator coil will still collect dirt. This dirt reduces airflow and insulates the coil, reducing its ability to absorb heat. To avoid this problem, check your evaporator coil every year and clean it as necessary.

Outdoor condenser coils can also become very dirty lawn mower are all potential sources of dirt and debris. Cleaning the area around the coil, removing any debris, and trimming foliage back at least 2 feet allow for adequate airflow around the condenser.

Coil fins



if the outdoor environment is dusty or if there is foliage nearby. You can easily see the condenser coil and notice if dirt is collecting on its fins.

You should minimize dirt and debris near the condenser unit. Your dryer vents, falling leaves, and

The aluminum fins on evaporator and condenser coils are easily bent and can block airflow through the coil. Air conditioning wholesalers sell a tool called a "fin comb" that will comb these fins back into nearly original condition.

Condensate drains

Occasionally pass a stiff wire through the unit's drain channels. Clogged drain channels prevent a unit from reducing humidity, and the resulting excess moisture may discolor walls or carpet.

Window seals for room air conditioners

At the start of each cooling season, inspect the seal between the air conditioner and the window frame to ensure it makes contact with the unit's metal case. Moisture can damage this seal, allowing cool air to escape from your house.

Preparing for winter

In the winter, either cover your room air conditioner or remove and store it. Covering the outdoor unit of a central air conditioner will protect the unit from winter weather and debris.

Hiring a professional

When your air conditioner needs more than regular maintenance, hire a professional service technician. A well-trained technician will find and

fix problems in your air conditioning system.

Buckling your child in safely

The seat belts in your car are not designed with children in mind. It's important to pay attention to guidelines about safe child passenger restraint to protect your most precious cargo. If, like most of us, you've ever felt unsure about things like when to turn your baby's seat around or when to let your child graduate to a booster, here's a brief guide to clarify it for you.

What is the law. exactly?

In New York State, all children must be in an appropriate "child restraint system", carseat, until their 8th birthday, at a minimum. Appropriate seats meet the child's size and weight as indicated by the manufacturer.

The driver of a vehicle is responsible for restraint of all passengers rear-facing position.

- 2. Convertible higher height and weight range than an infant seat and can be placed front or rear facing depending on the age and size of the child.
- 3. Forward facing only – for children over age 1 at minimum.
- 4. Booster frequently labeled for use with children over 40 pounds and over four years of age

Under the age of one, all babies must ride in an infant or convertible seat, installed in the rear-facing position. Though one year is the minimum requirement, many experts recommend keeping young children in a rearfacing position as long as possible. Once the child outgrows the height recommendations for the rearward facing position, their seat must be forward facing. However, many children can safely

booster. Consider that in addition to weighing at least 40 pounds, they must be developmentally capable of keeping their back straight in the seat and their knees reach the seat's edge and bend comfortably.

One common question about boosters is when it is appropriate to use a high back versus a backless seat. High back booster seats are called for when your vehicle has low seat backs. If you have high seat backs that allow for support of the child's head, you can use a backless booster seat. Boosters of either type must be used with both shoulder and lap belts to be safe.

When is it time to transition out of a booster seat? Once a child reaches 4'9", they can safety retire the booster. However, if you happen to have

the age of 13 ride in the back seat. Research estimates that, in the event of a collision, chance of injury and death is reduced by more than 30 percent simply by riding in the back.

It's important to note that these laws do not apply to public transportation. Taxis and buses are exempt from all occupant restraint laws, with one exception. Children under age four must ride in a car seat in school buses.

Your carseat may need

to be replaced if it:

- 1. Has been in a crash
- 2. Has missing parts
- 3. Has no labels or stickers indicating height and weight guidelines
- 4. Is on a recall list or is not compatible with the type of vehicle you drive (To check both of these things, visit The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration www.nhtsa.gov)

under the age of 16 and can be fined \$25-100 and receive three points on their license if they fail to comply with the law.

To understand the specifics and insure that your child is safely buckled and you're in compliance with the law, consider the four basic types of carseats:

1. Infant — generally up to a weight of 22 pounds. Only to be placed in a ride rear facing until age 2. This is the best position to reduce stress to their fragile necks and spinal cords.

Under age four, children must ride in carseats appropriate for their height and weight, rather than booster seat, however, size supersedes age. If your little one is over 40 pounds before their fourth birthday, you may move them to a a child on the taller side, they must remain in their booster regardless of height until they reach their eighth birthday.

Once a child is out of a booster, the next question that eventually arises is when can they can safely sit in the front passenger seat. New York State doesn't have a law regulating this decision, but strongly recommends that all children under

Don't like pressure? Your tires do

(NAPSA) — Investing a little time and effort to make sure your tires are road worthy can pay dividends when it comes to safety. Experts say the first step is to make sure your tires are properly inflated.

According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, underinflated tires contribute to more than 600 fatalities and 33,000 injuries each year. Simply checking your tire pressure can help you stay safe during your next trip.

To get the most from your tires this summer, here are some maintenance tips from the world's largest tire and wheel retailer — Discount Tire:

• Get pressure right — Low tire pressure can decrease fuel economy. Tires may lose up to one pound per square inch per month. The specific inflation pressure number can be found on the vehicle placard lo-

cated on the driver's side doorpost, glove box door, fuel door or in the owner's manual. Custom tires and wheels may change standard air pressure requirements, so if you customize, have a pro check them out before you go.

- Don't overload vehicle
 Overloading decreases
 fuel economy due to increased wind drag and
 cargo weight. Handling,
 control and braking are
 also negatively impacted.
- Rotate before you go Regular rotation helps achieve uniform tire wear and improves road performance. Tires rotated every 6,000 to 8,000 miles have longer life and help to maximize your tire investment.
- Straighten up Proper wheel alignment provides safe, predictable vehicle control and helps tires wear evenly and last longer.
- Bald isn't beautiful Lack of tread affects the

tire's ability to grip the road. Make sure tires don't have uneven wear, high or low spots or unusually smooth areas that can decrease traction and increase the risk of road accidents.

A five-minute fix

Checking tire pressure and tread is easy and can pay dividends when it comes to fuel economy and handling. Don't go by appearances. Use a tire gauge to check since a tire can be 50 percent underinflated but still not appear flat.

Make it a habit to check tire pressure every month and always before a long trip. Use the vehicle manufacturer's recommended tire pressure.

Additionally, check tire tread depth by using the "penny test." Insert Abe Lincoln's head upside down into the tread. If you see his entire head, it's time to replace the tire.



Air pressure in a tire goes up in warm weather 1-2 pounds for every 10-degree temperature change. Make sure the weather isn't affecting your tires by using a tire gauge to check your pressure.

- Cruise cautiously. Use the cruise control on long stretches of highway driving when it's safe to do so, which can help save fuel by helping your car maintain a steady speed. Driving aggressively by rapid acceleration and braking uses more gas.
