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

# Rabies vaccination clinics for October

MONTGOMERY COUNTY — There will be two rabies vaccination clinics for dogs, cats, and ferrets in the month of October:

• Saturday, Oct. 5, Fultonville Animal Hospital, VanWagenen Drive, Fultonville, 9 a.m. to 11 a.m. and

• Saturday, Oct. 19, Florida Town Highway Dept., Fort Hunter Rd., Minaville, 9 a.m. to noon

New York State Public Health Law requires that all dogs, cats and domestic ferrets shall have initial vaccinations administered against rabies no later than four months of age and stay up to date with re-vaccinations. Pet owners should bring proof of their pet's last rabies vaccination. To assure the safety of other pets and people; dogs must be leashed; cats and ferrets must be contained in a pet carrier or box when attending the rabies clinic.

Veterinarian administration fee is \$10 per Rabies Vaccine. The Oct. 19, clinic is offered free of charge to Montgomery County residents only, but open to everyone. Suggested donation is \$10. For more information about rabies contact Montgomery County Public Health at 518-853-3531. Monday – Friday 8:30 a.m. – 4 p.m.



### Collecting

#### by Larry Cox Coal chute

**Q:** I recently acquired a coal chute that is marked "Majestic." I'd like to know the value of it. — M.M.M., Decatur, IL

**A:** Most coal chutes sell in the \$25 to \$50 range depending on condition and design.

Q: I have inherited a small cigar case that was handed out as a premium at the St. Louis World's Fair. It is embossed with an image of the Palace of Transportation. It is in fairly good con-

**A:** I found your cigar case referenced in the definitive book about the mementos and memorabilia from the Fair, namely "1904 St. Louis World's Fair" by the late Robert L. Hendershott. According to this guide, your case is valued in the \$100 to \$200 range.

**Q:** I was fascinated by the California Raisins characters and wonder if the items I have are collectible. I have several key chains, a board game, a plush

pillow and a coffee mug. — Steve, Austin, Texas

A: The California Raisins were introduced in a TV commercial campaign in 1986. Originally there were four but characters, soon more than 21 designs had been added. Most of the items dated. are Typical values are Hip Guitarist keychain, \$65; plush pillow of Raisin figure, \$10; beach towel, \$15; and lunch box, \$25.

**Q:** At a recent yard sale, I purchased a Roseville

bowl in the Rozane pattern. It has a design that features floral and leaf patterns in pale green. When was it made, and how much do you think it is worth? — Susan, Tyler, Texas

**A:** According to Warman's Roseville Pottery by Mark F. Moran, your bowl is probably worth about \$150 and was produced in 1917. There was a later line, also called Rozane, featuring a sleek, modern look in bright colors, including blue, green terra and cotta.



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### Things to bring along on your next fishing trip

Fishing is a beloved pastime for many people. Fans of fishing are often passionate about the sport, and that passion has inspired many novices to try their hand at becoming anglers.

Though there is no way to guarantee you will catch a fish the first time out, you are likely to have some fun, especially if you head out to the nearest fishing hole with a fully stocked tackle box. While even first-timers know to bring a fishing pole and some bait along on their trips, there are some additional items to add to a tackle box that might not seem so practical until after your trip.

### The extras

When planning a fish-

ing trip, it never hurts to bring along some extra supplies. Many a maiden fishing trip has been cut short when fishermen realize they did not pack enough line or hooks. Fishing line has a tendency to break, even if you aren't expecting to reel in many fish. Fishing line can break in the mouth of a fish or on

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likely to snap. When conditions are more serene, a thin, less visible line should suffice.

You should also expect to lose a few hooks on your trip, so pack extra hooks of various sizes. Hooks come in many sizes because fish come in many varieties. You'll want to have various hooks in your tackle box to handle whichever fish seem to be biting on the day of your trip. When buying your hooks, speak with a store representative and let them know which area you plan to visit. They're likely to know which fish you're likely to encounter, and they can help you choose the appropriate hooks. Just remember to bring extras to account for the ones you're likely to lose.

### Bobbers

Few things are as exciting when fishing as that first bite from a fish. That's especially the case for first-timers, many of

bite on vour line. Bobbers come in various shapes, but many people are familiar with the red and white round bobbers, which can be easily attached to your line. Round bobbers limit how deep you can cast your line. If you're looking to cast a line deep, slip bobbers allow you to do just that because they can be slid up and down your line. However, slip bobbers are more difficult to attach to your line than round bobbers, something first-timers might want to keep in mind.

### Fake worms

First-timers might be a little skittish using live bait, so some fake plastic worms might be the best fit when embarking on a first fishing trip. Plastic worms come in various sizes and shapes, and after your initial trip you might decide you want to move on to live bait. But fake bait on the first time is nothing to be ashamed



Lures come in many varieties, and these are intended to attract fish on those days when nothing seems to be biting. Lures may help first-timers get their feet wet and catch their first fish. That's especially true when using lures that look like minnows, a popular snack for many fish.

### Pliers

Unexpected issues often arise when fishing for the first time, and one such issue is what to do when you have caught your first fish. Many firsttimers do not expect to catch a fish their first time out, but don't be so hard on yourself. Expect to catch a fish and bring along a pair of pliers in anticipation of that first catch. Pliers take the hook out of the fish once it's been caught, so bring along a pair and expect to use them.

Just as you make sure your car is ready for winter this time of year, so should you make sure your landscape is ready.

Start by cleaning up the debris in your garden, removing dead foliage as well as the stakes and row markers. Cut back dead growth on your perennials. These are all measures that not only get your garden and flower beds ready for planting and new growth next spring, but also they prevent overwintering pests and diseases on rotting foliage. Be sure to throw out or burn any diseased foliage. Don't put it into the compost pile.

It's too late to divide perennials, but you can cut them back in late fall. This allows time for birds to get seedheads, for any nutrition to recycle back to the roots from the leaves, and for you to enjoy the fall effect of many perennials. Of course if they're diseased or have died back, like many daylilies, you can cut

raked off perennial beds.

them back sooner. Cut most perennials back leaving 2 to 6-inches of growth near the base. Cut ornamental grasses back a bit higher, so not to cut off any growing points for the following year.

You can divide peonies, though, if needed. If sited properly with plenty of space, peonies may not roots called "eyes" these are quite obvious. Then, make sure not to plant more than 2 inches below ground, and don't cover with mulch.

Fall in your landscape

Wait until late winter or spring to prune woody plants if possible, as doing so now will leave open wounds that won't heal quickly, allowing diseases the chance to enter. Of course you can prune any dead, diseased, or broken branches.

Mulch shrubs, trees, and perennial beds with a loose organic material such as bark mulch. Do it now, and you will have one less job to worry about in the spring. Mulches also help protect roots during winter from cold and fluctuating tem-

plants, so it can work into and enrich the soil over the winter — another less task to do in spring, particularly if you'll then need to remove the mulch first. Also topdress an inch or two of compost around your perennials, more easily done after they're cut back. If you have deer near-

compost around woody

by, you may want to stock up and spray a repellent on desirable woody plants. If deer pressure isn't high, simply hanging bars of smelly soap near plants may work. But don't hang them directly on plants, as the dissolving soap on stems will attract mice feeding. If you have lots of deer or very hungry ones with few other food sources, you may have to resort to electric or high mesh fencing. If just a plant or two, you can erect a simple triangular mesh fence around each, about 6ft high and foot or so away from the plants.

Did you have "tender" summer bulbs such as gladiolus and dahlias? If so, dig the dahlia tubers right after tops have been killed with a hard frost. Gladiolus can be left in the ground until tops yellow and start dying back. Once the gladiolus corms have been dug and are fully dry, store in a paper bag or similar. Don't let dahlia tubers dry more than a day or two, as they'll begin to shrivel. Store them in slightly moist (but not too wet, or they'll rot) materials such as peat moss or wood shavings. Dry both of these summer bulbs out of direct sun, in a slightly warm, airy location. Store both in a cool, but nonfreezing, space.

As long as the grass is growing, mow. For me this is usually mid-October. While you want to mow higher (3-inches) during the growing season, lower this to about 2 inches with your last mowing. This discourages any mice and rodents from living there, as well as less chance of disease in spring (particularly "snow mold") from matted-down grass.

If you label your plants, make sure labels are still intact and legible. I like to make an inventory, too, of my planting beds and put on a simple computer spreadsheet during the

Have you raked those fallen leaves yet? The grass is still green underneath and can use all the light possible to prepare for winter. Removing leaves also allows water and air to get to the living plants, preventing them from suffocating. For this reason leaves, especially tough ones that pack down and rot slowly, do not make good mulch for perennials and should be

need dividing for many years or even decades. But, if they are too large or crowded or you just need to move them, fall is the time. Cut back leaves (usually not very attractive anyway by fall) to just above the ground. When plants are dug, you can with divide knife, pruners, or sharp tool. Make sure each division has at least 3 growing points or buds on the


peratures. Don't mulch too thickly — no more than a few inches around woody trees and shrubs as the mulch makes a nice home for mice, which chew bark. If packed around tree trunks too thick, mulch can smother the tree and cause it to die, so keep it a few inches away from tree trunks.

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


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
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### Steps to take when selling your car

When determining the price for your vehicle, make the most of the resources at your disposal. Edmunds.com, for example, offers a True Market Value, or TMV(R), tool that allows sellers to get an honest appraisal of their used vehicle, while Kelley Blue Book has long been a trusted resource for buyers and sellers alike who want to determine the value of preowned vehicles. Use resources such as these to determine a reasonable selling price for your used car. Many prospective buyers will want to negotiate the price down, so setting a price that's slightly higher than the vehicle's appraised value might be a good bet. Just don't go too far above that value or you risk getting little response to your ad.

### Effectively advertise the vehicle

Nowadays, many sell-

ers of used vehicles, including dealerships. make use of popular websites featuring hundreds, if not thousands, of vehicles for sale. Such sites allow prospective buyers to narrow their searches based on a host of factors, including geography, vehicle make and model, mileage, and so on. While such sites can be useful, it's also easy for your vehicle to get lost in the haystack that is such sites' vast inventory. That's something to consider, as many sites charge sellers to post their listing.

When advertising your vehicle for sale, consider traditional methods like putting a "For Sale" sign in the window and advertising the car in the classified section of your local newspaper. Many buyers still scour the classifieds when looking for a used car, while a "For Sale" sign in the window is an inexpensive yet effective way to make it known that your vehicle is for

In addition to more traditional methods, make use of other ways to in-

crease vour vehicle's visibility. Post the vehicle to social media sites where friends and family can see that the car is for sale. Even if your online friends are not in the market for a new vehicle, they might know someone who is and can easily send prospective buyers your way. This requires little effort on the part of the seller, but the potential payoff is considerable.

### Present yourself and the vehicle well

Sellers can make the most of the sales experience if they present themselves as responsible vehicle owners who went to great lengths to maintain their vehicles. If you have a maintenance history of the vehicle, make it available when showing the vehicle and answer sellers' questions with honesty and sinceri-

Of course, prospective buyers also want the vehicle to make a good impression. Before showing the vehicle, have your mechanic give it a tuneup so it's running as smoothly as possible dur-



ing test drives. In addition, make sure the vehicle's exterior has been washed and waxed and its interior thoroughly cleaned when it is being shown. Clean vehicles that run without any hiccups make a strong first impression on prospective buyers.

### Don't negotiate yourself out of a sale

The year a vehicle hits the market is a benchmark among prospective buyers. Even if they're unaware of it, many buvers harbor negative opinions of a vehicle as it gets older. So even if a decadeold vehicle runs like new, buyers will likely still be hesitant about paying full asking price for a car that first left a dealership's lot

10 years ago. Sellers should keep this in mind when selling their preowned vehicles, especially when they start to field offers. It's easy for sellers to negotiate themselves out of a sale if they feel buyers aren't making substantial offers. But the longer the vehicle goes unsold, the more negative the perception of that vehicle becomes, and the less sellers are likely to get for the car. If buyers are making offers within the realm of your initial asking price, then don't worry it if those offers are a few hundred dollars short of that initial price, as there's no guarantee a better offer is on the horizon.

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

### How to keep your garage work space safe

Auto enthusiasts often find their garage is a sanctuary where they can go and think about their vehicles and little else. Similar to a carpenter's workshop or a gardener's backyard, a garage can be a place where auto enthusiasts unwind as they pursue their passions for automobiles.

But no garage is a true sanctuary if it is not safe, and the following are a few ways auto enthusiasts can ensure their work space is safe and sound.

• Keep an adequately stocked first aid kit on hand. An accessible first aid kit can be the difference between a minor injury or a significant health issue. Make sure the first aid kit is easily accessible, ideally on a low shelf that you can reach should you suffer an injury that limits your mobility. Periodically restock your first aid kit with necessary supplies.

• Post the national Poison Control Hotline num-

ber in plain view. That number is 800-222-1222 in the United States, and varies from province to province in Canada.

• Always bring your cell phone with you when working in your workshop. Though it might seem like a good idea to escape from life's distractions and leave your cell phone inside when working on your vehicle, that cell phone may be your only way to contact the outside world should you suffer an injury. You don't have to answer the phone when it rings, but

be sure to bring it with you as a safety precaution whenever you will be working alone in the garage.

• Install a functioning fire extinguisher in your garage, and learn how to use it. Be sure to periodically check the extinguisher's expiration date and make sure it's easily accessible.

• Keep hazardous materials out of the reach of children. Read the labels on products. Items whose labels include warnings and cautions or suggest products can be poisonous if or when they are ingested should be stored

where kids cannot reach them. If necessary, store them in a cabinet that can be locked.

• Store gasoline in a locked outdoor shed or, if keeping it in the garage, make sure youngsters won't be able to reach it. Make sure the gasoline container is childproof and approved for gasoline storage.

• Wear chemical safety glasses when using hazardous solvents and cleaning products. Wear safety glasses with side shields when using power tools

• Don't allow children into your work space when you're working on your vehicle.

• Wear tight clothing and take off all jewely. Loose clothing and dangling jewelry that can easily get caught in moving parts, greatly increasing your risk of injury.

• Unplug any power cords before trouble-shooting any problems with your power tools.

• When working with power tools, unplug them when taking a break from work and when leaving your work space, even if such breaks are only momentary.

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
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### Infiniti to Land Rover: New car models in 2014

Infiniti is changing the names of all of its vehicles in the 2014 model year. All sedans, coupes and convertibles will have the Q badge (the M becomes the Q60, for example), while SUVs and crossovers will be called QX. The move helps clarify where each model ສຶ stands in the brand's lineup and also gives a nod to the brand's original flagship sedan, the Q45.

**Q50:** New to Infiniti's lineup is the entry-level Q50, a small competitor to the Lexus IS and BMW 3-Series. It has a low, wide look and taut lines. Under the hood is a 328horsepower, 3.7-liter V6 that gets 20 mpg in the city and 30 on the highway. A hybrid version, which gets an estimated 36 mpg on the highway, is also available.

QX60: The QX60 previously crossover. called the JX35, gets a hybrid version that's available in both frontwheel and all-wheel-drive.

**F** Type: The two-seat, rear-wheel-drive sports convertible was unveiled at the Paris auto show in 2012 and went on sale in the U.S. earlier this summer. Jaguar says the F Type has the company's most advanced use of lightweight aluminum to date, giving it a stiffer and more dynamic ride. There are three engine choices: Jaguar's new 3.0-liter V6 with either 340 horsepower or 380 horsepower outputs, or a 5.0-liter supercharged V8 with 495 horsepower. The latter can go from zero to 60 mph in 4.2 seconds and has a top speed of 186 mph. All are mated to an eight-speed transmission. On the inside, Jaguar has modified its touch-screen controls and now has physical dials for heating and ventilation. On the outside, there's a big grille and vertical headlights that follow the sleek lines of the car. To help the flow, the door handles remain flush with the car until they're unlocked, and a hidden rear spoiler rises at 60 mph and lowers

again when the speed drops below 40 mph.

XJR: After a four-year absence, a top-of-the-line R sport model returns to Jaguar's XJ sedan lineup. It has a 5.0-liter V8 engine with 550 horsepower and 502 pound feet of torque mated to an eightspeed transmission, and it can go from zero to 60 mph in a blistering 4.4 seconds. The XJR also has new, low-profile 20inch wheels. A stop-start system, which shuts the vehicle down at stop lights, helps save fuel economy, which clocks in at 18 mpg in combined city/highway driving.

Kia Forte: The 2014 Forte small car, which went on sale in March, is bigger and sportier than the outgoing model. There are three trim levels: the base LX with a 1.8-liter, 148-horsepower fourcylinder engine and a manual transmission; an LX with an automatic transmission; and the EX. which has a 2.0-liter. 173-horsepower fourcylinder engine. The LX gets 29 mpg in combined city and highway driving; the EX gets 1 mpg less. On the inside, the Forte has premium standard features, including wheel-mounted audio controls, satellite radio. power windows and heated folding side mirrors. Cruise control and keyless entry are optional. Two variations will go on sale this fall: The Forte5 hatchback and Forte Koup two-door. Those performance-oriented models will have two engine choices: The 2.0-173-horsepower liter. four-cylinder or a new, turbocharged 1.6-liter I4 with 201 horsepower.

Cadenza: Kia pulled its full-size Amanti sedan off the market three years ago. Now, it returns and gets significantly more upscale with the 2014 Cadenza. The Cadenza's big, 18-inch wheels and long, contoured hood give it a premium look. It's equipped with Kia's most powerful V6 engine ever, a 3.3-liter V6 with 293 horsepower, and has several new standard features, including a navigation system and rear-view camera in an 8-inch dashboard touch screen.

Options on higher trim levels include Kia's first lane departure warning system, which beeps if the driver leaves the lane, and water-repellent front side windows. The Cadenza includes complimentary maintenance for 36 months or 37,000 miles.

Sorento: The 2014

Sorento crossover isn't

completely new, but it has been significantly updated. It sits on a new chassis — to improve ride and handling — and has a new standard engine, a 2.4liter direct-injection fourcylinder with 191 horsepower. A new 3.3-liter V6 with 290 horsepower is also available. The redesigned Sorento — which seats five or seven with the optional third row offers two Kia firsts: a blind spot detection system and a power liftgate with programmable height levels. The outside is bolder with a larger grille and optional 19-inch wheels. while the inside is more sophisticated, with a simpler dashboard and a bigger, 8-inch touchscreen that's standard on higher trim levels.

Soul: The funky, boxy

Soul has a more premium look in its second generation, with more width and length and a more aggressive grille. Inside, there are upgraded materials and a larger, 8-inch touch screen in the dashboard. To improve the driving dynamics, the body is stiffer and the suspension has been reworked. There's an updated 1.6-liter four-cylinder engine with 130 horsepower on the base model, and a 2.0-liter, direct-injection I4 with 164 horsepower on higher trim levels.

### Land Rover

Range Rover Sport: Land Rover boasts that the 2014 Range Rover Sport is its fastest vehicle ever, with a zero-to-60 time of 4.7 seconds and a much more agile feel thanks to its new, lighter aluminum underbody. The inside is more luxurious and contains a new folding third row with two seats. Under the hood, there's a 3.0-liter V6 with 340 horsepower or a supercharged 5.0-liter V8 with 510 horsepower. The base engine gets 23 mpg on the highway; the V8 gets 17 mpg.



### Easy bathroom renovations

### Time your move right to save money

Buying a new home is the most expensive purchase a person is likely to make in his or her lifetime. It also can be one of the more stressful. Moving during certain times of the year can result in considerable savings. Moving during the summer, when children are out of school and the weather is nice, can make a move more manageable. Keep in mind that because late spring and summer are the peak moving seasons, they also tend to be more expensive. Many moving companies and truck rental agencies will charge a premium if you use their services during the summer. Furthermore, crews may change in the summer when students on vacation could fill in for regular, more experienced movers.

High prices are not only reserved for those who buy a new house during the spring and summer. Renters may find spring and summer is also the peak season for rentals. Many apartment managers can attest that the dates between June 2 and Aug. 30 are quite busy in terms of apartment turnover. College students are more likely to move as soon as the academic year ends, and many landlords plan leases to expire in the summer months to ensure that re-renting places will be easier thanks to a flooded apartment market. According to Apartment Wiz, a Houston-based apartment locating service, although there might be greater apartment availability during the warm-weather months, it also means greater competition between prospective tenants. That greater competition can drive up prices.

But apartments are harder to fill in the fall or at the onset of winter. That's because many people do not want the hassle of moving once school has started or the weather has chilled. Landlords who are stuck paying utilities and advertising fees for vacant apartments are far more likely to negotiate rent prices, lease terms and even security deposits during the winter in an effort to fill the apartment quickly.

People sitting with homes on the market are also more likely to negotiate during cooler months when foot traffic has fizzled out. That can make shopping for a home in the fall advantageous to home buyers.

Here are some other tips to reduce stress and save money when moving into a new home or apartment:

- Move mid-week. Weekends are a prime time for truck rentals and moving companies. Pick a Tuesday or a Wednesday to move, and you're much more likely to find an available moving service (even during peak moving months); you may even be able to negotiate a lower rate.
- Pick a mid-month moving date. Many people move at the beginning of the month when leases are up or after mortgage payments are made. Fewer people move in the middle of the month, so you might find more affordable moving deals if you can wait a few extra weeks.
- Schedule a fall or winter move. The American Moving and Storage Association says half of all moves occur during onethird of the year — between the beginning of May and Labor Day. Beat the rush by moving outside of these dates.
- Get an early start. Many people underestimate the amount of time it takes to actually move their belongings. Try to schedule a moving company to come very early in the morning to give you ample time to pack up the truck and unpack at your new home.

### Renovation loans give homebuyers an edge in a competitive market

(BPT) — Just a year ago homebuyers could choose from a bounty of properties on the market. Today things are starkly different. In many locations throughout the United States, inventory of homes for sale is at historic lows, creating a seller's market where multiple buyers get into bidding wars over move-in-ready homes.

"Move-in-ready homes may be selling like hotcakes, but older homes or damaged properties are often passed over," says Margaret Kelly, CEO with RE/MAX. "This is a big opportunity for smart buyers who are willing to overlook cosmetic or other imperfections."

If buyers can look beyond aesthetic characteristics like paint color, hardware and floor coverings, they may discover a diamond in the rough, especially if the home is in the neighborhood where they prefer to live. For example, if they like the overall design of a particular home, but the kitchen is straight out of the '70s and the deck needs major repairs, a renovation loan can help them purchase the property while upgrading the kitchen and outdoor space exactly how they want them.

"Many homebuyers are surprised you don't need a ton of money in the bank to fund improvements," explains Kelly. "A special type of loan called a renovation loan is ideal for these types of homes because it covers both the cost of the mortgage and repairs."

Renovation loans can also help buyers who want to purchase in a particular neighborhood where most home prices exceed their

budget. Properties that need work are typically listed at a lower cost and often go unsold, creating an opportunity for people willing to make improvements. Buyers can use a renovation loan to get into the neighborhood of their dreams, quickly build equity and customize a home to their personal preferences.

Several variations of renovation loans are available. FHA renovation loans are called 203(k) loans. How much money you want to borrow and the kinds of improvements you plan to make will determine which of the two 203(k) types you need. Freddie Mac and Fannie Mae have their own specific types of renovation loans.

Requirements for the borrower, the amount you can borrow, and the overall structure of the loan are different for each program. Typically, the loan is based on the estimated home value after improvements, and buyers will need to get bids from licensed contractors to help determine the total loan amount as well as a timeline for the work to be completed.

Because finding a home and getting approval of a renovation loan can be complicated, it's wise for buyers to work with a real estate specialist who has experience in these types of sales.

"A renovation loan really does give homebuyers an edge in today's competitive market," says Kelly. "It's definitely something to research and determine whether it's right for you."





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### Home buyer education: **Shopping for a home**

What you need to know before buying a manufactured

Manufactured housing is often considered to be a cost-effective approach to making home ownership a reality for families. According to Consumer Reports, in January of 1999, manufactured homes represented one-third of all new singlefamily homes sold in this country. Since buying a home is likely to be the largest investment a family will make, it is important to make a wise choice.

If you are considering the purchase of a manufactured home, there are some points you should know to protect yourself and your investment. Find a reputable dealer by contacting your state agency on manufactured housing (Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs [TDHCA]). Make sure that your installation firm is licensed and check with the Better Business Bureau to learn if there are substantial complaints against the firm. If a problem develops after you purchase your home, try to resolve it with the dealer or the manufacturer. If that fails, contact the TDHCA.

The term "manufactured home" was adopted in June of 1976 to describe a type of house that is constructed in a factory to comply with a building code developed by the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). In the past, manufactured homes were called "mobile homes," a term that many people still use. However, "mobile" is no longer an accurate name because fewer than five percent of such

homes are ever moved off the owner's original site.

Every new manufactured home now offered for sale must

- A red and silver seal that certifies that the home has been inspected during construction and meets federal home construction and safety standards. The code regulates design and construction, strength and durability, fire resistance, and energy efficiency. It also prescribes the performance standards for the heating, plumbing, air conditioning, thermal, and electrical systems.
- A diagram provided by the manufacturer must show the required number and position of placement piers. It must also show the positioning for anchoring devices.
- A certificate must be posted inside the home to tell what performance can be expected from the heating system, within a specified range of outside temperature and wind veloci-
- Maps must be included, as part of the certificate, that indicate the energy efficiency zone for which the home was built, the home's resistance to wind, and snow loads that the roof can be expected to withstand, provided the home has been properly anchored, in accordance with the manufacture's specifications.

Before you purchase a manufactured home, it is important that you:

- Determine where the home will be located. You need to find a community that has rental spaces or own or purchase private property. If you decide to locate on private property, you will need to know what deed restrictions or zoning issues are in place on the land site.
- Purchase a home with a wind-resistance rating and snow load rating appropriate for your location.
- Know what other costs are involved in setting up the

- Properly prepare the site and ensure that is it suitable for
- Buy from a licensed retailer and use a licensed installer to install your home.

or a lot that you own or intend to buy, it is important to consider deed restrictions, zoning requirements, restrictive covenants, and any city or county ordinances. Such restrictions may prevent you from placing a manufactured home on a particular piece of

If you decide to place the home in a manufactured home community, it is important to know the rules and regulations. Are children allowed? Are pets allowed? Are homes required to be skirted? What are the parking regulations? Look beyond the obvious factors. Find out who is responsible for yard maintenance, garbage removal, and whether it is covered in your rent. Inquire about laundry facilities, if you will need them. Decide if you want to pay for the use of luxury facilities, such as a sauna, swimming pool, tennis court and clubhouse.

Look for an established community or one being developed by a company for long-term investment purposes. Try to obtain a long term, written lease.

Talk to residents for their opinions about the community. Talk to the manager. Ask yourself if you are willing to live by the rules. You also need to know if the rules are enforced by the management on other residents.

Find out exactly what is included in your rent and what is not

### Wind-Resistance Standards

Wind-resistance relates to manufacturing standards as well as anchoring standards. Currently, the highest standards are required for hurricane-prone coastal areas. However, if you live in an area where there are high winds or tornadoes, these same strict standards would make your home safer.

Snow load rating refers to the amount of snow that your home can handle on the roof. The zone map provided by your retailer should indicate

the recommendations. However, you should be prepared to remove snow in situations when abnormal amounts of snow fall. Ice conditions should also be a concern.

It is much easier to solve your housing needs when you have as much information as possible to help you make an educated decision. This fact sheet along with the references listed should help you to make an informed decision regarding the purchase of a manufactured home. 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
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

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Next, decide the type home and neighborhood you want to live in. By visiting websites, such as www.realtor.com, you will learn about the price of homes you are interested in, as well as estimate the amount you need to borrow.

After determining how much you will borrow, visit www.bankrate.com to get informa-



tion about the current mortgage rates and an estimate of your monthly payment. When estimating your monthly payment, add 30 percent to your payment for expenses such as homeowner's insurance, property taxes, and home maintenance.

After you have the estimate of your monthly payment, determine how your payment fits into your budget. Be prepared to revise your goals for the type home and neighborhood you want if the monthly payment is too high.

There are tax advantages for home ownership, which include the following tax breaks:

- Mortgage interest and real estate taxes are tax-deductible on federal and many state income tax returns, including Alabama. These amounts are usually more than the IRS's standard deduction. By itemizing your return, you are able to take advantage of more deductions.
- The profits made by selling a home can be tax-free. If you sell a home for more than what you paid for it, you have a capital gain. Capital gains are normally taxed, but you can avoid paying taxes if you qualify. In order to qualify, you must have used the home as your principal residence for two of the last five years. Current tax laws allow tax-free capital gains of up to \$500,000 if married and filing

jointly and up to \$250,000 if you are single.

· Most lenders require a down payment of at least 20 percent. To accumulate the funds for the down payment, consider saving using a tax-sheltered account, such as a Roth IRA. If you are a first time home buyer, up to \$10,000 may be withdrawn tax- and penalty-free for contributions held for at least five years. Parents and grandparents may also make with drawals from Roth IRAs to help family members when purchasing their first home.
