### Whatchamacallits

When liquids are stored in sealed wooden barrels, this tool, known as a bung borer, is used to create a hole from which the barrel's contents can be collected.

Bungholes can be made in either the top of the barrel, or in one of the staves on the side. Once the bunghole has been created, a faucet can be attached to the hole to ease the process of dispensing the liquid. The hole can be closed with a cork.

While bung borers are most often associated with barrels of liquid, some types of borers can be used on boats to create a hole that can be plugged or unplugged as the owner desires to help prevent theft.

## Canajoharie Volunteer Fire Department reminds residents: working smoke alarms save lives!

Working smoke alarms can make a life-saving difference in a fire. That's the message behind this year's Fire Prevention Week campaign, "Working Smoke Alarms Save Lives: Test Yours Every Month!"

Along with firefighters and safety advocates nationwide, Canajoharie Volunteer Fire Department is joining forces with the nonprofit National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) during Fire Prevention Week, Oct. 5-11, to remind local residents about the importance of having working smoke alarms in the home and testing them monthly.

According to the latest NFPA research, working smoke alarms cut the chance of dying in a fire in half. Meanwhile, almost two-thirds of home fire deaths resulted from fires in homes with no smoke alarms or no working smoke alarms.

In a fire, seconds count. Roughly half of home fire deaths result from fires reported at night between 11 p.m. and 7 a.m. when most people are asleep. Home smoke alarms can alert people to a fire before it spreads, giving everyone

enough time to get out.

This year's Fire Prevention Week campaign includes the following smoke alarm messages:

- Install smoke alarms in every bedroom, outside each separate sleeping area and on every level of the home, including the basement.
- Interconnect all smoke alarms throughout the home. This way, when one sounds, they all do.
- Test alarms at least monthly by pushing the test button.
- Replace all smoke alarms when they are 10 years old or sooner if they don't respond properly.
- Make sure everyone in the home knows the sound of the smoke alarm and understands what to do when they hear it.

Through education, families and residents can learn more about the importance of working smoke alarms and testing them monthly by contacting their local fire departments.

Families are asked not to take advantage of this policy, and to make all attempts to keep student accounts current. Free/Reduced meal status carries over from the past school year, but only through October 16th. A new Free/Reduced meal application must be received by that date, so that benefits can continue. The program's mission focuses on veterans of the Iraq and Afghanistan conflicts by helping them to find employment, access housing and secure their educational and health benefits.
- ~District Receives Records Management Grant: The district was recently notified that they have received a grant for over \$35,000 from the office of New York State Local Government Records. The grant will be used to fund a more efficient way to access semi-active school files and a better way to handle requests for records. The district has successfully completed digitizing its inactive, permanent records including: former pesonnel files, payroll records, graduated student records, previous year tax rolls, and Board of Education minutes. This grant will focus on semi-active records those that are not used on a day-to-day basis, but are still accessed often. The grant will fund lateral filing systems and a storage vault. The grant also funds the staff that is used to organize and improve the efficiency of those semi-active files.
- ~Immunization Requirements Change: The NYS Department of Health has revised immunization requirements for school attendance. The new requirements took effect July 1st, and were developed to reduce the number of vaccine-preventable diseases such as measels and whooping cough. While no new vaccines are required, the number of doses and the time interval between doses has changed. Parents with students entering PreK, kindergarten, or 6th grade need to be especially aware of the new requirements. 

### To your good health

Not all back pain
improves with rest

Dear Dr. Roach: I have had lower-back problems almost all my life. Many doctors and therapists have examined it, with almost no success. Recently my attacks have been fewer and milder, even if the bed is not quite right. I can live with it, but a new wrinkle has emerged: If I don't get out of bed as soon as the alarm sounds, I'll have back pain and little mobility all day and partial incapacity. I am 74 years old, 6 feet, 4 inches tall 230 weigh pounds. Do you have any idea what causes this, and if there is any cure? — J.S.B.

Answer: There are dozens of causes of back pain, and it can be impossible, even with the most advanced diagnostic tests, to make a precise diagnosis of the underlying cause.

In your case, it sounds like you have had one problem for a long time and now something is causing a different kind of back problem. Back pain that gets worse

with bed rest and better with exercise is not likely to be a herniated disc spinal stenosis two serious causes of back pain. I am guessing that there is a component of osteoarthritis in your which back now, would be quite common in a 74-year-old man. Osteoarthritis tend to get does worse with rest and better with exercise. I impressed how acutely it gets worse, it's and entirely possible that there may be some muscular spasm associated with your back pain.

Even though you are quite tall, 230 pounds is a lot for your spine to support. You have a BMI of 28, which is in the "overweight" range. Losing even five or 10 pounds may help relieve pain on your back. And certainly listen to your body, and get up and be Stretching, active. including yoga and tai chi, can be a very effective treatment.



### Four simple home remedies for joint pain

(BPT) — Soreness, stiffness, tenderness — joint pain can have a direct impact on quality of life. Fortunately, there are a number of proactive steps that incorporate all-natural solutions to help improve joint health and overall wellness.

Joint pain is one of the most common health concerns. It affects 30 percent of U.S. adults, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). Not surprisingly, joint pain prevalence increases with age. 1. Eat for joint health Key nutrients that help with joint health, mobility and lubrication are healthy fats like omega-3s. "Think of these like lube for your joints," says Mohr. "Replace some

of the usual protein in your diet with fish — wild salmon, tuna, sardines, anchovies, etc. Aim to do this at least twice per week."

In addition to increasing foods with healthy omega-3 fats, Mohr recommends reducing unhealthy fats like trans and saturated fats. These are often found in packaged items, sweet treats and other overly processed foods.

2. Add supplements Omega-3 fats can support joint health, but often people don't get enough through the foods they eat. Supplementation is a good option for people who suffer from joint pain. "Joint health can be maintained by 'feeding' the body what it needs," says Mohr.

Manage

healthy weight "The less body weight you have to carry around, the easier it will be to move around," says Mohr. "Make physical activity a regular part of your day. The stronger your muscles, the easier it will be to move comfortably. Above all, this will help relieve some of the common pains in the joints."

4. Stay physically active Mohr says one of the most common misconceptions about joint pain is that rest is helpful. "Unfortunately that becomes a vicious cycle, where more rest can ultimately cause more pain because the surrounding muscles are getting weaker and giving less support to those joints," he says.

**Q:** At a recent church rummage sale, I found a W.C. Field's cookie jar marked "McCoy." I paid \$50 for it and feel I got quite a bargain. — Phyllis, Pueblo, CO.

A: Your cookie jar produced by McCoy in 1972 and generally retails in the \$200 to \$250 range, according to "McCoy Pottery: Identification and Price Guide" by Mark F. Moran. Many of the McCoy cookie jars have increased in value in recent years as collectors have become more and more interested in them. For example, the "Liberty Bell"

cookie jar, which often sold for about \$25 only five or six years ago, now sells for about \$100.

Q: I was a great fan of Hoot Gibson, the Western movie star of the 1930s and '40s. I have two of his comics, No. 1 and No. 3WW, both issued by Fox Features Syndicate. Are they worth keeping? — Rob, Roswell, NM

A: I contacted several comic-book dealers, and they seem to agree that your comics probably are \$300 worth about They each. were issued in about 1950. An excellent reference "The Standard Guide to Golden Age Comics" by Alex Ğ. Malloy and Stuart W.

Wells III, and published by Krause Books. This guide serves up 900 covers of Golden Age comics from 1938-1956, along with nearly 50,000 up-to-date values. It is easy to use and highly recommended, especially if you have a stack of older comics stashed under your bed or in a closet.

**Q:** I still have several books from when I was a child. They are "Fred Flintstone Bewildered Baby-Sitter with Pebbles," "The Flintstones and Dino" and "Hildy's Hideaway." Although I have no plans to sell them, I am nevertheless curious about how much they are currently worth.

A: I found your three books referenced in "Warman's Children's Books" by Steve Santi and published by Krause Books. The first Flintstone book was published in 1963 and is valued at \$16; the second featuring Dino was issued in 1961 and is worth about the same amount. Hideaway' "Hildy's also is from 1961 and listed for \$10. As with collectibles, condition is extremely important. Children's books with missing or marked pages are worth much less.

Problem 1: Refrigerator is running constantly.

Possible fix: Dust and pet fur may be smothering the heatdissipating condenser coils, which are the black coils located at the back or beneath the unit. Clean them off using a condensercoil cleaning brush (\$9).

Problem 2: Garbage disposer motor is not working.

Possible fix: Push the reset button located beneath or on the side of the unit and use a quarter-inch Allen wrench in the bottom of the unit to free up the motor. (\$0)

Problem 3: Lawn mower is not start-

Possible fix: Replace spark plug or clean out bad fuel from the carburetor (\$3).

Problem 4: Dryer is taking too long to dry clothes.

Possible fix: Clean out the lint buildup in dryer venting from the inside of the dryer to the outside.

Hire professionals or make it a low-cost, DIY job using a long dryer vent cleaning brush (\$39).

A related fix could be cleaning or replacing the lint filter (\$25), which may become coated and clogged due to dryer sheet residue.

Problem 5: Washing machine rocks or moves too much when in use.

Possible fix: Level the machine by adjusting the front and rear legs.

Consult the owner's manual for instructions on this process, as it varies by brand and for front or topload models. (\$0)

# Things to consider before buying an extended warranty

Bumper-to-bumper factory warranties can protect motorists should their vehicles experience any problems in the initial years after the car was purchased. Such warranties typically expire after three years or roughly 36,000 miles, whichever comes first. Once that warranty has expired, vehicle owners must then finance the cost of any problems that arise on their own.

But many drivers purchase extended warranties to provide further protection once their bumper-to-bumper manufacturer warranties have expired. While an extended warranty is, in theory, a great idea, such extra protection is not necessarily for everyone, and there are some things car buyers should consider before buying an extended warranty.

- Length of ownership: If you are a driver who typically buys a new car every few years or once the odometer hits the 40,000 mile marker, then an extended warranty likely is not worth the investment.
- Backer: A manufacturer-backed extended warranty is typically your safest bet, as you can take the vehicle into any of that manufacturer's dealerships across the country and have your warranty honored. A third-party warranty may insist the vehicle is taken into the dealership where you purchased the car, a big negative for anyone who might be moving while they own the vehicle and an ever bigger cause for concern if you are not a fan of the maintenance staff where you purchased the vehicle.
- Coverage: All extended warranties are not the same, and it's important that you understand the differences between your options before purchasing a warranty. Many extended warranties are tiered, which means some will offer you the moon while less expensive options are far more limited in terms of what they do and do not cover. Carefully read the fine print of each extended warranty offered to you to be certain you are getting what you want for the

price you want to pay.

• Cost: Ask the finance manager where you are buying the vehicle to quote you a price on their extended warranty offerings, and then take that price to the dealer's competitors until you find a better deal. You may or may not find a better deal, and if you do you can always take that deal back to the dealer who sold you the car and ask that dealership to match

the price. If they won't, simply take the best offer you found from another dealer.

• Personal history: Your personal history also can provide valuable insight into whether or not an extended warranty is right for you. If you are a driver who strictly adheres to manufacturer maintenance schedules and drives defensively, then you may not need an extended warranty

since your car likely won't be in need of significant repairs. But if vehicle maintenance is not high

on your priority list or if you live in a place where traffic is often congested and your risk of accident

is greater, then an extended warranty is likely a wise investment.

Apple-picking is an autumn activity both kids and adults enjoy.

Although scores of people cite summer as their favorite time of year, autumn also is a beloved season. Cool breezes and crisp air seem tailormade for afternoons spent enjoying the great outdoors. The pleasant autumn weather and awe-inspiring foliage may be the reason so many festivals and outdoor events are scheduled this

time of year.

Apple- and pumpkinpicking are popular fall pastimes. Neighborhood orchards open their doors to the public, allowing men, women and children to scour their fields and trees for the perfect finds. Heed these picking tips to make the experience even more of a success.

## **Apples**

have open picking seasons plant dwarf apple trees to make the picking process easier, particularly for young children, so there's no need to bring along a ladder. You should still be able to find plenty of apples close to the ground.

A good farmer will know when certain varieties of apples are ripe, and he or Many orchards that she will likely cordon off

trees that are not ready for picking. Ripe apples will be crisp and firm. Keep in mind that apples ripen from the outside of the tree inward. Those are the ones usually picked first, anyway.

Try to get to an orchard earlier in the season. If you wait too long, the trees may be picked of most of the best fruit. Depending on where you live, apple-picking season may begin in mid-September and continue into mid-October.

Apples can bruise, so don't toss them into baskets when picking. Also, wait to wash apples until right before eating to premoisture-related spoilage. Apples keep best in a cool location.

# **Pumpkins**

Pumpkin patches are often found in close proximity to apple orchards. Picking pumpkins to eat or decorate the home is a popular autumn activity, one that families often enjoy together.

When visiting a pumpkin patch, dress accordingly. That means wearing shoes that you don't mind getting dirty, as the patch may be muddy. Layer clothing in case it is a chilly day. Breezes are more pronounced in open fields.

Pumpkins are "longkeepers," which means if they are uncut or not damaged, they can last for several weeks. This means you can pick pumpkins at the same time as apples. When selecting a pumpkin, look for one that is completely orange. After picking, a green or yellow pumpkin may never ripen

to orange.

Bring along a small wagon and knife so that you can cut the vine, if necessary. Pumpkins are heavy, and a wagon will come in handy, especially with youngsters in tow.

Ripe pumpkins should not dent easily. Examine your pumpkin for holes or insects, which could indicate internal rot that greatly reduces the shelf life of the pumpkin. Remember, carving the pumpkin reduces its life expectancy, so be sure to reserve that task until close to Halloween.

If you desire a pumpkin to turn into a baked treat or other dish, you will need a type of small, sweet cooking pumpkin known as a "sugar pumpkin." The meat of this pumpkin is much less stringy and more smooth than decorative pumpkin varieties.

Autumn is the season for apple- and pumpkinpicking. This is a great way to spend an afternoon outdoors with the family. If possible, visit an orchard on a weekday, when the crowds will be much smaller than during prime fall weekends.



# Establish a home fire safety plan

People rely on fire and smoke detectors to help keep them safe in their homes. Though fire and smoke alarms are effective, a firm fire safety plan that will keep everyone calm should a fire occur could make the difference between life and death.

The U.S. Fire Administration says that more than 3,500 Americans die each year in fires, while roughly 18,300 more men, women and children are injured each year. Cooking accounts for the greatest percentage of residential fires, followed by arson. Dryer vent fires are also a big concern. FEMA says that smoke, rather than the fire's flames, is responsible for 75 percent of all deaths by fire.

In addition to physical injury and material damage, fires can cause a host of problems. Psychological distress, monetary damages and loss of pets may come with fires. Loss of irreplaceable personal items is also a concern. Although fires can be devastating, they're also highly preventable, and smoke alarms and a home fire safety plan are two precautionary measures everyone should take.

Creating an evacuation plan doesn't have to be complicated. Such a plan can be established in a few minutes and then reinforced through practice every so often to keep everyone fresh on what to do.



• Begin by assessing the layout of the home. Figure out the two best exits from the home.

Keeping family members safe from fire involves establishing a fire safety plan.

- If your home doesn't have two doors, invest in a fire ladder so that one of the windows can be a point of exit.
- Know how to gain access to the exits, including the best path to take to avoid injury. It's a good idea to consider a few different scenarios. A kitchen adjacent to the upstairs staircase may become engulfed in flames and make exit by way of staircase impossible. Just because you have doors to the outside doesn't mean they'll present the best type of exit
- Sketch out the layout of the home and the escape plan. Smoke can make it difficult to know up from down. Be sure everyone can reach the exits even if vision is obstructed. Try it with your eyes closed.
- Check fire alarms routinely, and change batteries at least every year.
- Make sure windows can be easily opened if they are an exit point.
- Make note of who will be helping children or the elderly out of the home
- Establish a place where the family will meet outdoors. This area should be far enough away from the home so that everyone will be safe from smoke, flames and falling debris. Fires may ignite fuel explosions, so be sure the meeting spot is a good deal away.
- Children should be instructed to run to the meeting spot immediately without waiting behind for anyone to catch up. No one should reenter the home after arriving at the meeting spot.
- Do a few practice runs so that everyone will be accustomed to getting out mickly
- While in most cases it is better to escape and let the fire department extinguish a fire, in the event of a small fire, occupants may be able to stanch it with a personal fire extinguisher. Follow the acronym PASS to properly put out the fire.



- PULL the pin in the extinguisher.
- AIM the nozzle or hose at the base of the flames.
- SQUEEZE the trigger.
- SWEEP the foam across the fire base; do not just aim in one place.

Fire safety is very important. In conjunction with smoke alarms, a fire safety plan can help everyone get out alive.






